PREFACE.

THE first edition of this work was published in January, 1863. The second edition, carefully corrected to the latest date, is now offered to the public.

The description of the practical working of the Post-Office, together with the rules and regulations and the tables of rates of postage, will afford every necessary information in regard to postal affairs in Canada.

The Census Table will give some idea of the settlements in the various counties.

And the list of Post-offices and the Railway Map will supply some guide in regard to the most direct route to every place in Canada West at which there is a Post-office. It is desired, for example, to know which would be the best way of reaching Elora. On turning to the list of Post-offices, it will be seen that Elora is in the county of Wellington. On referring to the map, it will be seen that this county may be reached by two lines of railway; the one running between Toronto and Sarnia, the other between Harrisburg and Guelph.

The most direct route to all places in Canada East is, of course, by the Grand Trunk Railway between Toronto and Montreal.

It is hoped that sufficient encouragement may be extended to this little publication, to enable the compiler to issue a new and improved edition at the beginning of each succeeding year.

REMARKS.—The Discount for a less rate than *one per cent.*, can be ascertained with sufficient accuracy for moderate amounts by taking the difference between the discount at the current rate of premium in the Table from the next higher rate (giving the discount for one per cent. advance), which divide by 2, 4, or 8, for $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{4}$, or $\frac{1}{8}$ per cent. as required.

The Table will also be found useful in comparing the relative values of Silver and Gold in *current funds*, and vice versa.

The value of one dollar of United States currency in Gold may be ascertained by dividing 10,000 by the figures representing the value of one dollar in Gold in United States currency. Example: Gold being at 52 per cent premium, a dollar in Gold is worth 1.52 ($1\frac{13}{25}$) in U. S. currency. Divide 10000 by 152. The quotient 65.79 (65 cents $\frac{79}{100}$) will represent the value of a dollar of United States currency in Gold.

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DESCRIPTION

OF THE

PRACTICAL WORKING OF THE POST OFFICE.

THE Postal Service is probably one of the most useful as well as one of the most extensive organizations which the genius of man has ever devised. Every portion of the civilized world is as it were covered by a vast net work of postal routes, the extent and importance of which it is difficult fully to appreciate. Conveyed by swift and powerful steamships, by rapid railway trains, in stages, in waggons, in sleds, in dog trains, on the backs of horses, of camels, and of men; traversing nearly every sea, lake and river, every highway, travelling through smiling fields, through pathless forests, through deep snows, across arid deserts, along undulating plains and over rugged mountains, onward the mails of the world ceaselessly continue their course, spreading intelligence, facilitating commerce, connecting mind with mind and heart with heart, and promoting everywhere the civilization, the brotherhood, and the happiness of mankind.

Of this vast organization the Postal Department of Canada forms an integral part. Dotted over the whole Province, and extending from the Post Office at Percé, on the extreme East, to the Post Office at Fort William, on lake Superior, on the extreme West, a distance of about 1800 miles, there are 2297 Post Offices, at which are delivered in each year about 12,000,000 letters. The aggregate length of the various routes by which these Offices are supplied is estimated at 17,000 miles, and the total number of miles actually travelled in the conveyance of the Mails in one year 6,500,000, a distance which can perhaps be better appreciated when it is considered that to perform it, a locomotive travelling day and night at the rate of 20 miles per hour would require rather more than 37 years. The gross postal revenue collected at these Post Offices in each year is about \$850,000, a sum which is about equal to the expenses incurred in their maintenance and supply.

In the management of these Post Offices and mail routes about 5,000 persons are engaged. The chief control is vested in the Postmaster General and Deputy

Postmaster General, who together with the staff, consisting of a Secretary, an Accountant, a Cashier, a Superintendent of Money Orders, and their subordinates, reside at the seat of Government at Ottawa. There are also Local Inspectors residing at Quebec, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, and London, whose duty it is, within the respective areas assigned to them, and which are more particularly described in another part of this book, to superintend the working of the service.

A story is somewhere told of an Irishman, who having recently landed in America, and being desirous of communicating with the friends he had left behind him, wrote a letter, took it to a Post Office, and presenting it to the clerk at the wicket, asked him to send it as soon as possible to its address. "Dont hand the letter to me," said the clerk rather sharply, "but put it into the Letter Box you see over yonder, and it will go safely and quickly to its destination." "In the Letther Box," said Paddy, "an is it in that little bit of a hole that ye mane. Och' murther, and by the powers an if I dthrop it in there will it slide all the way to Tipperary. Sure and is'nt this a wonderful country entirely, an if I hadnt seen it wid my own eyes I would not have belaved it tho' my ould grandmother had sworn it on Biddy O'Rafferty's Prayer Book."

It is not very probable that people generally have the same idea of the mode in which their correspondence is forwarded as poor Paddy, but few are aware of the system on which the Postal Service is conducted, or what is done with their letters from the time they are deposited in a Post Office until the time they are delivered to the parties for whom they are intended. On this point we propose to furnish some information, which, while it may not be generally uninteresting, will be found very useful to persons connected with the Postal Department, especially to new Postmasters and parties just entering in any capacity into service.

When letters or papers are dropped into a Letter Receiver they fall into a Box from whence they are collected at stated intervals. In large offices where the work has to be done rapidly and systematically they are taken to a table, where they are what is called "faced up," that is the addresses are all placed in the same direction (a position which if they are properly dealt with they ought to maintain until their delivery); the letters to which postage stamps have been affixed being at the same time divided from letters which have been posted as unpaid. The letters are then taken to the stamping table, where they are postmarked with the name of the office at and the date on which posted; the postage stamps "obliterated" with an instrument supplied for that purpose, and the unpaid letters rated with black ink with the postage to which they are liable. The letters, the postage on which has been prepaid at the wicket, are also postmarked and stamped in red with the word "Paid" and a figure denoting the amount of postage paid thereon; and all the letters are then ready to be sorted

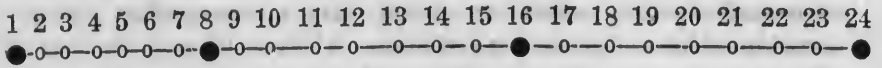
into the respective Letter Boxes appropriated for the Mails by which they are to be despatched. The newspapers and other printed matter posted at the Office are likewise collected, and, after the stamps affixed thereto have been obliterated, placed on a counter fronting a large semi-circular sett of pigeon holes and bags appropriated for the offices to which they are to be forwarded.

For each mail which is made up, there is a separate sorting box for letters, and a separate bag or box for newspapers. If therefore a Postmaster sends mails to 100 offices he should have a corresponding number of boxes into which to distribute or sort them. At Post Offices in the large cities where a great many mails are made up, and where correspondingly large numbers of sorting boxes are required which it would be difficult to sort directly into, the Boxes are divided into groups or sections,—one section for example containing boxes for mails going North, another for mails going East; another for mails going West, another for foreign mails and so on. When these sections are used, a double distribution of the letters is necessary, all the letters for instance going Northward being placed together, and afterward sorted into the boxes in the section appropriated for mails going North; all the letters going East being placed together, and afterwards sorted into the boxes in the section appropriated for letters going East, and so on. When the letters and papers are all sorted, the newspapers are placed in canvass or leather bags labelled for the offices for which intended. The letters accompanied by the letter bill (which will be described shortly) are put up in sealed packets, addressed to the offices for which destined. These packets are then put into the bags with the newspapers. The bags are then secured by a lock and despatched to their several destinations. Where there are several small offices on one route, the several canvass bags for those offices are placed in a large leather bag, which is secured by a lock of which each Postmaster has a key, so that on the arrival of the bag he can take out any mails there may be for his office, and enclose any mails he may have for offices in the direction on which the courier in charge is travelling. Accompanying the bag is a time bill in which each Postmaster enters the time of arrival at his office, the name of the courier in charge, and the numbers of mails he receives and sends away.

On opening a mail, the Postmaster checks the entries in the letter bills received therewith, postmarks the letters and letter bills on the backs with the date of their receipt and sorts the letters and papers into the boxes, from which they are delivered to the public. The registered letters he enters in a book kept for that purpose, in which the parties to whom they are delivered sign a receipt therefor.

We will now proceed to explain the way in which the mails are made up, as well as the means by which a check is maintained on the revenue. Formerly the system pursued was very different to what it is now. Then if a Postmaster

had letters for 500 different offices, he had to make up 500 separate mails or packets. In the year 1843, however, was adopted the English or "forward" system, under which not only is time and labor saved, but a very satisfactory check kept on the postage. The main feature of this system is the limitation of the exchange of mails to offices which are either situated on the same route or between which there is a large amount of correspondence. An illustration or two will probably render this intelligible.



The above figure represents three distinct lines of mail route, each route having 8 Post Offices thereon. No 1 to 8 being one route with the intermediate offices 2 to 7; No. 8 to 16 another route with the intermediate offices 9 to 15; and No. 3 a third route with the intermediate offices 17 to 23. Now under the old system of making up mails if the Postmaster of the office No. 2 had letters for each of the offices 3 to 24 inclusive, he would have to make up mails for each of them, thus rendering necessary 22 separate mails. Under the present system, however, he would make up only 6 mails for while he would have to make up separate packets for the offices 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 which are on the same route, he would enclose all the letters for the offices 9 to 24 on his mail for No. 8 which is the terminus of his route in the direction in which the letters are going. On their arrival at No. 8 the Postmaster would enclose the letters for 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 in separate packets for those offices, with which being on the same route he would exchange direct mails, and the letters for 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24, with which offices we will suppose he does not exchange direct mails, he would enclose in his packet for the office at No. 16, where they would be again mailed direct on the offices for which intended. Again supposing that the Postmaster at office No. 1 had letters for each of the offices No. 2 to 24, and supposing that owing to there being a large correspondence between No. 1 on the one hand, and No. 16 on the other; No. 1 made up mails direct for No. 16, as well as for Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8; he would make up the letters for 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 in separate packets for those offices, but the letters for 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, he would enclose in a packet for No. 8, and the letters for 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24, he would enclose in a packet for No. 16, thus instead of making up 23 mails which he would have to do under the old system, he would make up only 8 mails, which it must be admitted would as far as he is concerned, be, as before stated, a very great saving both of time and labor. But, it may be remarked, admitting that if this is a saving at one office, does it not throw a corresponding additional work on other offices where the letters have to be remailed, and if so, is there on the whole any advantage gained. That a little additional work is thrown on the last examples given on, offices 8 and

16 is clear, but taking into consideration that letters would probably be posted at No. 8 for the offices No. 9 to 15, and at No. 16 for the offices 17 to 24, and that consequently the Postmasters at No. 8 and 16 would at any rate have to make up mails for those places it would add very little to their labor to slip into those mails the letters received from No. 1, and thus the small additional trouble at Nos. 8 and 16 would be more than counterbalanced by the work of which No. 1 would be relieved. It should be borne in mind too that a great deal of labor is saved at the Receiving Post offices in each of the cases mentioned by the comparatively small number of mails which have to be opened and checked.

