

JANUARY TRIP TO TOMALES BAY

The 25 persons who turned out for this trip on January 17 certainly could not be accused of faint heart for the wind blew a gale for some 15 hours previously and over 5 inches of rain fell in the Pt. Reyes area. Dawn found clearing weather however, and blue skies predominated all day. The Olema marsh, full to overflowing, blocked the road to Inverness during the morning so the car caravan birded the east shore of Tomales Bay where the highlights were one female Old-squaw, about a dozen Redheads and hundreds of Black Brant. After lunch we slowly plowed through the shallow water covering the highway and made our way to Tomales Point where three more Old-squaws were seen plus the beautiful Harlequin Ducks and one female American Scoter.

The following 90 species were observed: Common Loon, Arctic Loon, Red-throated Loon, Horned Grebe, Eared Grebe, W. Grebe, Pied-billed Grebe, White Pelican, Brown Pelican, Double-crested Cormorant, Brandt Cormorant, Pelagic Cormorant, Great Blue Heron, Am. Egret, Snowy Egret, Black Brant, Mallard, Baldpate, Pintail, Green-winged Teal, Shoveller, Redhead., Canvasback, Scaup (probably both species), Am. Golden-eye, Bufflehead, Old Squaw, Harlequin Duck, White-winged Scoter, Surf Scoter, Am. Scoter, Ruddy Duck, Red-breasted Merganser, Turkey Vulture, Sharp-shinned Hawk, Cooper Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk, Sparrow Hawk, Calif. Quail, Coot, Black Oyster-catcher, Killdeer, Surf-bird, Ruddy Turnstone, Black Turnstone, Wilson Snipe, Spotted Sandpiper, Willet, Dowitcher, Sanderling, Glaucous-winged Gull, W. Gull, Herring Gull, Calif. Gull, Ring-billed Gull, Common Murre, Pigeon Guillemot, Horned Owl, Belted Kingfisher, Red-shafted Flicker, Scrub Jay, Am. Raven, Crow, Bush-tit, Wren-tit, Winter Wren, Bewick Wren, Robin, Varied Thrush, Hermit Thrush, W. The California office of the National Audubon Society has announced an all-day conference on "Conservation policies — their effect today and for the future of our national resources", to be held at the San Francisco YMCA camp at Jones Gulch, La Honda, on Saturday, April 3, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. A special field trip will be held on Sunday, April 4, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Reservations are to be mailed to the National Audubon Society, 693 Sutter St., San Francisco 2. The speakers will include Newton Drury, head of the Division of Beaches and Parks of the State of California, Dr. A. Starker Leopold of the Department of Zoology of the University of California, and Carl Buchheister, Vice-president of the National Audubon Society. This conference is being held in place of the State Convention which was held at Asilomar in recent years.

The Committee on Research of the American Ornithologists' Union has recently completed the manuscript of a new book, "Recent Studies in Avian Biology" to be published soon. The 13 chapters have been prepared by recognized authorities who are active investigators in their fields. Examples: Alden H. The authors show that the California Gull, like the Herring Gull, has a 4-year plumage cycle, not a 3-year cycle as suggested by Allan Brooks.
