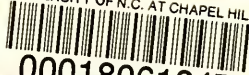

ABADIE, Eugene Hilarian, consulting engineer; born Mar. 1, 1872, in St. Louis, Mo., son of Eugene L. and Mary Louise (Snow) Abadie. Educated in public and private schools of St. Louis and Washington Univ. During World War served as General Comptroller of U. S. Shipping Board and Emergency Fleet Corporation, being appointed to this post in September, 1919. On May 1, 1920, appointed special agent for International Maritime Corporation, Tropical Steamship Corporation and others as Washington representative. D. C. resident since 1919. From 1903 to 1908 served as engineer and constructor under firm name of E. H. Abadie and Company, general engineers and contractors; designed and built underground conduits in Louisville, Ky., for various public utilities; located several interurban electric railroad projects; supervised the engineering and wrote the engineering and financial reports. ABBE, Truman, physician; born Nov. 1, 1873, in Wash., D. C., son of Cleveland and Frances Martha (Neal) Abbe. Graduate of Central High School, Harvard College, Columbia Univ. Degrees: A. B. (Harvard, 1895), M. D. (Columbia, 1899). Was the first user of radium for medical purposes in D. C. Awarded silver medal at Jamestown Exposition for demonstration of application of radium to medicine, 1906. *Member:* Chamber of Commerce, D. C. Medical Society, Obstetrical Society, Chevy Chase Citizens' Association, Parent-Teachers' Association of E. V. Brown School (president), Unitarian Church, Co-editor, Wharton and Stille's "Medical Jurisprudence," 1905; author of medical journal articles on surgery, radium, etc. Married Ethel Whipple Brown; four children, Truman Waldo, Petrena, Gilbert, Margaret. ABBOT, Charles Greeley, astrophysicist, assistant secretary, Smithsonian Institution; born May 31, 1872, at Wilton, N. H., son of Harris and Caroline Anne (Greeley) Abbot. Educated at Wilton High School, Phillips Andover Academy

(90), Massachusetts Institute of Technology ('94); took post-graduate course in physics ('95). Degrees: S.B., S.M., D.Sc. Connected with Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory since June, 1895; appointed director of observatory Mar. 10, 1907; appointed assistant secretary, Smithsonian Institution, Dec., 1918. Engaged in original research on solar and terrestrial radiations and invented several research instruments in world-wide use. Undertook several expeditions to foreign countries for solar research. Discovered variability of the sun and established three stations in U. S. and one in Chile to observe this variability. Directed expeditions to observe total solar eclipses, May 28, 1900; May 18, 1901; Jan. 3, 1908. Author of "Annals of the Astrophysical Observatory," Vols. I, II, III, IV, 1900-21; "The Sun," 1911; mapping of the infra-red solar spectrum (with S. P. Langley); numerous articles on solar research. Awarded Draper medal by National Academy of Sciences; Rumford medal by American Academy of Arts and Sciences. Fellow, American Association for the Advancement of Science. *Member:* American Astronomical and Astrophysical Society, Washington Academy of Sciences, Washington Philosophical Society, National Academy of Sciences, Astronomical Society of France, Astronomical Society of Mexico, First Congregational Church. ABBOT, Frederic Vaughn, colonel, U. S. Army; commanding officer Washington Barracks; born Mar. 4, 1858, at Cambridge, Mass., son of Henry Larcom and Mary Susan (Everett) Abbot. Educated at Flushing Institute, L. I.; Cambridge High School, U. S. Military Academy (graduated 1879). Assisted in survey of Maryland-Virginia boundary line, 1883-4; in charge of South Carolina river and harbor improvements and of Southern forts, 1888-97; in charge of Wisconsin and Minnesota rivers and harbors and fortification works, 1897-1900; assistant to chief of engineers, U. S. Army, 1900-10; commissioned lieutenant colonel, 1906; special inspector of fortifications, Philippine Islands, 1907; commissioned colonel, 1909; in charge Massachusetts rivers and harbors and fortification works, 1910-13, in Rhode Island, 1911-13; in charge river and harbor works, 3d New York district, division engineer, Northeastern Division, 1913-15; in charge of defensive works at southern and eastern entrances to New York Harbor, 1913-15; brigadier general, National Army, 1917; principal assistant to Chief of Engineers and commanding officer, Washington barracks, during World War; acting chief of engineers, 1918-19. C., where he prepared for college with private tutors and at the schools of these places. His real educator was his father, for some years professor of the Columbia (S. C.) Theological Seminary, and who