These examples are given simply, as before stated, to illustrate the principle of the system under which mails are made up. Fully to appreciate it, however, it should be borne in mind that whilst as a general rule, small offices exchange mails only with offices on the same route, mails are exchanged direct between distant points such as between the cities of Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Toronto, Hamilton and London, between the large towns in the various sections of the country, and between all the Post Offices in the cities and large towns and the travelling Post Offices on the various lines of railway about which something will be said by and by.

We will now endeavour to explain the way in which a check is maintained on the postage collected at the several Post Offices in the Province—a work which to the uninitiated must appear to be attended with some difficulty. This is done by means of a Letter Bill or invoice which accompanies every mail and which contains the following entries.

1. The number of and amount of postage on unpaid letters and papers addressed to the office for which the mail is intended, and for which as it is presumed they will be delivered at that office, the Postmaster is thus rendered accountable. Unpaid letters, however, *going beyond* the office for which the mail is intended (as in the case of the unpaid letters going from No. 2 to No. 9, and which would be enclosed by No. 2 in the mail for No. 8) are not entered in the letter bill, for as they would not be delivered at the office for which the mail was made up, they could not of course be fairly debited against it.

2. The number of and amount of postage on letters and papers prepaid in money at the office where the mail is made up, and for which the Postmaster of that office is consequently responsible.

3. The number of and amount of postage on letters and papers prepaid by stamps at the office where the mail is made up, and which are entered in the bill because the Postmaster is allowed a commission thereon.

4. The unpaid postages on letters and papers which have been charged by other offices on the sending Postmaster, but which having been missent to or redirected from his office he is entitled to take credit for.

5. The number and addresses of all registered letters.

These letter bills, the entries on which are checked by the Postmasters receiving them, are all entered in a book, and an abstract thereof made out every month on what is called a monthly sheet which within five days after the expiration of each month, is sent to the Accountant accompanied by all letter bills in which any errors have been discovered and corrected. On the one side of this sheet is entered in columns an abstract of all the entries on the letter bills received during the month, and on the other side an abstract of the entries on all the letter bills despatched during the month; a column being appropriated for each office with which the Postmaster exchanges mails. It will thus be seen that the received side of the sheet of one Postmaster is a check on the sent side of another. The entries made by the Postmaster at office No. 1, for example, on the sent side of his sheet in the column appropriated for an abstract of the letter bills sent to office No. 2 should agree with the entries made by the Postmaster at No. 2, on the received side of his sheet in the column appropriated for an abstract of the letter bills received from No. 1. If these entries do not agree the letter bills are sent for by the Accountant who is then able to decide where the error lays, and to make the necessary correction.

At the end of every three months an account current is made out by each Postmaster, in which he debits himself on the one side with the postage chargeable against his office as shewn by his monthly sheets; with the stamps he has sold; and with the postage he has collected on newspapers sent from the office of publication, and which is not charged against him in the letter bills; and credits himself on the other side with the unpaid postage on the "dead" letters which he sends to the Postmaster General to be returned to the writers, with the unpaid postage on the missent, and redirected letters, as shewn by his monthly sheets, and with the salary or commission, and allowances which he is authorized to claim. The balance of this account he is required to deposit to the credit of Postmaster General on Revenue account at the nearest Bank Agency authorized to receive the Provincial Revenue. The receipt or this deposit together with the accounts he is required to send to the Post Office Department, at Ottawa, within 25 days after the expiration of each quarter.

We have now given an outline of the working of a Post Office, and of the duties of a Postmaster. We will next describe the travelling Post Office, which is every day becoming more important in the working of our Postal system. With two or three exceptions, there are, on all the lines of railway in Canada, Travelling Post Offices which, save in the delivery of letters, perform all the functions of a regular Post Office. They receive mails from, and make up mails for, all the offices on the line over which they run. They also exchange mails with the cities and larger towns as well as with the Travelling Post Offices on other lines, an arrangement by which the work of distribution is greatly simplified, and letters and papers carried from one part of the country to another with the utmost possible expedition. The Travelling Post Offices are fitted up with pigeon holes for

letters, pigeon holes for papers, hooks for bags, and with every convenience necessary for the duty required to be performed. All the mails passing through them are checked daily at the office of the Local Inspector, and every means taken for their security and prompt despatch. Letters and papers can be posted on the travelling Post Offices up to the moment of their departure.

Besides the conveyance of letters and papers the Post Office undertakes for a small fee the transmission of money by means of Money Orders or Drafts drawn by one Money Order office on any other Money Order Office in Canada, in the Lower Provinces, and in the United Kingdom. This mode of transmitting money cannot be too highly recommended. It is entirely free from risk, and what is sometimes very desirable for future reference, a satisfactory record is kept of the name of the remitter, the amount remitted, and the date on which the order is issued. The signature of the party to whom the money is paid is also preserved.

While on this subject it may perhaps be as well to say a few words in reference to the registration of letters containing money or value. Passing through the Post Offices in Canada each year there are about 500,000 registered letters, of which only about 40 on the average fail to reach their destination. This includes such as may be accidentally destroyed by Railway and other casualties. If a letter is registered therefore, the chances are twelve thousand five hundred to one that it will be delivered safely to its address. But with an *unregistered* letter containing money or value of which it is difficult, if not impossible, to preserve any trace, no guarantee of this kind can be offered, nor can the practice of posting such letters without registration be too strongly condemned. If the letter fails to reach its destination, suspicion immediately attaches to every person connected with it. The writer may not have posted it, any one of the employes in the several offices through which it should have passed may have embezzled it, or the party to whom it was addressed though the letter came safely to hand, may have determined not to acknowledge its receipt. And surely when all this suspicion, and which it may be remarked, may seriously affect the characters of a hardworking, and not by any means overpaid class of public servants, could have been avoided, simply by the payment of two cents for the registration of the letter, the sender must be considered in some degree morally responsible for the misery which his neglect may have occasioned. He who needlessly throws temptation in the way of another is not altogether innocent of the offence committed.

The number of miles of railway over which mails are carried in Canada is about 2226. The payment made to the several companies for mail service with a travelling Post Office, is as follows:

When the mails are carried without a travelling Post Office and in charge of the servants of the company, payment is made at the rate of 2 cents for each mile travelled.

Contracts for carrying the mails over common roads are let for a term of 4 years. Tenders being invited by public advertisement, and the lowest tender accepted, provided the party making it is competent to undertake the work, and can give satisfactory security for its performance.

Every Postmaster is required to enter into a bond jointly and severally with two responsible sureties for the due performance of his duties. The penalty of this bond is \$800 and upwards.

The rates of postage, and a variety of other regulations will be found under their appropriate headings in the other parts of this book, which it is hoped may prove acceptable to the public as well as to all persons engaged in a very useful as well as interesting Department of the Government Service.

CANADIAN POSTAL GUIDE.

Rules and Regulations.

OFFICERS.

No person under sixteen years of age is permitted to hold any situation in the Post Office, to have access to the letters or papers, or is allowed to have charge of the mail. Age

On entering the service of the Post Office it is necessary to make an oath or declaration in the prescribed form before a Magistrate; and no person can be permitted to perform any official duty until this oath or declaration is signed. The following is the form of oath or declaration. Oath or declaration.

I, (*Name of person and capacity in which employed, to be inserted here*) do solemnly and sincerely promise and (*swear or affirm*) that I will faithfully perform all the duties required of me by my employment in the service of the Post Office, and will abstain from everything forbidden by the laws for the Establishment and Government of the Post Office Department in Canada—So HELP ME GOD.

POST OFFICE.

The words "Post Office," in large and conspicuous letters, should be exhibited outside every building in which a Post Office is kept. Sign.

A Letter Box should also be fixed, with an opening accessible from the road or street, the words "Letter Box" being painted over the same in plain legible characters. Letter Box.

A separate office or apartment, conveniently fitted up for the purpose, should be provided by the postmaster for conducting the business wherever the duties are sufficiently extensive or important to require such accommodation. The internal fittings of the office should vary according to the nature of the duties. Separate office.

At every principal office there should be a lobby or standing place within doors for the accommodation of parties applying at the office. Lobby.

Where the Postmaster General may consider that a separate room may be dispensed with, the letters and papers, both for delivery and despatch, Where separate office not required.

- are to be kept in a secure place, and, if practicable, under lock and key.
- Bar-room not to be used.** A bar-room or public room in a tavern is never to be made use of as a post office, nor should the entrance to a post office be through a bar-room.
- Unauthorized persons.** No person except the postmaster or his sworn assistant should, on any pretence whatever, be allowed to have access to the letters and papers in a post office.
- Situation.** A Post Office should be in a convenient and central situation, and must not be removed from one part of a town, village, or settlement, to another, without the approval first obtained of the Postmaster General.
- Protection.** Postmasters are required to take every precaution to secure their offices against burglary and fire.

OFFICE HOURS.

- Principal offices.** At the principal Post Offices in Canada the hours of opening and closing are regulated by the Postmaster General.
- Country offices.** In country places Postmasters are required to keep their offices open during the usual hours of business in the locality, and to attend at such other hours as may be necessary to receive and despatch the mails.
- Sundays, Canada West.** On Sundays Postmasters in Canada West are at liberty to close their offices to the public.
- When an office in Canada West is closed to the public on Sunday it must be closed to all persons alike, and no exceptional or partial delivery to particular persons can be allowed.
- Sundays, Canada East.** In Canada East, Postmasters keep their offices open on Sundays at least one hour either before or after Divine Service, as may be most convenient to the public generally.
- Notice of hours.** A Notice, stating the hours at which the office is opened and closed, should be posted in every office, in such a position as may be readily observed by the public.

