I have the honor to enclose five copies of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers Circular No. 23, dated September 13, 1949, entitled "General Personnel Regulations" for the Occupation Forces in Japan and other non-Japanese who have entered Japan by authorization of SCAP since the end of the war. The new regulations, which were promulgated by General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, on September 23, 1949, provide for considerable liberalization of the movements and activities of occupation troops and other personnel in Japan. Of interest in this connection is the official description of the purpose of the regulations, as set forth in Paragraph 2 of the enclosed circular: "to establish, in general effect, the same relationship between the occupation personnel and the indigenous population of Japan as exists between United States troops and the indigenous population of the United States..."

The principal changes effected are the removal of restrictions on travel, the placing of Japanese hotels and theatres "on limits" unless specifically designated "off limits" by local commanders for "cogent reasons", and removal of the ban on sales or gifts to Japanese nationals of personal property (except automobiles and property procured from Post Exchanges of similar United States Government facilities) unless quantities or circumstances involved create a reasonable suspicion of black-market activities. Barter of personal property not of Post Exchange origin is also permitted, but yen currency can not be acquired by such a transaction with any person. Provisions are made for permitting Japanese nationals, under certain

circumstances, to attend and participate in social activities at occupation force facilities as well as to engage in sports and athletic competitions with occupation personnel.

Many of the provisions supposedly liberalizing regulations currently in effect are subject to further authorization by subordinate commands and otherwise so qualified that it has not yet become apparent to what degree restrictions will actually be relaxed. Much publicity has been given to scheduled sport events between such groups as the Economic and Scientific Section of GHQ and the Japanese Ministry of International Trade and Industry, and between the Civil Information and Education Section and the Japanese Ministry of Education. It has not been possible, however, to find an instance of any occupation club, either for officers or enlisted men, having yet been authorized under the new regulations to permit attendance of Japanese guests. At least one occupation force club in Tokyo (of a unit composed largely of Nisei personnel) has permitted Japanese guests since the early days of the Occupation.

The placing of Japanese hotels "on limits" to occupation personnel eliminates a regulation which had long been subject to widespread violation. Except for foreign mission personnel in Japan who are, by the terms of the circular, given blanket authorization to use hotel facilities, the provision concerning hotels appears subject to complete freedom of interpretation on the part of local commanders. It may be mentioned that certain Japanese hotel owners and managers have in the past preferred that their establishments be "off limits" apparently fearing damage to fragile Japanese walls and furniture from occupation troops. Moreover, it is more lucrative for hotels to entertain Japanese guests, who obtain their food and drink on the spot, than to entertain occupation personnel who theoretically at least must carry their own food supplies.

It appears from the wording of the regulations that permission for occupation personnel to utilize Japanese hotels was granted largely on the theory that such personnel would spend Japanese currency legally acquired with dollars. Whether such is the case remains to be determined, particularly when barter of personal property is simultaneously authorized. Notwithstanding the prohibition by past and present regulations of acquisition of Japanese currency by occupation personnel except through exchange of acceptable foreign currency at approved agencies, such as Army finance offices and foreign-operated banks in Japan, many occupation personnel have preferred to acquire such currency by selling merchandise (available to them and otherwise unavailable to the Japanese) or by exchanging dollar instruments through unauthorized channels at a favorable rate. It may therefore be questioned whether the revision in regulations to permit use of Japanese hotels will increase significantly the amount

of foreign currency legally exchanged for Japanese currency.

In March, 1949, this Mission, as the Diplomatic Section of GHQ, addressed an intra-headquarters communication to the G-1 (Personnel) Section, recommending that foreign mission members in Japan be exempted from "off-limits" restrictions on Japanese theatres and hotels, and that travel restrictions on mission members be eased. Following its consideration of this communication, G-1 indicated that it was studying the possibility of removing such restrictions, not for mission personnel only, but for all occupation personnel. The G-1 Section subsequently submitted for the consideration of this Mission a proposed revision which included minor relaxations of restrictions. It is believed that the continued efforts of this Mission to secure more nearly normal conditions for foreign mission personnel in Japan contributed in a not inconsiderable degree to the present relaxation of regulations. It is reported also that Under Secretary of the Army Voorhees, on his recent visit to Japan, questioned the necessity of general "off-limits" restrictions such as those affecting about half the city of Yokohama, as well as all hotels and theatres.

