My dear bro. Phelps;

I am a "poor hand" to improve such occasions. I am so sorely pressed every day with business, which must be done; & withal, I have so poor an opinion of such a writer as "Somerset", that I can hardly persuade myself to notice his paragraphs.

I am sick of the Liberator. "I have seen an end of all inspection." Mr. Boyle, I believe, we had an opportunity of questioning before our Presbytery; & I doubt, whether any reid could be found any where, which could have uttered more absurd nonsense.