MAILS.

- Canada rail-ways.** Mails are conveyed twice each way every day, except Sunday, over the principal lines of railway in Canada. Over the less important lines of railway they are carried only once each way every day, except Sunday.
- Canada common roads.** Mails are also conveyed once each way every day, except Sunday, over the principal lines of common road; and once, twice, or three times per week over the less important lines of common road.
- Lower Provinces.** The postal communication between Canada and the Lower Provinces is three times per week each way *via* Quebec, twice per week each way by

steamers between Portland and Halifax, and once per fortnight each way by Cunard Steamers *via* Boston and Halifax.

The most speedy and direct postal route from Canada to almost every portion of the globe, with the exception of the Continent of North America, the Isthmus of Panama, and the West India Islands, is by way of England, from whence mails for the several British Colonies and Foreign Countries mentioned in the tables hereafter given are regularly despatched.

Postal routes to the several portions of the world.

The most speedy and direct postal route from Canada to all parts of the continent of North America, the Isthmus of Panama, and a portion of the West India Islands having direct communication with New York, is *via* New York.

Do. to North American Continent, Isthmus of Panama, W. Indies, &c.

Mails for England are despatched twice in each week from Canada, viz: once by Canadian Steamer sailing every Saturday, from Quebec in Summer and from Portland in Winter; and once by Cunard Steamer, sailing every Wednesday, either from New York or Boston.

Mails for England.

The following Post Offices in Canada make up mails direct for certain Post Offices in the United Kingdom, viz. —

Mails are exchanged daily with the United States post offices at all the principal frontier points, and closed mails are exchanged daily between the principal cities of Canada and New York and Boston.

Mails for United States.

Mails are also made up at Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal, and Quebec for Halifax, Nova Scotia, for St. John's, Newfoundland, and for the West Indies, and despatched to destination once per week *via* Portland and once per fortnight by Cunard Steamer, sailing from Boston, every alternate Wednesday. A mail packet runs every fortnight between Halifax and Bermuda, connecting at Halifax with the Cunard Steamer between Boston and Liverpool *via* Halifax. All letters for the West Indies are sent by this route, unless specially addressed *via* United States.

Mails for Lower Provinces and West Indies.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON LETTERS.

The rate of postage on *pre-paid* Letters between any place in Canada and any other place in Canada, and on *pre-paid* or *unpaid* letters between any place in Canada and any place in British North America (except places hereafter mentioned), including Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Cape Breton, is regulated by weight, irrespective of distance, and is as follows:—

- And so on, 5 cents being charged for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., or fraction of a half ounce.
- Excess of weight.** If the weight be exceeded to the smallest extent, even though the balance be merely turned, the letter becomes liable to an additional rate.
- Unpaid letters.** Letters addressed to any place within the Province of Canada, if sent unpaid, are liable to a charge of 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Letters addressed to to any place within the Province of Canada only partially prepaid, are charged as if *wholly* unpaid, credit being given, however, for the amount pre-paid thereon.
- Drop letters.** The charge on local or drop letters, viz., letters posted at an office in Canada for delivery from that office, is one cent for each letter.
- Letters delivered by carriers.** The charge on letters delivered by Letter Carrier, in Canada, is two cents for each letter in addition to the ordinary postage.
- Nova Scotia via Halifax.** Letters for Nova Scotia, specially addressed by steamer *via* Portland or by "Cunard Steamer," sailing from Boston to Liverpool *via* Halifax, every alternate Wednesday, are liable to $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which should be pre-paid.
- Newfoundland.** Letters for Newfoundland are liable to a rate of $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be pre-paid.
- British Columbia.** The rate of postage on letters to British Columbia and Vancouver Island is 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which must be pre-paid. An additional charge is made on these letters on their delivery, for the sea rate from San Francisco.
- Red River.** The rate of postage on letters to Red River, *via* the United States, is 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which may be pre-paid or not at the option of the sender.
- United States.** The rate of postage on letters between any place in Canada and any place in the United States, is 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., which may either be pre-paid or not at the option of the sender.
- United Kingdom.** The single rate of postage on letters between any place in Canada and any place in the United Kingdom, is as follows:—
- Canadian Steamers.** By Canadian Steamer, sailing every Saturday from Quebec in Summer and from Portland in Winter, $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents per half ounce or fraction of a half ounce.
- Cunard Steamers.** By Cunard Steamer, sailing either from New York or Boston every Wednesday, 17 cents per half ounce or fraction of a half ounce. Letters from the United Kingdom when received by Steamers other than Canadian or Cunard Steamers are liable to a rate of 1s. 2d sterling per half-ounce.
- Scale of weight.** The scale of weight under which the above letters are charged is the same as the scale under which letters passing between places in Canada are rated.
- Pre-payment required.** The postage on all letters posted in Canada for the United Kingdom, and in the United Kingdom for Canada, should be pre-paid.
- Unpaid letters.** If sent unpaid 6d. sterling will be charged on each letter on delivery in addition to the ordinary postage rate.

Letters posted in Canada for the United Kingdom, and in the United Kingdom for Canada, unless specially addressed "By Canadian Steamer," or "By Cunard Steamer," are despatched in the first mail that is made up—whether for the Canadian or Cunard line—after the letter is posted, so that letters intended for the Canadian Packets must either be posted on the proper days for the Canadian Packet Mail or bear the words "By Canadian Mail Steamer" on the address. By "Canadian Mail" is not a sufficiently definite direction, for any mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail" by whatever Packet forwarded.

Twopence sterling, equal to 5 cents, will be charged on the delivery of letters which have been forwarded as above by Cunard Steamers, but on which 6d. sterling or 12½ cents only, per ½ oz. have been pre-paid

The rates upon letters for British Colonies and Foreign Countries will be found in the tables given hereafter. These tables give the rates: 1, by Canadian Ocean Steamers; 2, by Cunard Steamers; 3, via Halifax; and 4, by United States. It will be desirable always to mark on the letter the route by which it is intended to be sent.

All letters are liable to the ordinary rates of postage, whether sealed or unsealed, and whether posted at a Post Office or handed to a Mail Courier on his Journey from one Post Office to another.

Letters re-directed from one office to another in Canada without being taken out of the Post Office are not liable to any additional postage on being re-forwarded.

If an officer in the army or Navy has removed from Canada to England on duty, his letters coming from England are not liable to additional postage on redirection from Canada to England.

The charge on dead letters returned to the writers is 3 cents on each letter in addition to the postage.

SOLDIERS', SEAMEN'S, AND VOLUNTEERS' LETTERS.

Non-Commissioned Officers, Embodied Pensioners, Seamen, and Soldiers, and Army Schoolmasters of all but first class, while they are employed in Her Majesty's Service and non commissioned officers and privates in the volunteer force whilst on active service can send and receive letters at the rate of two cents each under the following regulations:—

1. The two cents must be paid by postage stamp at the time the letter is posted.
2. The name of the soldier, sailor, or volunteer on active service, his class or description, and the name of the ship, corps, or detachment to which he belongs, must be specified in the direction of the letter; and in the case of letters sent by soldiers, seamen, or volunteers on active service the officer in command must sign his name and specify his rank, and the name of the ship or regiment, corps or detachment, which he commands.
3. The letter must not exceed half an ounce in weight.
4. The letter must refer solely to the private affairs of the soldier or seaman, or volunteer on active service.

Subject to pre-payment of foreign transit rates.

Letters for soldiers, seamen or volunteers on active service may be forwarded at the above rate to or through any country requiring the payment of any foreign or transit rate, but subject to the payment of such foreign or transit rate, as may be chargeable thereon.

Re-direction.

Soldiers', seamen's, and volunteers' letters are not liable to any additional rate on re-direction.

Conveyance.

All soldiers', seamen's, and volunteers' letters are conveyed between Canada and the United Kingdom by the Canadian Line of steamers.

Letters for commissioned officers, &c.

Letters sent to or by commissioned or warrant officers, midshipmen or master's mates, engineers in the navy, captain's clerks or first-class schoolmasters, or commissioned or warrant officers in the army and in the volunteer service, are not included in the privilege attached to letters of soldiers and seamen and volunteers, but are chargeable with the same rates as ordinary letters.

Letters posted without compliance with regulations.

Soldiers', seamen's, and volunteers' letters posted in Canada without a compliance with the above regulations are liable to full postage. If posted in accordance with the above regulations but without pre-payment of 2 cents they are liable to a charge of 2d. sterling on delivery in the United Kingdom.

RATES OF POSTAGE ON NEWSPAPERS.

Definition.

The law declares that for post office purposes a newspaper shall be held to mean a periodical published not less frequently than once in each week, and containing notices of passing events, that is to say general news.

Can be sent otherwise than by post.

Although provision is made for forwarding newspapers through the post, it is not compulsory on any one to employ this mode of transmission; everything except letters may be sent in any other way.

Restrictions.

A newspaper to pass at the undermentioned rates is subject to the following restrictions :—

1. It must have no cover, or a cover open at both ends.
2. It must not contain any enclosure.
3. It must have no writing or mark thereon but the name and address

of the person to whom it is sent, nor anything on the cover except such name and address.

Newspapers which are not posted in accordance with these regulations are not forwarded.

An extra newspaper or a supplement to a newspaper is deemed a distinct newspaper, and charged accordingly.

Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication to any place in Canada at the following rates, if paid quarterly in advance, either by the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the post office where the papers are delivered.

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either the publisher or subscriber the papers are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

It is not necessary that the commuted rate on newspapers should be paid absolutely on the first day of each quarter. The regulation is intended to be carried out with all possible consideration for the convenience of the public, and it will be sufficient if the person desiring to pay the commuted rate declares his intention and offers the payment when first calling at the office within a reasonable time after the commencement of the quarter; but after having made his option to pre-pay the commuted charge, or to pay for his papers as received at one cent each, as the case may be, postmasters are not expected to alter their newspaper accounts to allow of a change until the commencement of the next quarter.

