# **EFFORT TO FREE DEBS FROM JAIL**

American Socialists . Plan Demonstration in Washington; Appeal to Wilson

Chicago, March 20.—A "spectacular but dignified" effort to secure the release of Eugene V. Debs, from the Atlanta, Ga., penitentiary, will be made in Washington, D. C., April 13, the national Socialist headquarters announced to-day. Debs, who probably will be the next Socialist Presidential candidate, was convicted under the Espionage Act and put into the prison April 13, 1919.

Delegates of Socialists and radicals from all parts of the country will arrive on special trains and march up Pennsylvania Avenue, carrying placards and headed by a brass band, according to the plan. The procession will go to the White House, where it is planned to have a pre-arranged conference with the President. General amnesty will be asked for "all Socialists and radicals confined or under prison sentences under the Espionage Act."

# **ESSEN DECLARED** SOVIET REPUBLIC

Dusseldorff Also Is Reported in Hands of Spartacan Troops

Battle For Control of Essen Lasted Twenty-four Hours

Brussels, March 20 .- (Havas) The capture of Essen was effected Friday by a Spartacan seventy-seven guns and equipment of armored automoaccording to advices from Aix-la-Chapelle to-day. The Spartaeans proclaimed a soviet republic there.

During last night, the advices dd, the manufacturing city of Dusseldorff, on the Rhine north of Cologne, was captured by Spartacan forces, 'the Government troops evacuating it with-

out a fight.

Amsterdam, March 20.—The battle for the control of Essen, home of the immense Krupp arms and industrial works, lasted twenty-four hours before the Communists finally won possession of the city, according to a dispatch from Muenster to The Telegraaf to-day. During the battle Essen was shelled by artillery in possession of the workingmen.

The Government of the city is now in the hands of a "Committee of Action," the dispatch reports.

A Berlin dispatch last night esti-mated that 300 persons were killed in fighting for the possession of Essen.

## ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE IN UNITED STATES

Washington, March 20.—There has been no intimation yet as to what President Wilson will do with the Treaty of Versailles, sent back to him as a result of the failure of the Senate to ratify it.

White House officials said this forenoon that the usual procedure would be to send it to the State Department for "burial" in the archives there.

"To champion a beer and wine amendment is nothing short of an attack on law enforcement," said Mr. Wheeler. "This beer and wine movement is the entering wedge to destroy prohibition."

# LORD MAYOR OF **CORK MURDERED**

MacGuirin, Sinn Feiner, Killed By Men in His Own Home

London, March 29.—The Lord Mayor of Cork was shot dead at 1 o'clock this morning. The revolver was fired by one of several masked persons whose identity is unknown. They entered his residence and after hey entered his residence, and after ring the shot, escaped in an auto-obile.

A half-dozen men knocked at the door of the home of the Lord Mayor, Thomas MacGuirin, Mrs. MacGuirin opened the door and the men rushed in. Some of them held her while others ran upstairs to the Lord Mayor's bedroom. They took him to the landing and shot him in the chest. Then they fled.

Mrs. MacGuirin telephoned immediately for a doctor and a priest. The Lord Mayor died soon after the arrival of the priest.

Lord Mayor MacGuirin, a prominent Sinn Feiner, was interned after the Easter rebellion.

Prices Still Mounted in February, Says Ottawa Labor Gazette



#### RAISE PAYMENTS FOR DEPENDENTS

Provision for increased compensation to dependents of workmen fatally injured is made in amendments to the Workmen's Compensation Act, introduced in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. J. W. de B. Farris, Attorney-General. The amendments provide for payments to:

1. A dependent who is a widow or an invalid widower without any children \$35 per month for life, instead of \$20 heretofore paid.

2. To a widow or invalid widower with one or more children \$35, with an additional \$7.50, compared with the previous \$5 for each child under sixteen or each invalid child over that age, but not exceeding, in all, \$65, as against \$40 now allowed.

3. Where the dependents are children without any widow or invalid widower the existing \$10 per month to each child under sixteen years of age, and to each invalid child over that age, is increased to \$12.50, not to exceed in the whole \$50, against the present \$40.

4. Where there is no widow or invalid widower or invalid child over that age, is increased to \$12.50, not to exceed in the whole \$50, against the present \$40.

