### Proceedings of the Sixth Session of the Yolo County Teachers' Institute, held during the days of Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 23d, 24th and 25th Instant.

MR. EDITOR:—There having been a resolution passed instructing the Secretary to furnish you with a copy of the proceedings of the Teachers' Institute for publication, I respectfully submit the following:

#### FIRST SESSION—FIRST DAY.

The Institute met, pursuant to call, at the Hesperian College Hall. The Institute was called to order at 1 o'clock P. M. President Gaddis in the chair, who delivered an address on the objects, duties and responsibilities of the teacher.

Reading of minutes by Corresponding Secretary. Minutes adopted.

Admission of members being declared in order, the President appointed the following a committee to report on the admission of members: Messrs. Hartley, Fouch and Hall. The following names were proposed and reported favorably to membership—Prof. Anderson, W. W. Pendegast, J. W. Mackall, G. C. King, P. R. Burnett and D. T. Truitt.

Mr. Pierce moved that a committee be appointed by the chair to make arrangements for music. Messrs. Hartley and Clark appointed said committee.

An election being declared in order, Prof. Anderson was elected Vice Pres., A. Fouch Rec. Sec., J. W. Mackall Cor. Sec., H. G. Hartley Treas., G. C. King and A. C. Cox Executive Committee.

Miscellaneous business being declared in order, Prof. Anderson moved that a committee be appointed by the chair to draft an order of exercise for next meeting. Motion prevailed, and Prof. Anderson, Miss M. A. Duncan and Mr. Pierce appointed said committee.

Prof. Anderson moved that there be three teachers elected by the Institute to serve in conjunction with the County Superintendent, as a Board of Examination, for one year. Motion carried.

Mr. Pendegast moved that election be made the special order for 10 o'clock Friday morning.

Prof. Anderson moved that a delegate be elected to attend the Sacramento Co. Institute. Motion carried. Election deferred till 10 o'clock Friday morning.

The Institute adjourned to meet at 7 o'clock P. M.

#### EVENING SESSION.

The President called the Institute to order at 7 o'clock.

The audience were entertained with a song by the Glee Club. Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

Pres. Gaddis then introduced the lecturer of the evening, Mr. George Hall, who delivered an address on Mathematics, after which miscellaneous business was declared in order, and the following names proposed for membership—I. S. Maren, A. J. Hall and G. Spencer, which names were referred to the committee to report at next meeting; after which the Institute adjourned to meet Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

#### FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Institute met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order at 10 o'clock—Pres. Gaddis in the chair. Previous minutes read and adopted. Music by the Glee Club.

The President announced the special election to be in order.

Prof. Anderson moved that the three having the greatest number of votes should be declared elected. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Pierce moved that a Teller be appointed by the chair. Motion carried, and Mr. George Hall appointed.

After balloting the following named gentlemen were declared elected: H. A. Pierce, Geo. Hall and Albert Fouch, to constitute the board of examination, in conjunction with the County Superintendent for one year.

Mr. Pierce moved that a committee of three instead of one, be elected to represent this Institute in the Sacramento County Institute. Motion carried, and the following gentlemen were elected said committee: Prof. Anderson, W. W. Pendegast and H. A. Pierce.

Prof. Anderson moved that Mr. Thos. Ewing be elected a corresponding member of our Institute.

After a song from the Glee Club, Pres. Gaddis introduced Mr. H. G. Hartley, who delivered an address on Vocal Music, after which the president introduced J. L. Downing, M. D., who spoke of the benefits of the Institute—the laws of health. The Doctor proceeded to make and argue the proposition that the same laws govern health that govern the moral and physical kingdoms, and of the importance of the laws of health being observed in the school room. After which the Institute adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock P. M.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Institute met pursuant to adjournment and was called to order at 2 o'clock. The President being absent, Vice President in the chair.

Miscellaneous business being declared in order, committee on conference reported favorably for the admission of the following gentlemen: I. S. Marsh, A. J. Hall and G. Spencer—report adopted.

Mr. Pierce called the attention of the Institute to the importance of a State Journal of Education.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted; after which the Institute was favored with a song by the Glee Club.

After which Pres. Gaddis introduced Prof. Anderson, who delivered a lecture on the subject of Object Teaching, after which Miss Carrie A. Templeton was introduced who read an Essay on the Duties and Responsibilities of Parents; after which miscellaneous business was declared in order.

