



Winter Budding.

Ed. Horticultural Gleaner, Austin, Tex.:

Since a question has been raised concerning the origin of dormant or winter budding in America, it may be opportune to state that we have been practicing it at the station here since 1893. The first paper on the subject was written by Mr. H. Ness, the assistant of the horticultural department here, and was published in the issue of Farm and Ranch which gave the proceedings of the Rockport meeting of the State Horticultural Society during the Summer of 1893. Since then we have published descriptions of it and also given results of our experiments in several publications from the experiment station. A number of horticulturists have informed me that they are using the method successfully. While the method was discovered independently here, we have found out later that a German had practiced it to some extent many years ago. In a forthcoming bulletin on the peach we will give a translation of the German's method in comparison with our own. A good illustration will also be given showing exactly how it can be done. This bulletin will, of course, be distributed free to all addresses which appear on our mailing Meekan's Monthly.

list and others who may write for it. At your request I will give a short description of the method we have used. After cutting off a bud with some wood attached, cut a slip of bark with some wood attached to it also down about one inch, leaving it still attached to the lower end. This cut must be made about the size of the cut bud, so that the bud will fit evenly over the cut place. Part of the loose slip should be cut off and the bud slipped down between the wood and slip. the bud tightly with raffia or corn shuck. We have had success with this method in January. The buds soon knit firmly and can be forced out in Spring. method can be used to advantage in dry weather when the bark refuses to slip, or on stock which failed to take when budded in the usual way during the Summer. We have budded roses and many kinds of trees in this way successfully. method greatly prolongs the season of budding and will to that extent somewhat lessen the cost of the work.

The Rose Niphetos.

Rose after rose is introduced; and rose after rose disappears in the course of a few years. Only a very few seem to survive in popular estimation for any great number of years. One beautiful Tea rose, Niphetos, is one of those rare survivals. Although it is some fifty years since it was first introduced, it is just as popular to-day in some quarters as it ever was. It may be that this is because it was one of the first of this class to have a fine oval shape, which is the form generally preferred by those who love cut flowers. This is certainly so in America. It made its appearance first in France in 1843, having been raised by a celebrated raiser of new roses by the name of Bougere. The origin of the name is now attracting attention in the Old World. Some say it was given by Mr. Bougere, who was something of a classical scholar, after the nymph Nyphe, who was one of the companions of Diana; and that the name should therefore be spelled Nyphetos and not Niphetos. But like many other explanations of this kind it is probably nothing more than a shrewd guess .--

DISTRIBUTING POINTS.—We are making St. Louis, Mo., Cincinnati, Ohio, Rochester N. Y., and Philadelphia, Pa., distributing points; and will deliver free of freight charges to transfer companies, at either of these places, all orders in car lots, or in less than car lots, to be shipped from Huntsville on the dates named below:

For St. Louis—Early shipments from September 20th to October 10th; late shipments from October 25th to December 10th.

For Cincinnati, Rochester and Philadelphia-November 1st.

The orders will be packed in Huntsville, and those for less than car lots will be combined to make up car lots and shipped to these points and distributed promptly to the various railroads centering there. This plan insures quick time and low freight rates. Orders for less than car lots must be boxed at Huntsville. The price of boxes will be additional.

This offer to deliver to distributing points free of freight charges will not apply to less than car-lot orders, if shipment is required at other than the above named dates; but we will ship car-lot orders at any time after September 20th anywhere desired within the territory tributary to the cities designated, and will

deduct from the bill the cost of freight to the nearest distributing point.

Our reasons for charging more for Peach trees north of the Ohio River are that we must pay freight to distributing points, whilst our Southern customers pay freight from Huntsville, and that for shipments to Northern points we are usually required to dig early or place in cold storage in Spring, all of which is expensive, and the low prices we quote on Peach trees to Southern points cannot bear it. We make no additional charge for other trees for Northern points.

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uniof handling in the smaller numbers. We uniformly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filled at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March.

We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buy rees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direcour patrons to formism us with explicit airections as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will kelease and Guarantee, and required, we will Kelease and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the contrary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list as follows: Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.—Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS .- We do not require customers ASSORTMENTS.—We do not require customers to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substitution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission. mission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the condition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

We wish it expressly understood that payment is expected from the first collections made, and the time named is only intended as so many days of grace in which to make returns. To northern customers, who wish telay in stock for Spring trade, we will ship late in Fall or early in Spring, and allow time for payment till May 15th. If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for eash, but we make our prices low to command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time time to order is made, are expected to the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

Forms of Payment.—All bills are payable at the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. We will, however, accept checks from those of our customers

ever accept checks from those of our customers who may be located at places having no banking, express or postal facilities, provided they make them in every case payable "with exchange", or add ½ of one cent, to the amount of the bill for the cost of collection.

GRADES.—We grade very carefully, in some cases by caliper, in others by height. When graded by both caliper and height, the caliper must govern, as the height then named is only to be considered approximately. GUARANTEE OF GENUINENESS.—While we ex-

ercise the greatest diligence and care to have all our Trees, etc., true to label, and hold ourselves in readiness, on proper proof, to replace all trees, ctc.. that may prove unrue to label, free of charge, or refund the amount paid, it is mutually understood and agreed to, between the purchaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of genuineness shall in no case make us liable for any sum greater than that originally received for

sum greater than that originally received for said trees, etc., that shall prove untrue. ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by telegraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause, will receive consideration only when made cause, will receive consideration only when made promptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all out. The box should be placed in the cellar or protected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to secure the trees against damage, if the frost is allowed to come out in the natural way. Goods will be considered accepted if removed from the boxes in which they are packed, withfrom the boxes in which they are packed, with-out notice of complaint to us and without our orders for their disposition