4. Where there is no widow or invalid widower or any child under sixteen or invalid child over that age, is increased to \$10 for the present \$20 paid is increased to \$30 for the parent or parents, but not more than \$45 all told.

Here in England great numbers of women are out of employment, and even in offices where the gentler sex are employed feeling against them has run so high that the girls have formed a union to combine against the "enemy"—man. "Whitehall Flappers" are taboo, and Waacs are not welcomed in business circles. The good work these women of England did is forgotten, and all most folks remember are the harum-scarum antics of the few, the remembrance of which is spoiling the prospects of the many.

Miss Dorothy Evans, the secretary of the Federation of Women Clerks, who wanted to fly to Paris to draw attention to the wholesale dismissals of women in Government departments by interviewing Mr. Lloyd George there, was informed at No. 10 Downing Street that "the Prime Minister says that there can't be very much in this talk of women finding it hard to get employment. 





The cost of living has not mounted there the way it has in some other places, and this Mr. Sheldon said was due to two reasons: First, because there was little, if any, currency inflation; and second, because Australia produces most of the necessities of life and, despite tremendous exports, always has managed to keep enough for home consumption. Speaking of Australian currency, he said that at the present time there were outstanding about £55,000,000 currency notes, against which is held forty-four per cent. gold cover.

"One reason we have been able to sell our public debt bonds so readily," he said, "is that the people have become accustomed to them and buy them with confidence. There is practically no speculation in these securities and nobody ever worries about market quotations."

Mr. Justice Macdonald Finds in Favor of Vancouver

Vancouver, March 20.—Judgment has been given by Mr. Justice Macdonald in favor of the local union, No. 213, of the Ingrnational Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, in a consolidated action between the local and the international. The fight followed the revocation of the charter of the Vancouver body, numbering more than 600 members, by Canadian Vice-President Ernest Ingles, and an attempt on the part of the international to take over the books, money and assets of the local union. The officers of the organization in this city brought action against the international body seeking to retain membership in the brotherhood and in this they were successful. The case is reported to be the first of its kind in Canada wherein a union fought with its governing body for the retention of its affiliation, and it has been closely followed in labor circles throughout the Dominion.

The trial lasted fifteen days, the two actions being consolidated. The judgment and reasons handed down yesterday by Mr. Justice Macdonald are contained in whity-two typewritten pages.

In summing up his judgment Mr. Justice Macdonald restores the charter and membership privileges of the local union in the Brotherhood denies the right of the international body to attach the property of the local, and grants an injunction restraining Vice-President Ingles from interfering with the charter.

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



Declares Mr. Jardine Plotted For Reeve's Office Without Contest

CAUSTIC CRITICISM OF JARDINE'S MOTIVES

"God forbid that I should force apon the electors of Esquimait any nan of the calibre of John Jardine," observed Alexander Lockley amid applause at the Sallor's Club last light in opening his campaign for e-election to the office of Reeve of Esquimait.

Esquimalt.

Mr. Lockley charged that subtle political tricks of Mr. Jardine were responsible for the whole dislocation of Esquimalt's municipal affairs. He declared with emphasis that he did not know at the time of the election that he was in any way disqualified, and offered \$100 to anyone who could bring proof that he had been informed.

He declared that it took four lawyers two days and a judge seven days to decide that he was disqualified.

Wanted Office Without Election.

"John Jardine did not serve notice on me, but he had a card up his sleeve, and his supporters passed around the word to keep quiet about it until after nomination day," said Mr. Lockley. "Then when nobody else was in the contest besides us two, his game was to spring this disqualification charge, and try to grab the office of Reeve in an undemocratic way by acclamation and without being elected to it by the people. But the judge decided that that little game could not be worked, and he ordered a new election.

"John Jardine's past record elected me. After the election his words were: 'Lockley has beaten me, but







The sad pathos underlying this third movement gives place to a joyousness in the final "tone-picture," which is gaily descriptive of the Easter festival as observed throughout Russia. ### MUSICAL NOTES

(By George J. Dyke.)

