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The additions and corrections for all the Parts will be given with the last Part, similar to specimen in Part I., and the Author trusts that he will continue to be favoured with notes of all such as may be observed by his readers. WILLIAM FAITHORNE was one of the sons of the famous line engraver of the same names, and appears to have practised altogether in mezzotinto. He is said to have caused great grief to his father by his dissipated habits, and to have died before him; but the latter assertion cannot be true, for his father died in 1691, and the younger man's prints reach far into Queen Anne's reign, and could not possibly have been done before his father's death; besides, his earlier pieces are plainly inscribed, "W. Faithorne, junior" (Nos. 12, 27, 33, 34)), and without very good reason to the contrary, the conclusion must be come to, that when the remainder were done he was "junior" no longer.

It is not unlikely that the dissipated habits were truly imputed to him, for we find him merely working for a printseller, and not established, as was the custom of most other artists, at an address of his own; that on No. 33 is the address of his father, where he removed, according to Walpole, in 1680.

His style at his best is highly finished, and his ladies are very pleasing; but his prints generally have not the powerful effect of some other works of his time.

Bromley, p. 252, mentions Caroline Wilhelmina, who was afterwards Queen of George II., as engraved by Faithorne after Kerseboom, when Princess of Hanover. The print, however, more probably represents, as stated in the "Sutherland Catalogue" (Vol. I., p. 431,) Sophia Dorothea, the Queen of George I. See No. 39.

4. Charles I.

H. L., directed and facing to front, looking upwards, cap, both hands raised, rays from head, long hair, at top to left a hand holding crown of glory, similar to print by Faber, jun., but without the cherub. Above at top, Corruptibilem pro incorruptibile. Under, verses as in Faber's print, see page 327; at bottom, W Faithorne fec. E Cooper ex. H. 12\frac{1}{4}; Sub. 9\frac{1}{8}; W. 7\frac{5}{8}.

Charles II. after Riley, is mentioned by Bromley, p. 117. Suth. Cat. mentions one in armour, with George and ribbon, "Faithorne fecit. Beckett ex." This may be one of those mentioned under "Engraver not ascertained."

6. Jeremiah Collier. E. LELY.

H. L., in oval, directed towards right, facing towards and looking to front, thick wig, bands, black gown. Under, Mr Jeremiah Collier. Edmund Lely pinxit. W Faithorne Fecit. E Cooper exc. H. 10; W. 7\frac{3}{8}; O. D. H. 8\frac{5}{8}; W. 6\frac{7}{8}.

Born at Stow Qui, Cambridgeshire, 1650; educated at Cambridge; entered the Church, but afterwards left it; wrote against the Revolution, and was imprisoned; author of the "Great Dictionary," and of the celebrated attack on the Stage. Died of the stone, 26th April 1726; buried at St. Pancras.

7. (Elizabeth Cooper.) LELY.

W. L., a young girl, sitting on left, directed and looking to front, right hand on seat beside her, left taking grapes from a young Moor towards right, who presents them kneeling on his right knee, trees and buildings in background. Under, at bottom, *P Lelly Eques pinx:* E Cooper ex: W Faithorne fec. H. 13\frac{1}{2}; Sub. 12\frac{3}{8}; W. 10.

The likeness between the faces of the two foregoing would show them to be brother and sister; it has been conjectured that they are the children of the publisher of the plates, the celebrated printseller Edward Cooper, and that Priscilla Cooper, engraved (as was also his own portrait) by Pelham, was his wife.

Could this John Cooper have grown up to be the J. Cooper whose works have been described, page 142?

9. John Dryden. CLOSTERMAN.

Short H. L., in oval, directed towards left, facing towards and

Bromley (p. 189) mentions two prints, but there is probably only the one; perhaps some variation of it may exist.

"Glorious John," born 1631. Died, 1st May, 1701; buried in Westminster Abbey.

10. Prince Eugene. PFEFFER.

H. L., in oval, directed towards right, looking to front, long wig, armour, collar and order of Golden Fleece. Under, The most Serene Prince Eugene of Savoy, Knight of ye Order of the Golden Fleece, Privy Councellour to his Imperial Matie & Generalissimo of all his Forces in Italy. Done from the Original painted at Vienna. I. A. Pfeffer pinx. W Faithorne fecit. Cum Privilegio. Sold by E Cooper at the 3 Pidgeons in Bedford Street. H. 13½; W. 10½; O. D. H. 11¾; W. 9½. Born at Paris, 1663; son of Count Soissons by a niece of Cardinal Mazarin, and grandson of Charles Emanuel, 1st Duke of Savoy, but left the French for the service of the Emperor Leopold, and was one of the most celebrated generals of the period, acting in conjunction with Marlborough for some time. Died at Vienna, 21st April, 1736. He was attached to the arts, and formed a fine and extensive collection of prints.

11. (Thomas Flatman.)

L., standing, directed to front, facing and looking towards left, long hair, cravat tied round throat, dark dress, right elbow leaning on scroll on base of pillar to left, left hand holding open roll with shield of arms and coronet, mountain and buildings in distance to right. In catalogue of Stowe Granger, p. 125, three states are mentioned, first with the roll plain, which is probably intermediate between the foregoing; second, with the portrait; third, with the arms; this order of arrangement will not be sustained on careful comparison of the prints.

This is probably the engraver's earliest print, and he may have been

assisted in it by his father, by whom, or by Flatman himself, the drawing or painting was probably made.

Born about 1633; was both poet and painter. Died in London, 8th Dec., 1688.

12. Prince George of Denmark.

14. George of Hanover, afterwards George II. FOUNTAIN.

Done from ye original brought over by ye late Earl of Macclessield & humbly dedicated to ye Rt Honble ye Ld Mohun By his most humble Servt E. Cooper. Fountin Pinxit. W Faithorne secit. 15. Lady Grace Gethin. DICKSON.

pearls, falling over left shoulder, low dress, with armlets and breast-loop of jewels. Under, The Hon* The Lady Grace Gethin A Dick-fon Pinxit. W Faithorne Fec. E Cooper ex. H. $6\frac{3}{4}$; W. $4\frac{1}{8}$; O. D. H. $5\frac{1}{4}$; W. $4\frac{1}{4}$.

The portrait is prefixed to a book entitled, "Reliquiæ Gethinianæ," which was "Printed by D Edwards for the Author 1699."

Daughter of Sir George Norton, of Abbot's Leigh, Co. Somerset; mistress of great accomplishments; married Sir Richard Gethin, of Gethin-grott, Ireland. She died in her 21st year, 11th Oct., 1697; buried at Hollingbourne, and a beautiful monument erected to her in Westminster Abbey. The above-mentioned book is a collection of her short essays and witty sentences, much of it extracted from Lord Bacon's works.

16. Richard Gomeldon. KERSEBOOM.

Nearly W. L., sitting, directed slightly to left, facing slightly to right, looking to front, wig, coat, and laced shirt open at breast, right elbow on pedestal of fluted pillar to left, left hand on seat, trees in distance to right, large building to left. Called a musician by Bromley, and a dancing-master by Noble, but there is no evidence in the print to corroborate either assertion; he may not improbably have been of the family of Gomeldon, of Somerfield, Co. Kent, of which the Gumbletons of Cork are an offshoot-Richard is the principal family name of the latter.

17. Sir Richard Haddock. CLOSTERMAN.

Knighted in 1678; appointed as above, and an admiral. Died, 26th February, 1714; aged 85.

H. L., directed and looking to front, facing slightly to right, hair high, curl on left shoulder, earring, low dress. Under, The Honble Mrs Mariamne Herbert I Kersaboom pinx. W Faithorne fecit. Cum privilegio Regis. E Cooper excudit. H. 9\frac{3}{4}; Sub. 8\frac{5}{8}; W. 7\frac{1}{4}.

19. Lady Katherine Hyde. DAHL.

L., standing, directed towards right, facing and looking towards left, ribbons in hair, low dress, mantle over left shoulder, held by right hand and blown by the wind, left hand gathering oranges from tree to right. Under, The Lady Katharine Hyde. M Dahll pinx: W Faithorne fec: Cum Privilegio Regis. E Cooper Ex: H. 13\frac{8}{5}; Sub. 12\frac{8}{6}; W. 9\frac{3}{4}.

Bromley says this plate was altered and inscribed, "Lady Frail."

According to Bromley, youngest daughter of Lawrence, Earl of Rochester, Lady of the Bedchamber to Queen Anne, who died, 1737, aged 72; but the print more probably represents another of the same name who was daughter of Lord Cornbury (in 1709, 3rd Earl of Clarendon), and who died in 1708, aged 18. It could not, in any case, as queried by Bromley, be the Lady Catherine Hyde, afterwards the celebrated Duchess of Queensbury, as she was not born until 10th Feb., 1700, and would only have been a child when the print was engraved.

20. (The Impeached Lords.)

Bromley does not mention this print, but alludes to 8vo portraits

of Somers and Orford, having met, no doubt, with them after they had been cut from the others.

The first Partition Treaty between England and Holland, for regulating the Spanish Succession, was signed October 11th, 1698; in April, 1700, through a series of machinations of the Tories, aided by France, articles of impeachment, founded on Secretary Vernon's letters, were brought up by the Commons against these four noblemen for their conduct in the matter. These proceedings were very unpopular, and the noblemen were afterwards acquitted by the Lords.

The Index to "Sutherland Catalogue" calls this print the "Lords Justices."

H. L., in oval, directed towards right, looking to front, earrings, low dress, necklace, two large brooches on boddice, knots and curls on shoulder. Born at Market Harborough, Leicestershire; educated at Cambridge; chaplain to Heneage Finch, Earl of Nottingham; Bishop of Norwich, 1691; translated to Ely, 1707. Died at Ely House, Holborn, July 31st, 1714, in his 68th year. He was an eminent patron of learning, and his library was purchased by George I., and presented by him to the University of Cambridge.

Mrs. Morgan, of Norwich, is mentioned in Musgrave sale catalogue, p. 301, as by this artist. Bromley, p. 247, mentions the print, without the engraver's name, and says it is often mistaken for the Princess of Hanover. No impression with the name is in the Pepysian collection, as stated by him.

26. Margaret Nicholls. DAHL.

dress, displaying outline of figure, veil from back of head, right hand leaning on rock to left, left hand held to parrot perched on short branch of tree to right, overhanging rock in background to left, landscape in distance towards right. Noble, Vol. II., p. 382, says that this print and that of Madam Plowden (No. 29) resemble each other so much that they can hardly be distinguished; he evidently never saw the prints he writes about.

His portraits bear dates from 1765 to 1773; many of them are on an unusually large scale, and should be viewed at a little distance; they display considerable knowledge of the art.

His stock of plates appear to have fallen, at his death, into the hands of Boydell (except Nos. 3, 12, 13, 15, and 16), who issued impressions from them without altering Finlayson's address. These plates and the remainders of the proofs and prints were sold at Boydell's sale, on 1st June, 1818, mostly at very moderate prices.

Bromley, p. 417, mentions a print of the Duchess of Argyll

after Hamilton, by Finlayson; but this is probably an error for Faber's plate (page 364), which Bromley does not mention.

EDWARD FISHER, according to Redgrave, was born in Ireland, in 1730; was at first a hatter, but took to engraving; went to London; became a member of the Incorporated Society of Artists in 1766, and died about 1785.

His earliest dated print is 1758, and his latest, 1781; so that he may have been born later and died sooner than stated.

Pasquin says that he lived in the house in Leicester-square, in which Gardelle murdered Mrs. Anne King. This occurred on 19th February, 1761. He appears to have moved to Ludgate-street in 1778.

As no engraving of his certainly done in Ireland has been met with, it is possible that he learned the art in London, and probably 486 FISHER.

from his countryman, MacArdell, with whom he is often mentioned, and some of whose plates he published.

