HEAVY CROPPER . . . REDWIN took the severe cold of
last winter with no damage and bore a heavy crop this year.
Tests run here at the nursery lead us to believe that the
chilling requirement of REDWIN is between 700 and 800
hours for both leaf and flower buds. REDWIN is self-fertile.

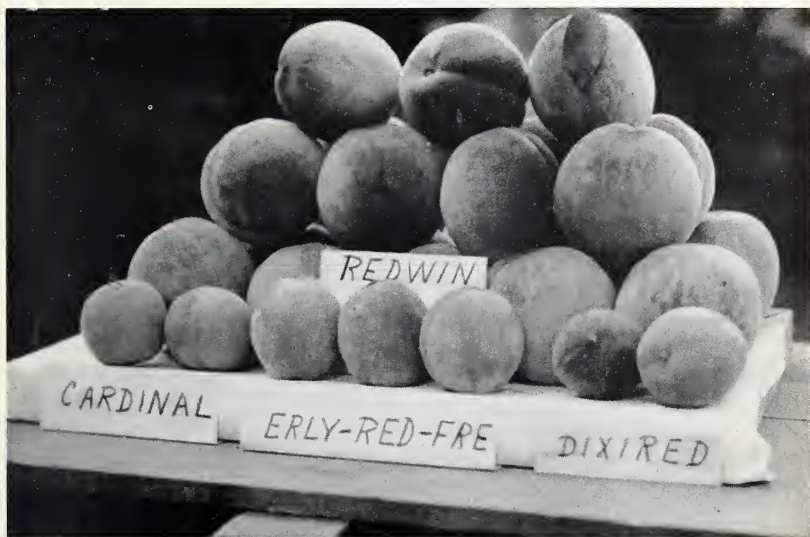

We are pleased to show this startling picture comparing REDWIN with three other outstanding early market peach varieties. The REDWIN fruits are shown directly above the label in the upper part of the picture and the Cardinal, Erly-Red-Fre, and Dixired fruits are directly above their respective labels also. All of these peaches were picked from the same orchard on the same day, June 18, 1957 at Hammonton, N. J. At that time some REDWIN were tree ripe and picking could have been started several days earlier if desired with good color in abundance. The size of the fruits shown is representative of the orchard average for the varieties shown on that date.

We firmly believe this new peach, REDWIN, should be tried in all areas where ERLY-RED-FRE has been grown successfully.

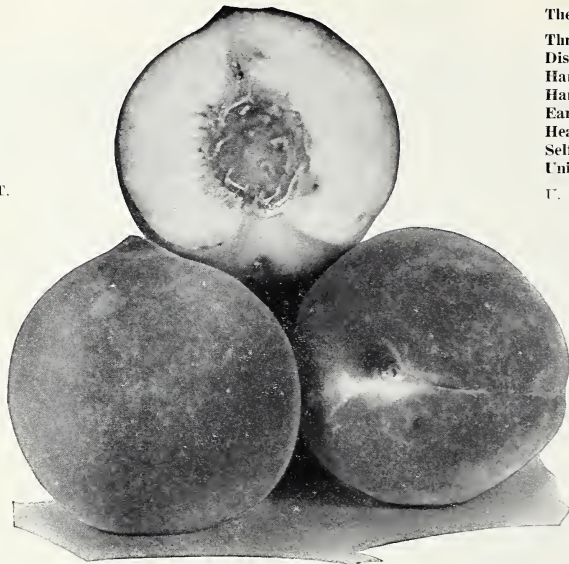

In all our experience as Nurserymen and Horticulturists, never have we seen a new peach with such wide adaptability and prove so universally satisfactory to grower and consumer, excepting possibly the famous Elberta.

The Erly-Red-Fre originated as a chance seedling in the orchard of Wm. Perry near Chase City, Va. We first saw the peach in 1935 and the second generation trees bore fruit of the same type two years later. The fruits are highly colored being an attractive red on a creamy white background. The skin is tough and medium thick. The flesh is such that it does not show bruises through the skin for several days and is white all the way through to the pit. It has one of the smallest pits of any cultivated peach. Fruit size is large for such an early peach, some specimens weighing 12 ounces. The entire crop can be packed at 25¢ and up if desired under normal conditions. The tree is very vigorous, resistant to bacterial spot, and bears very young.

The Erly-Red-Fre ripens uniformly, does not show bruises readily and will keep and ship better than Elberta. It is definitely the first ripening frees-tone peach now in commercial cultivation.

There is a place in every grower's program for the Erly-Red-Fre. Whether you are a large commercial grower or a smaller one depending on local or nearby markets, Erly-Red-Fre is a proven money maker. This great peach can withstand extremely low temperature both in the bud and blossom and still come through with a fine profitable crop. It has also come back from delayed dormancy trouble and hurricane damage to produce outstanding crops. Its inherent resistance to disease make it one of the easiest trees to manage.