London's chief sanctuary of religion is St. Paul's Cathedral, the finest building in London, with the worst approach, the shrine of heroes, the model of "grace" and the chef d'oeuvre of a great genius, Sir Christopher Wren. St. Paul's is the central object of modern London, and churches on the site have stodd above the welcoming waters of the Thames since the times of the Saxons. In the clock modern is the clock made by one Langley Bradley in 1708, which then cost £ 300. The minute hands are nine feet eight inches long and weigh seventy-five pounds each. The pendulum is sixteen feet long and the bob weighs 180 pounds, and yet is suspended by a spring no thicker than a twenty-five cent plece. Below the great bell are two smaller bells on which the clock strikes the quarters of the hour. In the northern tower is the bell that tolls for prayers. Although the bell of St. Paul's is the smallest, it is by far the best of the four large bells of England, the other three being York, Lincoln and Oxford. The great bell of St. Paul's weighs about 11,474 pounds, and its diameter is nine feet. It was cast from the metal of "Great Tom," a bell that once hung in a clock tower opposite Westminster Hall. It was given away by William III. and bought for St. Paul's for a little over fort, who stood up for their liberties. It was again especially rung on that memorable occasion when Queen Eleanor, who was so much detested by the people, tried to escape by water from the Tower. The celebration at St. Paul's of the victory over the French at the Battle of St. Quentin by Philip and the Spaniards was another occasion when the bells were especially rung. During a great storm in 1561 the then wooden steeple of St. Paul's was burned and the bells melted. This steeple was never re-erected in spite of Queen Elizabeth's angry remonstrances.

The "children of St. Paul's," whom Shakespeare, in Hamlet, maintains, with the jealousy of a rival manager, were the chorister boys of St. Paul's, it is supposed, acted in their singing school, beginning at 4 p.m. after prayers, the price of admission being fourpence. At a later period these boys were known to have acted some of Lily's euphemistic plays and one of Middleton's.

It is interesting to note that the "Messiah" has been given every year since 1882 by the Lindsbore Chorus, in that, perhaps, the most musical city of Kansas. 





It is anticipated in a few years to have no less than 350 miles of concrete roads in this one small county of many thousands in the United States of America.

Concrete roads have not reached their present pre-eminent position without receiving a severe gruelling at the hands of every state of engineering, road building, municipal, state and Federal opinion. The technichal professors of universities, the skilled scientists of the Bureau of Standard, the State Highway Commissions of America and many other private and public bodies have all in turn demanded that concrete roads shall show just cause for their widespread use as a permanent pavement. It would require a very long article by itself, in fact a book, to describe the changes of method and the revolution in the building specifications which have taken place during the last fifteen years. Suffice it is to say that concrete roads have come through the ordeal absolutely triumphant, and from the Indications which are now patent to the public everywhere, the concrete road bids fair to outstrip all others in general acceptance for future programmes. During the ten years ended December 31, 1919, there were laid in the miles of concrete roads streets and alleys. The year 1919 alone shows the peak record to date when 53,000,000 square yards of concrete road were placed under contract. This yardage is equivalent to over 5,000 miles of concrete pavement 18 feet wide. During the present year, 1920, it is anticipated that there will be miles of concrete pavement 18 feet wide. 



# ARTIFICIAL LIGHT AS REAL DAYLIGHT

NEW form of artificial lighting which has aroused widespread interest among A illuminating engineers is the invention of Mr. George Sheringham, an English artist and designer. This device produces daylight artificially and enables colors to retain their true values under artificial light.

One does not often connect artists with mechanical invention and Mr. Sheringham has been known hitherto by his decorative work on silk, fans and panels, which has given him a place of his own among lovers of the beautiful in color design. But, properly considered, it is not surprising that the invention of artificial daylight should have been conceived by the brain of an artist, for his work lies in the world of color and fight is color.

THE significance of this simple scientific fact I is too often lost sight of in considering the problem of lighting and illumination. One is so accustomed to regard paints and pigments, dyes and stains as being "colors" that it


is often forgotten that in reality, these are simply materials that reject a particular colored light or a combination of colored light—that the color itself is not in the material, but in the light that shines on it.