Prof. Anderson moved that a committee of three be appointed by the chair, who shall represent this Institute in the next State Teachers' Institute, and use their influence in the adoption of such provisions as may be deemed expedient by this Institute. Motion passed unanimously.

Prof. Anderson moved the following resolutions which were adopted unanimously:

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed by the chair, who shall represent this Institute in the next session of the State Teachers' Institute, and use their influence in the adoption, by that Institute, of such provisions as may be deemed expedient by this County Institute.

Resolved, That this committee be instructed to submit the following as a suitable plan for the examination of teachers: That the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and three teachers, to be selected by the State Institute, be a State Board of Examination; that the session shall be held semi-annually at the capital of the State, and that the certificates granted by this board be good and valid throughout the State and continue in force during the good behavior of the holder; that the County Superintendent of each county, and three teachers to be selected by the County Institute—where there is one, and where none exists by the County Supt. himself—be a County Board of Examination, by whom certificates may be granted in the interim of the session of the State Board, subject to its approval at its next regular semi-annual session.

Resolved, That the Co. Supt. be requested to convene the County Board of Examination at least once in three months, for the examination of such applicants as may present themselves.

Resolved, That said board be requested to grant a renewal of certificate without further examination to any teacher who may already be in possession of one, issued by their own or previous boards, in this county; provided that any teacher desiring a certificate of a higher grade, than that previously issued, shall be required to pass an examination upon the studies of the grade for which he or she may desire a certificate.

Resolved, That said board be requested to arrange a permanent standard of examination for each grade, and report the same prior to the close of this session.

Resolved, That it is the imperative duty of teachers to improve themselves, by a course of disciplinary study and investigation, and that in order to conduce to this, the county board be requested to refuse the renewal for more than once, of any certificate, lower in grade than that of Grammar School No. 1.

Mr. Pendegast moved that Institute adjourn to meet at 7 o'clock.

#### EVENING SESSION.

The Institute met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order at 7 o'clock—Pres. Gaddis in the chair.

Miscellaneous business being declared in order, the committee on Standard of Qualification reported the following which was adopted.

#### PRIMARY SCHOOLS.

Orthography and reading, and best methods of teaching them; Practical Arithmetic—through percentage—Colburn's Mental to section seventh; thoroughness in general principles of Mathematical, Physical and Political Geography; Penmanship, Teaching, and methods of discipline.

#### INTERMEDIATE SCHOOLS.

All requisites for primary schools; and in addition, a thorough knowledge of Practical Arithmetic; Colburn's Mental, complete; English Grammer, through Syntax, and Intermediate Geography, complete.

#### GRAMMER SCHOOLS.

All the qualifications for Primary and Intermediate schools; and in addition, English Grammer, complete; History of the United States, Elementary Philosophy, principles of Elocution, and the general principles of Physiology, and Elementary Algebra.

Mr. Spencer moved that a committee of three be appointed to take into consideration the propriety of erecting a piling around the grave of Mr. Wild. Motion carried, and Messrs. Spencer, Burnett and Bicknell, appointed said committee.

Mr. Spencer read the minutes of a called meeting of the Institute, which were adopted.

Mr. Hartley, as chairman of committee, read the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, We are called upon to mourn the loss of a dear friend, and a worthy member of our Institute, and an ardent lover of the cause of education, it is appropriate that we express our sentiments of grief and deep contrition—a tribute his memory well deserves—therefore

Resolved, That in the death of William Wild we are deprived of the exalted services of an accomplished scholar, successful teacher and worthy citizen.

Resolved, That we sympathise with his distant parents and friends, when they shall learn of his lamented death, and with them mourn over our common misfortune.

Resolved, That we profit by his good example, imitate his virtues and the excellencies of his character, and when we are called upon to obey the same summons, that it may be with the same christian resignation and confidence of a better life to come.

Resolved, That we suitably protect and ornament the spot which marks his final resting place.

Mr. Mackall then read a letter addressed to Mr. Wild's parents, informing them of his untimely death.

Pres. Gaddis then introduced Mr. H. A. Pierce, who pronounced the eulogy on Mr. Wild; after which the Glee Club entertained the audience with an appropriate song.

Judge Hoag was called upon, but declined making any remarks.