RICHHAVEN

Outstanding New Variety

Recommended For Test In All Areas

Originated in South Haven, Michigan, Richhaven gives promise of replacing the Hale Haven variety. Fruits are large, uniform in size and shape. Color a bright red bluish with stripes of red and gold, lay over a bright golden ground color. Fuzz is unnoticeable and an unusually thick, tough skin adds to its handling and shipping ability. Flesh is a clear yellow with moderate redding around the pit. Entirely a freestone when ripe. Ripens with Hale Haven or fourteen days before Elberta.

BLAKE (N.J. 117)

Widely planted in New Jersey and some other areas and seems to have grower and consumer approval. Named from the late Dr. M. A. Blake of the N. J. Experimental Station. Fruits are medium to large, very highly colored with attractive red over good yellow ground color. It is a freestone, having considerable red about the pit and extending to the flesh in some cases. Flesh is very firm and of excellent flavor. Trees are good growers, ranks with Elberta in hardness of bud and tree. The size, its bright attractive red coloring and season of ripening should make the Blake a desirable peach to precede Elberta.

SUNHAVEN

NEW INTRODUCTION

This Amazing New Peach Should Have A Place In Your Plantings

Result of cross made in South Haven, Michigan by Stanley Johnston in 1944. Matures ten days earlier than Red Haven. Fruit is large in size, nearly round and uniform in shape. Color much like Red Haven, largely bright red with stone ground color for attractive contrast. Fruits keep and handle unusually well for such an early maturing variety. Flesh clear yellow, fine textured, firm, of good flavor and resistant to browning. A partial cling until fully ripe. Trees are large, vigorous, and productive. Recommended for an early fresh market variety.

REDCAP

A Southland-Dixired cross formerly tested as FV 121-58. Ripens just before Dixired and resembles Dixired very much. A clingstone, medium size, round, with light pubescence, attractive red bluish covers most of the peach. The flesh is yellow, firm but melting, medium textured and good flavor. Trees are moderately vigorous and productive. Blossoms are small petaled and self-fertile, opening with Southland. Buds only require 750 hours chilling requirements to break rest period like Hiley, Southland and Hiland. Tested mostly in Georgia, this variety shows real merit and should prove especially valuable where short rest periods are a factor. We have observed this variety for several years and can recommend it highly. A U.S.D.A. introduction.

CARDINAL

Introduced and Released by U. S. D. A. During Summer 1951

Cardinal is a seedling of Halehaven selfed and formerly tested as FV 101. Ripens four days ahead of Dixired, more than two weeks before Jubilee. Fruits are clingstone, medium size, round, light pubescence. Well covered with attractive red bluish over good yellow ground color. Flesh is yellow, firm, medium textured and good flavor. About size of Dixired, also in color, appearance and firmness. Blossoms medium sized, self fertile and open about with Elberta. Chilling requirements about 900 hours. Should succeed anywhere Dixired can be grown and has advantage of being earlier. We recommend this peach from what we have seen of it in past several years and where low chilling requirements are not a great factor as its quality and appearance will make it popular in many sections.

RANGER

A fine looking yellow freestone peach ripening with or just after Golden Jubilee, formerly tested as 1312100 and a seedling of Kariton Rose selfed. Medium to large size, almost round, with light pubescence, highly colored with bright red bluish covering most of peach. Flesh yellow, medium firm, medium textured, good flavor and suitable for canning or freezing. Tree is vigorous and productive showing marked resistance to bacterial leaf spot. Blossoms medium sized, self fertile, usually open after Elberta. Ranger has been tested in Md., S. C., Ga., Tex., W. Va., and Dela. and should prove valuable in the central peach areas for local or commercial markets. This is a U. S. D. A. introduction.

REDHAVEN

Now A Tried and Proven Winner of Its Season.

Among the best for its season. Beautiful color, firmness, high quality, good consumer demand add popularity for this peach.



REDHAVEN is a cross between Halehaven and Kalhaven. We first observed this variety in 1939 and had our first fruits here in our test orchards in 1941. It colors a brilliant red and beautiful yellow. Skin is smooth, almost fuzzless, resembling J. H. Hale in color, skin and flesh. Flesh is very firm. Tree is vigorous with heavy bud set and bears young. Fruits medium sized and well filled when ready to pick, suture being rather prominent until peach approaches picking period. Growers may be inclined to pick too early because of good color and should watch this and when trees set too heavy, thinning should be practiced to increase size of the fruits. Trees are proving satisfactory in test plantings over a wide area.

It seems to be a few days later than Fisher; the flesh however is more firm and gives indication of being a good commercial peach to ripen before Golden Jubilee. We recommend applying fertilizer in early November or very early Spring on these early ripening types to help the early development of the fruits, also thinning should be practiced on Redhaven and Fisher when a heavy crop is set.

SUNRISE (N.J. 133)

This peach has been planted widely in N. J. and is proving very satisfactory as an early yellow fleshed peach ripening before Jerseyland. Fruits are well colored, semi-firm, good size and trees are resistant to bacterial spot. Fruits are firm and nicely colored. It overlaps on Goldray.