It is in this that daylight differs so widely from artificial light. Daylight, the clear white

light of a north window beloved of artists on account of its comparatively unvarying value. consists of rays of light of all colors mixed in a certain proportion. Artificial light contains, it , is true, all these colors, but the quantity of red and yellow rays exceeds so much the blues and violets that dyes and pigments, when examined under it, take on a totally different hue as compared with their appearance in daylight.

The problem, then, which Mr. Sheringham set himself to solve was how to obtain a light which. reduced the red and yellow rays of artificial light,

and increased the blue and violet rays which form such a notable feature of daylight when viewed through the spectroscope. That he has done as no one who has seen the apparatus can doubt. Under the new light, blues and greens shine out as brilliantly as the reds, instead of being diminished to about one-ninth and one-half respectively, as is the case when viewed under an ordinary electric bulb. Delicate graduations of grays and blues become easily apparent, and "navy" blue loses that black appearance which it takes on under artificial light, and is seen again in its true color. Yellows again, the finer shades of which are so difficult to distinguish that many artists find it necessary to keep them on a separate palette when painting in the evening, can

be distinguished as easily as in bright daylight, a point which will appeal strongly to artists, who so often find the hours of daylight too short for the work that has to be crowded into them.

The most extraordinary changes, too, are found in the purples and violets, which lose that distressing red tinge that so mars their splendor. White, which by its very nature can never be seen under artificial light, shows itself again in its intrinsic beauty—a most convincing proof

of the reality of the change which this invention has effected in artificial lighting.

The apparatus itself consists of a shade, on the under surface of which is a colored design, carefully worked out in accordance with a mathematical formula. The light from an electric bulb is thrown on to this surface in such a manner that all the rays strike the shade and are diffused into the surrounding atmosphere. The transformation into "daylight" is effected by the nature, proportion, and grouping of the colors, which have the effect of absorbing the excess rays from the red end of the spectrum and apparently reinforcing (for, be it noted, color is only a sensation of the optical nerve; the actual number of rays cannot, of course, be increased) those rays found toward the violet end, in which artificial light is so deficient.

The apparatus, in a simple form, was first worked out and used by the inventor in his own studio during the autumn of 1918. Later, it was shown to Maj. Klein, adviser in color physics to the Calico Printers Association of and formerly head of the experimental department of the Camouflage School, who immediately grasped its importance as a factor in color industries.

As to the uses to which the invention can be put, a few words will suffice. Artists, the quality of whose work depends in a great measure on the quality of their light, to whom a light which shows "false" colors is only one degree better than no light at all, will doubtless welcome it with enthusiasm. Indeed, there are indications that the art schools of today are as well aware of its possibilities as the color craftsmen of commerce, but it is among the latter, the color printers, the wallpaper manufacturers, the dye works, the textile trade, all that intricate mass of inter-dependent industries into which color enters, who now depend upon daylight for that matching and grading of colors which is the very keynote of their success—it is among these that Mr. Sheringham's invention will make its strongest and most lasting appeal.

#### Are MADE MATCHES How

OMPARED with the antiquity of the knowl-, edge of fire making, the match is of quite recent invention. It is said that the first match was produced in 1680, when splints of wood, dipped in sulphur, were ignited by friction with a bit of phosphorus, apparently much after the manner of a modern match. But the phophorus was too costly at that time for general use, and probably there was also too much danger of accidents in the use of this material. The

The first apparently practical match was pro-The first apparently practical match was produced about 1807, when a French experimenter produced a match made of a slip of wood, a portion of which was coated with sulphur, and the end tipped with a mixture of potasium chlorate was considered by being end tipped with a mixture of potasium chlorate and sugar. This match was ignited by being brought in contact with sulphuric acid, which caused the sulphur and sugar to burn by the rapid decomposition of the chlorate, and from this time the development of the match began. At first the ordinary yellow phosphorus was generally used, but as it is a dangerous poison, much disease resulted among the workers in match factories. This difficulty was later overcome by the development of a modified form of phosphorus, and now the red, or amorphous, form is generally used.

It is but natural that machinery should be ome an important factor in the making of matches, and necessarily so on account of the enormous numbers that must be produced to supply the daily demand of the world. A writer in The Scientific American gives the following interesting description of matches are made:

In the early days of match-making the wood for the splints was sawed into blocks, and then split into the little splints we are familiar with, but the latest and most rapid method is to cut the logs of wood into a thin veneer, and then to cut the splints in enormous numbers from a num-ber of layers of veneer piled together.

