Upwards of half a century has elapsed since the French aid was given;—the French people consists naw of other generations: their toretathers, our after, have disappeared from the stage of life, and not a few of those who first advised and zealously served the alliance, were either guillottned, or perished in exile, in the first years of the French revolution; the King, who was acknowledged as our chief benefactor, expired on the books: France underweat a thorough physical, moral and political change.

History has sectled the point that the attachment to our cause did not originate with the mass of the French people, who, from their intellectual and social condition, were necessarily passive; it began with the court politicians, and was diffused from the court circles, as far as it could be, throughout the nation. Dr. Franklin thought that more acknowledgment was due to Louis XVI, directly, than to any other quarter. Louis possessed absolute power; he concurred in the policy of his immediate counselers, withacknowledgment was due to Louis XVI. directly, than to any other quarter. Louis possessed absolute power; he concurred in the policy of his mmediate counsellers, without consulting the nation; he yielded to the sympathies of the Lafayettes, the Lameths, the Sigurs, and the higher noblesse and military order.
