


That is why we have standardized a type and quality of root now generally known to the Peony world as "A Brand Division."

Only a large, clean division, handled by specialized labor according to these standards, can qualify as "A Brand Division." That is why no Peonies in our list are priced lower than \$1.00. A root that could be produced and sold for less is not comparable in quality to "A Brand Division."

MRS. DEANE FUNK (A. M. Brand). Too new to be rated. Pink. Large and peculiarly beautiful in formation. The broad guards and half of the petals turn outward, gracefully downward, then up. Next is a distinct band of golden stamens as in Phyllis Kelway. Lighting up the entire flower, these stamens enclose a rosebud, cup-shaped center of large incurving petals. Color a Walter Faxon pink. Magnificent in the show room; holds up well as a cut flower; beautiful in the field. Among the five or six best seedlings we ever produced. A Brand Division \$5.00.

MRS. HARRIET GENTRY (A. M. Brand 1925). White. One of the most refined flowers in the list. Another white of most perfect rose type. This variety was first exhibited at the National Peony Show held in London, Ont., Canada, in 1922. Here it received an award of merit and attracted a great deal of attention. In 1933 we again exhibited this variety at the St. Paul show. Here Blanche King was very much in evidence and was awarded the prize for the best flower at the show and also won first in a class of twenty best dark pinks.

Mrs. Frank Beach is a glorified Jubilee. Deep cream, it fades but little even when developed in the field. Like Le Cygne, this variety develops a flower true to type even on a yearling. MRS. ROMAINE B. WARE (A. M. Brand 1925). 9.1. Pink. One of the most delicately beautiful Peonies ever produced. First selected from the seed bed because of its striking beauty of form. True rosebud effect in the center, the petals radiating in peculiar fashion to give a pleasing effect to the entire bloom. Returning from the National Show at Boston, I stopped with my good friend Harry F. Little. Mrs. Romaine B. Ware was in full bloom. Of this wonderful flower Mr. Little said, "I think this one of the daintiest of all Peonies in its perfect beauty." Exquisitely delicate; medium size; rose type. ADOLPHE ROUSSEAU (Dessert and Mechin). 8.5. Red. One of the very good early dark reds. The plant is very tall and holds its flowers so erect that it makes a fine showing. One of the finest of all red Peonies as a landscape variety. A great dark flower that looks almost black and unusually rich when viewed from a distance.

CHARLES McKELLIP (Brand). 7.8. Red. A splendid red which we consider much underrated. This variety comes into bloom just after Mary Brand and we feel sure you will like it.

FELIX CROUSSE (Crousse). 8.4. Red. Late. A deep rose-red showing no stamens. Consists of a central bomb of incurved petals surrounded by broad, prominent guard petals. A good all-purpose red.

BALL O' COTTON (Franklin), 8.8. White. Late midseason. This is an outstanding fragrant white. It is an excellent show flower and is also a good garden variety. The perfume of the flower is strong and sweet, the variety is so late that it is not always seen in Peony shows.

For a Peony of great size, probably no other can lace. For a Peony of Stead exhibit such perfection of beauty.

NYMPHAEA (Thurlow). 8.8. White. Large flat flowers with wide, silky petals of delicate creamy white, notched at tips, edges somewhat rolled; yellow stamens in center reflect a golden light throughout. Fragrant. Midseason. Remindful of a waterlily only much larger and more beautiful than any waterlily we have ever seen. Very refined; a real addition to our growing list of good peonies.

PARADISE (Hollis). 8.7. Very large, compact flat rose type. Guard petals hydrangea-pink. Center lilac-white fading to milk-white. Fragrant. Medium tall. Free bloomer. Early midseason.

Like all yellows, it must be developed inside away from the sun to preserve its color. Early midseason.

ARCHIE BRAND (Brand). 7.5. Pink. Large, round, full rose-type blossoms of an even shade of seashell-pink. Foliage and stems are light green, very clean in appearance. The buds, as they develop, are very attractive, enormous in size; beautiful as they open. Petals of good length are banked compactly with four distinct corners to the bloom—a very pleasing effect. As the

guards fall away they leave a great round ball of bloom in the center. Does best on clay soil.

ASA GRAY (Crousse). 8.1. Pink. Properly grown in suitable soil, this is a beautiful peony. Thrives best in heavy dark loams. Flowers are large, of true rosetype. AUGUSTE DESSERT (Dessert). 8.7. Deep pink. Among Dessert's latest peonies, this is one of his finest; regarded by the originator as worthy of his own name. He gives this description: "Flower cup-shaped of fine form, with rounded petals, very brilliant, velvety crimson, carmine, with silvery reflex and often streaked white; very large silvery border; visible stamens intermixed with the petals in many flowers. A superb variety, awarded certificate of merit at the Paris show, June 2. 1920."