CORONET

Formerly tested as FV 126-79, CORONET resulted from a cross between a seedling of Hale Haven selfed and Dixigem. Tested and released by U. S. D. A. June 1953.

CORONET ripens 2 to 3 days earlier than Dixigem or just before Redhaven. The fruit is medium size, highly colored, yellow fleshed tending to stick to pit when not fully ripe but a freestone when ripe. Bright, attractive red bluish over good yellow ground color. Firm, smooth textured, very good but mild flavor. Coronet trees are vigorous and productive. Blossoms are small-petaled, self-fertile, chilling requirement about 800 hours or a little less than Elberta. This is a fine looking peach and a challenge to Redhaven in many areas, especially in southern peach sections and may replace Dixigem.

HILAND (2) A highly colored, yellow clingstone peach from a cross between Southland and a seedling of Hilley by Hale Haven. Ripens just before Cardinal or 5 days before Dixired. Blossoms large, opening just after Hilley. Buds require about 750 hours chilling. Tested mostly in the Southern states. Vigorous and productive. Fruits medium size, ovate, light pubescence, attractively colored, with light red blush at shipping time. Flesh yellow, fairly firm, medium textured, and of good flavor. Recommended for areas of low chilling requirement.

REDCAP (2a) See page 7 for full description.

CARDINAL (2b) See page 7 for full description.

DIXIRED (2c) Dixired, a product of the U.S.D.A., is a clingstone, medium size, round with light pubescence. About three-fourths of the surface is covered with a bright attractive red blush. Flesh is yellow, firm but melting, medium textured and of good flavor. The outstanding characteristics of Dixired are its unusual firmness and slow rate of softening for an early peach, plus an attractive appearance. The fruit acquires color long before it is ready to pick. Dixired is recommended for trial as an early shipping peach.

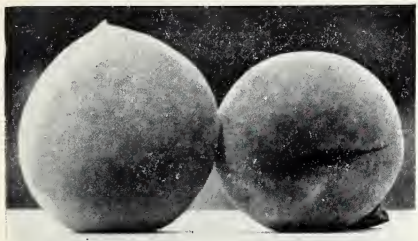
GOLDRAY (2e)

A NEW BUD SPORT OF THE FAMOUS GOLDEN JUBILEE PEACH. RIPENING TWO WEEKS EARLIER
INTRODUCED BY BOUNTIFUL RIDGE NURSERIES
SPRING 1950

First observed by us during fruiting season of 1939 on the fruit farms of J. Roy Cunningham, Lancaster, South Carolina, the original planting being made from Bountiful Ridge grown trees.

THE SIZE, BEAUTY, QUALITY AND GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS WERE SO OUTSTANDING, RIPENING SO MUCH EARLIER THAN THE BALANCE OF THE GOLDEN JUBILEE TREE, WE FELT IT WOULD BE A REAL POSITIVE. We began testing the variety, and we are glad that it has proven even better than anticipated and we now pass it on to the patrons of Bountiful Ridge Nurseries with a sense of pride.

GOLDRAY fruits are as large or larger than regular Jubilee. The quality is equal to Golden Jubilee. Goldray has a beautiful bright red blush on a real golden background. Goldray will cling to pit when not fully ripe and like regular Jubilee has a tender skin and flesh, being more adapted for home use, roadside markets and nearby commercial markets. **GOLDRAY TREES** are very vigorous, making a heavy set of buds which in our tests have proven as hardy or more hardy than regular Jubilee, resulting in very regular crop. **PLANT GOLDRAY AND STEP UP YOUR GOLDEN JUBILEE SEASON.**



GOLDGEN (N. J. 197) (4b) An attractive yellow-fleshed peach ripening with Golden Jubilee. It is firmer than Jubilee and the color is similar to Newday.

THE FAIRHAVEN PEACH (4c)

Recommended for trial to lengthen Golden Jubilee Season and precede Halehaven.

Fairhaven is a cross between J. H. Hale and South Haven. Trees have shown no weakness to date and are vigorous and productive.

Fairhaven has the same tendency for heavy fruit setting as Halehaven and Redhaven. Fruits of Fairhaven are medium to large, round, bright golden color with attractive red check.

Skin smooth and tough. Fruit firm and ships well. The flesh is medium yellow with moderate amount of red around the pit, moderately fine textured and good flavor. It resists browning which is of great advantage in processing. A freestone.

RANGER (4d)

The **CORONET** peach. This is one for the grower to watch when considering early peaches. It is proving to be a mighty fine peach.

SUNRISE (2f) See page 7 for full description.

EARLY EAST (N. J. 134) (2g)

By popular demand we add the Early East to our peach list because of its behavior in certain fruit areas. It is medium to large, yellow fleshed, ripening about 10 days before Golden Jubilee. The fruit attains an attractive red color and fair edible quality. It is hardy and productive. Ships well and is recommended for home and commercial plantings. Flesh clings to pit when hard ripe but becomes free when fruit ripens.