In summary, it may be said that the changes brought about by the new regulations (and introduced by lengthy press releases and other publicity about democratizing influences and friendly interest and guidance) fall into two classes: those such as placing hotels on limits and permitting gifts and barter which recognize a situation which had existed in spite of regulations to the contrary and which the occupation authorities were powerless to change; and those such as the provisions for permitting guests in occupation facilities, which require further "implementing legislation" in order to have any significance. The significance of the new regulations lies not so much in the specific changes in particular rules as in the new attitude which is set forth, in rather striking language, in the opening paragraph. The present circular marks the first major attempt at a general relaxation of regulations controlling the relations between the occupation forces and the population of Japan.

SCAP's circular 23 of September 13 is the first major attempt at a general relaxation of regulations controlling relations between the occupation forces and the Japanese population. Restrictions have been removed on travel; Japanese hotels and theatres are no longer off-limits (unless local commands so specify); bans on sales and gifts to Japanese have been lifted, including barter; and social activities between Japanese and occupationnaires may now flourish.

Permission for occupation personnel to use Japanese hotels was based largely on the theory that the personnel would spend Japanese currency legally acquired with dollars. It is doubtful, however, that this will add significantly to Japan's foreign exchange because payment is often made by barter of cigarettes, canned goods, etc. or by yen acquired on the black market.

POLAD claims to have taken a leading role in urging the release of circular 23.



Dear Niles:

In your letter of September 22 you raised the question of a possible maneuver by which the YOSHIDA Government might attempt to transfer responsibility for the plight of government enterprise workers to the Occupation.

We have looked into the matter and believe there is no cause for concern over the moves which you refer to as having been discussed by Mr. HEPLER and Mr. AMIS in letters to Mr. SULLIVAN. The proposal reported by Mr. Hepler (that present restrictions on the labor rights of communications and other government enterprise workers be alleviated) came from the Labor Policy Bureau of the Ministry of Labor. It was brought to Hepler apparently in hope of gaining his support, lacking which it seems to have died. As far as we have ascertained, it was not espoused by the Labor Minister, was not discussed by the Cabinet, and has not seen the light of day.

The proposal reported by Amis covered prefectural and local but not national government enterprise workers. There was considerable justification for this proposal. The local public service bill drafted by the Local Autonomy Agency restricted the labor, political, and organizational rights of local government enterprise employees far more than the national pattern established by the Public Corporations Labor Relations Law for national government enterprise employees. It now appears that the Local Autonomy Agency's draft will be extensively reworked under the guidance of the SCAP sections concerned and that a separate bill governing local government enterprise workers, patterned after the Public Corporations Labor Relations Law, will emerge.

I see little likelihood of a maneuver by the Yoshida Government to make a play for labor support by the means Hepler suggested. The Yoshida Government and the Democratic Liberal Party are still largely leaving it to the Socialist and Communist Parties to champion labor interests. The Labor Policy Bureau of the Ministry of Labor feels that the Government should adopt a more conciliatory policy toward labor in order to encourage the emerging moderate leadership, to stay the spreading apathy among the rank and file toward their unions, and to check the growing political hostility toward the Government among moderate labor elements. However I see no evidence as yet of the Government's adopting such a view. Even if it did, and sought to restore the collective bargaining rights of telecommunication workers or the right to strike of government enterprise workers, it would run up against the firm position taken by General MacARTHUR and Headquarters. Under such circumstances, a political gesture such as Hepler suggested probably would not be worth the candle, at least for the foreseeable future.