On motion the foregoing resolutions were unanimously adopted.

Prof. Anderson moved that a copy of the resolutions and address be sent to the parents of Mr. Wild, and to the County paper for publication. Motion passed unanimously.

The Institute adjourned to meet at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

#### MORNING SESSION.

Institute met pursuant to adjournment and was called to order at 10 o'clock—Pres. Gaddis in the chair. Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted. Music by the Glee Club, after which the President introduced Mr. Fouch, who delivered an address on the subject of Physiology.

Miscellaneous business being declared in order, G. Spencer, chairman of committee to take under advisement the propriety of putting a piling around Mr. Wild's grave, for which Mr. Pierce offered the following amendment:

That a committee of three be appointed by the chair, to confer with the friends of the deceased with reference to an appropriation from his property, for the erection of a suitable monument and the decoration of his grave.

Messrs. Pierce, Hartley and Hall appointed said committee.

Prof. Anderson moved that a committee of three be appointed to take under advisement, and report at the next session of the Institute, a course of study to be pursued by the teachers in our schools.

Motion prevailed, and Prof. Anderson, Miss Carrie A. Templeton and Mr. I. S. Marsh, committee.

The committee on arrangements reported the following as instructors at the next meeting of the Institute—Misses C. A. Templeton on Grammer, and M. A. Duncan on Arithmetic, and Messrs. Anderson on Object Teaching, Mackall on Algebra and Geometry, Pierce on Reading, Hartley on Music, Ewing on Philosophy of Teaching, and Marsh on School Government.

Mr. Pierce moved that a committee of three be appointed by the chair to procure lecturers for our next Institute. Motion prevailed, and Messrs. Pierce, King and Spencer appointed said committee.

Prof. Anderson moved that the County Supt. use his influence with the Trustees to permit Teachers to attend the Institute without loosing their time. Motion carried.

Mr. Pierce moved that Miss Carrie A. Templeton be invited to read an Essay at the next meeting of the Institute. Motion adopted.

Mr. Pendegast moved that our lectures be limited to four, for the next Institute. On motion we adjourned to meet at 7 o'clock.

#### EVENING SESSION.

Institute met pursuant to adjournment, and was called to order at 7 o'clock, by Vice President Anderson. Music by the Glee Club.

Vice Pres Anderson introduced the lecturer of the evening, Mr. Pendegast, who delivered a lecture on Education.

The Glee Club then favored the audience with a song, after which Vice Pres. Anderson introduced Miss M. A. Duncan who read an Essay on The Story Book.

Mr. Pierce moved that the warmest thanks and highest approbation be tendered to W. W. Pendegast and Miss Duncan—motion passed.

Mr. Pierce moved that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet in Woodland, the 1st Wednesday of April, 1863, at 1 o'clock—motion adopted.

Mr. Pierce moved that Mrs. M. B.

Dayton be requested to read an Essay at our next meeting—motion carried.

H. J. Spencer moved that the Secretary read the minutes of the afternoon session—carried.

The Secretary informed the Institute that there had been an examination during the afternoon, and that the Secretary of the Board of Examination would have to read the minutes.

H. A. Pierce moved that the Secretary read the minutes of the forenoon session—motion passed.

Prof. Anderson moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to the Glee Club—motion carried.

Mr. Woods moved that the minutes be prepared, and forward by the Secretary, to the KNIGHT'S LANDING NEWS for publication—motion passed.

Vice Pres. Anderson then introduced Pres. Gaddis to the audience.

Prof. Anderson moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to the President and Secretary for the faithful manner they have discharged their duties—motion prevailed.

W. W. Pendegast moved that a vote of thanks be tendered to Prof. Anderson for the impartial and able manner that he has discharged this evening's duties—motion prevailed.

Prof. Anderson moved that Institute adjourn, after listening to a song from the Glee Club—motion passed.

BALL.—On Wednesday next a ball will be given by C. D. Morin, at Cacheville, in his new brick building. We hope our citizens will turn out generally.

OWING to the unavoidable absence of the Editor the past week, our editorial columns will lack their usual amount of news. We shall endeavor, however, to make up the deficiency the coming week.

TEAMING.—Our farmers are busily engaged hauling off their grain to the mountains and, in return, bring back lumber. The number of teams in this business the past two weeks is greater than ever before this season. We infer by this, grain is advancing in the mountains in anticipation of early rains.