It is said that Reynolds called him "injudiciously exact," for finishing too highly what this painter considered the unimportant parts of the plate, and which possibly were carelessly done in the picture. This appears to be rather hypercriticism, and Fisher must be allowed a high place for both breadth of treatment and delicacy of finish.

After his death, his plates were dispersed amongst several printsellers; some of them were dishonestly tampered with, and by erasing the lettering, false proofs were produced. An examination of the genuine ones will, however, at once exhibit the vast difference between them.

MICHAEL FORD appears to have been a pupil of John Brooks along with MacArdell, Houston, Purcell, and Spooner. He did not leave Ireland with them, but set up in the same locality, as successor to Brooks, and both painted and engraved there.

His name is also found on some of Andrew Miller's plates.

Brooks, as has been observed, quitted Ireland about 1747, and the dates on Ford's prints would not prove that he maintained the establishment in Dublin for more than four or five years after; it is very probable that he then also visited London, but he does not seem to have settled there.

There is some ground for supposing that he was lost in the ship "Dublin Trader" (Capt. White), which left Parkgate for Dublin, on 28th Oct., 1758, and was not afterwards heard of; she had on board £70,000 in money; and £80,000 in goods, and amongst her passengers were Edward, 5th Earl of Drogheda, and his son; Theophilus Cibber; and Maddox, the rope-dancer.

In the appendix to Gilbert's "History of Dublin," Vol. II., a list of prints by Ford is given, which mentions, in addition to those described, the following, which have not been met with:—

THOMAS FRYE was born in or near Dublin, in 1710; when a young man he went to London in company with Stoppelaer, and soon afterwards painted and engraved Frederick, Prince of Wales, and others.

A few years afterwards, a scheme was set on foot to introduce the art of making china into England, and a manufactory was established at Bow, of which Frye was requested to undertake the management; this he engaged in with alacrity, and spent fifteen years in bringing it to perfection, losing his health amongst the furnaces. The undertaking was, however, not prosperous; the clay brought from South Carolina was so heavily taxed that the price of the china was very high; the specimens being, however, esteemed very fine, as to elegance of design and painting of the figures, excellences due to this artist's talents; in glazing they were defective. From the ruins of this factory those of Chelsea and Worcester had their origin.

After a tour to Wales to recover health, during which he painted portraits to defray his expenses, he took a house in Hatton Garden, London, and resumed his profession with eagerness. He frequented the playhouse in order to obtain likenesses of George III. and his queen, and it is said that this was perceived, and that their majesties looked towards the artist to enable him to complete his work. He scraped other heads of life-size, chiefly from imagination, as the ladies who were applied to would not consent to it, excusing themselves by saying that they did not know in what company they might be placed.

Being corpulent and subject to gout, he adopted too sparing a regimen, thereby bringing on various diseases; these, assisted by too great an application to his art, brought on consumption, of which he died, on 2nd April, 1762.

By his wife he left a son, who turned out an idle, drunken fellow, and two daughters, who assisted him in painting the china at Bow, but both married indiscreetly.

His character was open, affable, and humane, patient under mis-

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fortune, and very industrious. He was particularly kind to young artists, to whom he afforded opportunities of improvement by watching him at work. He was on terms of familiarity with the President of the Royal Academy (Sir Joshua Reynolds), to whom he was introduced by Mr. Ellis, whose portrait he painted.

His pictures in general were well finished, the colouring correct

and lasting, and he was an excellent miniature painter.

The foregoing particulars are from "Walker's Hibernian Magazine" for 1789; and Redgrave gives substantially the same account.

Frye's epitaph is in the "Gentleman's Magazine" for 1764.

One of his pupils was Mr. Pether, who engraved some of his designs in a style similar to his own: it is probable that those of the following, dated subsequently to the artist's death, may have been completed by Pether.

Born at Byer's Green, Durham, 22nd Sept., 1711; became an ingenious mathematician and astronomer; author of many almanacks, calculations of eclipses, treatises on use of the globes, &c; visited Ireland, in 1746, and published the first volume of "Louthiana;" retired, in 1762, to the locality where he was born, and there died, in February, 1786. There is a description of his house in "Gent's. Mag." for 1793, p. 213.

9-25. Life-sized Heads.

Eighteen Plates, including No. 6.

Short H. L.'s. States as those of No. 1.

"Boydell's Catalogue," of 1783, mentions Nos. 9 to 19, with No. 6, as one set of twelve, and Nos. 20 to 25 as a second set of six. At the Boydell sale, June 1st, 1818, the plates of all, with the two larger sizes of George III. and Queen Charlotte, were sold to Robinson for twenty guineas.

These prints were mentioned as portraits, but the personages are not stated, and names have been guessed for several without any really sound reason. From examination, it would seem likely that the first set of twelve were drawn from persons sitting as models, probably some of the painter's own family and acquaintance, and that the second set of six were elaborated afterwards from sketches taken at the theatre, or perhaps from recollection only; but however this may be, their great artistic merit must be admitted.

The arrangement which follows is that of Boydell's Catalogue of 1783.

Born, 29th March, 1713; second son of Brabazon Ponsonby (created Earl of Bessborough, 1739); married, 1743, Lady Elizabeth Cavendish, daughter of 3rd Duke of Devonshire; Commissioner of the Revenue in Ireland, 1744; Speaker, 1756 to 1771. He died at Bishop's Court, near Naas, Co. Kildare, 16th August, 1787. (Debrett gives this date incorrectly, 1789.) His eldest son was created Lord Ponsonby of Imokilly, in 1806; his second son was Lord Chancellor of Ireland, and a leading member of Opposition in the English Parliament.

2. John Wesley.

H. L., in oval frame, directed, facing, and looking towards right,

long hair, bands, black gown. Under, John Wesley M.A. Publish'd as the Act directs April 20. 1779. H. 13; Sub. 12; W. 9; O. D. H. 8; W. 71.

HENRI GASCAR was, according to Nagler, born in Paris, in 1635, and died at Rome, in 1701. He was brought to England under the patronage of the Duchess of Portsmouth, and became, in the fashionable estimation of the day, the rival, as a painter, to Lely himself. He is stated to have amassed a considerable sum by his portraits, and after his leaving England (about 1680, as stated by Graham), to have been successful in Italy also.

There is no certain proof that he engraved the following prints, which bear his name as painter only; but, by whomsoever executed, they are of the greatest interest, as being amongst the earliest specimens of the art in this country, and as being authentic and contemporary likenesses of the leading beauties of Charles the Second's court.

The scraping upon them is finished and artistic in manner, but the ground is open and more coarsely prepared than was afterwards the case when Blooteling had improved the method: this may have led to Strutt's remark, that they were "vile," and Bryan calls them "miserable;" but connoisseurs are not likely to be guided by such ignorant and flippant remarks, which might, with as little reason, be applied to the works of Von Siegen and Prince Rupert.

The inscriptions are so quaint in expression, and the characters so peculiar, that they strongly point to the conclusion that they were done by a Frenchman not accustomed to engrave letters.

All the prints are referable to dates previous to 1676.

1. Ladies Barrington and St. John.

T. Q. L.'s., sitting, to left Lady Anne, looking and facing nearly to front, curls, low dress, necklace, pointing with right hand to vase of Salara law. flowers on table between them, on which her left arm rests; to right which her left arm rests; to right Lady Mary similarly dressed, facing towards left, looking to front, right elbow on table, hand holding flower to cheek, left hand in lap,

curtain and pillar to left, terraces and temple in distance to right. Under, H Gascar Pinx My Lady Anne Barrington and My Lady Mary Saniohn. W. 15\frac{5}{8}; H: 11\frac{3}{8}; Sub. 10\frac{7}{8}. Brit: Mus.

Granger states that he knows nothing of the personal history of these ladies, and Bromley only says that the print is very scarce. It has therefore not yet been placed on record, that they were the daughters, and, with their sister Essex, the co-heiresses of Robert Rich, Earl of Warwick. Anne was married to Thomas, son and heir to Sir John Barrington, of Barrington Hall, Essex, third baronet of that family. He died before his father, but their two sons succeeded as 4th and 5th baronets. Mary was married to Henry St. John, who succeeded, in 1708, as 4th baronet, and was created, in 1716, Baron St. John of Battersea, and their only son was Henry, the famous Viscount Bolingbroke.

2. (Lord James Beauclerk.)

As Cupid, looking to front, wings, resting among clouds, left hand holding an arrow, which he touches with second finger of right hand. Under, to left, *II Gascar Pinx*. H. 8; Sub. 7%; W. 7.

Not mentioned by Bromley. One known. Brit: Mus.

Second son of Elinor Gwin and Charles II. He died in France, about Michaelmas, 1680; aged about 9 years.

The print has been also called the Earl of Burford. See No. 6.

3. Madame Sophia Bulkeley.

Nearly T. Q. L., standing, directed and looking to front, facing slightly towards left, hair in flowing curls behind right shoulder, low dress, brooch, hands holding vase, on which are carved heads and garlands, rocks in background. Under, H. Gascar Pinix. H. 13\frac{1}{8} Sub. 12\frac{1}{4}; W. 9\frac{5}{8}.

Daughter of Walter Stuart, and younger sister of the Duchess of Richmond; married the Hon. Henry Bulkeley, who was fourth son of Thomas, 1st Viscount Bulkeley, and master of the household to Charles II., and James II. One of their daughters, Charlotte, married Lord Clare, another, Anne, married James, Duke of Berwick, so that the family probably accompanied James II. into France after his abdi-

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cation. Madame Bulkeley is said to have been imprisoned in the Bastile for holding correspondence with Lord Godolphin, and Granger supposes that there was some connexion between them from the following lines, written in 1680:—

"Bulkeley's Godolphin's only care, As Middleton is Hyde's."

Bromley, p. 118, mentions a mez. of Charles II., from Gascar's painting; it is distinct from the one engraved in line by Vandrebanc, in 1675. This may be one of the portraits under "engraver not ascertained;" or it is possible that an impression of Corbetta (No. 5), without the separate plate, may have been mistaken for Charles II., as there is some resemblance, and a superficial observer might not detect the difference.

4. Barbara, Duchess of Cleveland and Daughter.

Nearly W. L., sitting, oblong oval frame at corners, directed to left, facing and looking to front, curls, earring, necklace, low dress, right hand raised, holding robe, left hand before her child, who is seated on her right knee, and is also looking to front, and holding a flying dove by a string with her right hand, her left resting on her mother's arm, to right back of couch with carvings of Cupids, pillar and curtain behind, to left vasc with plant, trees in background. Under, H Gascar pinxit The Dutchefs of Cleaueland, and My Lady Barbera her daughter. W. 14\frac{5}{8}; H. 11\frac{7}{8}; Sub. 11\frac{3}{8}.

Five known. Brit: Mus. Suth: Coll. (The latter impression imperfect.)

See page 27. The child was her third daughter, born July 16th, 1672, who became a nun, at Pontoise. Granger states that the picture of this print was in the possession of Lord Dacre.

5. Francis Corbetta.

H. L., in oval frame, directed to right, facing and looking to front, large dark wig, lace cravat, embroidered gown. H. 10½; W. 8½. Under, on separate plate, H. 1½; Francesco Corbetta famosisso Mastro di Chittarra qual Orfeo nel suonar ogn 'un il narra. H gas-car Pinx.

Grammont mentions the performance of this player, as highly relished by Charles, being full of grace and tenderness. This brought the guitar into so much vogue that everyone played upon it well or ill. Corbetta seems also to have composed music; and anecdotes of his saraband are related by the lively French count.

6. (Eleanor Gwin and her two Sons.)