The FEC complication is one which we shall bear in mind if any such maneuver appears over the horizon, which we do not expect. Stopping leftist (and particularly communist) labor is so much a matter of conviction with Yoshida that trickiness by him in derogation of that conviction would be a surprise to us.

In continuation of my despatches nos. 298, 391, and 477, dated respectively May 10, June 16, and July 22, 1949, on the above subject, I have the honor to enclose two sets of the Catalog of Directives to the Japanese Government (in two volumes, covering SCAPINS 1 to 2048, inclusive), and of the Catalog of Administrative Directives (SCAPIN-A's) to the Japanese Government (in four volumes, covering SCAPIN-A's 1 to 6747, inclusive). Each Catalog is accompanied by a list of corrections and additions to September 27, 1949, as well as by a list of rescinded Directives as of September 21, 1949.

The catalogs are in loose-leaf form. Amendments to them will be forwarded to the Department from time to time as they are received.

Supplementary to these catalogs and their accompanying lists, there is enclosed a statistical summary of SCAPINS and SCAPIN-A's, prepared by the SCAPIN Coordination Group, Statistics and Reports Section of General Headquarters, giving a breakdown of the number of directives issued by each section of General Headquarters to September 30, 1949.

The data indicated above have been obtained with the thought that they might be helpful in presenting a statistical indication of the relaxation of Occupation controls, by showing the number of directives issued, in the form of SCAPINS and SCAPIN-A's, in relation to the number rescinded. For example, from September 2, 1945,

to the end of August 1949, a total of 2,348 SCAPINS and 7,126 SCAPIN-A's had been issued, of which totals 389 SCAPINS and 152 SCAPIN-A's had been rescinded, proportions of approximately 16 per cent and 2 per cent, respectively. Mindful, however, that many of these instructions are one-time directives, most of which remain unrescinded despite completed action, it will be seen that the percentage figures given above bear little relation to the facts of the case. The picture is further distorted in that the original intent to confine policy matters to SCAPINS, leaving administrative directives to SCAPIN-A's, has not been consistently followed. A statistical approach to the subject is further confused in that many policy directives have been issued in the form of direct communication memoranda, issued direct by a section chief without clearance by the Chief of Staff. While these memoranda are nominally issued under authority of a SCAPIN, a member of Statistics and Reports Section states confidentially that he knows of at least several hundred such memoranda now in effect which bear little or no relation to the authority under which they were issued. In addition, there are many verbal directives to the Japanese Government of which there is no general record.

An approach to a statistical presentation of the relaxation of controls, using SCAPINS and SCAPIN-A's as factors, could be reached if all one-time directives no longer in effect were rescinded, thus presumably leaving only those dealing with matters of continuing policy, as well as one-time directives on which action was incomplete. Despite the May 9 meeting of all chiefs of Headquarters staff sections, such procedure, requiring action by each section responsible, has not so far been generally carried out. In comparison with previous periods, the Statistics and Reports Section has observed little change since June 1949 in the pattern of issuances and rescissions of SCAPINS and SCAPIN-A's.

4/ While a statistical presentation of the control-relaxation program, at least in its present state, is difficult, as observed in this Mission's despatch no. 298, May 10, 1949, "the test will come when the various section chiefs determine which of the presently operative controls for which they are responsible can be relinquished and which must be continued, and the effectiveness of the program will be finally determined by the action taken by the Chief of Staff and, ultimately, the Supreme Commander on the various justifications submitted". That effort in this direction is continuing is shown by a check sheet on the subject, Relaxation of Controls, September 8, 1949 (copy enclosed), from the Chief of Staff to all Headquarters sections in which their chiefs were directed to ensure

that all eliminations and relaxations of controls already decided upon be made effective and not re-established, and to report by January 15, 1950, on reports, controls, and requirements eliminated or scaled down between September 8 and December 31, and on those still remaining in effect. Section chiefs were reminded at the same time of the necessity of returning to the Japanese Government those functions, now performed or closely supervised by General Headquarters, for which the former shows capacity for assuming responsibility.

