

More About Japan Plums.


The handsomest plums we have ever seen were sent to us by Butler & Jewell, nurserymen of Cromwell, Conn.,-Burbanks. They were all of about the same size, and, except as to size, are well described under Ruralisms of August 21. They measured 61/2 inches either way in circumference, and were, therefore nearly In quality they seemed a shade round. better than Abundance, while resembling it in color of flesh, juiciness and meatiness. Under date of August 4th Butler & Jewell wrote us: "We have now finished marketing the Abundance, and for four days have been working off our Burbanks, and this week will probably finish them. Later we shall have Chabot and Satsuma. We have had specimens of the Burbank measuring eight inches in circumference.".....

It will be remembered that our own tree of Burbank was killed by a trial of the much-lauded Dendrolene, so that we may not speak of the Burbank from experience. All of the reports we have had except the following, all the specimens we have received, would, however, lead to the conclusion that the Burbank is larger and slightly better in quality than the Abundance.

C. F. McNair & Co., of Dansville, N. Y., favor us with with an important bit of their experience which goes to show that we must not hastily conclude that, because the Burbank is better in one locality, it is better in all:

"At the present time there is a strong tendency in some quarters to condemn the Abundance plum, and as we are orchardists and have fruited both this and Burbank this season under similar conditions, we feel competent to give positive testimony as to the two fruits. Our soil is a stiff, red clay, on a steep sidehill; ground very dry. The trees are six years old and have borne their first crop this year, Both sorts fruited too heavily, and were left without thinning purposely, but the Abundance are so much larger, better in color and quality, that we are surprised, and sent a plate of specimens to the State Fair at Syracuse to be in the exhibit of the Western New York Horticulrural Society. The Abundance are larger than Bradshaw fruiting alongside. and fully equal to the best specimens of Lincoln as grown in our town; in fact, twice the size and weight of Burbank in our grounds. A report from the exhibit at the fair will corroborate our statement. The Abundance is a fine upright grower, while the Burbank is very sprawling in habit. Of about fifty odd kinds of plums we have in our orchard the Abundance is decidedly the best all-around plum. Neither it or nor Burbank rotted or fell from curculio, while all the other sorts rotted very badly and were much injured by the little Turk."

The one thing that most drew us toward the Japan plums was the fact that they (as judged by the Abundance, and later by Ogon, Willard and Satsnma) were, in the Rural Grounds, practically curculio proof. All other plums tried there-and we began 25 years ago-were not curculio proof, and the crops borne were not worth the soil the trees covered. True it is that we might have jarred the trees, as do the nurserymen and orchardists, but the first object of the Rural Grounds experiments has been to find were curculio proof, implums that proved kind of gooseberries and grapes that would yield large crops without spraying; improved varieties of all kinds hardier and healthier than old kinds. ----Rural New Yorker.



DISTRIBUTING POINTS.

We are making St. Louis, Mo., Cincinnati, Ohio, Rochester, N. [^] This offer to deliver to distributing points free of freight charges will not apply to less than car-lot orders, if shipment is required at other than the above named dates; but we will ship car-lot orders at any time after September 20th anywhere desired within the territory tributary to the cities designated, and will deduct from he bill the cost of freight to the nearest distributing point

The prices quoted herein are made very low, to induce early orders, Fall shipments and Fall payments. Orders for trees to be shipped in Spring, Spring payments, will be accepted only at an advance of 25 per cent. over present quotations. This does not apply to Roses.

NEBRASKA, August 17th, 1897.—"You may tell it far and wide that for over 20 years I have had the best success with your cherries of any that I could buy. Last year \$5.00 worth of cherries were picked from one of your trees, out four year. This year three acres planted from your trees (mostly Russians) brought over three hundred dollars. Trees out five years. I want 1,000 in the Spring."

GEORGIA, July 17, 1897.—"We fruited many varieties of Peaches this year grown on trees received from you two years ago. All are corect to label except Chinese Blood."

For 100 rates add 1 cent each; for 10 rates add $2\frac{1}{2}$ cents each to the 1000 rates.

PEACH TREES.-On Peach, Leading Varieties

Our Peach Trees are budded on seedlings grown from Tennessee and Alabama Pits. They are free from Aphis or Root-knots, and have fewer borers than those from most nurseries.

We can supply beautiful medium and small-sized peach trees this year. The lands upon which our peach trees are grown this year produces a light, well-matured tree, with fine roots. These trees will answer well the purpose of "June Buds," and are very much better to transplant, as they will be well matured to the terminal bud, while June Buds are often tender at the tips. The little trees we offer should not be confounded with the little culls left after the larger trees have been dug and offered so cheaply by other nurseries. Our peach trees have been grown with especial reference to the Southern trade, where small sizes are mostly wanted. The Yellows and Rosette are unknown in this locality, and we have been careful not to bring in any buds from affected localities.

Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filed at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten. SEASON.—Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March. We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buy trees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

wanted for snipment. SHIPPING DIRECTIONS.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direc-tions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants of the veyore shipment by US. after a proper shipment by us.

RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. This left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows:

prompt-paying customers. Parties with whom we have had no business transactions, will save time by sending reference, with order. We wish it expressly understood that payment is expected from the first collections made, and the time named is only intended as so many days of grace in which to make returns. To northern customers, who wish to lay in stock days of grace in which to make returns. To northern customers, who wish to lay in stock for Spring trade, we will ship late in Fall or early in Spring, and allow time for payment till May 15th. If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per anoum must be paid on over due accounts brower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

FORMS OF PAYMENT.—All bills are payable at the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. ercise the greatest diligence and care to have all our Trees, etc., true to label, and hold ourselves in readiness, on proper proof, to replace all trees, etc. that may prove untrue to label, free of charge, or refund the amount paid, it is mutu-ally understood and agreed to, between the purchaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of genchaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of gen-uineness shall in no case make us liable for any sum greater than that originally received for said trees, etc., that shall prove untrue. ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by tel-egraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating

reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause, will receive consideration only when made promptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival they should get be for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all out. The box should be placed in the cellar or pro-tected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to secure the trees against damage, if the frost is allowed to come out in the natural way. 