T. Q. L.'s, standing, she is on right, directed towards and facing slightly to left, looking to front, curls, earring, necklace, low dress, basket of flowers in hands, from which the child to left is taking a sprig, but is gently pushed back by the other; (the child to left has its hair divided in centre, and earring and necklace, like a girl, but the children resemble those in print under R. Tompson, and also in the line-engraving after Gascar, in both of which prints the names of the two sons are engraved underneath), in background a balcony with trees and flowers. Under, H. gascar. pinxit. W. 12 $\frac{1}{2}$; H. 9 $\frac{1}{2}$; Sub. 9 $\frac{3}{8}$.

Not mentioned by Bromley. Three known. Brit: Mus. Suth: Coll.

Uncommon qualities of head and heart must have been added to sprightly wit and fascinating appearance, to explain why Nell, the orange-girl, was the special pet and favourite, not only of Charles and the Londoners of the time, but of all English-speaking people down to the present day. She died in 1687. The eldest boy was born, May 8th, 1670; created Earl of Burford, 1676, and Duke of St. Alban's, 1684. He died, 11th May, 1726. For Lord James, see No. 2.

James II., when Duke of York, is mentioned by Bryan, as having been scraped by Gascar. Bromley, a much more reliable authority, does specify an 8vo print, but not in mezzotinto.

7. Mrs. Jane Middleton.

L., sitting under a tree to right, directed to left, facing towards and looking to front, hair full, low dress, hands folded on lap, crook lying across under arm, sheep in valley to left, with castle, lake and mountains in distance. 8. George, Earl of Northumberland.

10. Charles, Duke of Richmond.

BENJAMIN GREEN is stated to have been born at Hales-Owen, about 1736, and to have died about 1800.

It would therefore appear very probable that he was an elder brother of Valentine Green; as this, however, has not been confirmed by any record, there may have been some reason for suppressing it, if it were the fact. Few particulars of him have been met with; and a letter in "Gentleman's Magazine" for 1800, p. 847, asking for an account of him, on the ground that it was a pity that such a character should be suffered to sink into oblivion, drew forth no response.

His connection with Christ's Hospital is undoubted; but he does not seem to have been engraver to the King, as stated in this letter, and also in Redgrave.

His works in mezzotinto are chiefly of animals, after Stubbs, and many of them are good examples of the art.

Son of Richard Pigot, Esq., of Westminster; created a baronet 5th Dec., 1764, and raised to the Irish peerage as Baron Pigot of Patshull in the following year; went out, in 1775, to India as Governor of Fort St. George, Madras, for the East India Company, and in carrying out their directions for placing the Rajah of Tanjore in power, incurred the enmity of the Nabob of Arcot and of several of the English; was deposed, and died in 1777. It was suspected that his death was

caused by violence; and by order of Parliament, Messrs. Stratton, Brook, Floyer, and Mackay, were tried at the King's Bench, Westminster, before Lord Mansfield, on 20th Dec., 1779; they were found guilty, and two months afterwards were each fined £1,000, which they at once paid, and were discharged. The date of his death is erroneously given in the "Peerages" as 1783.

Born at the Hague, 18th Nov., 1774; second son of William V.; with his elder brother, who afterwards became King of the Netherlands, served against the troops of the French Republic with much credit; soon after the annexation of Holland to France, entered the Austrian service, and took part in the victory of Wurzburg and siege of Kehl. He died suddenly when about to be named Field Marshal, 6th Jan., 1799.

RUPERT GREEN was the son and partner of Valentine Green. He has not been mentioned as an engraver. He probably died before his father.

George III.

It is somewhat remarkable that no portrait of George III. himself was engraved by Valentine Green, although he did those of all the Royal Family, and although there were so many pictures of the King to engrave from. George III. was a great admirer and collector of mezzotinto prints, as evidenced by the collection at Windsor Castle, and Green must have been well known to him.

VALENTINE GREEN was born, according to Sandby and Redgrave, at Hales-Owen, near Birmingham; according to a letter by James Ross, in "Gentleman's Magazine" (Vol. LXXXIII., Pt. II., p. 446), at Salford, near Evesham; the first place being near the northern, the second near the southern extremity of Worcestershire. The date given by Mr. Ross is Oct. 3, 1739, and he says that his father was a dancing-master. The first-named authors proceed to state that, after spending two years in a lawyer's office, he became pupil to an obscure line-engraver in Worcester. Mr. Ross states that this was Robert Hancock (who was no mean engraver in mezzotinto), and that he himself succeeded Green with Hancock in 1765, but he does not mention about the lawyer's office. There is nothing in Green's style to lead to the conclusion that he was self-taught, as stated by Bryan and Sandby, and there is every reason to believe Mr. Ross to be correct in his account.

Green then came to London; exhibited at Spring Gardens in 1766; was a member of the Incorporated Society of Artists, in 1767; in 1775, appointed associate-engraver to the Royal Academy, and mezzotinto-engraver to his Majesty, distinctions well merited by his artistic talents and unwearied diligence. He soon afterwards removed to Newman-street, Oxford-street, from Salisbury-street, Strand, where he had resided nearly from the time of his coming to London; and he also kept, for a short time, an establishment at 52, Strand.

In 1789, he obtained from Charles Theodore, Elector of Bavaria (to whom, when Elector Palatine, he had been appointed engraver), the exclusive privilege of engraving the pictures of the Dusseldorf Gallery. He completed over twenty plates, but, in 1798, much of his

property was destroyed at the siege of the town, and this, with the failure of some other speculations, involved his pecuniary affairs; his son, Rupert, whom he had made his partner, sharing the misfortune.

On the foundation of the British Institution, in 1805, he accepted the office of Keeper, and retained it to his death, which took place at St. Alban's-street, London, 29th June (not 6th July, as stated by Redgrave), 1813.

This engraver bestowed great labour upon producing in mezzotinto West's ideas of events in classical history; but it is doubtful if these now add anything to his reputation. A century ago, however, Boydell published and sold the prints of Regulus and Hannibal, each at six times the price at which he published and sold the "Girl in the Snow" (Lady C. Montague) after Reynolds, which would now be worth a hundred of the others put together. He executed some fine works after the old masters, amongst them, "The Dutch School," by Jan Steen, "Time clipping wings of Cupid," after Van Dyck, "A Hermit," after Mola, "Descent from the Cross," after Rubens, and several other Scriptural pieces.

His portraits exhibit great mastery of his art, joined to delicate and effective manipulation. They also exhibit the leading characteristic of the painters of his day; this was to make their portraits pictures or works of art apart from the representation of the personage; sometimes both objects were attained, as in No. 7, but often, especially with Reynolds, the picture was more thought of than the likeness, which had been the principal object of the earlier painters, with the exception, perhaps, of Lely.

Born at Stanton, Co Salop; when over twenty, was apprenticed to W. H. Toms, engraver, and having been successful in some publications, became an extensive print merchant, no doubt greatly encouraging the art of engraving in this country, and extending abroad the knowledge of our productions in this branch of art. In this business he amassed a large fortune; was elected alderman of Cheap Ward, 1782, sheriff 1785, and lord mayor 1790. He died at his house in Cheapside, 12th Dec., 1804, aged 86, and was buried in St. Olave, Jewry. An account of his nephew and partner will be found at page 81.

Boydell's merits would be still more appreciated by the genuine admirers of our English engravings, if he had confined himself to the publication of original prints; but his habit was to purchase all the plates of the older engravers which he could procure, and to circulate impressions from these, taken when they were utterly worn out, and could give no idea of their original beauty. This is a custom which, unfortunately for art, neither began nor ended with Alderman Boydell.

Henrietta Cumming's parents having died when she was very young, she was brought up by a maternal relative, Mrs. Bacon Muir, and went to reside in the family of the Countess of Balcarras; her accomplishments, especially in embroidery, having been brought under the notice of Queen Charlotte, she was invited to superintend the education of the Princesses; this, however, she declined. She corresponded with Miss Fordyce; and as Margaret, daughter of the Earl of Balcarras, had married Alexander Fordyce, who aspired to be the richest commoner in England, she thus became acquainted with and married their brother, Dr. James Fordyce, who was the eloquent pastor of the Presbyterian congregation in Monkwell-street, London, and author of "Sermons to Young Women," and other works. His popularity, however, declined, partly in consequence of the failure of

his above-mentioned brother's bank in 1772, and partly from a dispute, in 1775, with his assistant, Mr. Toller. He retired to Bath in 1783, where he died, in 1796. His wife died at the same place, Jan. 10, 1823, aged 89. In her biography she is said to have been one who was "peculiarly annoyed by the imperfections of servants."

He had a great taste for natural history, especially botany and shells, and formed fine collections in these pursuits. He also purchased, for eighty guineas, the English portraits collected by Mr. John Nicholls of Ware, arranged in four folio and six quarto volumes, a catalogue of which was published by Ames, in 1748; these were purchased at Dr. Fothergill's death for 200 guineas by Thane, the printseller, who broke up the volumes and disposed of the prints separately, realising an exceedingly large profit upon the transaction. These prints are occasionally met with, and may be recognised by having been cut to the plate-mark and inlaid in an ugly, coloured, border.

Hannah Vaughan was noticed by Mr. Booth, and when married to Mr. Pritchard, came on the stage and excelled in tragedy, especially in characters requiring force of expression and dignity; she retired, after a career of thirty-six years, in April, 1768, taking her leave in the character of Lady Macbeth (this picture being probably then painted), and died at Bath in the following August. A monument to her in Westminster Abbey was erected as a well-deserved tribute to the memory of her talents and excellent conduct.

Joseph Gulston died at Lausanne, 18th Dec., 1790, aged 22 years and 1 month, a dreadful victim to drinking, a habit contracted even before he left school; he would, therefore, have been only two years old when the print was published, and it is not on record that he had a brother.

The matter can be explained by supposing that Bromley was in error, and that the portrait is that of this lad's father and his brother, and that the picture was painted when they were young, about fifteen years before the print was engraved.

An account of the Gulston family is given at the commencement of Vol. v. of Nichols' "Literary Illustrations."

John Gulston, a lad of great promise, died at Eton, in 1764, at 14 years of age, from a fever contracted by drinking cold water when very hot from playing cricket.

Joseph, his elder brother, came into the possession of his father's large property (about £250,000 and landed estates), in 1766; he was indolent, good-natured, hospitable, and a delightful companion, probably had no idea of distinguishing between capital and revenue; and his wife (see page 141), not knowing better, they squandered all this money, except the portion entailed, and raised life annuities upon that.

How much Mr. Gulston expended upon books and prints cannot be known, but he formed collections which have, probably, never been equalled; he had read more English literature, especially biographical and quaint and curious books, than anyone of his time; and his abilities, retentive memory, and appreciation of wit and humour, enabled

him to use this knowledge in attaining extraordinary conversational powers.

But his chief delight was in collecting prints, especially British portraits. Granger was in a manner taught by him, and he was always ready to assist ingenious men and artists. He is said to have commenced collecting in 1768, and he lived to see all dispersed; first his books were sold; he then offered his prints to the Empress of Russia for £20,000; but this, most fortunately for after generations of English collectors, not having been accepted, they were sold by Greenwood at his auction rooms in Leicester-square, commencing Monday, 16th January, 1786, at six, p.m., and concluding on Wednesday, 15th March following, being the fortieth night. The catalogue was made by Thane, and is lotted in a very curtailed and promiscuous manner.

The produce, which was only £4,364, must have deeply mortified the owner; this and the grief caused by the habits of his son were, probably, predisposing causes of his death, which took place on the 16th July, 1786, when he was only in his forty-first year.

Prints from his collection are frequently met with; they are marked at the back, near the bottom, with a number to left and a price to right; this latter may have been what he estimated them at when valuing his collection for sale; it was not the price he paid, for a print has been met with inscribed by him, "No. 11,669, rare, 10s. 6d. I bought this print at Nottingham for 1s."

Although there is no reason to suppose that Mr. Gulston knew of the variations of state described in these volumes, yet such a judge of impression was he that his mark will rarely be found on any but a first state.

