Though living in Campbell but a few months, Mr. and Mrs. Stimers have made many friends who deeply sympathise with them in their sad bereavement.

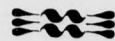

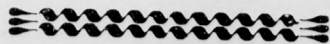

THE spring rains still continue to freshen up the gardens.

BURGLARS have never plied their vocation in Campbell to any considerable extent and this fact has led our people to be less cautious, perhaps, than is generally considered good policy. There will probably be more care taken in the future; doors and windows will be securely fastened and watch dogs will be in demand.

THE large attendance at the meetings in the interest of the Eleventh Amendment Campaign at San Jose the past week prophesies well for the success of the cause of Equal Rights and the result of the fall elections, we predict, will prove that the people of the country are fast coming to the conclusion that women are justly entitled to the right of franchise.

THE fearful destruction of life and property in Kansas and Texas by cyclones during the past ten days makes Californians more contented than ever with their "mild and unpretentious climate." While the frosty weather of the past few weeks has wrought havoc with our fruit crop our people still have roofs over their heads and their lives have not been endangered in any way by wind storms or raging floods. We have so much to be thankful for that grumbling seems out of place in this part of the world.

**NON-PARTIZAN VIEWS.**

**THE TWO GREAT CANALS.**

Great efforts have been made to bring the Nicaragua canal into politics,—to have it adopted by one or the other party as a party measure, and pushed by party methods. This would be very undesirable. The questions connected with the canal are entirely financial and scientific, and should be treated accordingly.

The question whether a canal can be made at all, either at Nicaragua or at Panama, is one for the engineers. The question whether either one or both of the canals would pay is one for the financiers. Other questions which arise about the use of the canal must be settled by the statesmen of the nations using it.

Californians are greatly interested in the canal, because, apparently, it would be of more advantage to them than to any other people. No doubt it would be a great benefit to us,—provided the charges should not be too high. It is well known that many ships sail around Africa, in going from England to India, rather than pay the charges at the Suez canal. Now, the rate of charges in the new canal would depend somewhat on the amount of tonnage which would pass through it.

The Suez canal, situated at the center of the commercial world, and carrying the vast business between Europe and Asia, is used by about eight million tons of shipping a year. The advocates of the Nicaragua canal estimate that it would carry about the same amount. The estimate seems quite unreasonable. Sailing vessels could never use this canal, because it is in the region of calms, and on account of the lack of good harbors. Railroads across the continent, and especially that at Tehautepec, would be important rivals, such as the Suez canal is entirely without.

It seems quite certain, then, that the amount of business to be done will not justify the construction of such a canal for a long time to come, if it be made for commercial reasons only. And it is instructive, in this connection, to notice the vastly greater amount of the internal commerce of the United States. The tonnage of vessels passing through the Detroit river is about twenty-three million tons a year, and the amount of freight carried by the railways of the United States is

about seven hundred and fifty million tons a year.

But if the canal be built as a national or military measure, it should be remembered that, in case of war, it will be entirely at the mercy of the greatest naval power in the world, or, in fact, constantly at the mercy of any revolutionists who can get hold of a few pounds of dynamite.

Again, it seems quite certain that the canal will not be built with American capital by a private corporation, for the simple reason that English capital is so much cheaper. An English investor is satisfied with three per cent where an American demands eight. Now, the advocates of the canal say it can be built for one hundred million dollars, but experienced engineers outside of their influence say that amount will have to be doubled. There seems to be no probability that it could pay interest on such a vast sum, even at English rates.

And, curiously enough, many of the most eminent engineers declare that a working canal cannot be made, either at Nicaragua or Panama, at any price. It is well known that the original plan of De Lesseps for a canal without locks at Panama proved infeasible and has been absolutely abandoned.

The probability seems to be very strong, then, that no canal will be made in either place. Hence it would be far wiser for Californians to give their attention to improving railway communication or starting a good line of sailing ships, than spend their energy in trying to get legislation in favor of a canal. We cannot expect the nation to invest such a vast sum of money in improving our transportation, and as a private enterprise it will not pay.

If either canal is ever completed, it will probably be that at Panama, where so much progress has been made, but it will hardly be done in less than a lifetime.

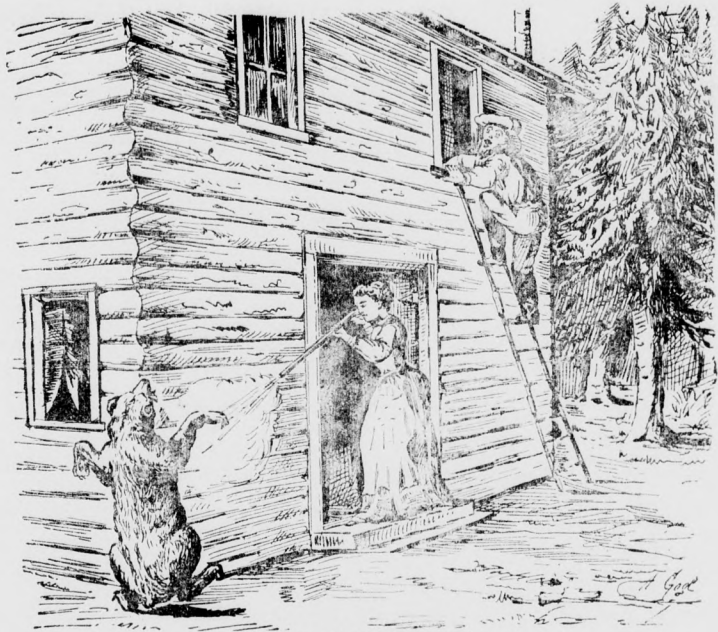

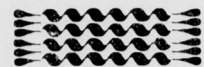
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