SCHOOL CENSUS.—According to the returns of the School Census taken in the month of October, there are in Yolo Co. 1382 children between the ages of 4 and 18 years; of which Woodland Dist. has 216, Ruchanan 101, Washington 99, Prairie 82, Grafton 98, and Union 95. We will give the list by districts when it is furnished us by the County Superintendent.

SCHOOL CENSUS FOR KNIGHT'S LAND-ING.—The returns of the School Marshal for this district—Grafton No. 7—shows quite an increase over that of last year. From the report we find the number of children in the district is 152. Between 4 and 18 years of age 98, of which 48 are girls, and 50 boys, and 52 under 4 years of age; of this total number, 92 are natives of California. The average number of the above attending school daily is 31.

TAXES.—Fiske, the Federal Collector of licences, visited our town on Tuesday last, and laid the business community under obligations to him, by taking his receipts for sundry small amounts—from \$10 to \$100—and ridding themselves of a few Uncle Sam's Green Backs. The offices of Collector and Assessor of these licenses may be a lucrative one, but, from our observation here, we incline to the opinion, it is not over agreeable.

TO SETTLERS ON THE KNIGHT GRANT. The week after next we shall commence the publication of the proceedings of the Supreme Court, in the case of the United States vs. Wm. Knight's Administrators, and shall continue the same from week to week, until the whole is published; and as this is of importance to the settlers, we would suggest that all the settlers procure and keep a file of these proceedings for future reference. Persons wishing to take the paper for the time, will leave their names, as none extra will be published, unless ordered.

THE patriotic ladies of Woodland have organized a "Soldiers' Aid Society."—Mrs. Chas W. Lewis, President; Mrs. Geo. D. Fiske, Secretary, and Mrs. F. S. Freeman, Treasurer. Quite a spirited meeting of the Society was held there on Tuesday evening last, which was addressed by Judge Deming, Professor Anderson, A. Wyckoff, H. A. Pierce, W. J. Johnson and H. Spencer. At the conclusion of the meeting, \$234 had been paid to the Treasurer, and considerable subscribed and not yet paid. Meetings are to be held weekly, on Tuesday evenings.

THE Sierra Democrat says the point is conceded by all who claim to be thoroughly informed on the subject, is that the proposed amendments to the Constitution, having never been regularly indorsed by legislative action, nor correctly advertised, will not go into force.

A LETTER from Newcastle-on-Tyne, England, dated the 14th of September, has been received in New York, which states that several large steamers are building there to run the blockade on the Southern coast. They were heavily armed and would be ready for sea in a month. Two of them, the Malacca and the Louisiana, are 325 feet long, and carry each two engines of 2,000 horse power.

San Francisco Correspondence.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12th, '62.

EDITOR KNIGHT'S LANDING NEWS:— People are commencing to learn that it hardly pays to leave the quiet shores of California, to race around in the tumultuous Atlantic States, when they run a risk of being sent off against their inclination to battle for their country. Yesterday the "Orizaba" sailed for Panama with but 110 passengers; but this does not prove that our citizens are contented even here, away from the roar and excitement of contending armies; for there seems to be at the present time, quite a skeddadle for China—scarcely a ship sailing in that direction without carrying a full list of passengers. The clipper ship "Kingfisher" sails hence in a few days, bound for Shanghai, and has all the freight of this kind she can carry. The "Lotus," for Hong Kong, also goes full. Well, the inducements to go toward the setting sun are certainly very great. The whole of the vast valley of the Yang-tse-Kiang river—which drains a territory of considerably over 2,000,000 of square miles—has been thrown open to the commerce of the world. This is the Paradise of China. Already steamers have ascended the noble stream which drains this vast extent of country, and the reports concerning the commercial resources of the territory are of the most encouraging nature; so much so, that the ship owners of London, Liverpool, Glasgow, New York and Boston, are rapidly building steamboats suitable for navigating the waters of the Yang-tse-Kiang and its tributaries, and dispatching them to the Celestial country; and it is said that the commerce of this river will soon more than equal that of the "Father of Waters" in its most prosperous days. Several gentlemen have recently gone from this city to Shanghai, for the purpose of erecting large and commodious hotels, to meet the demand of the large increase of travel in that direction. The "Kingfisher" carries for freight, lumber that is designed for building a large drydock—but when are we to have a line of steamers plying between this port and Shanghai? There has been a great amount of talk about it, but I am not aware as any more in the matter has yet commenced. By the way, speaking of the emigration to China, reminds me that Sir James Brooke has placed a steamer on the route between his possessions in Sarawak, on the north-west coast of Island of Borneo, and Singapore, for the purpose of carrying passengers free, who desire to emigrate to that magnificent country. A good many Chinamen, I believe, are taking advantage of the Rajah's generosity. If General Ward, with the assistance of the English and French, succeeds in quelling the great rebellion that has been desolating the Chinese Empire for so many years, the commerce will soon assume the most gigantic proportions; and the Golden State is destined to reap a glorious harvest when this important era is consummated.