SUNHAVEN (2h) See full description page 7.

JERSEYLAND (N. J. 135) (3a)

Introduced by the N. J. Peach Council as an early, large, firm, attractive yellow-fleshed freestone, ripening a few days before Golden Jubilee. It hangs well to the tree and is an excellent shipper. Tree is hardy, sets fruit buds freely and comes into bearing early. Recommended for trial in sections where early peaches are profitable.

THIS VARIETY HAS BEEN MARKETED AND IS CALLED BEAUTY GEM BY MANY GROWERS IN THE SOUTHERN REGIONS.

CORONET (3b) See full description page 7.

DIXIGEM (3c) Ripens several days ahead of the Golden Jubilee or about with Fisher and Redhaven. The fruit is medium size, ovate with light pubescence and a bright, attractive red blush covering about half the surface. The ground color is a bright yellow. The flesh is yellow, medium to firm, having a fine texture and excellent flavor. It is almost a freestone when fully ripe and is usually semi-free at shipping stage.

The trees of Dixigem have been vigorous and productive, sometimes requiring thinning of fruit, but generally do not tend to overbear. While Dixigem has mostly been fruited in Georgia and other nearby southern states, its characteristics of early ripening season, good size, near freestone, high quality, attractive appearance and good tree growth, recommend it for trial as an early yellow shipping variety for all peach growing sections.

REDHAVEN (3d) See page 7 for full description.

CUMBERLAND (4) The tree is a vigorous grower. The fruit is attractively colored with red, oval in shape. The flesh is white, almost free. Ripens just before Carman. Cumberland continues to gain in popularity in all peach sections.

GOLDEN JUBILEE (4a)

No general planting of Peaches is Complete Without A Liberal Amount of Golden Jubilee Trees. See Color Illustration inside Front Cover Page.

A development of the New Jersey Experiment Station, first offered by us during Fall shipping season of 1928. The Golden Jubilee is a second generation seedling of the Elberta crossed with the Greensboro. The tree is unusually hardy. The buds resist low winter temperatures better than Elberta and open later than Elberta which insures a regular crop. The blossoms are self fertile. The peach is medium to large in size. The peach develops better if a well balanced fertilizer is used. As the tree grows older the fruit becomes firmer and develops more naturally.

KEYSTONE (5) Tested as FV 177-17, a cross of New day, Southland, released July, 1954 by U.S.D.A. Keystone ripens just ahead of Triogem and after Jubilee. The fruits are large, highly colored, round light pubescence, bright golden ground color. Flesh is yellow, firm, smooth texture and of good flavor, and a freestone. Trees are vigorous and productive where tested, with less bacterial spot than Southland or Elberta. Blossoms are small-petaled, self fertile, opening about with Southland, requires 750 chilling hours to break rest period. Keystone would seem to be especially well adapted to the Southern Peach area.

TRIOGEM (N. J. 70) (5a) An early, oval red all over, firm, yellow freestone peach ripening usually about two days after Golden Jubilee or 20-25 days before Elberta. The trees are medium in size, hardy and heavy bearers. Trees require good soil and good culture for best results.

For the past several years Triogem has fruited over a wide area and has gained in popularity due to heavy yields and good marketing traits. Hardiness of tree has been another factor for its increased popularity. It is well to remember however the tree needs heavy feeding and a good spray program for best results.

FAIR BEAUTY (5b)

HARDINESS—GREAT BEAUTY—HIGH QUALITY

Tree vigorous, spreading, very hardy in bud, often producing a crop when other varieties are winter killed. Fruit is medium to large in size, a deep golden yellow blushed with bright red, the flesh is firm, tender, melting and juicy. Fruit hangs exceptionally well to tree and when full ripe is a perfect freestone, clinging slightly when the peach is hard ripe, an excellent market and canning peach.

COLORA PEACH (5c)

An Outstanding Hardy, Early, Yellow Freestone Peach. High Color, Superb Quality, Size and Hardiness Are Reasons Why You Should Plant Colora. Introduced in 1936.

Our own introduction of a new frost resistant, yellow freestone peach. Second generation trees as well as the original branch have withstood temperatures during the past winters of about 17 degrees below zero, when most other varieties such as Elberta, Hiley Belle, Belle of Georgia, Early Elberta and J. H. Hale were wiped out by these low temperatures. The peach is an attractive yellow, freestone, well-colored and of excellent quality, ripening just after Golden Jubilee.

Despite the fact that competition from other varieties ripening in the same season the Colora peach continues to gain in popularity in many sections of the country and we have sold out on trees early each year in spite of increased production.

VEDETTE (5d)

A product of the Vineland Experimental Station, Canada, proving unusually well adapted in the various peach growing sections of the United States. A seedling of Elberta resembling that variety in color and type of flesh but is more globular in shape, more highly colored, and of finer quality. The fruit is yellow fleshed, freestone. The tree is vigorous, very hardy, and is very productive.

