To this result this Council have come with strong regrets. They are reluctant to part with one so able, so faithful, genial and extensively useful, in the work of the Christian Ministry. They feel that they are henceforth to be in their respective fields of labor without Counsellor whose advice has always enlightened, and with- out a friend whose sympathy has always cheered them in hours of uncertainty and sorrow.

Hayes to the churches of Christ as thoroughly competent and devoted christian pastor, and every way qualified for accomplishing a great work in the Kingdom of the Redeemer. This Church and Society, in parting with such a pastor, who has been so kind, affectionate and faithful for so many years, are not only grieved, but they must have some one to take his place, and they have decided to call a pastor.

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South Weymouth. Mr. Editor.—This South Weymouth has the reputation of being the dullest part of the town. Our friends outside tell us we are "slow," "lack enterprise," and one particular locality is called "Sleepy Hollow." I am not disposed to deny entirely, the "Soft impeachment." It is a fact, that about some things our people are "eminently conservative," but it is no less true that we are not so lifeless as some persons represent. Florida Memorial. 20th Anniversary of the Landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth.

Mr. Editor: Dear Sir—To those of your readers who were unable to attend the great Memorial gathering at Plymouth on the 21st inst. (For Details see page 10) it cannot be uninteresting to receive a brief sketch of the celebration.

At quarter before nine, on the morning of the day, a well appointed excursion train started from the Old Colony depot, Boston, for the field of operations. This train had aboard about the most respectable crowd of people who have ever been our pleasure to see together.

On the arrival of the train at Plymouth, we were greeted by crowds of citizens and strangers who had come to celebrate the day. The first thing we saw was a new and striking looking town, old fashioned, of course, but having been the cradle where a nation was rocked in its infancy, to the lullaby of the "breaking waves," it is all the better for that.

At about noon we were fairly settled in the church. The music was all that could be desired. The sublime passages of Revelation calling God to defend, sustain and succor the devotee, the lonely, the persecuted and then answered from heaven by "I will not leave thee nor forsake thee," sounded like the shout of an army in answer to the bugle call, surrounded and filled with memories as we were, of the martyrs who had there "fought the good fight."

The oration by Hon. Robert C. Winthrop was as good as a sermon, and four times as much of it. Starting with a description of the highest praise to the Pilgrims that more than taxed his highest powers of exclamation, he very soon landed, and struck bottom on the legitimate subject before him.

After earnest, devout prayer by Rev. J. E. Thompson, of New York, and singing of the magnificent hymn by Bryant, the services closed with the benediction.

MANAKATO, BLUE EARTH COUNTY, MINN., Dec. 16, 1870.

Mr. Editor—Perish the introduction to you Rev. Amos G. Williams, Episcopalian, a pastor in Blue Earth County, Minnesota.

Mr. Editor: For more than five hundred years the city of Venice was the pride and glory of sunny Italy; but now she has expired upon a pile of ruins, and her principal remains are the fragments of a once magnificent city.

Venice is indeed built in the sea, or Gulf of Venice, and is about three miles from the main land, to which it is connected by a single railroad bridge.

There is however much left to admire, and interest one in this grand city. The most beautiful building in Venice is the Basilica di Santa Maria della Salute, where the chief magistrates were originally crowned, with its wealth of pictures, history, and great hall.

Manakato is situated on the right or south bank of the Minnesota river, at the point of intersection of the Blue Earth river. The ground gradually recedes from the bottom distance of about a mile, when it strikes a series of elevations, the altitudes, or approaches to which are broken by benches or tables, averaging some 40 rods in width, and the summit reaching an altitude of 250 or 300 feet above the sea level.