The commuted rate of payment can be accepted from new subscribers during a quarter for any unexpired period of the quarter not less than a month. A newspaper on which the commuted rate has been prepaid by a regular subscriber is not liable to additional postage if re-directed to the said subscriber, at another office, provided the party to whom the paper is redirected produces a certificate of the payment of the commuted rate.

Newspapers posted at an office for delivery therefrom are liable to the ordinary rates of postage.

Newspapers published in Canada which are not posted from the office of publication must be pre-paid one cent each by postage stamp, otherwise they will not be forwarded.

Publishers of newspapers in Canada are allowed to enclose in copies of their papers sent to subscribers, subscription accounts, and receipts for the same, without rendering them liable to any additional postage.

Packets of unbound newspapers published in Canada may be returned by a subscriber to the office of publication, at the rate of 2 cents per 8 oz. or fraction of 8 oz., which must be pre-paid.

By Cunard Steamers.	If forwarded by Cunard Steamer they are subject on delivery to a charge of two cents each, being the American transit rate.
British papers reposted.	British newspapers re-posted in Canada must be pre-paid 1 cent each, by stamp.
British papers posted by agents.	British newspapers distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers or agents pass free in the same way as if received by the Canadian Steamers.
Commuted rate on newspapers to places out of Canada.	Canadian newspapers addressed from the office of publication to subscribers in the United States, the United Kingdom, Lower Provinces, &c., may be forwarded on pre-payment of the commuted rate, applicable to subscribers within the Province; but they cannot be forwarded if unpaid.
Exchanges free.	Exchange papers passing between publishers in Canada and between publishers in Canada and publishers in the United States, are carried <i>free</i> through the post. Only one copy of each publication can be forwarded to the same publisher under this privilege.
No other exemption from charge.	No newspaper, properly so called (except exchanges), whether devoted to education, temperance, agriculture, or to any branch of science is entitled to exemption from charge. The law exempts only periodicals, other than newspapers, printed in Canada, and devoted exclusively to the above objects.
Newfoundland.	Newspapers addressed to Newfoundland must be pre-paid two cents each, by stamp.

The rates on newspapers addressed to British Colonies and foreign countries will be found in the tables given hereafter. These tables give the rates: 1, by Canadian Ocean Steamers; 2, by Cunard Steamers; 3, via Halifax; and 4, via the United States.

No United States newspapers of any kind or description (with the exception of exchange papers) are on any ground entitled to pass through the Canadian mails free of postage.

No United

In cities and towns where newspapers are published, the printers and publishers should send them to the post office put up in a manner to admit of their being readily counted, and if necessary withdrawn from their covers for examination. The newspapers for each office also should be made up in strong paper in a separate parcel, which should be plainly addressed.

When the numbers of a newspaper published in Canada or in either of the other British North American Provinces, or in the United States, and issued daily, have remained in a post office in Canada uncalled for during two weeks; of a newspaper issued semi-weekly, or tri-weekly, during three weeks; of a newspaper issued weekly, during one month; and of a monthly periodical during two months, or when such newspapers and periodicals have been refused to be taken by the party to whom addressed, the postmaster is instructed to notify the respective publishers in the proper form, which is to pass free of postage. If the newspaper or periodical continues to arrive after the notice has been sent, the postmaster is instructed to notify the publisher in the same way a second time, specially calling his attention to the first notice given.

To enclose a letter, or any writing, or to make any written marks to serve the purposes of a letter, or to enclose any other thing (except publishers' accounts and receipts, as before mentioned) in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, is a misdemeanor. Postmasters are requested at once to transmit all newspapers containing such writing, marks, and enclosures to the Postmaster General.

Newspapers addressed to the United Kingdom may be registered on prepayment by Stamp of a registration fee of 8 cents in addition to the ordinary postage.

PERIODICAL PUBLICATIONS.

Periodical Publications are publications issued at regular intervals, but less frequently than once per week.

Definition.

Periodical Publications can be transmitted by post to any part of Canada and the United States at the rate of one cent for every 4 oz. weight of package whether the packet contains one or more numbers.

Rate to Canada
and United
States.

Any fraction of 4 oz. is charged as a full rate.

If addressed to the United States, they are liable on delivery to United States postage.

On Periodicals posted from the office of publication or by News Agents to regular subscribers within the Province this rate may remain to be collected on delivery, but when mailed to go out of the Province, such

	Periodical matter must be pre-paid by Postage Stamp. British and United States periodicals may be posted in Canada by News Agents and Booksellers to regular subscribers under this regulation.
Transient Periodicals.	Transient Periodical matter posted in Canada must in all cases be pre-paid by Postage Stamp.
From United States.	The above rate will be payable on delivery on all periodical matter received from the United States.
Exchanges.	Canadian Editors may receive Exchange Periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage. Only one copy of each publication can be forwarded to the same publisher under this privilege.
Packet addressed to a Post Office.	Periodicals enclosed in a packet and addressed simply to a Post Office or to a <i>Postmaster</i> are charged one cent each. For the packet to pass at the rate of one cent per 4 oz. it must be addressed to an individual.
Periodicals exempt from postage.	Periodicals printed in Canada other than newspapers when specially devoted to education, meaning the instruction of youth, (both religious and general), to agriculture, to temperance, or to any branch of science, and addressed directly from the office of publication to be transmitted to any post-office in Canada, are conveyed by mail free of charge. Such periodicals must not contain general news or general advertisements or they forfeit their claim to exemption. A periodical devoted to education to pass free must be either strictly scholastic in its subject matter, or manifestly adapted and intended for juvenile as distinguished from adult instruction. It is in this primary sense that the word Education, whether religious or secular, is understood to be used. Religious publications are not as a class entitled to exemption from charge. The law exempts only those which come within the foregoing definitions.
United Kingdom.	Periodicals printed and published in Canada may be posted addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, by Canadian Packet on pre-payment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.
No exemption to U. Kingdom.	This rate is applicable to all classes of Canadian Periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom, the exemption from postage to which certain classes of Canadian Periodicals are entitled, extending to such numbers only as are addressed from the office of publication to places within the Province.
U. S. periodicals not exempt.	No United States periodical of any kind or description with the exception of the exchanges above referred to can, upon any ground, claim exemption from Canadian postage.
Returned periodicals.	Parcels of unbound periodicals may be returned by a subscriber to the office of publication at the rate of two cents per 8 oz. or fraction of 8 oz.
Conditions.	Periodicals to pass at the above rates must be put up in covers open at the ends or sides, and if these regulations are not strictly complied with, or if such periodicals are found to contain any writing other than the address, they are liable to full letter rates of postage.
Not to exceed 48 oz.	No packet of periodicals can be forwarded through the post if exceeding the weight of 48 oz.

Bound volumes of any periodical published in Canada may be forwarded at the rates and under the conditions described under the article *Book Post*. Bound periodicals.

BOOK POST.

Books bound or unbound posted in Canada, and addressed to any office in Canada, British North America and the United States, are chargeable with a rate of 1 cent per oz., which must be pre-paid by postage stamps. Canada, B. N. America, and United States.

Book packets are forwarded by post from Canada to the United Kingdom, and *vice versa*, by *Canadian Steamers only*, at the following rates. Sent by Canadian Steamers only.

Book packets, printed matter, or single newspapers, can be forwarded from Canada to France, or *vice versa*, by *Canadian Steamers only* at the following rates :— France.

The following conditions must be carefully observed :—

1. Every book packet must be either without a cover or in a cover open at both ends.
2. It must not contain any letter open or sealed, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, or any sealed enclosure whatever.
3. It must not exceed two feet in length, breadth, or width.
4. The postage must be pre-paid by stamps.

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, publications, works of literature or art, almanacs, maps or prints, photographs, daguerreotypes, when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment (to the exclusion of letters); and the books, maps, paper, &c., may be either written, printed or plain, or any mixture of the three, and may be either British, Colonial or Foreign. Contents of a book packet.

All legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, or a portion thereof, will be allowed as part of the packet, whether such binding &c., be loose or attached, as also rollers in the case of prints and maps, and whatever may be necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or whatever usually appertains thereto, and the postage is rated upon the gross weight of the packet.

No prints or printed matter are allowed to pass by Book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper parchment or vellum.

Sender's address permitted on cover.

The name and address of the sender, and anything else not in the nature of a letter, may also be written and printed on the envelope or cover of the packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom it may be forwarded.

Books carried at parcel rates.

Books addressed to places in Canada can be sent through the mails in closed packets for the same rates of postage as parcels.

Cannot be sent by Cunard Steamers. Bound volumes of newspapers or periodicals.

Books cannot be forwarded except at letter rates of postage by the mail made up for the Cunard Steamers sailing from New York and Boston.

Bound volumes of any periodical or newspaper published in Canada, if bound in a form to come within mailable dimensions, that is to say, not exceeding two feet in length, breadth or thickness, nor exceeding 4 lbs. in weight, may be sent from the office of publication to any place in Canada at a charge of two cents per 8 oz. or fraction of 8 oz.

Insufficiently prepaid.

When a book packet is posted in the United Kingdom for Canada, or in Canada for the United Kingdom either wholly unpaid, or prepaid less than a single rate of book postage, it is forwarded to destination charged with double the amount of the book postage rate on the packet, deducting however the amount of postage actually prepaid, if any has been prepaid. But if the partial prepayment of a book packet amounts to a single rate then the book packet is forwarded charged with additional postage equal to the deficiency and another single rate as a fine.

When conditions not observed.

Should a book packet be posted in a cover not open at the ends or should it exceed the dimensions specified in this article it will be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

Registration to U. Kingdom.

Book packets addressed to the United Kingdom may be registered on payment by Stamp of a registration fee of 8 cents in addition to the ordinary postage.

Letters enclosed in book packets.

Letters, whether sealed or unsealed, or any enclosure found in a book parcel, are liable to rates as unpaid letters, and the packet in which enclosed to an additional rate of 12½ cents, as a penalty for a breach of the regulations.

British Colonies and Foreign Countries.

The rates of postage on books to British Colonies and Foreign Countries are to be found in the tables given hereafter.

PRINTED PAPERS, CIRCULARS, PRICES CURRENT, HAND-BILLS, &c.