NEWDAY (N. J. 79) (5e) A large, oval, yellow-fleshed peach which begins to ripen a few days after Triogem. The tree is somewhat more vigorous and the fruit averages larger which makes the variety somewhat easier to grow for market. The fruit is showy, firm in texture and hangs to the tree well.

The growers demand we again grow and list this variety. It is a good one for many sections.



GOLDEN GLOBE (N.J. 73) (5f)

Where the market demands a large peach this variety meets that demand. It is a very large, showy yellow peach of delicious flavor. Fruit hangs well to the tree. The tree is vigorous, upright and spreading. Fruit buds are somewhat tender under certain conditions. Usually a freestone.

SUNHIGH (N.J. 82) (6) A large, red, bright smooth peach, which colors well all over before it ripens, softens slowly, making it a good commercial peach. Flesh inclines to adhere to the pit when hard, ripens but is generally freestone. The tree is spreading in growth and the dormant buds are hardy. The variety seems to do best in hilly sections and requires thorough summer spraying.

SOUTHLAND (6a)

A promising new yellow fleshed variety that looks very good to precede Halehaven. Don't miss out on this one.

The Southland has lived up to all predictions made for it. New Yellow Fleshed variety ripening in Hiley Season. Released by the U.S.D.A. July, 1946, and tested under No. FV 4-155. Southland is a seedling of Halehaven selfed. It ripens about with Hiley or 16 days before Elberta. The fruit is a freestone, medium to large size, round and has little fuzz. The color is attractive with a light-red blush covering about half the peach at shipping ripe stage. The flesh is yellow, firm, slow softening, medium textured, good flavor. The tree is vigorous and productive, blossoms large and self fertile.

HILEY BELLE (6b) Like Elberta the Hiley Belle continues to hold a place which is unique in the peach world and its popularity is unquestioned. It is a medium size white freestone peach of Georgia Belle type, ripening two weeks earlier or about with Halehaven.

Because of its fine quality and flavor, plus beauty of color it has been planted commercially and in home orchards for many years.

LORING (7) Originated by the Missouri State Experiment Station at Mountain Grove, Mo. Resembles Golden Jubilee in color and shape, however, is much firmer and does not soften at the suture or tip. A large firm yellow fleshed freestone with attractive bright color of red and yellow over a yellow ground color. Ripens about two weeks ahead of Elberta.

JULY ELBERTA (Burnett Elberta) (7a)

A large, medium early freestone peach ripening with or slightly before Halehaven.

The fruit has a golden yellow color, over-spread with red, which is most attractive. It can be picked for shipping about four days before ripening due to early color. The quality is excellent for canning and fresh eating. It shows better than average results when frozen. The variety does well in all peach sections.

REDGLOBE (7b) Released by the U.S.D.A. 1954. Ripens 15 days before Elberta. Fruits large round with light pubescence. Skin is highly colored with red over a good yellow ground color. A freestone and complete absence of red in the flesh makes it an outstanding canning peach. Very good quality. Chilling requirements about same as Elberta. Blossoms are large and self-fertile. Widely tested and very promising.

RICHHAVEN (7c) See full description page 7.

The tree is a strong thrifty grower, resistant to common peach diseases, the fruit is large, oval shaped like a well grown J. H. Hale, it has a good tough skin, the flesh of the peach being of such texture that it will not bruise easily and best of all it has a beautiful red color that at once attracts the buyer and a flavor that is as good as the very best. SOUTH HAVEN (7e) One of the earlier introductions of the South Haven Experimental Station. Very hardy in bud, good growing tree, large fruits of excellent quality and a freestone. Not so well adapted to long distance shipping but hard to beat for roadstand and nearby markets. Golden yellow, meaty, delicious.

JULY HEATH (Othelle Cling) (7f)

A large to very large white cling, ripening latter part of Hale Haven season, and before Elberta, coming to us from Kentucky and very highly recommended by the Kentucky Experimental Station. A beautiful peach, strong growing tree and hardy in bud. Very high in quality. We can heartily recommend this peach to anyone desiring a white cling peach for all purposes. Sometimes called July or Summer Cling.

GOLDEN EAST (N.J. 87) (7g) A large oval firm, highly colored, yellow-fleshed peach ripening with Hiley or about 15 days before Elberta. Usually a freestone. A promising variety for sites south of Central New Jersey where favorable elevations, soil and climate prevail. The tree is upright, spreading and vigorous. The dormant buds are medium in hardness. Worthy of trial in all sections.

VETERAN (8) A cross between Vaughn and Early Elberta; of Canadian origin. The fruit is large, oval shaped like a well grown J. H. Hale, it is like Elberta in quality. Ripens several days before Vedette.

ECLIPSE (8a) A self-pollinated seedling from Georgia Belle. A dark red, yellow-fleshed freestone peach of firm texture and good flavor, ripens with Hiley. Tree is very vigorous. The fruit is oval in shape, flesh fine grained and an excellent shipper; hangs well to the tree and can be harvested over a long period.