At the conclusion of the war, Mr. Laurens retired to his country-seat at Mepkin, and died there in 1792, aged 70 years. According to his direction, his body was burnt two days after death. Neither father nor son (who was killed near the end of the war) would ever receive pay or profit for their services.

Captain David Roche, rather a remarkable Irishman, who died in 1793, was her brother. Her eldest daughter was Mrs. Rawlins, who died in 1797.

His three sons were M.P.'s; Samuel, for Surrey; Robert, for Colchester; and Henry, for Southwark; the latter, with Clarkson and Wilberforce, who was nephew to the personage, took a leading part in obtaining the abolition of the slave trade.

JOHN GREENWOOD was born in Boston, 7th Dec., 1727; son of Samuel Greenwood, and nephew of Professor Isaac Greenwood of Harvard College; in 1752, he went to Surinam, afterwards to Holland, practising painting and dealing in works of art. He came to London about 1763, and practised as a painter and engraver in mezzotinto up to 1773, when he quitted this profession and became an auctioneer, at first in the Haymarket, afterwards in Leicestersquare. He died at Margate, 15th Sept., 1792. His grandson was late Sergeant-at-arms to the House at Wellington, New Zealand.*

In Holland he engraved portraits of Simon Fokke, after Buys, T. Q. L., sitting, and holding up a print; Schouman and others; possibly also No. 3. may have been engraved there.

His own portrait was engraved by Pether.

JOHN GRIFFIER was born at Amsterdam, in 1645; came to England about 1667, and painted landscapes; purchased a vessel in which he lived on the Thames, and, having amassed some money, set sail for Rotterdam, but was wrecked, and lost all his possessions. He again came to England after a few years, and took a house at Milbank, where he died in 1718.

He is mentioned as having etched some plates of birds and animals, but not as working in mezzotinto, which was probably owing to his use of slight initials, or a monogram of them only, on his prints.

Brulliot (Dictionnaire des Monogrammes, Ed. 1832, Appendice, No. 256, 2156 bis), gives as his a monogram which is not precisely that on the following prints, but composed, like it, of the letters J. and G.

So many of his plates appear to have fallen into other hands before 1799, that he probably died somewhat before that date.

Mary, daughter of Baptist Proby, D.D., Dean of Litchfield, and brother to John, 1st Lord Carysfort; married, 22nd April, 1782, Francis Humberston Mackenzie, who succeeded to the estates of Seaforth and Humberston on the murder, by the Mahrattas, of his elder brother, in April, 1783. He was descendant of the Earls of Seaforth, a title attainted in 1715, and was created Lord Seaforth and Baron Mackenzie of Kintail, 26th Oct., 1797; was Governor of Barbadoes for some years, and died in Edinburgh, aged 61, 11th Jan., 1815. His sons having pre-deceased him, the title became extinct. Lady Seaforth died at Edinburgh, 27th Feb., 1829, aged 75.

The child is, in all probability, their eldest daughter, Mary Frederica Elizabeth, who married, first, at Barbadoes, 6th Nov., 1804, Sir Samuel Hood; second, James Alexander Stewart, Esq., who assumed the name of Mackenzie.

To this lady, Walter Scott, in 1818, addressed the lines:

"And thou, gentle dame, who must bear, to thy grief, For thy clan and thy country, the cares of a chief, Whom brief rolling moons in six changes have left, Of thy husband, and father, and brethren bereft; To thine ear of affection how sad is the hail That salutes thee, the Heir of the line of Kintail."

It is to be noted that Sir Joshua's Pocket-book and also Bromley, p. 444, call this lady "Mrs. Seaforth and Child." If the identity of the personage be now here correctly ascertained, the full name in the Pocket-book should have been "Mrs. Mackenzie of Seaforth." The surname Seaforth has not been met with, as belonging to anyone of note at the period.

John Mudge is mentioned by Bromley, p. 392, as engraved by F. Grozer, 1790. If this be not entirely an error, it is probably another state of the plate by Dickinson (see page 189), which is not mentioned by Bromley.

Bromley, p. 325, mentions a W. L. of Lord Camden, after Reynolds, by J. G. Haid. This may be a first state of the foregoing before the plate was cut, or it may be of another picture which represents the personage sitting in robes; there is also a W. L., without name of painter, of him standing, holding Magna Charta, to right figure of Britannia holding Amor Populi. ROBERT HANCOCK is stated by Redgrave to have been born in Staffordshire; employed in the Pottery Works at Battersea, and later in his native county; saved about £6,000, which he lost by the failure of a bank, and then commenced as an artist, executing small portraits in the crayon manner, amongst them one of S. T. Coleridge, in 1796; and that he resided for the latter part of his life at Bristol.

He is elsewhere mentioned as the discoverer of the art of printing on china, and as the engraver of the first plate that was used for calico printing.

It is not an unreasonable supposition that he learned engraving in mezzotinto at Battersea from Brooks or Frye, and that on the breaking up of the works there he removed to Worcester, and executed the following; V. Green being, as already mentioned, one of his pupils.

The prints produced after the loss of his money are chiefly little portraits for booksellers; amongst them are, John Freeth, Job Hart, Hugh Horsman, John Wesley; but none of them are mezzotinto.



FRANCIS HAWARD was born 19th April, 1759; student at the Royal Academy, in 1776, and Associate Engraver, in 1783. He died at his house, 29 Marsh-street, Lambeth, in 1797; and his widow received a pension from the Royal Academy for over forty years. Foregoing are the particulars given by Sandby, but the print of Cymon and Iphigenia, is published, June 4th, 1797, by Francis Haward, No. 3 Little George-street, Westminster.

He worked at first in the mezzotinto method, but about 1782 changed to the stipple manner, in which he engraved the Infant Academy and Mrs. Siddons, after Reynolds, and some other plates. It is much to be regretted that the artist, who could produce such a charming work as Master Bunbury, should not have continued to exercise his talents in the mode in which his success had been so signal.

CHARLES HOWARD HODGES was born; according to Redgrave, in 1774; but this cannot be correct, for he could not have engraved at such an extraordinarily early age as the dates on his prints would then prove; Joubert and Nagler also give earlier dates for his birth. About 1794, he left this country and went to Holland, where he resided until his death, practising as a portrait painter, but continuing for some years to produce mezzotinto portraits; amongst these are Admiral de Winter, dated 1796; General Daendels; Archibald Maclaine, D.D., dated from the Hague, 1796; General Pichegru; the Shipbuilder and his Wife, after Rembrandt, dated 1802; and Schimmelpenninck, whole length, dated 1806. Bryan and Redgrave state that he died in 1837, at Amsterdam, aged 63.

As his earlier prints are published by that artist, it may be presumed that he was a pupil of John Raphael Smith, and his fine painter-like style would lead to the same conclusion. His manipulation also was very able, the portrait of Schimmelpenninck being generally quoted as one of the most excellent examples of workmanship in mezzotinto of feathers, lace, satins, and other textures. This portrait was painted as well as engraved by Hodges, and probably led to such extensive practice in portrait painting that he discontinued engraving.

It will be observed that the initial of the engraver's Christian name on No. 8 is "E.;" this is undoubtedly a mistake for "C.," as the print is clearly by the same hand as its companion No. 36.

The name "E. Hedges," does however occur as publisher of some small prints at this period.

The ground of this print partakes considerably of the stipple manner. An impression from a similar plate, not quite finished, in pure mezzotinto has been met with. THOMAS HOLLOWAY was born in Broad-street, London, 1748; apprenticed to Mr. Stent, a seal engraver; on the expiration of his pupilage practised at several kinds of engraving on stone, copper, and steel, and studied at the Royal Academy, finally adopting line-engraving on copper as his future business. In this method he executed the illustrations to "Lavater's Physiognomy," many other book-plates, and portraits, and the Cartoons of Raphael; this last work was specially encouraged by George III., who appointed the artist his historical engraver. Holloway removed with his assistants to Coltishall, near Norwich, and when he had nearly completed the sixth and commenced the seventh engraving of the Cartoons, died there, in Feb., 1827.

Younger brother of the philosopher and Unitarian, Joseph Priestley; became an Independent minister, being ordained about 1760; had charges at Kipping, near Bradford; at Cannon-street, Manchester; and at Dublin; removed to Jewin-street, London, about 1788. Died at Islington, 23rd April, 1814.

NATHANIEL HONE was born in Dublin, 1718; went to England and ultimately settled in London; was a member of the Incorporated Society of Artists and a Foundation R.A. He died at Rathbone-place, 14th Aug., 1784, and is buried at Hendon, with his children, Sophia, Samuel, Apelles, Floreth, and Lydia.

His portraits in oils have some merit, and he was very successful in miniature and enamels. He painted a picture called the "Conjuror,"

which was intended as an exposition of the manœuvring with respect to attitudes attributable to Reynolds. As this picture was not accepted by the Academy his vanity was piqued, and he then made an exhibition of his own works, in 1775.

Francis Grose was born in Middlesex, in 1731; was Adjutant and Paymaster of the Surrey Militia; devoted much of his time to travelling through the British Islands for the purpose of obtaining materials for the valuable topographical and antiquarian works which he afterwards published, and which were very successful. His appearance was remarkable, being only five feet high and weighing over twenty stone. He died very suddenly, whilst laughing and relating a story, at the house of Mr. Horace Hone, in Dorset-street, Dublin, on 12th

May, 1791, and was buried at Drumcondra. He was a man of great wit and humour, and a delightful, perhaps too convivial a companion; Burns alludes to him as the "chiel's amang you takin' notes."

Theodosius Forrest was a London attorney, also a giant in society though a very small man; he had studied drawing under Lambert, and frequently exhibited at the Royal Academy; he also wrote songs and pieces for the stage; whilst suffering from a nervous disorder accompanied by an attack of black jaundice he unfortunately put an end to his existence at his house in George-street, York Buildings, on 8th Nov., 1784, when in his 56th year.

JOHN HOPPNER was born in Whitechapel, in 1758; his parents being connected with the palace, he was at first a chorister in the Chapel Royal; showing an inclination for art, George III. made him an allowance, and, in 1775, he became a student of the Royal Academy. He commenced to exhibit in 1780, and, becoming an eminent portrait painter, was elected Associate in 1793, and R.A. in 1795. He died in Charles-street, St. James's-square, 23rd Jan., 1810.

RICHARD HOUSTON was born in Dublin, about 1722; was apprenticed to Brooks, and thus became fellow-pupil with M'Ardell, whom he was considered, at the outset of his career, to rival if not even to surpass in spirit and fire; and it is very probable that he may have possessed a greater natural genius.

He went to London about the same time as M'Ardell, and established himself near Drummond's, at Charing Cross, from which address he issued the fine series of statesmen after Hoare, Nos. 53, 70, 86, 92, 113, and some of his most successful productions after Rembrandt and others.

His indolent and dissipated conduct, however, soon reduced him to dependence on printsellers; and we find his works published by Bowles and others, but especially by Sayer, who is stated by Redgrave to have arrested and confined him in the Fleet (whence he was released at the accession of George III.), in order, as he said, to know where to find him. It is certain that he did employ him in producing copies or imitations of the popular works of other engravers; but the story of the arrest is more probably true of Richard Purcell, because it is not likely that an escape from such a dilemma could occur, and yet Houston appears to have been independent of Sayer in the latter years of his life, and to have worked for Carington Bowles, by whom the extensive series of clergy (who seem to have been even more anxious than the beautiful ladies to figure in the print-shops) were published, Nos. 11, 18, 32, 47, 58, 66, 68, 73, 74, 78, 85, 89, 101, 106, 107, 117.

Houston died, 4th Aug., 1775.

He executed two small etchings of an old man and old woman, after Rembrandt, which were published by Sayer, and many subject pieces in mezzotinto.

Although not so named, there are such strong reasons for supposing that he was the engraver of Nos. 56, 57, and 112, that they have been placed amongst his works; it is not, however, an absolute certainty.