Canada, British America and United States.

Printed circulars, prices current, hand bills, and other printed matter of a like character, posted in Canada, and addressed to any place in Canada, British North America, or the United States, are chargeable with a rate of one cent per oz., which must be pre-paid by postage stamp.

School Returns.

The half-yearly School Returns made by School Trustees to the Local Superintendants of Schools, may, though the printed form be partly

filled up in writing with the names of the pupils and days of attendance, be transmitted by post in Canada at the rate of one cent each, to be pre-paid by stamp.

When not filled up, the above forms are printed matter, and liable, as such, to one cent per oz. postage.

Military returns, states, and rolls, containing written figures and signatures, may be forwarded as printed matter on pre-payment of one cent per ounce.

Printed circulars may be transmitted by post to the United Kingdom under the regulations and charges of the Book Post. They must be forwarded, however, open at the ends, or sides. If sent in envelopes, sealed or unsealed, they are liable to letter rates of postage.

Prices current, posted in Canada and addressed to any place in the United Kingdom, are liable to a rate of 2 cents each, which must be pre-paid by stamp.

Lithographed letters and circulars are allowed to pass through the Post at the same rate as printed circulars.

Military Returns, &c.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, and not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight, may be posted at any post-office in Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, for conveyance to any other post-office in Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, at the following rates :-

For each parcel weighing not more than 1 lb.....	25 cts.
Exceeding 1 lb. and not exceeding 2 lbs.....	50 "
" 2 " " " 3 "	75 "

Not to exceed 3 lbs.

Scale of charge.

The following conditions must be carefully observed :-

1. No letter or letters shall be enclosed.
2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail.
3. The weight of the parcel shall not exceed 3 lbs., nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness.
4. The postage must be pre-paid by stamps.
5. The parcel should have the words "By Parcel Post," plainly written on the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the post-office address of the intended receiver, the name of the County in which the said office is situated being added.

Conditions under which carried.

If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned from the Dead Letter Office unopened to the sender, on payment of an additional rate for the return conveyance.

Sender's name on address.

If the number of stamps affixed to a parcel be insufficient to pre-pay the proper rate, the amount deficient will be rated unpaid, with a fine of 10 cents in addition.

Parcels insufficiently pre-paid.

Registered parcels.

Parcels may be registered on pre-payment, by stamp, of five cents in addition to the postage. When registered the Postmaster should give a receipt to the party posting the parcel.

Contents allowed in parcels.

Parcels sent by post may contain books, daguerreotypes, photographs, printers' proof and copy, military returns, states and rolls, containing written figures and signatures; returns, deeds, legal papers, and all transmissions of a like character not being strictly letters.

Enclosure of letters in parcels.

To enclose a letter or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel intended for the Parcel Post is a misdemeanour.

Should it be ascertained that a packet posted for the Parcel Post contains a letter or letters, the stamps it may bear will be cancelled, and the parcel rated as a letter with full unpaid rates.

Parcel post confined to Canada and Lower Provinces.

Parcels cannot be transmitted by post at the above rates to any place beyond the limits of the Province of Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

MISCELLANEOUS MATTER.

Seeds, cuttings, roots, grafts, &c., Canada and United States.

Packages of Seeds, Cuttings, Bulbous Roots, and Scions or Grafts may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Province, or to an address within the United States on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce, and when received from the United States addressed to any place in Canada such packages are delivered on payment by the person addressed of a like rate.

The limit of weight of such packages is one pound. No communication whether written or printed must be enclosed in them, and they must be put up to be easy of examination for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck so as to admit of inspection, and in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents such as "seeds," "roots," &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate above mentioned.

Book Manuscript Printer's Proof Sheets (whether corrected or not), Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Photographs (when not on glass or in case containing glass), Sheet Music (whether printed or written), may pass in covers open at both ends or both sides, provided that no letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter be enclosed therein, on prepayment when posted in Canada by postage stamp of the ordinary printed matter rate of one cent per ounce, or upon payment of that rate on delivery of such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Manuscript, Proof, Prints, Engravings, Photographs, &c., Canada and United States.

Patterns or Samples of Merchandize and goods, not exceeding one pound in weight, may be posted in Canada for transmission to any place within the Province on pre-payment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce.

Patterns and Samples, Canada.

If the above rate is not fully pre-paid the packet will be rated, with the deficient postage and a fine of five cents in addition.

Should a packet of Patterns or Samples be posted addressed to any place in Canada exceeding the weight of one pound it will not be forwarded to its address, but will be sent to the Postmaster General, for return to the sender.

Patterns or Samples of Merchandize may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, France, Germany, the Kingdom of Italy, Belgium, Denmark, and Switzerland at the book rates laid down in the tables given hereafter.

Patterns and Samples, United Kingdom and Foreign Countries.

The following conditions must be observed. These conditions it will be seen differ in regard to Patterns or Samples of Merchandize sent to the different countries above mentioned.

There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, and the address of the sender, other than a trade mark and number and the prices of the articles, and these particulars must be given, not on loose piece of papers but either on the outside of the packet, or on small labels attached to the samples or the bags containing them.

Patterns however, of scizzors, knives razors, forks, steel pens, nails, keys, watch machinery, metal tubing, pieces of metal and ore and such like articles, may be forwarded by post, as samples, provided they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the Mail Bags and to the persons of the officers of the Post Office. But such articles must be so packed that they may be easily examined; any packet containing such articles which may be found to be insufficiently guarded will not be forwarded.

Any infringement of the conditions laid down as above will render the packet liable either to forfeiture, or to be treated and charged as a letter. When conditions not observed.

Packets of patterns or samples addressed to any place in Canada may be registered on pre-payment by postage stamps of a Registration fee of five cents in addition to the postage rate, provided such packets be duly handed in to a Post Office for registration.

FRANKING AND FREE LETTERS.

The following matter is exempt from Provincial Postage :

All letters and other mailable matter addressed to or sent by the Governor General of Canada, or addressed to or sent by any Public Department at the seat of Government. Matter exempt from postage.

All letters and other mailable matter addressed to or sent by the Speaker or Chief Clerk of the Legislative Council or of the Legislative Assembly or to or by any Member of the Legislature at the Seat of Government during any Session of the Legislature, or addressed to any of the Members or Officers in this Section mentioned at the Seat of Government as aforesaid, during the ten days next before the meeting of Parliament.

All public documents and printed papers sent by the Speaker or Chief Clerk of the Legislative Council or Legislative Assembly, to any Member of either of the said branches of the Legislature of Canada, during the recess of Parliament.

All papers printed by order of either branch of the Legislature of Canada, sent by Members of either branch of the said Legislature, either during the Session or recess.

Public documents and printed papers sent under the two foregoing clauses, should bear, as part of the address, the *bona fide* superscription of the Speaker, Chief Clerk, or officer specially deputed for this purpose to act for those functionaries, or of the Member sending the same. Signature required to addresses.

All letters to and from the Postmaster General and the Deputy Postmaster General ; and all official communications to and from the Post Office Department, and to and from the Post Office Inspectors, are to pass free of any Provincial postage. P. M. G., D. P. M. G., and Post Office Inspectors.

Letters on Her Majesty's service passing between the United Kingdom and Canada, to or from the following Imperial Military Departments, are exempt from Canadian postage : Military departments and officers.

Adjutant General.
Quarter-Master General.
Commissariat Department.
Barrack Department.
Medical Department (including Purveyors.)
Comptroller of Army Expenditure.
Military Accountant.
Royal Engineer Department.
Regimental Paymaster and Officers Commanding.

United States franked letters. Letters from the United States Departments of State at Washington, which have been franked by officers of the United States Government, and which have passed free through the United States mails may be delivered to the parties to whom addressed in Canada, free from Canadian postage.

ABATING AND REFUNDING POSTAGE.

Postmasters may refund. Postmasters in Canada are allowed to refund postage in the following cases only :—

Charges for over weight. Letters charged as weighing more than the actual weight.

On editors' notices and exchanges. Postage incorrectly charged on editor's notices addressed to publishers and editors, and exchange papers, which should legally pass without charge.

On official letters to Postmasters. Postmasters are allowed to claim the unpaid postage on letters addressed to them on official business, on sending the letters to the Dead Letter Office as Dead Letters.

Other cases to be referred to Postmaster General. All other claims for the return or abatement of postage must be specially referred to the Postmaster General for his decision, with the letter or packet on which the return is claimed.

UNDELIVERED AND DEAD LETTERS.

Advertized on 1st of each month. All letters remaining undelivered in a post office on the first of each month, excepting drop letters and such letters as are daily called for, are advertized in a list posted at the office door for the information of the public.

Advertizement in newspapers. If a newspaper is published in the neighbourhood, the Postmaster may at the discretion of the Postmaster General be directed to insert this list therein, provided the proprietor will give it insertion in three separate issues or publications of such newspaper at the rate of 2 cents for each letter. No letters can, however, be advertized in a newspaper without the permission of the Postmaster General.

Advertized letters to be asked for as such. Parties applying at an office for advertized letters should always ask for them as such.

When sent to Dead Letter office. Letters and papers after remaining undelivered in an office for three months are sent to the Dead Letter Office, as also are all letters refused by the persons to whom they are addressed or letters addressed to persons deceased.

Return to writers. Every letter which is opened at the Dead Letter Office and found to contain money and other articles of value is forwarded for delivery to the writer on payment of such postage as may be due thereon, together with 3 cents additional on each letter, to defray the cost of advertising, opening, and returning the same. Such of these letters however as do not contain the sender's address are kept for a reasonable time for the purpose of being reclaimed.

REGISTRATION.

By the pre-payment of the following fee, in addition to the ordinary postage, letters and parcels can be registered at the office at which posted :—

The registration fees on letters to British Colonies and Foreign Countries will be found in the tables given hereafter.

To British Colonies and Foreign Countries.

Every letter or parcel containing value should be registered and presented to the Postmaster or his clerk and a receipt obtained therefor. On no account should it be dropped into a letter box.

Certificate of posting to be given.

When letters are registered, for whatever destination, both the postage and the registration fee must be pre-paid.

Pre-payment.

Registration fees on letters may be paid either in money or by postage stamp.