CHAMPION (8b) By popular demand we restore this variety to our list because of demand for a fine white peach in this season. The fruit is large, quite regular, yellowish-white mottled with red on sunny side; flesh white with red at pit. Very hardy. Freestone.

SULLIVAN'S EARLY ELBERTA (9)

Leads The Early Elberta Season

It is proving to be well adapted to the entire Central peach growing areas as well as Southern peach states.

The variety, found as a bud sport in the orchard of Mr. J. P. Sullivan at Zebulon, Ga. The tree and fruit characteristics were found to be identical with Elberta. Sullivan's Early Elberta is being planted extensively throughout Georgia and adjoining states. Our trees are propagated from the original strain.

It ripens ahead of the regular Early Elberta and Belle of Georgia. It averages a large size, extra fine quality and shows good shipping ability. We have long needed a good commercial peach to fill this ripening time. Sullivan's Early Elberta has real possibilities and we recommend it highly.

POPPY (9a) Introduced by Missouri Exp. Station resulting from a cross of Frank by Hale Haven. Its ripening season is eight days before Elberta. The fruits are large, shaped like Elberta, seems to size well with heavy crop. Poppy has an attractive red color, coloring well before peach is ripe. Fruits are firm, yellow-fleshed, freestone of fine texture and flavor. A good shipping peach. Its season and general characteristics are such that it should have a place in most orchards.

REDCREST (N. J. 126) (9b) A large, attractive, yellow-fleshed freestone ripening about a week before Elberta. The skin color is a beautiful crimson red which resembles Sunhigh. The quality is supreme, flesh golden yellow, firm and juicy. Tree is productive and a vigorous grower. Redcrest is what is known as an airfree peach.

BLAKE (9c) See full description page 7.

EARLY ELBERTA (10)

A Great Commercial Peach Ripening Just Before Regular Elberta. The Genuine Gleason Strain.

A great commercial peach in the Central and Northern peach producing areas where the markets are not too distant and quality is a decided factor. One of the most beautiful of the Elberta type peaches. Large, attractive, colored, yellow-fleshed, freestone peach ripening with Belle of Georgia or from 3 to 8 days before the regular Elberta. The highest quality peach of all the Elberta types grown commercially. The trees are hardy, thrifty and bear consistently. The deep lemon yellow colored skin blushed with bright red makes it very attractive and the peach retains a beautiful golden yellow color after being canned. SUMMERCREST (N. J. 94) (10a)

A large, oval freestone peach of fine quality, ripening with Georgia Belle. The flesh is deep golden yellow, melting and sweet. Tree is exceptionally vigorous, requiring light soil and very little nitrogen. Summercrest is hardy as J. H. Hale and adapted to regions having a climate similar to central and southern New Jersey.

It is a freestone of exceptional quality, with a keen peachy taste, juicy and aromatic. The color is a beautiful white overlaid with a rich red blush. Recommended to all growers who wish an exceptional white peach in Elberta season.

AMBERGEM (10d)

A comparatively new canning peach with clear yellow flesh and very high quality, having good red blush. Ripens mid-season, large and a cling stone. Trees very thrifty. Buds are resistant to frost injury and a heavy bearer. The commercial canners favorite.

REDSKIN (11)

A New Introduction by University of Maryland Experimental Station (Bred and Tested as Md. 1-15).

The Redskin peach is a product of the Maryland University Experiment Station and is the result of a cross between Hale and Elberta. It ripens slightly ahead or with Elberta. The tree is vigorous, fast growing and productive. Wood is hardy and the buds survived the low winter temperatures of 1942-43 along with the hardest varieties indicating that it is very bud hardy. The fruit of the Redskin is round, yellow-flesh with little or no color near the pit. It is a complete freestone, firm flesh of excellent shipping quality, well colored with a deep red blush covering the fruit even when ripening under shady conditions. In taste, it is aromatic, firm and sweet. Due to the firmness, it is rated high for canning. Fruit develops good size even with heavy load on trees.

Without question, the greatest commercial peach ever introduced. It has proven its ability to adapt itself to varied climatic and soil conditions throughout the U. S. and Canada. Whether the climate is hot or cold, whether the soil is light sandy or heavy clay, Elberta can be depended on to give you fine results. There is no prettier peach when grown under ideal conditions.

The tree is hardy, disease resistant, very thrifty and very productive under most conditions. The fruit is large to very large, freestone, skin of deep golden yellow and highly colored. The skin is tough and the flesh, while tender and juicy, is of such texture that the ELBERTA IS FAMOUS FOR ITS ABILITY TO CARRY TO DISTANT MARKETS. The quality is classed as good, and the slight bitter flavor is preferred by many. It is estimated that 50% of all peaches planted are Elberta. As improved types and varieties are introduced this ratio is lower but after all is said, ELBERTA STILL REMAINS THE WORLD'S LEADING COMMERCIAL PEACH. We are propagating our Elberta trees from selected orchards of great bearing records and to the old original type Elberta.

