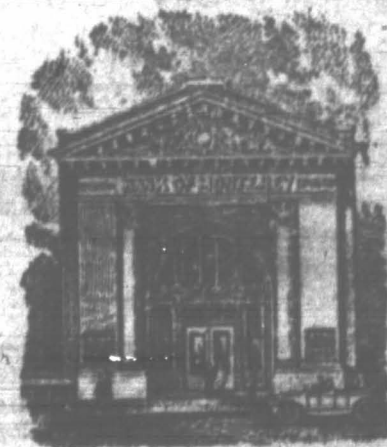

War Stamps on Sale at Local Postoffice

What's the Matter With Carmel?

So far, only a very few of the stamps have been sold in Carmel. Don't let us lag behind other communities, where heavy sales are reported.

The war savings certificate campaign was inaugurated throughout the country Monday morning. It is one of the most vital undertakings of the government since the war began.

In its broadest aspects it contemplates that a hundred million persons shall invest \$20 each during the coming twelve months—save it and loan it to the government at interest.

The plan is very simple. Beginning next Monday there will be placed on sale at postoffices and other public places two varieties of stamps—War Savings stamps of the denomination of \$5, selling for \$4.12, and Thrift stamps, selling at 25 cents.

The purchaser of a War Savings stamp obtains the promise of the government to pay \$5 at the end of five years, or on January 1, 1923.

A Thrift stamp purchaser waits until he has acquired sixteen 25-cent stamps, amounting to \$4, whereupon he exchanges the card upon which they are pasted at any of the places where the stamps are on sale and receive one of the War Saving stamps upon payment of 12 cents.

The purchaser of a War Savings stamp at \$4.12 is given a war-savings certificate, to which may be affixed twenty of the same stamps. This certificate will bear his name and address.

The plan provides that no one may buy more than \$100 worth of the War Saving Stamps at one time, and no one is allowed to own over \$1000 worth in all.

Those of small or moderate means should embrace this opportunity to assist the government. Even children may purchase the 25-cent stamps.

By order of the postmaster general, letters, postcards and printed matter mailed in the United States for transmission to the United States expeditionary forces in Europe will be accepted at ordinary domestic postage rates.

The United States is on the eve of a great, well-organized campaign to put the saloon completely and permanently out of business.

The normal anti-saloon sentiment throughout the country is augmented and encouraged by the conceded fact that there is no single factor in our national life that so tends to retard the purposes of the government today as the liquor interests.

Young men are being called by the million for military service; appeals are made to the householders of the nation to economize; our children must buy thrift stamps.

The saloon, indefensible at any time, is in war time a source of great food waste and weakening man-power and manhood. Right now it is undermining the country's labor efficiency.

Those not in uniform are under as deep obligation as are those in uniform. Saloons are denied to the man in uniform, for his sake and for the country's sake. No reasoning man or woman will gainsay the wisdom or patriotism of such a course. Then why not enlist the rest of the nation in this shut-down on inefficiency and waste?

Ohio's recent near-victory and the "dry" wins in the important cities of Los Angeles and San Jose are signs of the times.

The saloon is doomed.

Our Weekly Recipe

STEAMED PUDDING AND CHOCOLATE SAUCE

One teaspoonful of soda dissolved in a cupful of sour milk, one-half cupful of molasses, one teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of shortening, two rounded cupfuls of flour, raisins and spice. Steam one and one-half hours.

Sauce: One cupful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of flour, pinch of salt. Mix dry and pour on one pint of boiling water. Mix two tablespoonfuls of cocoa with one-half cupful of milk and add to sauce. Stir and cook well.

Bret Harte's Visit to Anthony Froude

Having put the affairs of the Consular office [at Cresfield, Prussia] upon a proper footing, Bret Harte returned to England about the middle of August [1878] for a short vacation, which proved, however, to be rather a long one. His particular object was a visit to James Anthony Froude, at his house in Devonshire. Bret Harte had great admiration for Froude's writings.

From Froude's home Bret Harte wrote to his wife as follows:

"Imagine, if you can, something between Locksley Hall and the High Walled Garden, where Maud used to walk, and you have some idea of this graceful English home. I look from my windows down upon the exquisite lawns and terraces, all sloping toward the sea wall, and then down upon the blue

I walk out on the long, high garden, past terraces looking over the ruins of an old feudal castle, and I can scarcely believe I am not reading an English novel.

"To heighten the absurdity, when I return to my room I am confronted by the inscription on the door, 'Lord Devon' (for this is the property of the Earl of Devon, and I occupy his favorite room). Froude is a connection of the Earl's, and has hired the house for the summer.

"But Froude—dear old noble fellow—is splendid. I love him more than I ever did in America. He is great, broad, manly, democratic in the best sense of the word, scorning all sycophancy and meanness, accepting all that is around him, yet more proud of his literary profession than of his kinship with these people whom he quietly controls. There are only a few literary men like him here, but they are kings. So far I've avoided seeing any company here; but Froude and I walk and walk, and talk and talk." — Henry Childs Merwin's "Life of Bret Harte"