How to be made

Both the postage and the registration fees on letters addressed to the United Kingdom, the United States, and places abroad must, however, be paid wholly in stamps or wholly in money. The postage cannot be paid in money, and the registration fee by stamps. Nor can the postage be paid by stamps and the registration fee in money. Both charges must be covered either by money or by stamps.

Books unless addressed to the United Kingdom, periodicals, newspapers, circulars, and other printed matter, cannot be registered unless pre-paid the full letter rates, in addition to the ordinary registration fee.

Books, &c., cannot be registered.

Registered letters and packets can only be delivered to the parties to whom they are addressed or to their order, and a receipt must be given on the delivery of each registered letter in a book kept by every Postmaster for that purpose.

Receipt required on Delivery.

It should be clearly understood that the post office is not responsible for the safe delivery of a registered letter or parcel. The registration simply makes its transmission more secure, by rendering it practicable to trace it, when passing from one place to another in Canada, from its receipt to its delivery ; and when addressed from any place in Canada to any place in the United States, the United Kingdom, or parts abroad, if not to its delivery, at least to the frontier or port of despatch.

Post office not responsible for loss.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Every Postmaster is required to have on hand a sufficient stock of postage stamps, and to sell them to the public at 1 cent, 2 cents, 5 cents, 10 cents, 12½ cents, and 17 cents each.

Prices of stamps.

Letter envelopes are also provided with medallion stamps equivalent to 5 cents and 10 cents postage, each. The 5 cent envelopes are sold singly at 6 cents each ; 66 cents per dozen ; \$5.50 per hundred. The

Envelopes.

10 cent envelopes are sold singly at 11 cents each ; \$1.26 per dozen ; \$10.50 per hundred.

- Sale to dealers.** With the approval of the Postmaster General, postage stamps are sold in cities only to certain dealers to retail again to the public.
- Pre-payment in stamps.** Pre-payment of letters should, in all cases where practicable, be made by postage stamps.
- Mutilated stamps.** A mutilated stamp, or a stamp cut in half, is not recognized in pre-payment of postage.
- Medallion stamps.** A medallion stamp cannot be accepted in pre-payment of postage if separated from the envelope of which it may have formed a part.
- British and Foreign.** No British stamps, or stamps of a foreign country, can be received in pre-payment of postage in Canada.
- Mode of affixing.** In affixing the stamp to the letter wet slightly the corner of the envelope and the gummed side of the stamp, and gently press the stamp till it is firmly fixed. Stamps should be placed on the front or address side of the letter, and on the right hand upper corner.
- Partial payment in.** Letters cannot be pre-paid partly in stamps and partly in money ; the postage must be pre-paid either wholly in stamps, or wholly in money.
- Insufficient pre-payment.** If the stamps affixed to a letter addressed to any place in British North America be not adequate to the proper postage, the letter is rated with an amount equal to the deficiency.
- Do, United States.** Letters addressed to or received from the United States, on which stamps are affixed representing less than the amount of postage to which the letters are liable, are rated with full unpaid postage.
- Stamps received for postage.** Postage stamps are received at all post offices in payment of postage on unpaid letters delivered therefrom.

BILL STAMPS.

- Sold at certain offices.** Postmasters at certain offices are required to sell bill stamps to the public.
- Stamps required for Bills of different amounts.** These stamps should be affixed to all notes drafts and bills of exchange as follows :

- Interest to be included.** Any interest made payable at the maturity of the note draft or bill to be counted as part of the principal sum.
- Obliteration of stamp.** The date of the note, draft or bill of exchange should be written in ink across the stamp or stamps thereto affixed.
- Cannot be used for postage.** Bill stamps cannot be used for the payment of postage.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money orders are issued at every Money Order Office in Canada on every other Money Order Office in Canada, as well as on every Money Order Office in the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, and Prince Edward Island. Money orders are also issued at every Money Order Office in the above countries on every Money Order Office in Canada. Orders issued.

Post offices in Canada at which money orders are issued and paid are distinguished in the List of Post Offices by being printed in *italics*. Money order offices.

The rate of commission charged on money orders drawn by one money order office in Canada on any other money order office in Canada, is as follows :— Commission on Canadian orders.

If not exceeding in amount \$10.....	5 cents
Exceeding \$10 and not exceeding \$20.....	10 "

No half cents can be introduced into orders. Half cents.

No money order exceeding \$100 in amount can be granted on any office in Canada ; but postmasters are at liberty to grant two or more orders for \$100 or for any lesser sum. They cannot, however, grant two or more orders for sums of or under \$30 on the same day to the same applicant in favor of the same payee. Amount of single orders not to exceed \$100.

Money orders on the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, and Prince Edward Island, are drawn in sterling money. If on the United Kingdom they may be for any sum from one shilling to ten pounds. If on the Lower Provinces for any sum from one shilling to twenty pounds. They must not, however, exceed the higher amounts ; but postmasters are at liberty to issue two or more separate orders for ten pounds each on the United Kingdom or for twenty pounds each on the Lower Provinces, or for any smaller sum. No half pence can be introduced into sterling orders. Orders on United Kingdom and Lower Provinces.

The rate of commission charged on orders on the United Kingdom, over and above the currency value of the sterling, is as follows :— Commission, U. Kingdom.

- Tables of exchange.** Tables shewing the amount of Provincial currency required for money orders issued in Canada upon the United Kingdom and the Lower Provinces, in addition to the commission, and paid for money orders issued in the United Kingdom and the Lower Provinces, on Canada, will be found hereafter.
- Printed applications.** Applicants for money orders should always use the printed application forms, in which they should fill up the particulars of the order required. These forms are supplied gratuitously at all money order offices.
- Country to be indicated.** As there are several places of the same name in Canada, in the United Kingdom, and in the Lower Provinces, it will be desirable always to indicate the country in which the office, where the order is to be made payable is situated.
- Full names and residences required.** The christian and surnames in full, and residences, both of the remitter and the payee, should be furnished to the issuing postmaster. When a married woman is either the remitter or the payee, her own christian name should be given, and not that of her husband, thus—"Mrs. Mary Smith," not "Mrs. John Smith."
- If the remitter or payee be a Peer or a Bishop, his ordinary title is sufficient. If a firm, the usual designation of such firm will suffice, such as "Baring Bros.," "Smith & Son," "Jones & Co."
- Orders should be examined.** Parties procuring money orders should examine them carefully to see that they are properly filled up and stamped. This caution will appear the more necessary when it is understood that any defect in these respects will throw difficulties in the way of payment.
- Erroneous orders.** Money orders which in consequence of misapprehension of the name of the remitter or place of payment have been erroneously made out, can be returned to the postmaster, and a correct order given in exchange; a new commission, however, will be charged on the corrected order.
- Re-payment of orders at issuing office.** Parties obtaining money orders on Canadian offices can procure re-payment thereof on presentation of the orders at the office at which issued, signing the receipt at the foot. No order, however, can be repaid without the authority of the superintendent, unless presented for repayment on the day on which it is issued. Neither can orders on the United Kingdom or Lower Provinces be repaid without the special authority.
- Orders on United Kingdom can be paid through a bank.** When a remitter desires an order on the United Kingdom to be paid through a bank, it is left to his option to give or withhold the name of the payee, or to substitute for the name of the payee any other designation or modification, such as "the Cashier of the Bank of England," "the Chief Clerk of the Foreign Office." Such orders must, however, be crossed by the issuing postmaster with the name of bank through which the order is to be paid.
- No credit allowed.** The issue of money orders on credit, or for cheques not marked "good" by the bank drawn upon, is strictly prohibited.

If a payee is unable to write, he must sign the receipt at the foot of the order, in the presence of the paying postmaster, by making his mark, to be witnessed in writing; as, for example :—

Witness,—*John Kenny,*
Queen Street, Toronto.

His
Joseph X Allen.

In cases of money orders issued in Canada, postmasters are at liberty to accept the written order of the payee on the order itself in favour of a second person, if through illness or insuperable difficulty the payee is prevented from presenting the order in person.

Order of payee
in favour of se-
cond person.

When a Canadian money order has been lost, either by the remitter or payee, the circumstance must be made known to the superintendent, who, under certain precautions, will issue a duplicate.

Lost orders.

Duplicates of sterling orders can only be granted by the paying country. Thus the British post office issues duplicates of orders drawn in Canada on the United Kingdom, and the Canadian Head Money Order Office grants duplicates of orders drawn in the United Kingdom on Canada.

Duplicates of
British orders.

Money orders which are not presented until one full year after their date are considered as lapsed orders, and cannot be paid without the special permission of the superintendent. In all such cases satisfactory reasons should be given explanatory of the delay in the presentation of the order.

Lapsed orders.

The Deputy Postmasters General of Malta and Gibraltar are authorized to issue money orders on the several money order offices in Canada. Money order offices in Canada do not, however, grant money orders on Malta and Gibraltar.

Orders on Ca-

MAIL CONTRACTS.

Contracts for the conveyance of the mails are let for a term of four years. Tenders for such contracts are invited by public advertisement.

Term of con-
tracts. Adver-
tisement of do.
Tenders how to
be made.

Every tender for carrying a mail should be made on a form supplied for that purpose. It should state the price asked per annum or per trip, as the case may be, in words at length, and should be accompanied by the written guarantee of two responsible parties undertaking, that in the event of the tender being accepted, the contract shall be duly executed by the party tendering for the price demanded. Undertaking also to become bound with the contractor for the due performance of the service.

Tenders for mail contracts should be sealed and addressed to the Postmaster General at Ottawa. These tenders are kept sealed until the biddings are closed, and then opened as the law directs.

The contract in all cases is awarded to the lowest bidder tendering sufficient security for the faithful performance of the contract, unless the Postmaster General is satisfied that it is for the interest of the public not to accept the lowest tender.

Lowest tender
accepted with
certain excep-
tions.

The Postmaster General is not bound to consider the tender of any person who has wilfully or negligently failed to perform a prior contract.

Tenders of
defaulting
Contractors.

When lowest tender not accepted.

Neither is the Postmaster General compelled to accept the lowest tender, when in his opinion the price demanded is excessive, but he may in such case re-advertise the contract, or offer to such parties as have tendered, each in his turn, commencing with the party who has made the lowest tender, such sum as may be considered by the Postmaster General an equitable and sufficient price for the service.