J. H. HALE (11b)

A description will hardly do justice to this fine variety. In size it is one-third to one-half larger than the Elberta and is more highly colored. The skin is deep crimson, smooth tight, and almost without fuzz. Flesh is golden yellow, firm and has a most delicious flavor. The pit separates easily from the flesh. It is exceptionally valuable as a commercial peach owing to its unusual keeping qualities. Will ship nearly as well as an apple. Fruit ripens a few days before and with the Elberta but it will hang on the tree longer. Your planting is incomplete without it. Note—The J. H. Hale does not have an entirely perfect bloom, and to get the best results it should be planted with some other variety.

WHITE HALE (N.J. 63) (11c) A large white fleshed freestone of good quality, ripening with J. H. Hale. Tree is vigorous. A fine white fleshed peach to follow Belle of Georgia.

AFTERGLOW (N.J. 84) (12) Usually ripens 3 to 5 days after Elberta, therefore, often meets good, strong markets. Fruits are large, round, oval in shape and almost completely over-spread with red. The flesh is yellow stained with red about the pit and is free. The trees are vigorous and rapid growers, the fruit buds appear more hardy than J. H. Hale where observed. Recommended for trial in most districts.

SHIPPERS LATE RED (12a)

(Bountiful Strain)

Best of the Hale type Shippers Late Red. A Large, Productive, Handsome peach recommended to follow Elberta. Brings high prices.

A very large, very highly colored attractive red, yellow fleshed freestone and good quality peach of distinct Hale type. Ripens just after Elberta and J. H. Hale. A good shipping peach, extremely productive. Very hardy and its beauty and size enables it to bring top prices on the markets. This splendid variety should be planted more extensively as we know of no variety we can recommend more highly for a peach to follow the Elberta.

Much confusion exists regarding the various strains of this variety. We are growing the true type as determined by comparison with fruit in U. S. D. A. test orchards, which is known as the Hale type.

GAGE ELBERTA (12b)

MR. PLANTER: Don't pass up Gage, it has everything a peach should have— size, quality and beauty.

A Disease Resistant Bud Sport of the Famous Elberta Peach, Which We Recommend Highly.

Recommended for resistance to bacterium pruni. The tree grows as thrifty as the Elberta and looks much like the old time Elberta. Gage Elberta blooms two to four days after Elberta and apparently has a very strong blossom setting a crop of fruit under unfavorable conditions. The fruit is so near like the Elberta that only an expert can distinguish the difference. Ripens two to three days later than Elberta.

THE BRACKETT PEACH (12c)

ONE OF THE BEST VARIETIES TO FOLLOW ELBERTA AND IT IS PROVING A GREAT COMMERCIAL PEACH.

This is a comparatively new variety in some sections, but has been tried and proven one of the most profitable peaches in the South and Central areas. Its season is about five days after Elberta, with a beautiful orange-yellow skin tinged with earmine. Flesh is a deep yellow and much lighter flavored than Elberta. This peach sizes up well under heavy crops and is equal to Elberta as a shipper. A perfect freestone and a real peach.

Flesh very firm, being slightly tinged with red about the pit but red does not extend into the golden yellow flesh. Originating at Sussex, N. J., well up in the Mountains where many varieties of peaches fail to stand the climatic conditions, should recommend GEMMERS as a hardy variety both in tree and bud.

RIO-OSO-GEM (13a)

Generally recognized as one of the better peaches ripening after Elberta.

LIZZIE (14)

SIZE — FIRMNESS — FINE COLOR — EXCELLENT QUALITY COMBINE TO MAKE THIS PEACH A FAVORITE TO FOLLOW GEMMERS LATE ELBERTA.

The origin of this peach has not been fully determined yet. It has been very successfully grown by commercial orchardists in N. J., Conn., and in several Southern states. It is a distinct Elberta type peach, large, freestone having a fine yellow flesh and the peach ripens very slowly after being taken off the tree. It ripens from 12 to 16 days after Elberta, colors over with a handsome red over a deep yellow undertone. The tree is thrifty, hardy, heavy bearer of regular crops. Some growers consider it the best of our present list of real late peaches.

AUTUMN (N.J. 145) (15)

CONSIDERED ONE OF THE BEST VERY LATE VARIETIES

The latest, large, yellow freestone ripening fully fourteen days after Elberta. Later than Late Crawford, or Rio-Oso-Gem. The tree is a very vigorous grower and should be planted on well-drained good peach soil. For the grower who wishes good size, high quality fruit for road side stand or nearby markets, Autumn fills the bill.

Blueberries require an acid soil containing an abundance of peat or other partially rotted vegetable matter. They need a moderate supply of soil-moisture, and good drainage.

Where natural blueberry soil is not available, ideal conditions can be created by mixing with the surface soil a liberal quantity of peat moss or partially rotted leaves or sawdust or chip dirt from an old woodpile.