San Francisco seems to be getting ready for most any emergency that is likely to take place in the future. For instance, observe the number of palatial hotels that are rising like magic in this our beautiful city. I think San Francisco could very appropriately be christened the "City of Hotels," like Brooklyn, called the "City of Churches," and New Haven the "Elm City," &c. We have now one hundred and two hotels, great and small, besides any quantity of lodging-houses, and so forth. A man's reputation is at once established if he can say—"I live at the 'Russ House,'" or "come and see me at the 'Lick House.'" I am persuaded that many young men are spending every cent they make, in order that they may be enabled to utter some such magic words as the above. The fashionable "Houses" are the most terrific places of resort for old ladies with marriageable daughters. They are "brought out" on all conceivable occasions, especially at the *table d'hote*, where they are exposed to the inspection of the "fine fellows," in much the same way as mutton is exhibited in the stalls of Washington Market. The "Occidental" is to be some what remarkable in this respect, I believe. The worst of it is, that the fond mammas sometimes get sadly taken in by gents who eat a dime dinner at the "Miner's Restaurant," and pick their teeth in the halls of the *Russ or Lick House*. You may look out sharp for some interesting developments at the Palace "Occidental," during the coming winter, as I know of several "young creatures" who are to have their first "bringing out" at the grand opening of this hotel, which is to take place in a month and a half or two months, from

now. The furniture of this boarding house is to cost over \$100,000; and I think the portion I have seen is as beautiful and elegant as that of the famous "Fifth Avenue" of New York. When completed, this superb building will extend a whole block on Montgomery St.; and it is to have a magnificent entrance way, fifty feet wide, in the center of the structure. While I am speaking about Houses, I will mention that the famous "What Cheer" house has been undergoing some extensive alterations and fixings. Mr. Woodard brought from Europe, a valuable collection of paintings, which have been for some days on exhibition at the office of the hotel, drawing, of course, crowds of the lovers of fine arts to inspect them. In my next, I shall make a descent from hotels, and hotel life, and give you a few particulars about Sewers, City Railroads, and many other things, too numerous to mention in this letter.

MAKEE SEE. We are told by an eastern journal that there is a young man in the army who was born on July 4th, at 4 o'clock P. M., at No. 44, in a street in Buffalo, in 1844; a 4th child, has 4 names; enlisted into a military company which has joined the 4th battalion, 44th regiment, 4th company, and on the 4th of September was appointed 4th corporal, and is now going forth to defend the fourth part of the country of his fore-fathers, and so forth. SHIPWRECKED REPUTATIONS.—The war has been particularly fatal to military reputations. General Scott, who at the commencement of hostilities stood a head and shoulders above all his countrymen, was soon found to be unequal to the contest, and was laid aside to rest upon the laurels he had won in his younger days. General Harney, who was supposed to be the Boanerges of war, was tried for a short time in Missouri, but he too failed to meet public expectations, and as a consequence was shelved, and now lays a helpless wreck piled up among the debris of the War Department. Following Harney, came the "Pathfinder of the West," the redoubtable General Fremont, whom thousands looked to as the predestined savior of his country. Amid the clang and blare of trumpets this favorite of the hour took the field, but in less than a hundred days the vaunting commander demonstrated his utter inefficiency, and he too sank beneath the waves of oblivion. At the West was another General of suppose great promise, and at a perilous moment he was summoned to command the army of Virginia. Preceded by glowing proclamations, "full of sound and fury," General Pope placed himself at the head of the army of the Republic, but here again it was found that a great name availed nothing, and in less than a fortnight the President was compelled to withdraw his favor from the incompetent commander. We have here no less than four commanders, of acknowledged courage, who have shivered their reputations in the war. In the light of these wrecks, can we discern the Joshua who is to lead our mustering hosts in triumph, and place his heel upon the viper of rebellion?—*Dalles Mountaineer*.