Some years after R. Houston's death, H. Houston practised in Dublin as a stipple engraver; some heads of his are in Walker's "Hibernian Magazine."

On his resignation he refused to burden the country with a pension; he was President of the Council for some years; and died at his seat, Oakley Grove, near Cirencester, 6th Aug., 1794.

Alderman Townsend was eldest son of Chauncy Townsend, a considerable merchant in Austin Friars; married, 1763, Rosa, only child of Henry Hare, the last Lord Coleraine, by whom he acquired large landed properties; was M.P., and a leading democratic politician for many years; Lord Mayor, 1773. Died at Bruce Castle, Tottenham, Middlesex, 1st July, 1787.

Alderman Sawbridge inherited a princely fortune from his father (who was son of Jacob Sawbridge, M.P. for Cricklade, and one of the South Sea Directors, in 1720); was a supporter of Wilkes in Parliament; Lord Mayor, 1776. Died at Gloucester-place, Portman-square, 21st Feb., 1795.

The petition, about which the consultation is taking place, was presented to the King at St. James's, on 5th July, 1769. The paymaster alluded to is Lord Holland.

Born, 1704; entered the navy under his father's auspices; rose to be admiral; prevented supplies coming from France to the insurgents in Scotland, in 1745, and rendered other services. When in command of a fleet in the Mediterranean, intended to relieve Minorca, which was held by General Blakeney, he, on 20th May, 1756, declined a close engagement with the French fleet, which escaped, and Minorca shortly afterwards had to surrender. On Byng's arrival at Gibraltar, Admirals Hawke and Saunders placed him in custody and sent him to England, where, at the close of the year, he was tried by court-martial and found guilty of a breach of the 12th Article of War, but acquitted of disaffection or cowardice. Great exertions were made to save him, but he was shot at the date given on the print, displaying to the last great resolution and composure.

Bromley, as noticed by Hamilton, has misplaced this print at p. 286, as if it had been a portrait of Colonel Charteris; he has also mentioned it in its proper place at p. 341, but as engraved by M'Ardell; this latter mistake may have arisen from the name M'Ardell being written on a proof, and it might be that that engraver had assisted in the plate.

Mr. Charteris is mentioned in Reynolds's Pocket-book for 1757, which is the probable date of the picture.

Roscommon; married Bridget, eldest daughter of Theobald Bourke, 6th Viscount Mayo; their daughters were the celebrated beauties of whom Walpole writes, "These are two Irish girls, of no fortune, who are declared the handsomest women alive." Mr. Gunning died at Somerset House, 27th June, 1767; and his wife, who had been appointed housekeeper there in 1761, died at the same place, 9th June, 1770.

As further particulars of the family may be of interest, the death of Catherine, sister of Mr. Gunning, is recorded on 9th July, 1755; and that of another sister in Dublin, in July, 1797, at the age of 98.

There was a brother of the beauties, a great favourite with the

ladies; he was in the army; rose to be major-general in 1787, and died at the latter end of the century; he married Miss Minifie, author of some novels, who died 28th Sept., 1800. Born in Scotland, 1730; his mother was afterwards nurse to George III.; appointed, in 1764, as Envoy to the Court of Naples, in which position he remained until 1800, having been made K.B. in 1772. He died in Piccadilly, in his 74th year, 6th April, 1803; was buried at Milford Haven, in Pembrokeshire.

He married, in 1755, a lady of property, with whom he lived very

happily; she died in 1782, their only daughter having died six years before. In 1791 he married the beautiful Emma Hart (whose name was afterwards so celebrated in connection with Lord Nelson), and appears to have remained attached to her up to his death.

Having naturally a taste for the fine arts and antiquities, he made good use of the opportunities afforded him by his long residence in Italy by collecting a most interesting series of Greek, Etruscan, and Roman ancient vases, most of which are now in the British Museum, and by publishing magnificent works on these subjects and on the phenomena of Mount Vesuvius. He also contributed to the Royal Society, of which he became a member in 1766, memoirs of the discoveries at Pompeii and Herculaneum, which were mainly due to his own exertions.

He was a sound and able scholar, and lover of literature, and LL.D., F.R.S., F.S.A.

Born in Ireland, 1737; educated at Trinity College, Dublin; Envoy to Russia, 1764; married, 1768, Lady Jane Stuart, second daughter of the Earl of Bute; Chief Secretary to Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, 1769-72; Governor of Grenada and Tobago, 1775; raised to the Irish

Peerage, 1776; appointed to the Madras Presidency in 1781, when he placed General Stuart under arrest, who differed from him with respect to the measures to be pursued towards Tippoo Saib; in 1792, was appointed Ambassador to China, and raised to an earldom; the account of his very important embassy was published by Sir George Staunton in 1797. He died, in Curzon-street, of gout, 31st March, 1806, and was buried at Chiswick.

WILLIAM HUMPHREY is stated to have been born about 1740; and he received the Society of Arts' premium for an engraving after Rembrandt (No. 23) in 1765. He practised as an engraver for some years at Gerrard-street, Soho; and living in the neighbourhood of J. R. Smith, there appears to have been an arrangement between them that Humphrey should publish Smith's plates when they had become somewhat worn. In this way may be explained Redgrave's assertion, that Humphrey's mezzotints, after Reynolds, were esteemed amongst the best of the time, for, it is not known that he engraved anything after Reynolds, the Duchess of Devonshire being erroneously so named in Stanley's Bryan. After 1777, other addresses of Humphrey's are found on some of Kingsbury's and J. R. Smith's prints, but nothing of later date than No. 15. It is not improbable that he may have been a connection of the Mrs. Humphrey so well known for many years afterwards as publisher of Gillray's Caricatures, from her addresses in New and Old Bond-street, and then in St. James's-street.

Of an old Yorkshire family; served his time to Mr. George Fleming of Wakefield (a house painter, but a very ingenious man), from whom he derived his skill in drawing and his taste for antiquarian pursuits. He devoted himself to heraldic and genealogical researches, and formed large collections on these subjects, being often consulted on the pedigrees of families in the northern counties. He died at York, 17th Feb., 1786. His son was a physician at Whitby.

He was restored to his rank three years afterwards, and appointed Commander-in-Chief in Ireland; was M.P. for Preston; and author of the "Heiress," and other popular dramatic works. Marie Jeanne Gomart de Vaubernier, born 19th Aug., 1746; came to Paris and led a bad life there; introduced to Louis XV., who was enslaved by her charms, and who married her to Guillaume du Barry (who died in 1811); made her a countess, and introduced her at his court. After the death of Louis, in 1774, she lived in a decorous manner, evincing respect for religion and great taste for the fine arts. She visited England several times; on the last occasion bringing her diamonds to succour those whom the Revolution had banished from France; on her return she was brought before the tribunal for having worn mourning for the tyrant (Louis XVI.); condemned and guillotined, 6th Dec., 1793.

Born in Dublin, 1719; son of a silversmith, but failed in trade, and appeared on the Dublin stage in 1744, in London, 1746, when he divided the applause of the town with Garrick. He was an admirable actor and a very handsome and pleasing man, and in such characters as Romeo was considered to have surpassed every other player. He joined Woodward, in 1758, in the speculation of the Crow-street Theatre in Dublin, but it failed, and he returned to London, in 1766, with Mrs. Dancer, whom he married, and who became an excellent actress. He died 10th Jan., 1777, and was interred in the Cloisters, Westminster.

This popular dancer appeared at Covent Garden Theatre, and in 1760 is mentioned her first appearance in Drury-lane. She frequently visited Dublin, and may have been a native of Ireland. She died at Hampstead, 27th May, 1767. J. T. Smith in his "Book for a Rainy Day," p. 7, says that he was informed that Nancy, when a girl, set up the skittles in a Marylebone tavern; and that Sir Wm. Musgrave said she was the wife of a publican near Kelso.

JOHN JACOBE was born at Vienna in 1733, and came to England for the purpose of learning mezzotinto engraving. He produced some good plates in London in 1779-80, then returned to his native city, and continued to engrave there; amongst these later works being the Vienna Academy, portraits of Sir Robert Murray Keith; Prince of Nassau-Siegen; Prince of Schwarzenberg; and Princess of Wurtemberg. He died in 1797. The addresses on No. 1 and 6 I. would indicate that Dickinson was his teacher.

There was a William Chamberlayne, Solicitor to the Treasury, who died in 1799, and whose son, William, was M.P. for Southampton, first cousin to the Earl of Liverpool, and died in 1830.

Born 21st May, 1746, youngest child of John, 1st Viscount Galway; married, 1786 (his second wife), Edmund, 7th Earl of Cork; died in New Burlington-street 30th May, 1840. She was highly esteemed in London society, both from her sprightly vivacity, and her endeavours to mingle those who possessed wit and genius amongst people of wealth and fashion. Boswell says that she and Johnson "used to talk together with all imaginable ease."

Brought over to England in the "Adventure" by Capt. Furneaux (the companion of Capt. Cook in his second voyage), arriving in April, 1775. Being the first native of the South Sea Islands who reached this country, great interest was manifested about him; he was introduced to the King, and brought by Lord Sandwich and others into fashionable society; he left this country in June, 1776, with Capt. Cook in the "Discovery," and was settled by him in Hualuire, where he obtained the king's daughter in marriage, and was named "Paari" (wise or instructed).

J. JAMES is named in the following as engraver. Nagler mentions Jacob James, but the prints there stated to be by him are not known. It is possible that the initial is erroneous, and that the engraver was George James, A.R.A., who died in 1795.

W. JAMES is the engraver of the following. Possibly he may have been William James, a landscape painter, mentioned by Redgrave as a pupil of Canaletti, and a member of the Incorporated Society of Artists.

J. JEHNER produced a few engravings in London about 1777, he afterwards appears to have settled in the South of England, and he there practised painting as well as engraving. His work is remarkable for great minuteness and precision of detail, of which No. 10 and the Seasons by him after Breughel are prominent examples. He was evidently an attached member of the Masonic Order. Most of his prints are very uncommon.

Born, 1769; succeeded as 7th Earl of Barrymore in 1773; of great talents, but led a dissipated life; was accidentally shot, 5th March, 1793.

Died 1775; aged 88; according to Bromley, who also states that he was a Free Mason at Exeter, and that the print is inscribed "A Tyler," is from a picture by Cavang, and is dated 1782. This portrait does represent him as a Tyler, or keeper of the door of a Masonic Lodge, and the variations may have been in MS., or may denote an earlier state of the plate.

3. (Edward Beetham.)

not completed. This is the mezzotinto mentioned in Nichol's "Lit. Anec.," Vol. VIII., p. 480.

William Canynge, rebuilder of Redcliffe Church, Bristol. J. Jehner fecit, is mentioned in Strawberry Hill sale catalogue. In the Fonnerean catalogue mez. of him by Johns (evidently a mistake for Jehner) is named.

5. Richard Hutchins.

Bromley, p. 363; dated 1779. Rector of Lincoln College, Oxford. Died 1781; aged 83.

Bromley mentions a portrait of this personage, by S. Hart, 1788? It is clear that he mistook the engraver of the lettering for the engraver of the print, because "S. Hart, Lit. Sculp.," will be found in the inscriptions of Nos. 2 and 9; he may, however, have seen a lettered impression corresponding to the companion prints, Nos. 9 and 11; the date is more likely to be 1785. A slip accompanying the print has in old MS., "Edward Spry, M.A., Candidate of Divinity, Batchelor of Musick, Doctor of Medicine, Philosophy, Civil Law, of the Colleges of Physicians of London and Edinburgh, of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Aberdeen, and Leyden. R.: A.:; Knight Templar; and of the Oriental Star, &c. &c. &c." It may be observed, that R.A. does not mean Royal Academician in addition to all the other pursuits, but probably Royal Arch-Mason.

11. John Spry.

Bromley, p. 415, gives date 1777 for this print.

