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TO-MORROW'S VISITORS.

To-morrow afternoon Victoria will be visited by the Hon. Josephus Daniels, Secretary of the United States Navy, and Admiral Hugh Rodman, Commander-in-Chief of the American Pacific Fleet, with the two dreadnoughts . New Mexico. and Arkansas and a squadron of smaller craft. Victoria will extend to her visitors a hearty welcome, not only because they include a distinguished member of the United States Government and a gallant, able commander, but because she appreciates the friendly spirit which prompted the decision of Mr. Daniels to have so important a section of the fleet call here. And in doing so this city will be acting not for itself only but for the whole Dominion. only but for the whole Dominion.

Special interest will be attached to this visit from the fact that Admiral Rodman commanded the American squadrou which co-operated with the Grand Fleet under Admiral Beatty during the war and the Arkansas, one of the vessels which will be here to-morrow, was among that squadron. Admiral Rodman's command was a valued unit of the great fleet which waited, vainly; for the German navy to emerge from its hid ing place and give battle but which, instead, came hid out to surrender. How highly its co-operation and services were prized by Admiral Beatty is well known, the great British sailor's tribute to Admiral Rodman and his gallant officers and men being fresh in the public mind.

Of the two dreadnoughts which will be here to-morrow and will be open to public inspection in the afternoon, the Arkansas was completed in 191. She is of 26,000 tons and carries twelve 12-inch guns. The New Mexico is a recent.addition to the United States navy, having been completed last year. She is perhaps, the largest battleship afloat, having a tonnage of 32,000 tons and being armed with fourteen 14-inch guns. She is thus 4,500 tons larger than the Japanese battle-cruiser Kirishima, which was the biggest warship that had visited Victoria up to the time of her arrival here last year.

AUSTRIA SIGNS.

But a small fragment of what once was the proud Austro-Hungarian Empire is represented in the signature which Dr. Karl Renner attached to the Austrian peace treaty at St. Germain to day. This plenipotentiary, whose dignified courtly bearing presented a vivid contrast with the bitter and boorish demeanor of Count Rantzau, the German representative at Versailles, acted in the interests of only what has been known as German-Austria, a district of some 11,000,000 people, of which Vienna is the centre. To such minor proportions has the Empire of the Hapsburgs shrunk under the pressure of the fear ful circumstances which were precipitated by Francis Joseph when, as the tool of the Prussian Magyar combination which dominated his coun els, he began war upon Serbia in July five years

Arrogantly confident, little did those crazy war-makers dream that when the day for the signing of the treaty of peace came all that the emissary from Vienna would be able to speak for would be the comparatively small section of this once great Empire which lies about the capital; that the despised Jugo-Slavia and Czecho-Slovakia would be permitted to sign as free and independent nations or that Hungary would be given a separate treaty to sign on her own behalf. Thus, through the ages the Holy Roman Empire has been whittled down to a minute point, and a republican Minister acts in the capacity which formerly belonged to a satellite of the imperial House at Vienna



The Mayor said he would also have boolutely prohibited the shooting off of firearms, as well as firecrack-rs, during the visit of the Prince, as the firearms are as dangerous as the firecrackers.

The firearms are as dangerous recrackers. "Firecrackers set off during the reace celebration sent many return-de soldiers back to the hospital," said A Axon, of the Great War Veterans' Association. "The results of months of medical treatment were undone in a single moment by the explosion of these toy bombs."

To Have People Dress Up.





Men wearing this type of hand hook have been able to saw wood, drive in nails and turn machinery, as well as manage all kinds of Mit-ing, An excellent feature of the grip is that, although it is so vice-like for the purpose of handling tools, when necessary, in the case of an ac-cident it is equally easy for the wear-er to loosen the tension.