closed his career as professor in the Southwestern Theological Seminary, at Clarksville, Tenn. In 1874, he entered Davidson College, North Carolina, remained one year, and in the fall of 1875, went to Princeton College, from which he was graduated in the class of 1879. Following his graduation he entered the Univ. of Virginia, Charlottesville, Va., as a law student and was graduated in 1881. For two years he practiced law at Atlanta, Ga. In 1883 to 1885 did graduate work at Johns Hopkins Univ. in political economy and history; 1885 to 1888 professor of history and political economy at Bryn Mawr College, Pennsylvania; 1888 to 1890, professor in the same branches of science at Wesleyan Univ. In June, 1890, was elected professor of jurisprudence and political economy at Princeton Univ. In 1895 the department was divided and he was assigned to the chair of jurisprudence; in 1897 he was promoted to the McCormick professorship of jurisprudence and politics. In 1902 he was elected president of the university, resigning both that office and his professorship in Oct., 1910, immediately after his nomination for governor of New Jersey, to which office he was elected Nov. 8, 1910, by a plurality of 49,056 votes. Resigned on Mar. 1, 1913. Nominated for President in Democratic National Convention held in Baltimore, 1912, and elected in November, 1912, for term, Mar. 4, 1913-17, receiving 435 electoral votes. Renominated for President in Democratic National Convention, St. Louis, 1916, and re-elected Nov. 7, 1916, for term Mar. 4, 1917-21, receiving 277 electoral votes. In December, 1918, headed American Commission to Negotiate Peace, arriving at Paris, December, 1914. Visited England, Italy and Belgium, making numerous addresses and was given many honorary degrees by universities of the allied countries. Returned to the U. S. on Feb. 24, 1919. After delivering address at closing session of Congress left New York on March 5, for second trip to Europe, arriving in Paris on Mar. 14. Signed Peace Treaty on June 28, 1919, returning to U. S. early in July, 1919. On June 24, 1885, he married Miss Ellen Louise Axson, of a distinguished family of Savannah, Ga. Mrs. Wilson died at the White House on Aug. 6, 1914. 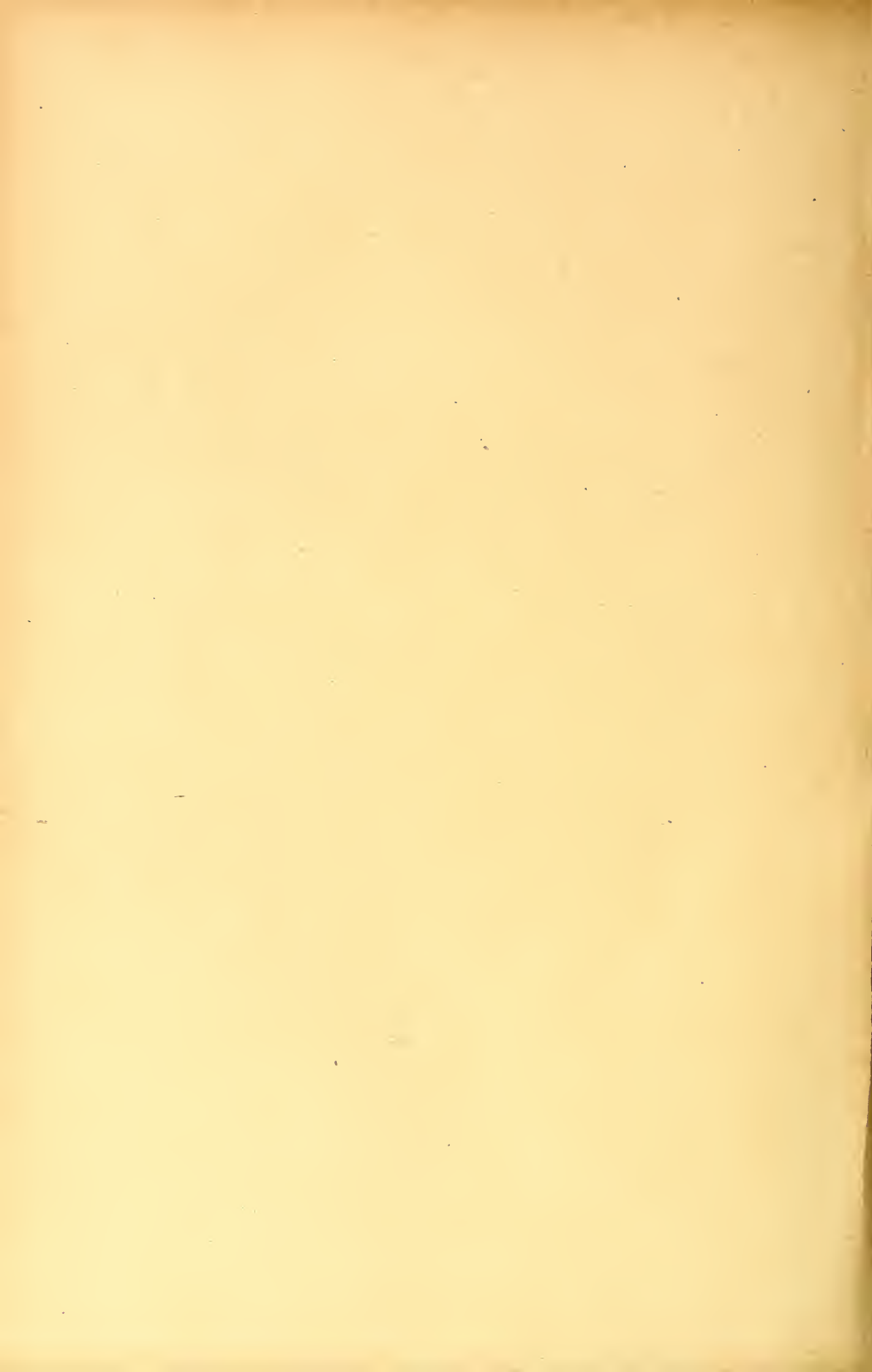