CLAIRE BUBOIS (Crousse). 8.7. Pink. A late flower, of immense globular form, with long incurved petals of a uniform shade of clear violet rose, tipped silvery white. The best cut flower of its color in its season.



Advantages of the Own-Root Lilac. The Lilac you buy from us is on its own root. If this Lilac sends up a sucker, the sucker is the same as the bush from which it springs. It grows at the same rate as does the mother bush and when it blooms, the bloom is identical with that of the original plant of which

We have never had any success with these new Lilacs where they were on common Lilac root and not more than 50% success where they were grafted on privet root, yet we have always had perfect success with Own-Root Lilacs, so we believe the Own-Root Lilac is the only Lilac to plant and to offer our customers; and we believe an improved Lilac on its own root is just as long lived as the common Lilac.

Plant Early Lilacs are the one shrub that SHOULD be planted early.
And by early we really mean early.
As a rule we can dig Lilacs after March 28th at Fari-bault. Order lilacs if possible so they can be dug and shipped the fore-part of April.

Growing an Improved Lilac on its own root is a slow process. It actually takes us 2 years longer to produce a Lilac of a given grade on its own root than it would take to produce the same grade on privet. Yet we insist on sending out only those Lilacs that will prove satisfactory, so our customers can depend upon receiving only genuine own-root plants.

We have a wonderful deep rich alluvial soil; the soil in which the Lilac revels. This contributes to strong thrifty tops with a large, well-balanced root system. This spring our stock well-be unusually fine.

Planting. Lilacs can be planted either in spring or fall. In the spring, it should be done very early before the buds start. In the fall the planting season starts about September 20th and continues in the North well into late

October, while in the South planting can go on all winter.

To allow the French Lilac its natural spread, the plants should be set out not less than 8 feet apart. Dig a hole as large as a bushel basket. Fill back with rich top soil and tramp down firmly until you can place the plant on this soil so that when roots are spread out naturally the crown will be an inch or two lower than it was in the pursery. Work the soil in carefully among the roots until nursery. Work the soil in carefully among the roots until the hole is half full; then tramp this down unusually hard. Then pour in a full pail of water. After this has settled away fill the hole with loose mellow soil until it is rounding full; then tramp lightly. Keep plants well hoed. Where planting is done in the fall, place a coarse mulch about bushes first winter to keep ground from

Fertilizers. A Lilac likes a sweet soil and responds wonderfully to applications of lime. Use 4 quarts of lime to a large bush each year. Any good well-balanced fer-tilizer can be used with good results.

Heavy applications of well-rotted barnyard manure ev-

ery 3 years covering the ground about the bushes is best. **Trimming.** As soon as the blossoms fade the bushes should be gone over and the faded blossoms cut out. Remove just the blossom stem but none of the new wood surrounding it, as it is on this new wood that next year's bloom appears. As the bush starts to become too large and tall it should be gone over in March and from a quarter to a half of the older part cut back to within 3 or 4 feet of the ground. This will soon put on new growth and if this practice is carried out every year the bush can always be kept young, within bounds, and will produce very large blooms.

Caution. The newly planted Lilac often acts as though it were going to die, even after it has made a good start the first spring. The leaves suddenly stop growing, turn limp, and the bush looks as though it were dying. As a rule there is no cause for alarm. Give the plant a good, thereugh socking of water; then cultivate it well the thorough soaking of water; then cultivate it well the balance of the season. The next spring, remove any dead wood and your Lilac will come all right.

Pests. Oystershell scale and the lilac borer are about the only enemies of the Lilac. For oystershell scale use as a spray either lime-sulphur or an oil spray. Use liquid lime-sulphur in preference to dry at the rate of 1 part to 7 parts water, or if the oil spray is used, then at the rate of 1 part to 15 parts water. In using the oil spray be sure the sprayer is thoroughly cleaned out before putting in the oil. Lime-sulphur spray should be applied just as the buds are beginning to show green, while the oil spray should be used just before the buds show any green.

The lilac horer is best handled by prevention. If bushes

The lilac borer is best handled by prevention. If bushes are kept well cultivated and growing, there is but little borer trouble. Where the borer is at work, he may be taken and killed by running a small wire into the hole and twisting it around to accomplish this. One can also shoot carbon bisulphide into the furrow of the borer with a medicine or fountain pen dropper; then plug up the entrance with putty entrance with putty.

The Chinese Elm

The Chinese Elm is the most popular and unusual tree that has ever been introduced into America from foreign lands. From seed brought in a few years ago from the barren lands of far Northern China, the tree has gained rapidly in public favor such as has been shown to no other tree and is now scattered clear across the northern part of the country and over the entire dry western part.

