The pupils showed a thorough knowledge of the subjects from the least to the greatest, and the manner in which they acquitted themselves, would bring the blush to the cheeks of many of those who present themselves for examination as teachers.

The recitations in the different classes of arithmetic passed off in a very happy manner; showing the thorough instruction they had received. The most obtruse principle were elucidated with a clearness not inferior to the first schools of our cities. The afternoon was devoted to stage exercises, comprising declamation, dialogues and recitations, that were very creditably performed—reflecting credit upon both teacher and pupils. The removal of any officer from the State, Territory, or District for which she may be appointed shall vacate

All the officers of this Society. except the National Treasurer, shall be ladies; and the wife of each and Master of a Masonic Lodge throughout the country shall be a Collecting Agent, except when such Master shall be unmarried, and in this case he shall select and recommend to the County Treasurer a suitable person therefor. It shall be the duty of the Collecting Agent, without delay, to circulate subscription papers to collect funds, and to exercise all diligence in procuring and for-warding to the County Treasurer all moneys she may obtain for the purposes of this So-

It is the duty of the County Treasurer, as soon as notified of her appointment, to see that the local Agents attend to the duty of procuring and transmitting to her such contributions as they shall be able to raise in their respective Districts; to induce the local newspapers to aid the objects of this Society, and to publish the names of the Agents.

To use her best exertions in the collection of funds, and to transmit to the Vice-President of her District such funds as often as ten dollars shall be collected, as prescribed in article eighth of the Constitution, and, at the same time, to send a duplicate statement that such remittance has been made to J. B. H. Smith, National Treasurer, at Washington, D. C., and when and how made.
