People Live Longer In Kansas, Claims U. S. Department

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug .—People live longer in Kansas than in any state in the union, according to new statis-tics made public today by the commerce department.

The expectation of life at birth in Kansas is 59.73 for white males and 60.89 for white females. The average for the United States is 55.23 for men and 57.41 for women

The life tables upon which the department based its figures were compiled from the 1920 census, covering seventyfour per cent of the total pop-ulation of the country. As a standard of comparison

for the expectation of life estimates, the department cites the figures for females in the county of West Essex in England, which were 63.05 in 1911 and 1912. This figure was the highest ever published officially in any country. Washington, D. C., outranks

all of the other fourteen large cities with 59.83 for white females. Pittsburg comes at the foot of the list with 47,16 years for white males and 50.42 for white females.

As you are already aware, the executives of the carriers declared their inability to restore seniority rights unimpaired.

"It is exceedingly gratifying however, that in responding to the terms which were proposed that both the spokesmen, for the employes have pledged that they will recognize the validity of all decisions by the railroad labor board and to faithfully carry out such decisions as contemplated by Moreover, spokesmen for carriers and employes have approved the second paragraph of the proposal and in their approval have agreed that 'railroad labor made in the strike, may be taken in the exercise of reorganized rights, by either party, to the railroad labor board for re-hearing." Inasmuch as the employes have agreed to all terms proposed and the executives have agreed to two of the bases of the settlement and rejected the third, there remains only the question of seniority covered in paragraph three in dispute, to bar a settlement. 