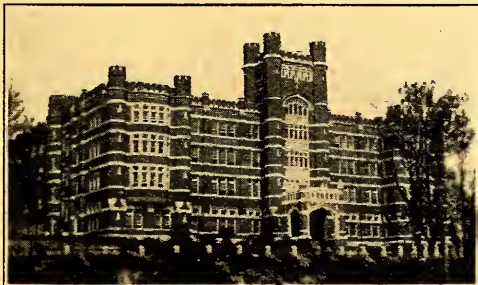

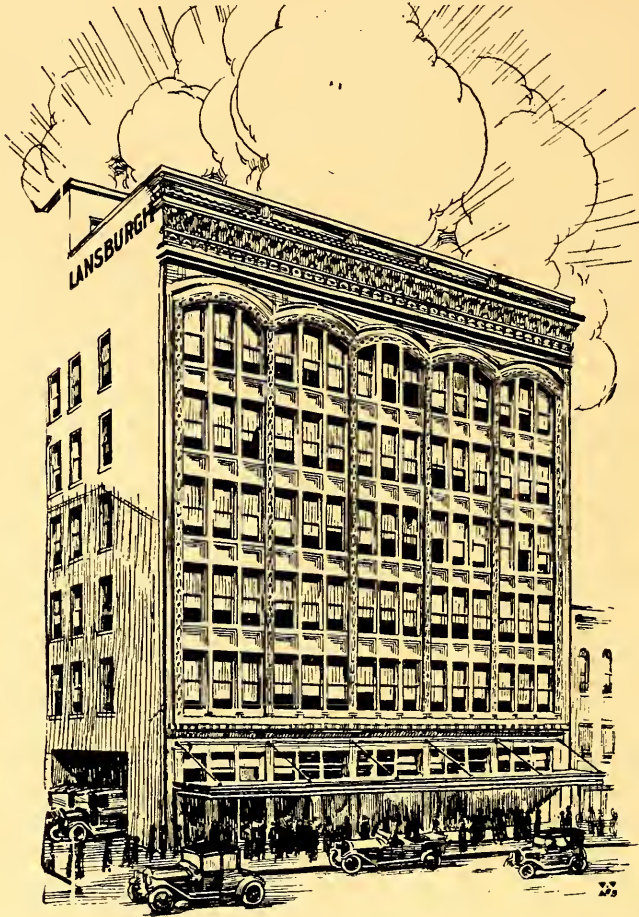

The Washington Real Estate Board

The Washington Real Estate Board grew out of the former Real Estate Brokers' Association of the District of Columbia. In the spring of 1921, the Board reorganized, enlarging the scope of its activities and extending associate membership in a somewhat broader manner.