THE Secretary of the U. S. Sanitary Commission at Washington, writes to the Superintendent of the Philadelphia depository, as follows: Lint, bandages, and old linen have reached us in such enormous quantities that we have been obliged to hire a store-room for no other purpose than to store away the surplus 500 barrels. Please, therefore, discourage their further manufacture in your district, and endeavor to turn the energies of people towards the making of under clothes and the knitting of socks instead.

WE understand that the Deciples are holding a protracted meeting at Woodland. Much interest is manifested, some fifteen or twenty having already joined the church. Meeting will be continued at least till Sunday evening next.

WHEN Baker, Kewen and Hamilton were released upon taking the oath to support the government, the same offer was made to Majors Gillis and McKay. They refused to do so; telling the authorities to "go to hell," they were well satisfied with their situation—got board and lodging free and nothing to do, which was a better thing than they had ever struck before."—*Folsom Telegraph*.

THE Democrats of Castleton, Vermont, elected their town representatives at the town election, the first Democratic representative ever sent from that town.

GEN. STONE now promenades Pennsylvania Avenue daily, in full uniform. It is rumored that he will be reinstated in his command.

It is said to be a fact, substantiated by reliable testimony, that rebel officers having friends in Baltimore frequently visit them for days together, without molestation or inconvenience from the authorities.

S. Curtis, in Washington Township—advertisement for proposals having been heretofore made for filling such cut or slough—and in accordance with such advertisement, the Board proceeded to open and examine said proposals, and having fully considered the premises, awarded the contract to A. A. Bennett—contract and specifications filed in Clerk's office.

Wm. Pollock, Blind man: Ordered that John Hill be allowed at the rate of \$125 00 per month for the support and maintenance of Wm. Pollock, blind man, and that the Auditor draw warrants quarterly for the same on the Hospital fund. Adjourned.

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**BY OVERLAND TELEGRAPH.**  
The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union of Nov. 21st:  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Hooker has been assigned to the command of the army corps heretofore commanded by Fitz John Porter, who has been ordered to Washington to stand trial on charges preferred by pope, for misconduct at the battle of Bull Run.  
Gen. Schenck has been designated as the successor of Gen. Wool at Baltimore and will probably leave for his new post within a few days.  
A private letter from New Orleans says:  
Gen. Butler has taken possession of 2 large plantations near the city, and has transferred a large number of loyal blacks to them for active service. The number of fugitive blacks in the Department of the Gulf is increasing at a rapid rate, but by employing them in this way, says the writer, and paying them small wages and charging them for clothing, the Government will be fully reimbursed for the expense.  
One of those brilliant affairs which shed luster upon our volunteer cavalry occurred on Sunday morning. Captain Dahlgren, with 60 of the First Indiana and a small detachment of the sixth Ohio cavalry, dashed into Fredericksburg where they found 8 companies of rebel cavalry. Without giving the enemy time to form, Dahlgren fell upon them, and a desperate hand to hand fight ensued, lasting three hours, when the rebels retreated. Our men returned on Sunday night, bringing 30 prisoners, with their horses, accouterments and their wagons loaded with army cloth, having lost but one killed and 3 wounded.  
Heavy firing was heard on Sunday night at Sigel's headquarters, in the direction of Rappahannock, which leads to the belief that Pleasanton and Stuart were again fighting there. It was rumored that Pleasanton had driven the rebels off.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—A Washington special dispatch says:  
The wagon bridge across the Rappahannock at Waterloo, Fauquier county, three hundred feet long, was burned by the rebels.  
A few days only will be required to put the Orange and Alexandria railroad in running order.  
A reconnaissance was made on Saturday morning by Doubleday's division, which crossed the Rappahannock at Waterloo and explored the country five miles beyond the river, encountering the enemy in small force, routing them, and capturing two cannon and several prisoners.  
Gen Sumner's old corps reached Warrenton on Saturday.  
The Richmond Whig of November 8, speaking of the recent Northern elections says they show plainly the tide is all one way, and that against Abraham Lincoln and his rampant war part. If the electioneering assertions and appeals of this party could be credited, this success of the Democracy is about equal to a declaration of peace, but they are not to be credited, and we are not permitted to take that comfort to our bosom. We have reason to hope that with a Democratic Congress and a Republican Administration, they will regard each other as men who are in doubt, but that on the morrow may be cutting each others throats. The people mean, by this remarkable revolution, to declare deep dissatisfaction, and also to decree that important changes must be made. Having found their strength, we may expect they will now speak their sentiments with a boldness they have not dared to venture upon before.  
The Whig says:  
On Sunday last the Abolitionists marched from Jameston, N. C., to a point a short distance below Williamston, on the Roanoke river, to cut off two Confederate regiments stationed there. Four companies encountered the whole Yankee force, and kept them at bay the whole day. During the night the Confederate forces arrived, and offered battle to the enemy, who fell back to prevent a fight. The shelling was kept up by the gunboats until 10 o'clock at night.  
AUGUSTA, Ga., Nov. 6.—The Savannah Republican of this morning says:  
The Abolitionists were bombarding Tampa Bay, Florida, on the 3d. Our forces were confident of their ability to hold out.  
A cartridge factory at Jackson, Ga., exploded on Nov. 5, killing every person employed in the works. Not less than 30 lives were lost.  
The Herald's Washington correspondent says:  
We have news from Richmond to the 6th of November. Lee has arrived there and resumed his position as Commander-in-Chief. Gen. Joe Johnston succeeds Lee in active command of the armies north of Richmond. He has now his headquarters at Culpepper. Stonewall Jackson's corps has been increased to 50,000.  
The situation of the Federal army was well understood at Richmond.  
The new Merrimac is completed, and has been at Fort Darling for some days, with steam up, and a full complement of men aboard. It is stated that if worsted in an encounter with our navy she can seek protection under the guns of Fort Darling.  
A number of officers of the rebel service have been detailed by their War Department to carry on the contraband trade between Baltimore and Richmond. A large amount of quinine, and two millions of percussion caps, recently ran the