Failure of party tendering to contract.

If, after the acceptance of a tender, the party making it, fails to enter into an obligation with good and sufficient sureties for the performance of the service, the Postmaster General may hold the said party and his proposed sureties liable for the difference between the price named in the said tender and the price which the Postmaster General may have to pay for the said service, under a contract with another party.

P. M. G. not bound to advertise contracts not exceeding \$200 per an.

The Postmaster General is not bound to advertise mail contracts involving an annual expense of less than two hundred dollars. He may direct an agent to receive tenders for such contracts on his behalf, or he may, in special cases, make such contracts by private agreement when he considers that public interests will be thereby promoted.

Parties combining to prevent others from bidding not to receive contract

No contract can be made with any person who has entered into any combination, or proposed to enter into any combination, to prevent any other person from making a bid, or who has made an agreement or promised to give any consideration to induce any other person not to bid for a mail contract.

Additional compensation when allowed.

No additional compensation can be granted to any mail contractor unless he is required to perform additional service. And the rate of compensation for such additional service, must be in exact proportion to the rate paid for the work undertaken under the original contract. And no extra allowance can be made to any mail contractor for an increased speed in the transportation of the mail, unless the employment of additional stock or couriers be thereby rendered necessary, and in such case the additional allowance must not bear a greater proportion to the additional stock or couriers rendered necessary than the sum stipulated under the original contract bears to the stock and couriers necessarily employed in its execution. No extra compensation is allowed in cases where the contractor has to travel an additional distance, or incur an extra expense in consequence of snow drifts or of the destruction of roads or bridges by floods or otherwise.

Postmasters allowed to contract.

The Postmaster General may in his discretion authorize and allow a Postmaster to undertake and perform a contract for the conveyance of a mail, subject to the regulations applying to all mail contracts, when in his opinion the public service will thereby be promoted.

Contractors and Couriers to be sworn.

All mail contractors and parties employed by them in the conveyance of the mails, must take and subscribe the oath or declaration hereinbefore given, before a magistrate. And no courier should be allowed to have charge of a mail until he has taken and subscribed this oath or declaration.

Age of couriers.

No person is allowed to be employed as mail courier who is under the age of sixteen years.

Mail contractors are not allowed to employ any person in the conveyance of the mails, who has been dismissed from the post office service.

Parties dismissed not eligible as couriers.

No courier who is under the influence of liquor should be allowed to have charge of a mail, or to be again employed in the service of a mail contractor.

Couriers intoxicated on duty.

Mail couriers are required to carry a post horn which they should sound on arriving at and leaving a post office, and occasionally along the road.

Post horn.

Mail couriers are also required to carry a side bag, and to deposit therein any letters which may be offered to them *en route*, whilst at a distance of over one mile from a Post Office. Such letters to be delivered to the Postmaster at the first office at which the mail courier may arrive for the purpose of being mailed to destination.

Way letters.

The mail bags are to be delivered into and taken from each post office and at each terminus of the route by the mail couriers.

Delivery of mail.

The contractor is to provide for the defence of the mail bags whilst *en route*, from the weather, and from other causes of injury and from dangers of every kind.

Defence of mail.

A fine may be imposed by the Postmaster General for each and every default or failure to perform any of the stipulations of the contract or for any neglect or violation of the orders or regulations communicated by the Postmaster General to the contractor for his government in the performance of the service.

Fines.

Parties undertaking the conveyance of mails are bound to pay all expenses for tolls and ferries, and to assume all risks and contingencies in the performance of the service.

Tolls and ferries.

No mail stage or vehicle carrying a mail is exempt from toll on any road or bridge in Canada, unless in the act or charter authorizing such road or bridge it is specially so provided.

Neither are ferrymen bound to transport the mails across their ferries without remuneration, but if any ferryman demands more than the contractor for the mail is willing to pay, the amount of remuneration is to be determined by arbitration.

GENERAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

The Postmaster General has by law the exclusive privilege of conveying, receiving, collecting, sending, and delivering letters within the Province of Canada, and any person infringing on this privilege is liable to a penalty of twenty dollars, for each letter unlawfully conveyed or undertaken to be conveyed, received, delivered, or found in his possession.

Exclusive privilege of P. M. G.

Such exclusive privilege, however, does not apply to Letters sent by a private friend on his way or journey to be delivered by such private friend to the party to whom addressed.

Exceptions thereto

Letters sent by a messenger on purpose, concerning the private affairs of the sender or receiver.

Commissions or returns thereof, affidavits, writs, processes or proceedings or return thereof, issuing out of a Court of Justice.

Letters addressed to a place out of the Province, and sent by sea or private vessel.

Letters brought into the Province, and immediately posted at the nearest Post Office.

Letters of merchants, owners of vessels, of merchandize, or of the cargo, or loading therein, sent by such vessel of merchandize, or by any person employed by such owners for the carriage of such letters, according to their respective addresses and delivered to the persons to whom they are respectively addressed without pay, hire, reward, advantage, or profit, for so doing.

Letters concerning goods or merchandize sent by common known carriers to be delivered with the goods to which such letters relate without hire, reward, profit, or advantage, for receiving or delivering them.

But no person is authorized to make a collection of such excepted letters for the purpose of sending them or conveying them as aforesaid.

The exclusive privilege of the Postmaster General does not extend to newspapers, books, or periodicals, which it is not compulsory on any one to send through the post. Everything except letters may be sent in any other way.

P. M. G. not liable for losses.

The Postmaster General is not liable for the loss of any letter, paper or parcel whether registered or not registered sent through the post.

Exemption from juries, inquests, and militia.

Postmasters and certain other officers of the department are exempt from serving on juries or inquests, or in the militia. This exemption applies to mail carriers, but not to assistants appointed and paid by postmasters.

Officers prohibited from voting.

The postmasters of Quebec, Montreal, Three Rivers, and Sherbrooke, and the postmasters of incorporated cities and towns in Upper Canada, divided into wards, and other officers of the Post Office Department, excepting Postmasters at other than the above places, cannot legally vote at the election of any member of the Legislative Council or of the Legislative Assembly.

Bonds required for Postmasters.

Every Postmaster is required to enter into a Bond with two responsible parties for the due discharge of his duties. The amount of the penalty of this Bond varies according to the business transacted, the lowest amount however being \$500.

Release of sureties.

The surety of a Postmaster may be released from his suretyship on notifying the Postmaster General of his desire to that effect. Such release to date from the completion and acceptance of the new bond.

Non-transmission of accounts

Postmasters neglecting to render their accounts at the time prescribed by the Postmaster General are liable to a forfeiture of double the balance due thereon.

No credit allowed.

Postmasters are not authorized to give credit for postage, if they do so, it is entirely at their own risk.

Postage may be required in advance of delivery.

A Postmaster cannot be required to deliver a letter or a parcel until the postage thereon is paid by the party to whom the same may be addressed.

British silver is a legal tender at the rate of 12 cents for every British sixpence, and 24 cents for every British shilling.

Discount on silver.

United States silver, however, is not a legal tender at any rate, and a postmaster can be expected to receive it only at the rate at which a bank will take it on deposit.

American silver.

A letter once posted becomes the property of the person to whom it is addressed, and must be forwarded according to its direction. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer, or to any other person.

Return of letter to sender not allowed.

A letter addressed to a firm may be delivered to any member of the firm. If addressed to several persons it may be delivered to any one of them.

Letters addressed to firms, &c.

A letter delivered to the wrong person in consequence of his name being the same as the one of the person for whom the letter is really intended, should be at once returned to the postmaster from whom received, the party writing on the cover "opened by me through mistake," and signing his name thereto.

Letters delivered to wrong parties.

Letters posted without any direction, or addressed so imperfectly that they cannot be forwarded to their intended destinations, and also unpaid or insufficiently paid letters addressed to countries to which letters cannot be sent without the postage is prepaid, are returned to the writers through the Dead Letter Office.

Letters posted without proper direction or pre-payment.

No information can be given respecting letters which pass through a post office, except to the persons to whom they are addressed.

Information not to be given.

Parties desiring their letters and papers to be re-directed should send an intimation to that effect in writing to the postmaster of the office from which the letters and papers are to be re-directed.

Re-direction of letters.

Postmasters are allowed to re-direct letters to the known places of residence of the parties to whom they are addressed, after allowing a reasonable time to elapse without their being called for.

Letters and papers are not subject to any additional charge when re-directed from one post office in Canada to another post office in Canada.

No extra charge.

If a letter or packet is refused, or if the party to whom it is addressed cannot be found, the postage is recoverable with costs, by the Postmaster General from the sender of such letter or packet.

Postmasters are instructed not to receive any letter or packet which there is good reason to believe contains glass or anything likely to injure the contents of the mail bag or the person of any officer of the post office. The transmission of indecent Photographs or immoral books through the Post is strictly prohibited, and all Packets containing such articles should be sent to the Postmaster General.

Objectionable matter.

A postmaster is not legally bound to furnish change, but if absolutely necessary may require that the exact amount of postage on any letter or packet be tendered to him in current coin, or in Canada postage stamps.

Change.

Postmasters and their assistants in the above matter, as well as in all their official intercourse with the public, are expected to afford every accommodation, and to treat every person having business at their offices with every courtesy.

Civility required from Postmasters.

Deposit of
Balances by
Postmasters
in Banks.

Postmasters are required to deposit the balance due on their quarterly accounts at the nearest agency of the Bank of Montreal, or such other Bank as may be authorized to receive Provincial Revenue. The money should be deposited to the credit of the Postmaster General on Revenue account, and a deposit receipt obtained from the Bank, which should be sent to the Postmaster General with the account current.

Mail couriers to
receive letters
en route.

Mail couriers are bound to receive letters offered to them whilst on the road between one post office and another, provided that when a letter is so offered the distance from the nearest post office exceeds one mile. Such letters are termed Way Letters, and are subject to the ordinary rates of postage.

OFFENCES AND PENALTIES.

Certain offences against the Post Office Department, are by law constituted Felonies, and certain other offences, Misdemeanours. The following is an abstract of these offences and the penalties thereto attached.