Under the reorganization, it equipped permanent offices in the Interstate Building, in charge of an executive secretary, who devotes his entire time to the development work of the Board.

The local Board is affiliated with the National Association of Real Estate Boards, which is composed of almost 400 local boards scattered throughout the entire country, having a total individual membership of over 15,000.

Active membership is restricted to licensed brokers who have maintained an office in the District of Columbia for a period of at least one year. Associate membership is divided into three classes: (a) Salesmen in the offices of active members; (b) Businesses and professions allied with real estate; (c) Property owners.

A code of ethics, based on the "Golden Rule," was adopted as a standard of practice in real estate by the National Association, and the active members of the local Board have accepted this code in the conduct of their profession.

An Arbitration Committee hears and adjusts any disputes or complaints that may arise among the members, or between them and the public. This Committee acts as referee and its decision is binding on the members. Active members are privileged to use the title "Realtor." This is a copyrighted title that has been adopted by the National Association and the use of it is restricted to active members of local boards that in turn are members of the National Association of Real Estate Boards. The exclusive right to use this title has been sustained by the highest court in the State of Minnesota, and local boards throughout the country are vigilant in correcting any improper use of this title by non-members.

Along G Street

President of the G Street Business Association

The shopper, in search of anything from cemetery lots to ice cream sodas, can find it along G Street.

No other street in Washington can offer the shopper, both masculine and feminine, such a variety of articles. In the six or seven blocks along which are grouped the merchants of the G Street Business Association, can be found practically any article for the person or home.

The G Street Business Association was organized in April of 1921, and in the few months of its existence has grown to be one of the most active and progressive associations of its kind in the city. One of the first movements started by the organization resulted in the lighting of G Street shop windows after dark, one of the first steps toward making G Street the rival of its neighbor and sister street, F, as a fashionable promenade.

At present the merchants of the street feel that all lacking to complete the thoroughfare are two, or even three attractive motion picture houses. With the completion within a few months of the City Club Building on G Street between 13th and 14th the "movie" houses, the merchants feel, are sure to come.

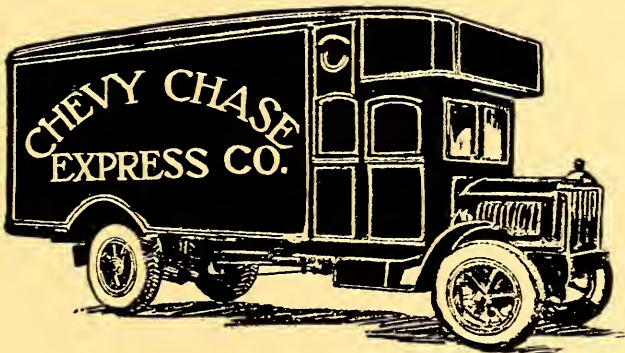

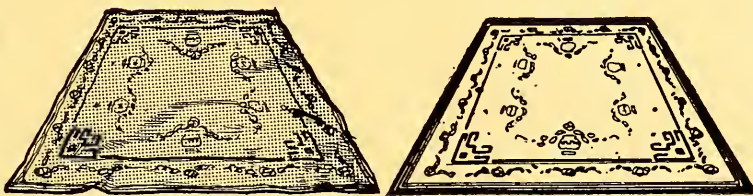

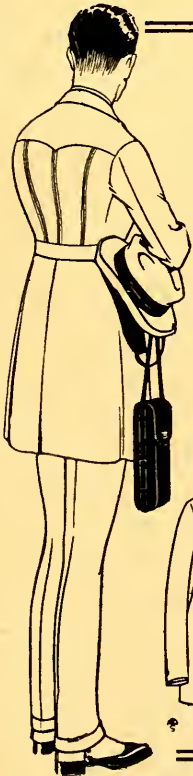