2. At the meetings of the Committee with representatives of the various sections agreement was reached to eliminate or scale down a number of reports, controls and requirements. Section chiefs will insure that these eliminations and relaxations are effected and that the reports, controls, and requirements involved are not re-established.

3. Section chiefs are reminded that relaxation of controls is a continuing program. As the Japanese Government and its agencies demonstrate capacity for assuming responsibility for additional functions now performed, or closely supervised by this headquarters, those functions must be returned to it. Section chiefs are responsible for initiating such action within their respective spheres of interest.

4. A report will be required from each section by 15 January 1950 indicating the reports, controls, and requirements eliminated or scaled down during the period from date of this checknote to 31 December 1949 and those still remaining in effect. Those referred to in paragraph 2, above, will not be included.

Dear John:

Since my letter to you of September 3, 1949, we have continued to devote considerable thought and discussion to the question of the status and organization of our Mission here, having in mind both the special circumstances and requirements of the remaining period under the Occupation and the eventual needs of a normal mission structure. We have been fortunate in having Foreign Service Inspector Taylor here during the past few weeks, as we have thus been able to enjoy the benefit of his views and suggestions on this subject.

In discussing the suggestion of a transfer of liaison functions and the consequent division of staff contained in my previous letter, we have found that the drawbacks and obstacles to such a move have seemed to grow larger and the advantages to assume correspondingly smaller proportions in our calculations. We accordingly now feel, and Mr. Taylor concurs, that for the immediate future we should abandon any idea of an outwardly apparent reorganization and place the main emphasis on internal adjustments within the Mission. Inasmuch as the principal obstruction to our performing many normal mission functions has been the constant and almost total preoccupation of the staff with Headquarters matters, we have for some time believed that, irrespective of any other organizational developments, it would be desirable to relieve the permanent sections of the Mission (notably the political and economic) of all Headquarters or "Diplomatic Section" functions and to concentrate those functions in so far as possible in the International Liaison Division. We have already taken steps in this direction, seeking to the extent possible to free the political and economic officers for more constructive work in the form of reporting and of planning the organization and development of their respective sections in the eventual

Embassy. This naturally entails some increase in the staff of the Liaison Division to the detriment of the other divisions, but it will at least enable the limited personnel remaining in the latter to devote a reasonable share of their time and energies to relatively normal mission work. In this way we hope to increase the quality and quantity of our present reporting and lay the groundwork for the full development of the reporting sections with the arrival of additional personnel.

Another factor that requires consideration in any contemplation of an independent status for the Political Adviser is the technical question of accreditation to the Supreme Commander. In so far as I am aware, no such formal accreditation exists at present; I am merely assigned to Tokyo and would have no authority to exist or function as an "independent" mission. Were I to be made "independent", I would presumably continue to act as the Supreme Commander's Deputy as Chairman and United States Member on the Allied Council for Japan, but would have no other standing in the absence of an accreditation to the Supreme Commander. While this situation could be met by my being accredited to SCAP, any move in this direction would probably raise questions and possibly create discord at a time when SCAP-Headquarters control functions are being rapidly reduced and a peace conference is presumably in sight. I doubt, therefore, whether it would be worth-while at this stage to start tinkering with the status of our Mission as regards its general relationship with Headquarters.

With the foregoing in mind, and pending the receipt of the Department's views or suggestions, we are accordingly now making such internal readjustments within the Mission as we consider will contribute to our ready convertibility into a normal mission, presumably an Embassy. At the same time as we are endeavoring to segregate and concentrate all of our liaison and other Headquarters functions in the International Liaison Division, we are also seeking to maximize our assistance to General Headquarters in the way of political advisory functions and to begin carrying out the normal functions of being, as you suggested, the eyes, ears and mouth of the Department of State in Japan.
