WASHINGTON CITY, DEC. 10, 4850. Editors of the Pacific News:

The EMPIRE CITY has arrived and brought us sad news. It seems that your office and fix. tures have been destroyed by fire. Your loss is put down at \$30,000. I hope that it is rated B too high, and that you were, at least partially insured. If my hopes are to be betrayed by Be the realities, I shall, notwithstanding, not despair. We are all familiar with your energy and industry. You have never, in any of your enterprises, been overcome by circumstances within human control. Persevere, my dear General. for the sake of your wife and children. Let not this terrible calamity fright your character from its propriety. You have triumphed over adversity oftener than twice, and your spirit has given no sign yet of being broken. Remember your integrity, trust in God and your own right arm, and go ahead.

The papers state, also, that another newspaper office, the Picayune, has suffered damage in the same conflagration, but that its publication was soon resumed. I have no doubt you are, as I am, glad it is no worse with your brother

The Nashville Convention is to meet on tomorrow. It will be a very slim gathering. The President, Judge Sharkey, has publicly abdicated his responsibilities, and will not preside over the re-organization. The Virginia delegation have also concluded to have nothing more to do with it; all except one, who prefers being in at the death. The only States from which citizens will answer to the roll, are South Carolina and Mississippi, Georgia is overwhelmingly for the Union, and so is Tennessee, Kentucky, and the other slaveholding States. No general movement will be made by the South in case the provisions of the Constitution and the laws of Congress are faithfully carried out. Otherwise I believe some general plan of re sistance to Abolitionism will be agreed upon by the slave-holding States. Mr. Seward will, no doubt, introduce some bill for the modification, alias repeal, of the fugitive slave law; and Mr Giddings, Preston King, and "others like em, will try to knock up some such shuttlecock in the House. But the game will soon be over

amidst the derisive scorn of the spectators. The Secretary of the Treasury has issued circular upon the subject of exports, entitled under the law of Sept. 28, 1850, to debenture. He informs the commercial public that goods in the bonded warehouse, may be taken thence in the original packages and exported without payment of the usual duty. If shipped for con? tiguous British or Mexican ports, the duty must first be paid, and the customary bonds against re-importation given. A certificate of the arrival of the goods in such foreign port must also be obtained; whereupon the merchant will be entitled to draw back, and the money at once refunded from the treasury. The collectors of customs are fully instructed in all the details. and Mr. Corwin hopes that they are sufficiently clear to obviate all the vexatious difficulties which have been so deprecated by Boards of Commerce. San Francisco will be gratified at this, for your journals set forth divers proofs that the Custom House regulations have occasionally rubbed against the grain.

Have ever you heard of old Mr. Mc. Donough of New Orleans? He has for a long time, been a citizen of that place, and distinguished for his acquisitivness. He died a few days ago. and left his property, after deducting a few small legacies, to be equally divided between New Orleans and Baltimore, for benevolent purposes. His estate is rated over ten millions. The lawyers however will get some portion of the personal property, for efforts will be made to break the will.

The papers are making remarks about a new Printing Press which you ought to have, to fill the space vacated by the late fire. It is the invention of Jeptha A. Wilkinson of Providence. R. I. and differs from any now in use. The action of the press is rotary. The type being set on two cylinders both sides of the sheet are printed by the same motion. The paper is cut only as comes from the press, being placed thereon in large rolls as many thousand yards in length as desired. The papers being thus of the necessary dampness the wetting down is saved. As it passes from the cylinders the paper is by machinery cut off into sheets and folded at the rate of 20,000 sheets an hour. But one man or boy, is required to superintend the operation. The cost of the new Press is less than a double cylinder Napier, and is said to possess great advantages over any other press

in its effect on the type. This wonderful machine has been examined closely, and every printer so far, commends it ORIENT.

SOCIETY OF CALIFORNIA PIONEERS.

The First Semi-Annual Celebration of the Society of California Pioneers, in connection with the California Guards, on New Year's Day, was all their friends could wish, and such an impression was made as will lead our citizens in all future time to hail the natal day of this society with an enthusiasm hardly less than that we feel at the advent of the give as a sentimentday of our National Independence. As time rolls away, children will gather at the knee to hear the story of the lives of those of our. citizens, who yesterday paraded under the banner of the founders of our State.

At an early hour the citizens began to issemble at the head-quarters of the Society, it the corner of Montgomery and Commercial streets, where at eleven o'clock, the procession formed, and taking up the line of march, proceeded to the Plaza. First came Band of music, the equal of which is rarely seen. After the Band, followed the California Guards, under Capt. W. D. M. Howard, as' escort, attracting universal attention and approbation, not only from their fine bearing. but from their perfection in evolutions, which could only have been attained under officers of merit. Immediately after the military, was borne a splendid blue silk banner bearing the motto-

San Francisco—the Commercial Emporium of the Pacific."

This was followed by the elegant white satin banner, of the Pioneers, bearing in

" Society of California Pioneers. ESTABLISHED AUG., 1850."

Next came the Society, strong in numbers, and composing a large majority of our most valued citizens. The appearance of the procession was very striking, and elicited the warmest approbation at all points of the extended line of march.

Upon arriving at the Plaza, a national salute was fired, by a detachment of United States soldiers, making the welkin ring, and arousing the sleeping echoes of our noble bay. At the close of the salute, the orator of the day. Capt. John Frisber, appeared on the piazza of the adobe building, and addressed the large audience in the following language. As a scholastic production, it confers upon him a most enviable reputation, while none can refuse their commendation at its appropriateness to the glorious occa-

At six o'clock in the evening, a large comcanv. consisting of the Society of Pioneers, he California Guard, and a number of invited guests, sat down to a sumptuous feast, at the splendid hall of the Guards. At the head of the room was the beautiful banner of the Pioneers, representing a native Californian on the shore of the bay, receiving with amazement a Yankee gold-seeker, just landed from a ship seen in the distance. Around the room was appropriately grouped the stars and stripes, surmounted by golden spread eagles.

At the hour named, the President of the Society of Pioneers, Capt. W. D. M. How-ARD, took his seat at the head of the centre table, at which were placed, the invited guests, the Society and Soldiery occupying the tables to the right and left. The feast of good things was in every way creditable to the entertainers, and to those who had the management in getting up the dinner.

After discussing the variety of eatables set before them, with the will of men who had seen some duty during the day, the President announced the reading of the Regular Toasts. and between the popping of champagne corks, and the general hilarity manifested on all sides, we endeavored to catch the spirit of the many good things said and done on the occasion. We were also informed through the same source, that there is no want of money in the streets, to be had at 5 per cent. when the securities are ample. Subscriptions to the stock of the "Pacific Marine Insurance Co." have reached within \$29,000 of the amount required to commence business. Our commerce can then obtain protection at home, instead of seeking for it in localities where our honesty is questioned, and prudence denied.