Apprenticed to Mr. Baldwin of Paternoster-row; became a very celebrated journalist, and was the first who fully reported the debates in Parliament on the same night as they took place. He was often named in connection with Junius, and owned and edited various papers, which, however, were not ultimately remunerative, as he died in somewhat straitened circumstances on 1st Aug., 1803, in his 58th year. He was buried at St. Margaret's, Westminster.

RICHARD JENNYS appears to have engraved the following in America before the separation between the United States and Great Britain. The portraits so engraved are very few in number, exceedingly scarce, and of interest to English readers; they have, therefore, been inserted in this work.

Jonathan Mayhew.

H. L., in oval frame, directed towards right, facing towards and looking to front, wig, bands, cloak over lay habit. Under, Richd Jennys Junr pinx & Fecit. The Revd Jonathan Mayhew D.D. Pastor of the West Church in Boston.

H.; Sub. 117; W. 93.

Born in 1720; educated at Harvard College; ordained minister of foregoing church, 1747, and retained the post until his death in 1766. He published many sermons, and had considerable influence in leading the opinion of the colonists towards independence. He is very favourably mentioned in Bancroft's History.

There are several prints with the name Johnson as engraver which are difficult to arrange in consequence of the absence of initials to the engraver's name, or with initials which are met with on so few prints that either the engraver produced little worth notice, or the name is an assumed one; indeed it has been directly stated by Strutt (Vol. II. p. 53), that it was "said that Faber, when he did not choose to affix his own name to his engravings, adopted this fictitious one." Strutt, however, went too far if he supposed that Thomas Johnson was not an engraver perfectly distinct from Faber or any one else.

Countess of Strafford. Probably after-state of Brookshaw, No. 23a, Additions.

The under-mentioned appear to be original plates; but they are not numbered, for it may be that some of them should be placed under one of the engravers having initials, which follow after them.

Jenny Cameron. LE CLARE.

Caulfield (VOL. III., p. 83) gives a very unfavourable report of this young lady's morality in early life, and states that she joined a troop of banditti; she was certainly an ardent advocate of the Stuart cause for many years before 1745 (when she was 46 years of age), and then took an active part with Charles Edward; she was taken prisoner, but admitted to bail in consequence of bad health, and died, according to Caulfield, in 1790.

ANDREW JOHNSTON would appear from the following to have practised in the latter part of Queen Anne's and, perhaps, the beginning of the reign of George I.

1. George Mackenzie, Earl of Cromartie and Wives.

Bromley, p. 208; Musgrave Catalogue, p. 27, and there described as "George, Viscount Tarbat, Earl of Cromartie, æt 47, with his two wives, three ovals, with emblems of Time, Death, &c. Mez. by And. Johnston. Very rare."

Born, 1630; succeeded his father as 2nd Baronet, 1654; raised forces to attempt the restoration of Charles II.; when that event occurred, would have risen to high power at once except for his opposition to Lauderdale; appointed, however, Justice-General in 1678, Lord Clerk-Register in 1681; created Viscount Tarbat in 1685, and Earl of Cromartie in 1703. He married, first, Anne, daughter of

Sir James Sinclair, of Mey, Bart.; second, on 11th April, 1700, Margaret, Countess of Wemyss in her own right, who died in 1705, aged 54. He died at New Tarbat, 17th Aug., 1714, in his 84th year.

The Musgrave Catalogue, p. 27, mentions another print thus: "Ditto, with his wife, Margaret Weemiss, æt. 39, ditto, fine;" and a copy of the Catalogue has been met with, marked in MS., opposite this lot, "Time & Death hammering at 2 Hearts on an anvil." Bromley does not mention it, but it is evident that there were two prints, or perhaps two states of the same print, as both the Musgrave prints were purchased by Sykes, and at his sale they were purchased by Rodd, lot 22, 24th June, 1824.

Bromley mentions, p. 246, Margaret, Countess of Wemys and Cromartie, with a query if it be not a copy of the print of Mrs. Sherard; and Noble, Vol. I., p. 368, mentions Ann, Countess of Cromartie, as mez., by A. Johnson, but not Margaret. It is most probable that there is some mistake about these entries, and that no such prints exist.

2. Philip Lockhart.

Held a commission in the army under Lord Mark Kerr; although the interests of his family were altogether with the House of Brunswick, he deserted to the Stuart side in 1715, and commanded a troop at Preston. He was taken prisoner, tried, sentenced, and, on 2nd Dec., 1715, was shot.

3. Henry Sacheverell. GIBSON.

THOMAS JOHNSON is said by Redgrave to have practised in the latter half of last century; Nagier correctly states that he did so in the first half. Both mention as by him a print (in line) of Canterbury Cathedral, in "Dugdale's Monasticon" (ed. 1718). Bryan is pleased to consider his style one "which does him no great credit," and it does exhibit indications of his being probably self-taught; but, apart even from their great rarity, there is a singular fascination, probably arising from their truthfulness, about his portraits, and this is not decreased by his modesty, as shown in last verse of inscription to No. 1.

Born in Northamptonshire about the middle of the seventeenth century; followed the business of a small-coalman in Clerkenwell; but having a great taste for books, became acquainted with several noblemen and gentlemen, also interested in this pursuit, who esteemed him highly; his attachment to music led him to give concerts, said to have been the first ever given in this country, which were attended by the most fashionable company, and at which Pepusch and even Handel

have performed. He died, 14th Sept., 1714, it is said, from having been frightened by a ventriloquist shortly before, who ordered him to prepare for death, in a voice apparently coming from the sky. He was buried in Clerkenwell churchyard.

Collectors of theatrical prints are always most desirous of acquiring those special rarities called the three B.'s; these are Betterton (by Williams), Booth (by G. White), and Bullock (by Johnson). When the late George Daniel procured an impression of the last, which he had vainly sought for years, in his delight he told every one he met that he had got a "Bullock;" many naturally supposed that it was a four-footed one.

He died, 20th June, 1731, and was buried at St. Pancras. This print could not have been known to Chalmers, who gives the date of his birth as about 1667.

Bromley and Noble erroneously give the engraver's initial as "J." Succeeded his father as 5th Baron Wharton in 1696; was a leading partisan of the Revolution and opponent of the Stuarts; created, 1706, Earl Wharton, and Marquess of Wharton and Catherlough (Carlow) in Ireland, about three months before his death, which took place 12th April, 1715. His great talents and statesmanship were sullied by both atheism and profligacy.

JOHSON, the engraver of the following would appear, at first sight, to have been an error for Johnson; but this may not be so, for the style is peculiar, and the mistake would hardly have been likely to occur twice; as the name has not been met with, it may, however, be an alias.

JOHN JONES is said to have been born about 1740, but the real date is probably much later, as he does not appear to have engraved before 1775. He resided from the year 1783 in Great Portland-street, from different numbers in which street nearly all his prints were published. He died, according to Redgrave, in 1797. His only son, George, who was born 6th Jan., 1786, became an R.A.

His works are powerful and artistic in style, but not, as a general rule, exhibiting specially careful finish; he appears to have been highly thought of by Romney, and he worked too after Reynolds, Gainsborough, Ræburn, and other leading painters. He also practised in stipple, and in that method produced portraits, amongst others, of Judge Ashurst, Earl Guilford, Archbishop Moore, Lord Sheffield, Miss Sneyd, Lord H. Spencer and Sister, and Frederick, Duke of York.

She was a most bewitching and delightful actress. Her connection with the Duke of Clarence was well-known. She died at St. Cloud, July 5th, 1816, having left England for the purpose of avoiding creditors, her debts being the consequence of bills given by her to relieve a near relation.

Frances Barton was born in London in 1731; after passing through many difficulties, she appeared with success at Drury Lane in 1755, and soon afterwards married Mr. James Abington. Under this name she is as celebrated in Comedy as Mrs. Siddons was in Tragedy, and was an unrivalled favourite with the public up to her retirement from the stage at the close of the century. She died at Pall Mall, 4th March, 1815. She must have possessed rare talents, attracting admiration by the elegance of her figure, taste in dress, and piquancy of expression, in spite of plain and somewhat coarse features; overcoming the defect of a harsh and unpleasant voice by skill in modulation of its tones, and causing, what in another would be considered extreme impudence, in herself to appear as charming sauciness.

GILES KING practised engraving in Dublin, and produced four interesting views of places near that city, after Wm. Jones, viz., Blackrock, Powerscourt Waterfall, Leixlip Salmon Leap, and Howth; these were originally published in Dublin, in 1744-5, by Jones; afterwards in London by Bowles, then cut down and published by Wilkinson; they are engraved in the line method, as were some illustrations by King to Smith's "History of Waterford," dated 1746, where he calls himself "Londinensis." Born at Yarmouth, 23rd Jan., 1688-9; settled in Wapping as ship's ironmonger, where he continued to his death, on 7th Oct., 1759. He early developed an extraordinary taste for antiquities

and great powers of research, and was highly esteemed by those who appreciated such labours. His principal work was the "Typographical Antiquities," published in 1749, but in the previous year he had given to the public his "Catalogue of English Heads," drawn up from the collection formed by Mr. Nicholls (see page 553). It may be observed that that work undertook to "Describe what was peculiar on each, as the Name, Title or Office of the Person, the Habit, Posture, Age or Time when done, the Name of the Painter, Graver, Scraper, &c., and some remarkable particulars relating to their lives," and that for a period of one hundred and thirty years, although the value of such descriptions to the knowledge of English Art and History must have been manifest to many, the investigations of Ames were not pursued further in the direction indicated by him until the publication of these present volumes.

Robert Dighton, the designer, whose portrait is in the print, was a great humourist and displayed talent in many ways; his portraits are exceedingly clever, but do not exhibit much knowledge of perspective; he afterwards degenerated into caricature. This plate is not mentioned by Bromley. From the likeness to the portrait by C. Turner, after Lawrence (dated, 1814), there can be little doubt of its representing Charles Whitworth, who was born in 1754; obtained a commission in the Guards; sent on a diplomatic mission to the Court of Poland in 1786; two years afterwards Envoy to Russia; received the Order of the Bath in 1793; created Baron Whitworth in the Irish Peerage in 1800; and in the following year married Arabella, widow of the 3rd Duke of Dorset. He subsequently took a leading part in European diplomacy; was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, 1814-17, having been raised to an earldom in 1816. He died at Knole, 13th May, 1825.

WILLIAM LAWRANSON was the son of an Irish portrait painter, whose Christian name was Thomas; he gained premiums at the Society of Arts in 1760 and 1761, and was a member of the Incorporated Society of Artists; many of his pictures have been engraved, and he scraped the following with much ability.

Born, 1730; educated at Eton and Cambridge, but was obliged to quit the latter place; he then went on the stage, appearing at Covent Garden in 1753; he continued there for twenty-two years, and was afterwards at Drury-lane up to 1788, when he retired. He was best known during this career as "Gentleman Smith." He married Elizabeth, granddaughter of the 3rd Earl of Sandwich, and widow of Kelland Courtenay, Esq.; she died in 1762. Mr. Smith died at Bury St. Edmunds, 13th Sept., 1819.

S. LEADER is not named by Nagler or Redgrave, but they do mention a William Leader, who was, however, of much more recent date. The following curious and uncommon print is the only one known of this engraver, but the execution is so good that it is difficult to believe that he did not practise more extensively, unless the name for some reason be an assumed one. The painter is also unknown; the work partakes of the styles of Lely and Wissing.

Lady Neville.

Granger and Bromley consider this to be the same personage as Madam Katharine Neville, see page 116; but the features, especially the mouth, are so different that this is not possible. One of these portraits most probably represents Catherine, daughter of Ralph, Lord Grey of Werke, and sister of Forde, afterwards Earl of Tankerville (see page 111); she married, about 1679, Richard Neville of Billingbere, Berks, whose great grandson became 2nd Lord Braybrooke.

