Fear an Eruption Lean Mountain, Nebraska's miniature volcane, has been for two days sending pp smoke and steam. The volcano is situated on the Missouri river, in Cedar county, about L50 miles above Omaha, and has been practically dead for thirty years. Reports say that all the settlers in the immediate neighborhood are preparing to move. Geologists say smoke is caused by water from Missouri soaking into the limestope rock formation of the mountain, but the people are fearful of an eruption.

Guadejara, Mexico, May 13.-The Col-Gandejara, Mexico, May 13.—The Col-ima volcano shows strong indications of a great eruption, and the inhabitants are leaving the valley at the base and are moving to a safe distance from the peak-from which smoke and puffs of flame have been belehing for several days. Mount Colima has threatened renewed activity for several weeks. NOT ONE HOUSE HAS BEEN LEFT INTACT

Survivors Tell of the Barning of the British Steamer Roraima -The Relief Fund.

The city of St. Pierre stretched nearly two miles along the water front and half a mile back to the cliff, the base of the volcano. The houses of the richer French families were built of stone. The sab-covered hills were flanked by the still smoking volcano. The ruins were still turning in many places and trightful odors of burned flesh filled the str. With great difficulty a landing was effected. Not one house was left instact. Everywhere were heaps of mud, of beighter ashes or piles of volcanie stones.

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

WILD RIDE ON SNOWSLIDE,

It Is Feared Several Men May Have Been Buried,

Been Buried.

J. W. Binndell has arrived in Nelson from McGuigan basin, bringing additional particulars of the anowslide which came down Washington mourtain on Thursday and resulted in the death of John Douglass, says the Nelson News.

Mr. Blundell visited the scene of the slide shortly after it came down. He says the first report was no exaggeration, and that there are fears now that other men may be buried beneath the debris which covers the Brown camp. The slide occurred in a draw. About 5,000 feet below the summit was a narrow bench, extending across the draw, and on this, in a row, had been built the buildings connected with the packing camp. The Washington mine is situated near the summit, while McGuigan, the nearest point on the railway, is four miles away. The trail to the mine comes down one side of the hill, through the packing camp, and up the other side towards McGuigan,

Just at noon J. W. Powers, the proprietor, was getting into the camp the heard a terrific roar, and looking up the

heard a terrific roar, and looking up the ravine saw an immonse wall of snow, logs and rock sweeping down on him like a wave. John Douglass, Sandr McDimald and H. Powers also made a rush for the side of the ravine, but were caught before they had fairly started and swept forward on the crest of the avalanche. Douglass went under, and when found later the appearance of the body showed that he had been smothered to death. McDonald was struct oy a bank of snow, and white carried atong on its wild ride retained conscion, yes, and wondered how death would strike him. His reflections were brought to an end by being swallowed up in the snow and he knew nothing more till dug out. The rescuers saw his feet sticking up through the snow.

H. Powers had a still more thrilling escape. He was relied and thrown, lodging with his head on a huge log, with his right arm and leg jammed between some pieces of timber. As he lay there a huge fir tree, over two feet in diameter, swung over him and came down till it scraped the flesh off his temple to the bone, and stopped. Another inch would have fractured his skull which was pinned between the huge tree above and the log undernenth.