A letter is deemed a "Post Letter," from the time of its being deposited at a post office, or in a street letter box, to the time of its being delivered to the party to whom addressed.

And the term "Post Letter Bag," includes a Mail Bag or Box, or packet, or parcel, or other envelope, or covering in which post letters are conveyed, whether it does or does not actually contain post letters.

FELONIES.

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Definition.

To forge, counterfeit, or imitate any postage stamp, or knowingly to use the same, or to engrave any plate or thing whereby to forge, counterfeit or imitate such stamps, or to have possession of such plate or thing as aforesaid, or to use or affix upon any letter or packet any stamps, signature, initials or other mark or sign, purporting that such Letter or Packet ought to pass free or at a lower rate, or that the postage thereon, or any part thereof has been pre-paid, or ought to be paid by, or charged to any person or department.

For any officer of, or connected with the Provincial Post Office Department to convert to his own use in any way whatever, or to use by way of investment in any kind of property or merchandise, or loan with or without interest, any portion of the Public Monies intrusted to him for safe keeping, transfer, disbursement, or for any other purpose; the neglect or refusal to pay over such monies promptly, on the requirement of the Postmaster General, to be *prima facie* evidence of such conversion to his own use of so much of the public monies as are in the hands of such officer, and for any person advisingly or knowingly to participate in such embezzlement.

For any person to steal, purloin, embezzle, or obtain by any false pretence, or knowingly, or unlawfully to make, forge, or counterfeit any key suited to any lock adapted for use by the Provincial Post Office Department, and in use by the said Department; or to have in his possession any such Mail Key or Mail Lock with the intent, unlawfully or improperly to use, sell, or otherwise dispose of the same, or for any person to aid or assist in the above.

In any indictment for stealing, embezzling, secreting, or delaying any Post Letter, Post Letter Bag, Packet, Chattel, Money, or valuable security sent by post, the property of such Post Letter, Post Letter Bag, Packet, Chattel, Money or valuable security, may be laid in the Postmaster General. And it shall not be necessary to allege in the indictment or to prove upon the trial or otherwise, that the Post Letter, Post Letter Bag, Packet, Chattel or valuable security was of value.

Penalty.

Imprisonment in the Provincial Penitentiary for life.

A fine equal to the amount embezzled, and imprisonment for a term not less than three months, and not more than seven years.

Imprisonment in the Provincial Penitentiary for a period not exceeding seven years.

MISDEMEANOURS.

Punishable by fine or imprisonment, or by both, at the discretion of the Court before whom the offender is convicted.

The imprisonment, if for a term of, or exceeding two years, to be in the Provincial Penitentiary. If for a less term, with or without hard labour at the discretion of the Court.

To open unlawfully, or wilfully to keep, secrete, delay, or detain any Post Bag or Post Letter, whether the same comes into possession of the offender by finding or otherwise.

To neglect or refuse after payment or tender of postage due thereon to deliver up any post letter to the person to whom it is addressed, or who is legally entitled to receive the same.

To steal, embezzle, secrete, destroy, wilfully detain or delay any printed vote or proceeding, newspaper, printed paper, or book sent by post.

Wilfully or maliciously to destroy, damage, detain, or delay any parcel sent by parcel post.

Wilfully or maliciously to injure or destroy any Street Letter Box or Pillar Box for the reception of letters.

To obstruct or wilfully delay the passage or progress of any mail.

To cut, tear, rip, or wilfully to damage or destroy any Post Letter Bag.

For any Mail Carrier or person employed to carry the Mail to be guilty of any act of drunkenness, negligence or misconduct whereby the safety or punctual delivery of such mail might be endangered, or contrary to law to collect, receive or deliver any Letter or Packet, or to neglect to use due care and diligence to convey any Mail at the rate of speed provided for in the contract under which he is employed.

For any Toll Gate Keeper to refuse or neglect forthwith, on demand, to allow any mail, or carriage horse or animal employed in conveying the same to pass through such toll gate whether on pretence of non-payment of toll or any other. But the toll, if due, and not paid, shall be recoverable in the usual course of law from the party liable.

To collect and convey or deliver, or to undertake to collect, convey, send and deliver, (except in the case mentioned under the heading "General Laws and Regulations,") any letters within the Province, or to be in possession of letters for the purpose of conveying and delivering them, renders the offender liable to a fine of Twenty dollars for each letter so unlawfully conveyed, or undertaken to be conveyed, received, delivered or found in his possession.

To use, or attempt to use, in pre-payment of postage on any letter or mailable matter, any postage stamp which has been before used for a like purpose, subjects the offender to a penalty of not less than Ten, and not exceeding Forty dollars.

To enclose a Letter or Letters, or any Writing calculated to serve the purpose of a Letter, in a Parcel posted for the Parcel Post, or in a

Packet of Samples or Patterns, posted to pass at sample rates, or in a newspaper, posted to pass at a newspaper rate, (except in the case of Publishers' accounts receipts,) subjects the offender to a penalty of not less than Ten and not exceeding Forty dollars.

SUGGESTIONS TO THE PUBLIC.

Facility will be given to the Post Office in the discharge of its daily duties, and greater security afforded to the Public, by careful attention to the following recommendations:

Post all letters and newspapers, &c., as early as practicable, especially when sent in large numbers. Early posting.

When a number of newspapers are addressed to the same office, put them up in one parcel. Newspapers.

When a number of circulars are posted, tie them up in a bundle, with the addresses all in one direction. Circulars.

Address letters, papers, &c., in a legible and complete manner, always giving the name of the Post Office; and if there be more than one Post Office of that name, the name of the county in which situated. In case of letters going abroad, the name of the country as well as of the town and city, should be given in full. Letters, for example, intended for London, England, is simply addressed "London," would be forwarded to London, Canada West, and thus be delayed. Address.

Should it be desired to send a letter or newspaper by any particular line of Packets or by any particular route, the special address should be clearly written *above* the ordinary direction as "By Canadian Packet."

See that every letter, newspaper, or other packet sent by post, is securely folded and sealed. Every such packet has to be several times handled; and even when in the mail bag, is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant, it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or some other material which will not readily tear or break. Secure folding.

Fasten the covers of newspapers firmly, so as to prevent them from slipping out. Newspaper covers.

When dropping a letter or newspaper into a letter-box, always see that the packet falls into the box, and does not stick in its passage. Letter Box.

Never seal letters for the East and West Indies and other hot climates with wax. Such a practice is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury, in consequence of the melting of the wax and the adhesion of the letters to each other. In all such cases use either wafers or gum, and advise your correspondents in the country referred to to do the same. Letters for hot climates.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office, except either by means of a money-order or in a registered letter. Carefully secure every letter or packet containing money or value, first with gum and afterwards with good sealing-wax, on which make the clear impression of a seal. Letters containing money or value.

On posting a registered letter or packet, always obtain a receipt for the same at the office where posted. Registered letters.

Delayed and missing letters and papers.

When letters or papers are delayed or missing, at once communicate the fact to the Postmaster General or to the Inspector of the division in which is situated the Post Office at which the delayed or missing letters were posted. In case of a missing letter enclosing value, state the exact contents, the exact address, and the office at which posted, and the day and hour on which posted ; the name of the person by whom posted, and the name of the person by whom received at the office. In the case of a delayed letter or paper, send the cover or wrapper in an entire state, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the post marks. State also the office at which posted, and the day and hour on which posted.

Strict enquiry in cases of loss.

Trouble and loss occasionally arise out of the carelessness or dishonesty of parties employed in the Post Office service ; yet instances are not wanting in which it has been shown to the satisfaction even of the complainants, that the fault at first attributed to the Post Office, in truth rested in other quarters. Thefts by private hands, although very difficult of proof, have not unfrequently been brought to light ; and it is greatly to be desired that those who suffer loss should, in the first instance, and while the circumstances are fresh, endeavour to ascertain with the utmost precision all particulars respecting the despatch or receipt of the lost letters or papers, and lose no time in communicating this information to the Inspector. Indeed, generally speaking, it is only by careful inquiry into minute details that the offender can be detected, whether he be a servant of the Department or not.

Improvements

The Post Office is a Department which admits of constant improvement and expansion. The public, by sending to the Postmaster General, clear and correct information respecting faulty arrangements, may materially benefit the service. It must be remembered, however, that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office, must be made cautiously and with much previous consideration.

Time is generally required to carry out any material change in postal arrangements ; for even when decided upon, old contracts, requiring notice of termination, may have to be got rid off, and tenders for new contracts invited by public advertisement, before the decision can take effect.

New post offices.

New Post Offices are established by the Department wherever it is ascertained that a sufficient number of inhabitants can be accommodated, and a sufficient amount of postal revenue collected to warrant such a measure. When a new Post Office is required, a petition should be addressed to the Postmaster General, signed by as many of the inhabitants as can conveniently subscribe the same. The petition should state the name of the township and the number of the lot and concession on which it is desired the office should be established ; the distance from the neighbouring offices ; whether at the site of the proposed Post Office there is a village ; the number of mills, stores, taverns, and houses thereat ; the extent of the settlement to be served and the probable cost of the mail service together with any other facts which may form any ground for granting the accommodation applied for.

Dear Sir,—I have this day examined Engines 76 and 78, the engines which were
furnished with the "Anti-Incrustator," on the 19th of December last. On applying the
instrument, the flues were coated with scale over one-eighth of an inch in thickness.
We have taken a flue out of each engine, and find the scale entirely removed, and the
boiler perfectly clean. I have also taken a flue out of engine 89, of the same class, and
employed in the same service, and find a full one-eighth of an inch of scale, and the
inside of the boiler in condition similar to that of the other two engines, previous to
the application of the instrument. I consider the fact as fully established, that the
"Anti-Incrustator" will not only prevent the accumulation of scale on the boiler
but will remove that already formed in old boilers.

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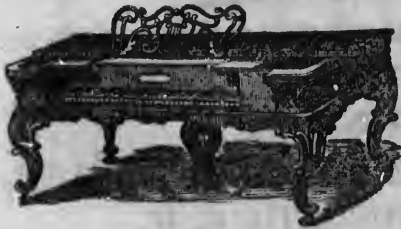
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