LELIUS is also unmentioned as an engraver; the following does not display much ability, but it is carefully worked.

Thomas Sherlock. JONES.

Born, 1678; educated at Eton and Cambridge; entered the Church and published many admirable works; Bishop of Bangor, 1728; translated to Salisbury, 1734; to London, 1748. He died, 18th July, 1761, and was interred at Fulham.

BERNARD LENS was born in London in 1659, and was son of an enamel painter of the same name, who died in 1708. He was instructed in art by his father, and chiefly devoted himself to mezzotinto engraving. He died, 28th April, 1725. He had a son also of the same name, who was born in 1680 and died in 1740, and was an excellent miniature painter. It is stated by Redgrave that this latter engraved in mezzotinto, and Nagler actually divides the prints, having the name of Lens, between the father and son. All these, however, are referable to dates within the lifetime of the father, and it would be extremely unlikely that the younger Lens would publish anything during this period without "junior," or some such expression, after his name, as done by the younger Faithorne and Faber. Neither Walpole, Strutt, nor Bryan (in original edition) confirm Nagler's conjecture, nor does there seem any foundation for it in the style of work of the prints. This style in the following portraits is very good and artistic, but there are a vast number of small subject pieces by this engraver which display no great merit; possibly some of them, having "ex." only, were not engraved by Lens. His prints have addresses of Beckett, Smith, many of E. Cooper, and a few of his own. There is a curious print by him of Fireworks on the Thames on 7th July, 1713.

Bromley, p. 203, mentions Queen Anne, 4to, after Kneller, possibly portion of No. 17; at page 253, Princesses Anne and Amelia, grand-daughters of King George, without name of engraver, probably No. 6; and at p. 254, Princess Elizabeth, granddaughter to King George, probably No. 7.

Of Childerley, in Cambridgeshire; entered the army; served under the Duke of Monmouth, in Hungary; afterwards with the Princess Mary of Orange, and accompanied William to England in 1688; created, in 1690, Baron Cutts of Gowran, in Ireland; in 1693, Governor of the Isle of Wight; M.P. for Cambridgeshire, afterwards for Newport; was wounded at the siege of Namur; afterwards fought at Venlo, Blenheim, &c., but retired to Ireland in consequence of some disagreement with Marlborough. He died in Dublin, 26th Jan., 1706-7, and was buried in Christ Church there. He appears to have had a taste for poetry, and, on the death of his second wife, Nahum Tate addressed to him a consolatory poem in 1698, from which Wall, who is otherwise unknown, designed this very curious print.

In 1711, Charles, in consequence of the death of his elder brother, Joseph, succeeded to the Empire; was crowned at Frankfort, on 22nd Dec., as Charles VI., and soon afterwards withdrew his claim to the crown of Spain. JOHN LLOYD is said by Walpole to have been a printseller in Salisbury-street, Strand, and to have procured the secret of mezzotinto from Blois (who used to lay grounds for Blooteling), with the object of communicating it to Luttrell, but that afterwards he would

not do so, on which they quarrelled. The latter part of this story is not credible, for Lloyd published a great number of Luttrell's prints after the latter had thoroughly mastered the art, and it is not improbable that Luttrell was the engraver of some of the following also, for he often did not put his name to his prints. The curious style of work on No. 1, if engraved by Luttrell, would tend to confirm Walpole's statement, that he at first laid his grounds with a roller; but, on the other hand, it is a strange thing that, if Luttrell was seeking by every means to acquire the art, he could have been ignorant of A. Browne's book (see pages 106, 7), which was published fully twelve years before this print. As mentioned at page xiv, the prints under this and the following name have not been ascertained to have been engraved by them, but the grouping thus may perhaps lead to a solution of some of the very interesting questions connected with the early history of the art in England.

DAVID LOGGAN was born at Dantzic about 1630; he came to England before the Restoration, and settled for some years at Oxford; published "Oxonia Illustrata" in 1676, and "Cantabrigia Illustrata" in 1688. Died at his house in Leicester Fields in 1693. He engraved a number of portraits in the line manner and also made blacklead drawings, displaying great ability in both. Whether or not he engraved the following is not yet apparent. Walpole mentions that he brought over Blooteling and Valck; but these prints are not in the style of other works of these artists, and, on the whole, bear most affinity to the prints published by R. Tompson, with which they appear to be nearly contemporary.

Richard Allestree was born, 1619; entered the Church in 1656; Canon of Christ Church and Chaplain to the King, 1660; Professor of Divinity, 1663; Provost of Eton, 1665. He died, 28th Jan., 1680-1.

John Dolben was born, 1625; entered the Church in 1656; Canon of Christ Church, 1660; Dean of Westminster, 1662; Bishop of Rochester, 1666; Archbishop of York, 1683. He died of smallpox, 11th April, 1686.

John Fell was born, 1625; ordained, 1643, and deprived, 1648; Dean of Christ Church, 1660; Bishop of Oxford, 1675. He died, 10th July, 1686.

Charles II. is stated to have exclaimed on seeing the picture, "Chiplain! Choplain! Chaplain!" alluding to the leanness of Fell, the plumpness of Dolben, and the position held by Allestree.

GEORGE LUMLEY was a resident of York, and friend of Francis Place. From him he learned the art of mezzotinto, and produced the following prints. It is stated that he was an attorney by profession, and Redgrave places his death as recently as 1768, at the age of 60. Owing, however, to the difficulty of overcoming the fact that one cannot engrave before one is born, either Redgrave must be altogether mistaken, or the prints cannot be contemporary with the persons they represent. But the evidence of the prints themselves

is clear and conclusive against the latter supposition, and, furthermore, some of them may be esteemed amongst the most rare and valuable of their class.

1. Thomas Comber.

Born, 1644; educated at Cambridge; on account of his uncommon qualifications was priested by Archbishop Sterne although under age; Prebendary of York; Chaplain to William and Mary; Dean as above, 1691. He was author of the "Companion to the Temple" and many other excellent works. He was buried at Stonegrave in Yorkshire.

Noble states that Granger was well assured that this engraving was by Place, although Bromley had assigned it to Lumley on the authority of Sir William Musgrave. Place's mezzotintoes were all engraved several years before the date of this print; but it is exceedingly probable that he may have directed and perhaps assisted Lumley in its execution.

2. Lady Mary Fenwick. DAHL.

Eldest daughter of Charles Howard, created Earl of Carlisle in 1661; married Sir John Fenwick of Wallington, Northumberland, who, by an act of attainder, which passed both Houses under strong protest of the minority,* was beheaded, 27th Jan., 1696, without a trial, for conspiring in favour of James II. She made the greatest exertions to save her husband's life, and became an object of much interest to the Jacobite party. She died, 27th Oct., 1708, aged 50, and is buried in York Minster.

3. Sir Walter Hawksworth.

Succeeded his father as 2nd baronet in 1683. Died, 17th March, 1735, leaving a daughter, who married Thomas Ramsden, Esq.

4. Sir Mark Millbanke.

Of Halnaby, Yorkshire. Considered by these writers to be the second baronet, who succeeded in 1680, and died, May, 1698, being succeeded by his eldest son, of the same name, who died young, in 1705.

5. Mrs. Morris. MURREY.

6. John Nicholson.

Educated at Cambridge; M.D., 1694; was related to Mr. Thoresby.

7. Hannah Tomlinson.

Said by Noble to have been also a midwife at York.

E. LUTTRELL is stated to have been born in Dublin about 1650, and to have come to London, when young, in order to study law. His taste for art, however, induced him to give up this pursuit, and he applied himself to portraiture in crayons, in which he was very successful. He also produced several works in mezzotinto, and appears to have had the honour of attracting Beckett's attention to this art. His works range over a considerable period, some being attributed to as early a date as 1681, others as late as 1710, in which year he is said to have died; most of his prints were published by Lloyd (see page 821).

English writers on engravings have hitherto uniformly given this artist's name as "Henry," showing how little they looked to the engravings themselves for information as to the lives of the artists. Nagler, however, noticed the discrepancy.

Several prints of his time, under, "Engraver not ascertained," may have been by Luttrell, as the Earl of Nottingham, Earl of Ossory, &c., for he is said often not to have put his name to his prints.

He was the author of the Histories of the Reformation and of His Own Time, and of many other works.

Born in Denbighshire; went to the bar; appointed Chief Justice of Chester, 1680; created a baronet in the following year; Chief Justice of the King's Bench, 1683; Lord Chancellor and Baron Jefferys of Wem, 1685; notorious for his cruelties in suppressing Monmouth's rebellion; on the landing of the Prince of Orange endeavoured to escape, but was detected and sent to the Tower, where he died in 1689.

12. Keay Nabee and Keay Abi.

Bromley, p. 194, mentions a portrait of Francis le Pipre, a painter who died in 1698; and a proof of this is in the Musgrave Catalogue, p. 247. Query, however, if this be not a print by W. Vaillant, before the inscription.

Son and heir of William, 5th Earl of Bedford, who was created Duke of Bedford in 1694; married Rachel, daughter of Thomas, Earl of Southampton, and widow of Francis, Lord Vaughan; accused of complicity in the Ryehouse plot, and, despite the exertions of his wife and friends, the former aiding him by taking notes of the evidence at his trial, was condemned and beheaded, 21st July, 1683. His attainder was annulled by Parliament in 1689.

16. Anthony, Earl of Shaftesbury. GREENHILL.

Anthony Ashley Cooper was born in Dorsetshire, 1621; educated at Oxford and Lincoln's Inn; engaged in the civil war, and contri-

buted to the Restoration; created Lord Ashley, 1661, and one of the "Cabal" Ministry, 1670; Earl of Shaftesbury and Lord Chancellor, 1672; implicated in the Ryehouse plot, but withdrew into Holland. He died 22nd Jan., 1683.

17. William, Lord Stafford.

Sir William Howard, K.B., younger son of Thomas, Earl of Arundel; married Mary, sister of Henry, 4th Lord Stafford, who died in 1637; created Baron and Viscount Stafford in 1640; accused by Titus Oates, tried in Westminster Hall, found guilty, and beheaded, 29th Dec., 1680.

18. Duchess de la Valliere.

Louise Françoise de la Baume le Blanc de la Vallière was born in 1644; maid-of-honour to Henrietta of England the wife of Duke of Orleans, younger brother of Louis XIV., who was attracted by her charms, and about 1661 they became intimate. She twice endeavoured to escape from the Court to the Convent of Chaillot; and, on the favour shown by Louis to Mdme. de Montespan, took the veil finally in 1675. She died 6th June, 1710.

19. Id.

Two known, both damaged; that in Suth: Coll. has the inscription, but is clipped round the oval.

Son of Sir William Paston, 1st baronet (died, 1662), who had devoted his fortune and energies to the Royal cause during the civil war; was created Viscount Yarmouth, 1673, and Earl of Yarmouth 1679. He was esteemed of refined taste and learning. Died, 8th March, 1682, aged 51, and was buried at Oxford.

JAMES MACARDELL was born in Cow-lane (afterwards altered to Greek-street), in Dublin, about 1729; he was pupil of John Brooks, and came with him to London about 1747; he soon afterwards commenced to practise on his own account, and about 1754 established himself at the Golden Head, Covent Garden, where he published most of his prints. He died, 2nd June, 1765, and was interred in Hampstead Churchyard, where, Lysons says, there was a short inscription to his memory, stating that he died in his 37th year.*

The writer of the article in Gentleman's Magazine, referred to at page 84 (who is conjectured to have been Alexander Mangin, a well-known connoisseur and print collector, resident in Dublin), mentions MacArdell as having done the head of the half-length of Primate Boulter, from a picture by Bindon, and borrowed the remainder; this would show that the plate (Brooks, No. 15, page 91) was altered by MacArdell's hand. The statement in a foot-note that the whole length of Primate Hoadley was "indubitably the entire work of MacArdell," is inaccurate, for the personage was not Hoadley but Boulter, and the print (see page 87) is not inscribed "Brooks fecit," but "Brooks Excudit." The article is a severe and not undeserved stricture on Strutt's Engravers; but critics who expose the mistakes of authors should be doubly cautious about what they state themselves.

