Great Peach Prices.

From a private letter from Mr. Roland Morrill, of Benton Harbor, Mich., we take the liberty to make the following extracts concerning the results of his fruit sales this season and his experience with some new varieties:

I have just finished the peach crop and had an excellent one. My oldest orchard, ten acres, now eight years old, just produced its fifth successive crop, over 3,000 bushels, and in spite of the glutted condition of the market has done well.

My Elbertas have not returned less than \$3 per bushel net, from South Water st., and vesterday I received returns at \$4 per bushel on select Stevens Rareripe, and 45 cents per fifth basket on the seconds.

The only time thal I have not been satisfied was through the rush of Gold Drops, as I only realized about \$1 per bushel for what I sent to Chicago, but I sold on orders nearly 1,000 bushels of them at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bushel, but as I had some 1,500 bushels from 400 trees I am not "kicking."

The Kalamazoo came to the front again this year with a heavy crop that brought \$1.50 to \$2 per bushel.

My Lewis yielded 4,000 fifth baskets from two acres, and sold at 25 to 40 cents per baskets, and I presume will show largest net profit of any variety.

Hill's Chili, as usual, suffered from the severe drouth and came on very uneven in size and not as satisfactory as last vear.

Fitzgerald and Crosby both showed fruit on one-vcar-old trees and I am most favorably impressed with both. Fitzgerald is as large as Crawford or larger, and even hardier than Crosby or Lewis, with the smallest pit I ever saw, and most brilliant color. Take your map and find Oakville, on the north shore of Lake Ontario where it originated, and when you come to consider that in that cold region the original tree has borne five successive crops you will not wonder that the introducers are enthusiastic over it and are quietly setting large orchards in Canada. I hope it may do as well after propagation and in a new climate as in its place of origin, as I am going to set 1,000 trees in the spring, but do not advise anybody else to set them until better tested.

The Horton's Rivers is another variety that I think is to do well here, where they do not have to be shipped too far to mar-ket. It is simply a "Freestone Rivers."

The Abundance and Burbank plums have done well this year. They stood the many freezings better than peaches, and produced enormously on three-year trees. The Burbank is the grandest plum I have ever seen, but neither of them are strictly curculio proof, as claimed by so many nurserymen, but do resist their attacks much better than the European plums. I believe lots of money will be made on the Burbank along the lake, where bloom is held back in the spring.

I fell under obligations to Prof. Taft for calling my attention to the Conrath raspberry, as there is more profit in it for me by far than in any other. I have now eight acres growing and twelve acres more fitted for next spring's setting. For a red raspberry, the Loudon impresses me, from one season's fruiting, as the best by far in sight. Still, all these new things may develop some weakness in time .--Green's Fruit Grower.

The Kieffer Leads:

A fruit grower in Deleware writes us that he has 400 young trees which bore their first crop this year, and that they cleared him about one hundred dollars per acre.

Orders for trees quoted on pages 23, 24, and 25 should be sent in promptly, so that they can be packed into orders in the assort-ment desired, and before they are packed into "Box Lots.

We will not pack into "Box Lots" the following named trees, and orders may be sent in for these at any time during February: One year pears of the different sizes; one year Americana Plums; one year Cherries.

Notice surplus on Peaches and Japan Plums. We have just finished cellaring these and find we have an unexpected surplus of some varieties. Orders should be sent for them promptly upon receipt of this list.

We make special prices this month upon Orange Quince two years old. See quotations.

We have a few thousand LeConte Pears, one year, at Biloxi, Miss., upon which will give special quotations in thousand lots.

The Willard Plum still holds its place We as being the earliest market sort. have been refusing orders for it, but find upon placing our stock of it in cellar that we have several thousands left of the different sizes. See quotations.

We will have the following specialties in large supply, Fall of 1896 and Spring of 1897: Plums: Milton, Chas. Downing, Wickson, Willard, Red June, Red Nagate, Abundance, and Burbank. Peaches: Triumph, Greensboro, Sneed. Nurserymen will do well to supply their agents with colored plates in good time. Except Wickson, Red June, Triumph and Greensboro the prices will be the same as other varieties of the same type. Prices on Wickson, Red June, Triumph and Greensboro will be very low for new sorts so son, and your trees were the best packed much in demand.

