In some parts they form whole mountains of themselves, as the gold bluffs. Generally, these deposits consist and vary in masses of soft gray clay and sand stones, strata of conglomerate of pebbles, red loam, fine gold and black sand. and of nearly petrified forest trees, all stratified. Going south, the stones grow smaller, the loam from a deep red assumes ighter shades, until at Trinidad and Humboldt they change into strata of different The main body of the substratum sands. is a talcous slate, green stone, &c. North of these deposits the country is broken, rugged and mountainous, covered with deep red soil heaps of large, broken and red burned rocks and pounded quartz.

If we ascend the nearest of these red mountains, we will find ourselves on the Table mountain, about eight miles N. N. E. of the mouth of the Klamath, and on the dividing line of two sections, one the northern, rise first from the ocean, charged with the precious metals, and distinguished by the bare and dreary aspect of its lofty ridges and its deep ravines, clothed on the northern side only with gloomy pine, and growing higher and more rugged as they recede north. To the eastward, the same confused view presents itself.

The second section, to the southeastward is of a later elevation, and covered with some of the deposits of the first section; the ridges are still formidable, but after arriving in latitude 41 deg. 4 min., the country shelves off into hills and lagoons, into Humboldt Bay. This section, the section of de posits below the actual gold region, is generally found covered with a rich, black soil and gloomy red woods; only now and then green, open spots relieve the eye.

Record of the City Courts. SUPREME COURT .- Hon. H. A. Lyon and N. Bennett, Associate Justices.

Joseph L. Folsom vs Kingsbury Root et al. Opinion of the court by Justice Bennett. This case is in all respects the same as the case of Woodworth vs. Fulton decided at the last term. The plaintiffs claim title under a grant made by an American alcalde during the continuance of the war between the United States and Mcxico; and the defendants derive their title from a Justice of the Peace. It clearly appears from the judgment of the Court of the First Instance, that the plaintiff was permitted to recover solely upon the assumption of the validity of his title, and not upon the ground that he had ever been in the actual possession of the premises, and had been ousted by the defendants. In Woodworth vs. Fulton, it was held that a title of precisely the same character as that upon which the plaintiff recovered in this suit was void and of no effect. The defendants having been in actual possession at the time of bringing suit, they should have been protected in such possession, until some better title than theirs was adduced against them. Such was not this title under which the plaintiff recovered. The judgment should therefore be eversed, and the rights which they respectively enjoyed at the time of the commencement of this suit. This judgment will be remitted to the District Court of the Fourth Judicial District to be carried into execution.

BY LAST NIGHT'S BOAT. News from the San Joaquin Valley.

FREEMAN & Co. have our thanks for furnishing us with Sacramento papers and a Marysville Herald, at an early hour last evening.

The Transcript says that the house of a miner on Jackson Creek was entered last week and robbed of \$1,300. Every effort to recover the property was unsuccessful.

A lump of gold was found in the Mariposa diggings on the 18th ultimo, weighing fourteen and a half pounds. On the 23d, two lumps were taken out at the same place, one weighing four pounds and a half, and another worth \$570.

The Times learns that the miners on the the South Fork of the American river, are generally making but small wages, being compelled to limit their operations to the bank diggings, on account of the height of the water. At Colomo, though some few are doing well, the greater number are complaining of hard times.

There has been some quarrelling about the big dam which is being erected for backing water on some good leads above; but we believe this has been amicably settled.

It is supposed that the tunnel will hold all the water in the river in July next, and lay bare a great extent of the bed of the river to the adventurous miners. It is indeed to a great amount of time and labor having been expended in its construction.

The Union says that the miners at Rough and Ready are doing tolerably well. The ditch to conduct the water from Deer Creek is completed, or nearly so, which will afford a sufficiency of water to enable the miners to operate successfully.

On the Mokelumne, the water is so high, that it will be probably as late as July before anything great can be effected. Provisions are abundant and prices good.

What the English Journals Say.

We find the following extract of an artiticle, the whole of which is of similar tone, in a late number of the London Times:

"We believe Mr. Webster was substantially justified in treating as already exploded the recent agitation for the dissolution of the federal union. There is, indeed, something so unprecedented in this enormous aggregation of states and territories, that it is impossible to arrive at any probable conclusion respecting the fu-ture destinies of America. The weights on the two seaboards are now so immense that the constitutional fabric must needs be exposed to severance from its own gravitation alone. The thirteen States of the Union have already become three-and-thirty, if not more, for they increase as we write, and there is space and verge enough for converting the number into a hundred. It is beyond all human power to calculate the prospects of a government to which one continent supplies territory, and another population. What California is to America, America is to the whole world. No example has ever yet been seen of such a mighty and interminable conflux of peoples. Ireland alone supplies yearly to this extraordinary State the population of a first class city. San Francisco has increased more in two years than Brighton in fifty. The treasures of the new territory have attracted immigrants in equal numbers from two proverbial extremities of the world—from China and Peru; and yet, by some wonderful process, the system of the Union appears to absorb and assimilate to its constitution these various and conflicting elements. No speculator can prognosticate the end of such a prodigious experiment, or prophesy the eventual decisions of a chamber in which the delegates of California and New Mexico will meet the representatives of Florida and Maine. But thus much we may at least say, that the American Union is now discharging a providential part in the progress of the world, and that if the possible modifications of its political constitution are but effected in obedience to the principles which have hitherto maintained it, there can be no reason why either Americans or Englishmen need look with apprehension to the result."

Commercial.

WEDNESDAY EVENING, April 16, 1851. Business to-day has been dull in consequence, perhaps, of the uncongenial weather, aided by the re-action consequent upon the excitement of steamer day. Sales were not at all numerous, and those at auction were not extensive, as groceries, the main articles offered, were only sold at a sacrifice. Retail trade, we are glad to observe is generally improving-gradually, but we hope surely. Larger quantities of clothing, boots and shoes have been disposed of in this mode, but the stocks are so very heavy that no improvement in prices can be expected for some time. Coal still maintains the firmness with which it has been held for some days past, and a further slight advance has been effected in price.

Flour'still continues dull of sale and declining in price. Stocks are exceedingly heavy, yet the principal holders will not submit to the decline which has been generally accepted by the smaller dcalers, who are anxious to sell from an anticipation of a further decline, as they expect large quantities of flour to be sent to us from Oregon. The flour company we learn are building a very large warehouse at Benicia and have cleared their flour warehoused here on board ships, etc. for that port, intending to store it there for better times. We apprehend this will prove to be a false move on their part as we cannot see any prospect of a rise in price for some months unless immigration this season should be much more extensive than can reasonably be expected.