blockade of the Potomac in possession of some of these parties.  
The Richmond papers of November 7 state that the rebel army is shoeless, and appeal to the people to supply them.  
They also state that a letter from a private reliable source says the enemy is reported at Monterey, Highland county, Western Virginia. Their force is said to be 1,500 cavalry.  
BALTIMORE, Nov. 11.—A Pensacola letter, dated Oct. 29th, says:  
The United States steamer Montgomery had arrived at that port, with the steamer Caroline as a prize, captured 50 miles off Mobile, after a seven hour's chase. She was loaded with munitions of war.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—The Herald's Washington special dispatch says:  
Advices have been received here from our squadron on the coast of Texas, by which it appears that while a couple of vessels remain at Galveston, others have gone toward the Rio Grande. Up to the 20th of October no troops had arrived to follow up the naval success. The rebels held the country around Galveston and made frequent incursions into the city at night. The people of the city flocked to the wharves to be protected from rebel soldiery.  
HARPER'S FERRY, Nov. 11th.—Rebel pickets had appeared on the Virginia side of the Potomac, between Berlin and Point of Rocks. Rebel cavalry are scouring the country on the south side of Loudon Heights. They fired on our pickets yesterday in Loudon Valley.  
The report that a strong rebel force is in the vicinity of Front Royal is confirmed by contrabands.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Recent reconnoissances indicate that two divisions of rebel cavalry are between the Rappahannock and the Rapidan, and one division in the vicinity of the old battle ground of Cedar mountain, under command of Hill.  
Hampton's legion, consisting of a brigade of cavalry from Stuart's division, was between Little Washington and Sperryville on Monday. His artillery yesterday shelled the camp of the Eighth Illinois Cavalry. Wilcox's division promptly moved to their support. Gen. Griffin has occupied the village of Jefferson four miles from Rappahannock, on the road from Warrenton Springs to Culpepper.  
Warrenton correspondence of Nov. 10 says:  
The feeling throughout the army toward Gen. Burnside is very warm and cordial.  
Thirty of our regular cavalry while on a foraging expedition, ten miles south of Warrenton, encountered a squadron of rebel cavalry, completely routing them. Our loss was eight and the rebel fourteen. The rebel army is believed to be massed at Culpepper and in that vicinity.