We are now entering orders from Northern customers to be delivered in Spring free of freight charges to transfer companies at St. Louis, Mo., Cincinnati, Ohio, Rochester, N. Y., and Philadelphia, Pa. Orders should be sent in as early as possible to secure the sizes and assortments most desired.

We will sell small trees for "Lining Out" in nursery rows, and take notes bearing interest at the maximum legal rate. payable May 1st, 1897, on responsible prompt paying parties. This offer includes Keiffer and LeConte, 1 year, 1 to 2 feet, 2 to 3 feet, and 3 to 4 feet; Dwarf Pears, one year, 1 to 2 feet, 2 to 3 feet and 3 to 4 feet; Plums one and two years, 1 to 2 feet, 2 to 3 feet and 3 to 4 feet; Cherries, 2 years, 2 to 3 feet and 3 to 4 feet; Peaches, 1 to 2 feet and 2 to 3 feet. Trees for this purpose may be ordered at once, but will not be shipped to Southern customers before February 15th; for Northeran customers, not before April 5th. Trees sold on our usual terms will be shipped promptly when ordered.

Terms and Conditions Governing Quotations in the Price List of the Huntsville Wholesale Nurseries.

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uni-formly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10, as for as practicable. Orders for 50 and of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filled at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten.

one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten-SEASON-Our packing and shipping season begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March. We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for these we do not grow, as to not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buyt rees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS .- We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direc-tions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance turns as to surppoing, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe delivery and condition of Trees and Plants after a proper shipment by us.

after a proper shipment by us. RELEASE.—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will Release and Guarantee, and take forwarder's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value less than 5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. Claims for delay or loss must be made to the forwarders.

PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows:

Boxes 30 inches square, from $7\frac{1}{5}$ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 18 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING .- Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS .- We do not require customers AssortMENTS.-We do not require customers to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substi-tution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the con-dition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control

TERMS.-Cash. When desired, we will allow 30 to 60 days from date of shipment, to responsible. orders for their disposition

Parties with whom we have had no business transactions, will save with a ventility is a set of the tions made, and the time named is only intended as so many days of grace in which to make returns. To northern customers, who wish to lay in stock for Spring trade, we will ship late in Fall or early in Spring, and allow time for payment till May 15th. If shipment is required in the Fall for Spring use, a note is to be given upon receipt of the trees. We do not allow any discount for cash, but we make our prices low to discount for cash, but we make our prices low to command cash, or prompt returns. In orders when the time is not mentioned, 30 days is to be understood. Interest at the rate of 8 per cent per annum must be paid on over due accounts. Should prices be changed, either higher or lower, during the season, the prices ruling at the time the order is made, are expected to stand.

FORMS OF PAYMENT.—All bills are payable at the office of the seller, and remittances should be made by drafts on New York, Chicago or St. Louis, or by money orders on some Express Company, or by postal orders. We will, how-ever, accept checks from those of our customers who may be located at places having no bankwho may be located at places having no bank-ing, express or postal facilities, provided they make them in every case payable "with ex-change", or add ½ of one cent. to the amount of the bill for the cost of collection. GRADES.—We grade very carefully, in some cases by caliper, in others by height. When graded by both caliper and height, the caliper must govern, as the height then named is only to be generidered approximation.

must govern, as the height then named is only to be considered approximately. When graded by height or caliper, we include the lower num-ber and exclude the higher. Instance: in a grade of 4 to 5 feet trees, the 4 feet trees are in-cluded, but not the 5 feet trees. If 5 feet trees are wanted, the 5 to 6 feet grade must be ordered.



GUARANTEE OF GENUTNENESS.—While we ex-ercise the greatest diligence and care to have all our Trees, etc., true to label, and hold ourselves in readiness, on proper proof, to replace all trees, etc., that may prove untrue to label, free of charge, or refund the amount paid, it is mutu-ally understood and agreed to, between the pur-abaren card coverduce that cover the purchaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of gen-

ally understood and agreed to, between the pur-chaser and ourselves, that our guarantee of gen-uineness shall in no case make us liable for any sum greater than that originally received for said trees, etc., that shall prove untrue. ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by tel-egraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint,or should the trees be refused, stating reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause,will receive consideration only whon made promptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all out. The box should be placed in the cellar or pro-tected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to secure the trees against damage, if the frost is allowed to come out in the natural way. Goods will be considered accepted if removed from the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of complaint to us, and without cur orders for their disposition

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
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