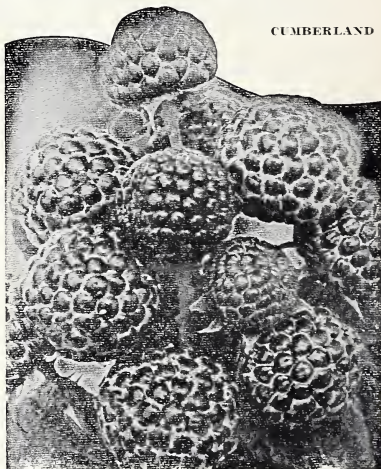

VIRUS FREE PLANTS

Virus Free plants have had a great deal of publicity in recent years and it is well for the planter to have a better understanding of the meaning of VIRUS FREE PLANTS. Plants infected with virus are often abnormally yellow, stunted, are poor runner and berry producers, or more often exhibit a combination of the symptoms. Virus free foundation stock was attained only after a complex system of indexing was devised to determine the presence of one or more of the strawberry viruses. The virus free strains can be continued by controlling the vector, an aphid, with applications of parathion 1% (dust or spray) every 14 days from May to frost at the rate of 20 pounds of dust (or a proportionate amount of spray) per acre. However, the fact that virus free plants are used does not eliminate the effects of other diseases and insects already known to the plant grower, many of which are also controlled by following the above dusting or spray program.

We at Bountiful Ridge are maintaining a dusting schedule on our plants, growing in fumigated soil for the control of nematodes, and using a chlorodane additive in our fertilizer in order to give you, our customer, the best possible stock available for your planting needs.

The varieties listed in this catalog as VIRUS FREE have been grown from VIRUS FREE FOUNDATION STOCK and cared for as listed above. These plants will carry a tag issued by the MARYLAND STATE HORTICULTURAL DEPARTMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND AS BEING REGISTERED AND ALL VIRUS FREE. Strawberry Culture

1. **Location, Soil and Preparation.** Adequate soil moisture is essential to growing good strawberries; whether the type soil selected holds moisture well. Also take care that the contour of the land is such that frost pockets will not form late in the spring to freeze out the blossoms. Sites which are not affected by late frosts are considered the best for strawberry culture. Plow and prepare the soil the same as for truck crops. Never plant in newly plowed sod land, however, as white grub worms are always present in this type of soil and will do a lot of damage to the plants after being set. The soil should be high in humus for best results. Rye and crimson clover make splendid crops to turn under as a natural humus soil builder. However, in using these, the land should be plowed far enough ahead so that cover crops have time enough to decay before the plants are set.

2. **Time To Plant.** In the Southern states from November to April is considered the best time for planting. March and April in the Central states, and for the Northern states, April and May the best time. We cannot too strongly urge early planting. Set the plants just as soon as the ground is workable in the spring. Should a cold snap follow, it will not damage the plants if they are properly set, and by setting early the plants will grow better and be more productive in every way.

3. **Distance To Plant.** We recommend that strawberry plants be planted in rows 3 1/2 - 4 feet apart, spacing the plants 15 - 30 inches apart in the row, depending on the variety. Everbearing varieties should be planted 12-16 inches apart. For planting in rows 3 1/2 feet apart and 18 inches apart in the rows, it requires 3,000 plants per acre and in rows 4 feet apart and 18 inches apart in the row it requires 7,200 plants per acre.

4. **Care of Plants on Arrival.** Set plants immediately on arrival, if possible. However, if it is not convenient to do so, the plants should be removed from the package and dipped in water to allow roots to plump up before setting. If the plants become dried out in transit, they should be placed in water up to the crowns for at least 3 hours. When this is done the plants should be set as soon as possible after being taken from the water, but in no case should the tops of the plant be wet when being set if the sun is shining, because very often the tops will scald and damage the plants materially. If you are not able to plant immediately after the plants are watered, place the plants where they will be kept cool and cover the plants with moss; or dig a V-shaped trench, open the bundles, distribute the plants evenly in the trench, and cover them even with the surface of the ground and firm the soil. In this manner they can be held until such time as you are able to plant.

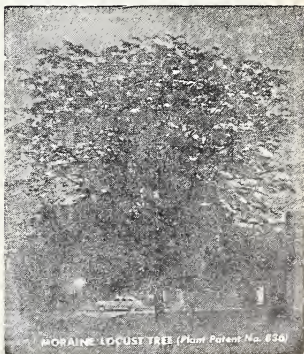

The prices quoted herein are for shipping season Fall 1957 and Spring 1958. However, all prices as listed in this catalogue will be effective until our new catalogue or price list is printed for Fall 1958, Spring 1959.

PLEASE NOTE — Any Sales Tax which may be imposed on nursery stock by State or Federal authority should be added to the amount of your order. You will be advised of any changes or additions which may be made when orders are acknowledged.

OUR SHIPPING SEASON

We pack and ship all through the winter to Southern States. Our regular shipping and packing season usually starts about the 15th of October and continues until May 10. Our fall shipping season opens about October 1st on some items.

OUR TERMS

Our terms are cash except in large orders when satisfactory reference is given; then one-third the amount of the order must be sent and the balance on arrival of trees at depot.