It is clear, however, that even whilst a boy, MacArdell displayed his great natural capacity, and his works tell how this was cultivated by application and industry, qualities possessed by neither his master

^{*} Yet, in spite of this distinct proof and of the evidence afforded by the dates of his prints, all the art writers have hitherto copied one another in the error of placing his birth in 1710 Many of them, too, have called him "Ardell;" Nagler, in consequence, gives him two Christian names, "James Marc."

nor fellow-pupils. He may be said to have carried on the art from the point to which it was brought by Faber, by adopting boldness, decision, and freedom of handling without losing either accuracy or truth.

His talents were duly appreciated by the great painters of his time, especially by Reynolds, who considered, as Northcote tells us, that his own fame would be preserved by MacArdell's engravings, when the pictures had faded away: and it may be noted that No. 67 was published by Reynolds himself.

Like most truly great men, MacArdell was of a kind and genial disposition; he never seems to have endeavoured to prevent the wholesale copying of his prints by Purcell and others, which, probably, to some extent affected their sale; indeed it is likely that he greatly assisted his old companions, for the last request of poor, wild, and wayward Spooner was to be buried beside him. Horace Walpole, indeed, was indignant ("Correspondence," Vol. III., p. 223) that MacArdell had told people of his print (No. 186); but it is easy to see that this petulance was aroused by an offence which must have been wholly unintentional.

There can be but little doubt that if MacArdell had lived longer he would have had still more considerable influence on English Art, probably in the direction of curbing the extravagances caused by straining after effect, of which many examples were subsequently produced even by eminent painters.

MacArdell scraped many fine subject pieces, amongst them, Virgin and Child, and Finding of Moses after Vandyck; Christ disputing with Doctors, Mathematician, Tobit and Angel, and Dutch Interior, after Rembrandt; Virgin ascending, and St. Francis, after Murillo; St. Jerome, after Da Cortona; Ghismonda and Lisabetta, after Corregio and Furino; St. Peter, after Spagnoletto; St. John, after R. Browne; Corn Mill, after J. Richards.

He also etched two curious portraits of the Chevalier Michael du Halley Descazeaux,* both W. L., standing, the larger with dog fawning on left knee, cane in right hand, left hand to face, is inscribed

^{*} Born at Paris, 10th Aug., 1710; is said to have entered the Prussian service, and in consequence of a duel with a brother officer, who was dangerously wounded by him, fled to England. His singular dress and character attracted much notice, and although nominally confined for debt in the Fleet, he appears to have been allowed to go about as he wished. He wrote a great deal of poetry, but little of which was printed, and used to carry a roll of this, his cane and a sword, the last in order to give satisfaction to his antagonist should he meet him. All this joined to his extreme vanity seems to betoken a kind of harmless derangement of mind. He died, 16th Feb., 1775. There are prints of him by Beauvais after Bancks, 1748, and others.

The greater portion of MacArdell's plates fell, after his death, into the hands of Sayer; five (Nos. 33, 38, 39, 102, and 175) unfinished ones were completed, but many others were tampered with without altering the addresses, and some were falsified to resemble proofs. It is therefore necessary to observe great caution in purchasing several of the prints by this engraver.

Born 24th Sept., 1717; his father having procured him the sinecure office of Usher of the Exchequer, he was able to devote himself to his villa of Strawberry Hill, and to literary pursuits; author of "Castle of Otranto," "Royal and Noble Authors," "Anecdotes of Painting," and many other works, and the most interesting and delightful English correspondence which has yet been published. He succeeded his nephew as 4th Earl of Orford in 1791, and died at Berkeley-square, 2nd March, 1797.

Walpole was a great collector of matters connected with art and antiquity, always, however, taking due care not to pay too much for indulging his taste, as may be seen from his lamentations when forced to give a high price for some specially coveted object, and from his having left a very large sum of money, invested in Government Stocks, behind him. He also, much to the credit of his judgment, appreciated English Art when it was the cry of the day to run it down. His collections were sold by the celebrated George Robins, in 1842, mostly at what now appear exceedingly low prices. They included a large number of English portraits, which had been pasted by Walpole himself in volumes, but were cut up for lotting at the sale; a matter for regret, for he had written on most of the portraits the names so often not given in the inscription, and remarkable particulars of the personages. The list of purchasers and prices to the sale of these prints, published by J. H. Burn, distinctly states that "Bromley's" Catalogue was one of the Strawberry Hill prints, and that Bromley was an assumed name, the real author being Anthony Wilson.

Nagler and Le Blanc mention a print of George Washington, after Pond, by MacArdell; but Bromley does not notice it at page 382, and its existence is almost impossible.

Born 29th May, 1735; entered the army with an ensign's commission, when only eleven years of age; succeeded his father as 17th Earl in 1750; in 1759, raised a battalion of infantry, and was constituted Lieutenant-Colonel thereof; Colonel, 1763. He married, 1761, Mary, eldest daughter of William Maxwell of Prestown, and they had two daughters, the eldest died at the beginning of 1766, and her parents went to Bath, for a change; at this place the Earl was seized with a fever, and the Countess so over-fatigued herself by nursing him, that she died on 1st June, 1766, in her 26th year, and the Earl died sixteen days afterwards. Their surviving daughter's claim to the earldom was disputed by Sir Robert Gordon, and by George Sutherland, but she was confirmed therein in 1771, and is the person to whom the print is dedicated. She married, 1785, the eldest son of Earl Gower, afterwards Marquess of Stafford. Her husband was created Duke of Sutherland, in 1833, and she died at Hamilton-place, London, 29th Jan., 1839, her eldest son becoming 19th earl.

SIMON MALGO is mentioned by Nagler as having engraved the "View of the Torrent of the Lutschinen;" although he probably practised in England, and the following were published in London, it is not likely that he was of English birth.

Redgrave names William Mainwaring as a medallist, towards end of 18th century, about the period to which to which the following, which are in a very stiff manner, are referable. Bromley, p. 8, names a portrait of Thomas Cromwell, Earl of Essex, by Manwairing.

JOSEPH PHILIP LIBERATI MARCHI was born in Rome, and having a taste for art, was brought to London in 1752 by Reynolds, to whom he became assistant. About 1770 he appears to have endeavoured to establish himself as a portrait painter on his own account, but not succeeding to his expectations, he returned to and remained with Reynolds. He died in London, 2nd April, 1808, aged 73.

His individual work as a painter cannot, of course, be discriminated in pictures attributed to his master. No. 5, painted by him, is probably a fair specimen of his powers, but his fame may well rest on his mezzotinto prints, which, although not numerous, exhibit a most artistic feeling, and prove him a worthy disciple of Reynolds, who himself may probably have supervised the engraving.

Henrietta, or Harriet, daughter of Sir Everard Fawkener, who was for many years ambassador at the Porte, and died Nov. 16th, 1758, his widow, the daughter of Gen. Churchill, afterwards marrying Governor Pownall; married first, 1764, Edward Bouverie, whose elder brother was created Earl of Radnor; second, 1811, Lord Robert Spencer, youngest son of 2nd Duke of Marlborough. She died at Woolbeding, Sussex, 17th Nov., 1825, aged 76.

For Mrs. Crewe, see page 869. The earlier date then given for her marriage is probably the correct one, as Collins is certainly right in date of Lord Crewe's birth, and Debrett gives it ten years too late.

The Magazines record the marriage of John Crew, Esq., with Miss Fawkener on 17th May, 1764, and this marriage is also mentioned by Walpole (Cor. Vol. IV., p, 238). If the peerage compilers have overlooked a first marriage of Mr. Crewe with a sister of Mrs. Bouverie, such might explain the friendship between her and the second Mrs. Crewe, and also the allusion to death in the picture. Both Mrs. Crewe and Mrs. Bouverie are named in Reynold's pocket book as sitters in April, 1767, the probable date of the picture.

Her cousin Hester, who was the daughter of Lord Malpas, was born in 1755, but would have been older than represented in the picture when it was painted. She married W. C. Lisle, Esq., of Upway, Co. Dorset.

Born at Geneva, 1711; wrote plays and novels, and in 1762, "Emilie," which was severely condemned, and on the populace attacking his house at Neufchatel, he set out for Paris and adopted the habit of an Armenian. Whilst there he met Hume, who brought him to England in 1766; he left the following year, and published other works of a quasi philosophical character. He died 3rd July, 1778.

Mrs. Delany, in a letter of Jan., 1772, writes, "I have searched the town over, and the Duchess of Portland has employed all her emissaries in vain to get a print of Rousseau, after Ramsay."

Bromley, p. 350, mentions a mez. of Sir John Smith, dated 1775. Evan's catalogue, No. 9,704, states it to be 4to size.

CHARLES MAUCOURT was a native of Germany, and practised portrait painting in London for several years. He was a Member of the Incorporated Society of Artists, and died in London, Jan., 1768. From the following it would not appear that his sitters were from the upper classes.

Francis Meheux was a native of Dover, and engraved a portrait of James II., and some other prints in mezzotinto, but they were not published in this country.

J. Menni is mentioned by Bromly, p. 408, as the engraver of a small oval mez. of himself.

ANDREW MILLER is said to have been born in London, of Scotch parents, and to have been taught his art by Faber. This latter assertion is open to some doubt, as his style is very peculiar, and does not resemble Faber's, but has some affinity to that of Van Haecken. Having practised in London for some years, he removed to Dublin, probably invited thereto by Brooks, and for whom he most likely engraved some plates, without putting his name to them. Meeting with fair success, he established himself, in 1744, on Hog Hill (now St. Andrew-street), and remained in Dublin, having the field nearly to himself after Brooks and his pupils had gone to London. Redgrave states that he was addicted to drinking, which accelerated his death; this did not occur, however, until September, 1763, although placed by Redgrave about the middle of the century, so the remainder of the statement may be inaccurate also.

A considerable number of the following were taken by Miller from other prints, they are very different, however, from servile copies, possessing a breadth and power observable in few of the originals; this superiority is very marked in the prints from those engraved in the line manner by Houbraken and Vertue in "Birch's Lives." In an advertisement of them in a newspaper, of September, 1745, Miller calls them the first Attempt of the kind in Metzotinto.

Nearly all the prints by Miller are of very great rarity. Pasquin mentions that "Joe Miller" was the only print he ever saw by him, and although Walpole, Bull, and other collectors, had agents in Dublin to procure the prints which had been published there, several were not obtained for them, and hence do not appear in "Bromley."

Miller and Ford seem sometimes to have been rivals, and to have each executed prints from the same originals, at other times they appear to have joined in the publication of some of Miller's prints.

The following were engraved by Miller in London. Nos. 2, 17, 23, 24, 29, 35, 43, 44, 46, 50, 51, 54, 57, 59, 63.

He also engraved amongst his subject pieces a nude female, after P. Veronese, and the Complaisant Lover, and Magnificent Lover, a pair after Courtin.

This print is known by the name of "Tottenham in his Boots," the portrait having been painted in allusion to the occasion of a close contest in the Irish House of Commons between the Government and the country party, relating to the application of a large surplus fund in the Irish Exchequer, when Mr. Tottenham, hearing that the debate

was to come on sooner than was expected, rode up from his country seat, and arrived at the House just as the division was about to take place; although there was a heavy penalty on any Member of the Irish House of Commons who did not appear in full dress, Mr. Tottenham claimed his privilege, entered in his riding-dress and voted, and in consequence the division was adverse to the Government by a majority of ONE.

57. Mr. Turbutt. BISSE.

He died at Reigate, Surrey, 21st March, 1655-6, and was buried in Westminster Abbey.