The tree is an Elm with almost the graceful habits of the Cut-Leaf Birch. It has the true elm leaf only the leaf is comparatively small, of a light green color and very graceful. It comes into leaf very early and the effect is most refined and pleasing all summer when the tree is in full leaf.

The tree seems to be adapted to almost any part of the country and is especially adapted to the more arid parts. It is a tree that sends its roots down deep in search of water and the drier the location the better it seems to grow.

Note the picture of the little tree dug in our nursery, in the fall of 1932, showing the long root system. This little tree is from seed planted in the spring of 1932. The tree is an 18 to 24-inch tree. The root is over 4 feet long. No wonder the trees do so well in the dryer states.

It makes a very graceful ornamental tree for planting in the yard, it is good as a street tree planted along the boulevard. One does not have to wait for results years after it is planted, for it grows as rapidly as any Poplar or the Box Elder and within four or five years after planting one has a good-sized tree twenty to thirty feet high.

Because of its rapid growth and the fact that it limbs out heavily from the bottom it makes a great tree for planting for windbreaks. Many of the fine artificial groves planted about the farmsteads of the entire middle northwest, because of age and the severe droughts of the last few years, are in sad shape. In the dryer regions they have entirely disappeared. It seems fortunate that just at this time when such a tree is so sadly needed, the Chinese Elm has come to us. It is evidently the answer to the long search for a tree to use for windbreak purposes on the prairies of western Minnesota, of North and South Dakota, in Western Iowa, parts of Nebraska and over eastern Colorado, Wyoming and Montana. The chances are that these states

will take advantage of this wonderful drought - resisting tree, plant it in great quantities, and that within a few years every farm in this territory whose owner loves trees, will support a beautiful Chinese Elm windbreak about its buildings.









A Dwarf Apple for the Family Garden

Anoka is a new apple produced by that great plant wizard of South Dakota, Professor Niels Hansen. The tree starts to bear very young, often producing apples on 2-year-old trees in the nursery row and is a heavy annual bearer. The fruit has much the appearance of Duchess of Oldenburg but is larger and a little more oblong, and does not show quite so much color. Ripens very early, beginning around August 15th. Four of these trees were sent to the Fargo, North Dakota, Experimental Station in the spring of 1920 (1-year trees). In the fall of 1922 that Station made the following report: "This spring two of the four trees blossomed; one produced 23 apples, the other 26."

One spring we had 46 little 3- to 4-ft. trees that we failed to sell. We planted these back into the nursery row. Six of these bore fruit that same year, one ripened 7 apples.





We have been fortunate in having it under test on our own grounds for some 6 or 7 years and can recommend it in every way.



Six or More Trees in a City Back Yard

Clipping from Dec. 10, 1932, issue of "The Farmer and Farm Stock and Home":

Practically the only change in the recommended fruit list of the Horticultural Society was the addition of OKA, an early maturing, high quality, redfleshed plum-cherry hybrid, for culture in all parts of Minnesota. This variety was developed by Dr. N. E. Hansen, horticulturist of the South Dakota Experiment Station, Brookings.


The OKA cherry begins to bear on two-year-old trees; that is, the second year after being planted out. The trees produce annually great crops of large, sweet, delicious red-fleshed cherries.

Due to their dwarf-like growing habit, the trees may be planted as close as six feet apart. Six or more in a city back yard will not interfere with garden flowers, or other plantings. The cherries grow in clusters of two all along the stems and they cover the branches so densely as to make the entire tree look black. Especially if allowed to grow in bush form, which is their natural growth, the trees will bear heavily all along the limbs from the ground up.

Fertilizers for Plum Trees

Most of the northern plums bear much better where two or more kinds that bloom at the same time are planted together.

Oka Cherry is a western sand cherry-plum hybrid. To bear at its best it should be planted with one tree of Compass, as a





Apricot Plum We are always on the lookout for a good new plum. When we were informed by Mr. Chas. Haralson, Superintendent of the Minnesota Fruit Breeding Farm, that he had a new plum of great merit, we visited his nursery and saw this new Apricot Plum. The tree clearly shows the Apricot parentage as does the fruit which is light green in color, heavily flushed with pink to red. The fruits run about 1½ inches in diameter and are round and flattened in shape. We do not advise the planting of this tree north of our own latitude, only in very favorable plum locations. Apricot Plum is a distinct break in plums. Something absolutely different from any other plum we can grow here. Flesh green and sweet, pit small. Has no bitterness about skin or pit. Makes a wonderful sauce. Flavor mild and pleasant, not like other plums.

NANKING CHERRY

(Prunus Tomentosa)