Although the process of making matches is

comparatively simple, without the aid of very ingenious machinery it would be impossible either to supply this very necessary article in the great

quantities required, or at so reasonable a price as they command in the market today. From the cutting machine the splints are sent to kilns, where all moisture is dried out and they drop down stairs to an apparatus that straight out the splints and lays them in straight s. The splints are then automatically stuck into square frames that are attached to endless chains that run slowly through the dipping ma-chine. Ordinarily the splints are first dipped in paraffin in such a manner

that about one-fourth of the outer end is immersed. following which they are tipped with the ignition compound, which is applied in two operations.

The composition of the first dip is made up of potassium chlorate, glue, glass powder and filler, which is poured into a trough into which a slow moving roller dins, and picks up the composition of its surface. As the endless chain of the dipping machine carries the frames of splints along the ends of the splints come into contact with the oated roil, and receive the first dip. Then the carrying chains move slowly up and down over a series of rollers, in order to allow the first coating to dry before applying the second dip.

The above is a general description of the process of making a match, but there are many variations in detail, and also in the composition used. Sometimes the splints used. Sometimes the spirits are given but one dip, in which case the compound used is made up of all of the materials mentioned above; and a variation of the method is to soak the splints in a solution of sulphate of magnesium, alum or sodium phosphate before dipping in order to prevent the burned stems from smouldering.

Safety matches are made similar manner to the above, but in these the match carries no phosphorus in its head and in order to ignite it the match must be drawn over a surface coated with phosphorus such as is found on all boxes of safety matches.

# Ground Floor Furnace That Gives the Effect of an Open Fireplace

OR long periods of severely cold weather the open fireplace has very little to recommend it besides its remantic charm and aspect of cheerfulness. As a waster of fuel for the heat developed the open fireplace has few equals, if any, and as for atten-

tion a very sick baby scarcely requires more. One builder, however, has developed a heating plant that is said to preserve all the charm of an open fireplace with none of its dis-

advantages. Between the living room and one of the outer walls, in the new heating arrangement, as described in the Il-lustrated World, is a partition of brick, into with an inclined magazine coal feeder the principle of the well known base burner stove. # Why WILD DUCKS DIE From

W ILD ducks and other water fowl some-times die from lead poisoning resultitimes die from lead poisoning resulting from swallowing stray shot which they from swallowing stray shot which they pick out of the mud about shooting grounds. Many ducks that become sick from lead poisoning finally recover, but it is probable that the effect is permanently injurious not only to the individual but to the species. It has been ascertained by experiment that lead greatly impairs the virility of male domestic fowls. Females mated with them lay many unfertile eggs, while in many of the eggs that are fertilized the embryo dies in the shell or the chick emerges weak and unable to withstand the hardships of early life.

These facts are set forth by the United States department of agriculture in bulletin 793, "Lead Poisoning in Waterfowl." Reports of waterfowl apparently sick from lead poisoning have been coming in for several years.

coming in for several years.

The bureau of biological survey of the department of agriculture undertook an investigation at various shooting grounds to determine how common the taking of shot by waterfowl is, and an account of the effect of mon the taking of shot by waterfowl is, and a series of experiments to ascertain the effect of shot swallowed. It was found that at places where much shooting is regularly done from blinds, shot at the bottom of the shallow water are so numerous that one or more was found in practically every sleveful of mud or silt, and that they are swallowed by waterfowl whenever found, as a result of the habit of swallowing

small hard objects to supply grit for the gizzard.

The experiments have shown that shot swallowed are gradually ground away in the gizzard and pass into the intestines, producing a poisoning that results in progressive paralysis and, sually, death.

Experiments with wild waterfowl captured when young and reared in captivity—to obviate

the possibility of their having taken lead before the beginning of the experiments—have shown that six pellets of No.6 shot constitute an amount of lead that is always fatal. Two or three shot In one experiment, two mallards were given one No. 6 shot each. One of them died in nine days and the other was able to throw off the poison.





# **BEEKEEPING GROWS** IN THE PROVINCE

Total of 6,830 Colonies Are Kept by Licensed Apiarists
