#### THIRD YEAR.

Reading—Watson's Independent Sixth. Arithmetic—Sanford's Common School completed. Grammar—Reed and Kellogg's Graded Lessons completed. Geography—Monteith's Comprehensive completed. Spelling—Watson's Independent completed.

#### NORMAL DEPARTMENT.

#### JUNIOR CLASS.

First Term.-Elocution, Etymology, Grammar, Arithmetic and History of the United States.

Second Term.-Elocution, Etymology, Grammar, Arithmetic and History of the United States completed.

Third Term.-Elocution, Etymology, Grammar, Composition, Physiology and Hygeine.

#### MIDDLE CLASS.

First Term.—Composition, Ancient History, Physiology and Hygeine and Algebra.

Second Term.—Latin, Ancient History, Natural Philosophy, Algebra. ThirdTerm.—Latin, Algebra, Arithmetic reviewed,

Third Term.—Latin, Algebra, Arithmetic reviewed, Grammar reviewed.

#### SENIOR CLASS.

First Term.-Latin, Algebra, Rhetoric, Astronomy. Second Term.-Latin, Rhetoric, Book Keeping, School Economy.

Third Term.-Latin, Rhetoric, Botany, Theory and Practice of Teaching.

Writing and Drawing exercises and Vocal Music in all the classes throughout the course.

Lectures on History, Biography, Pedagogics and topics of the day will be delivered by the Principal and others during the session.

# FAYETTEVILLE STATE COLORED NORMAL SCHOOL.

This institution was established by the State of North Carolina, in 1877, for the training of teachers for the colored schools of the State. It receives an annual appropriation of two thousand dollars from the State.

Since the establishment of the School four hundred and twenty-two different pupils have been admitted. Of these sixty-five have received certificates or diplomas upon the completion of the entire course of study prescribed.

#### LOCATION.

The school is located at Fayetteville, on the Cape Fear River. Fayetteville is a very healthy and pleasant town, and is easily accessible by steamer from Wilmington, and by the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railway from Greensboro via Sanford, where connection is made with the Raleigh and Augusta Rail Road. Also by the southern extension of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railway to Shoe Heel, where connection is made with the Carolina Central Rail Road.

The school is taught in a large and commodious building, well adapted to the purpose, and furnished free of rent by the colored people of Fayetteville.

#### MANAGEMENT.

The management of the school is vested in the Principal and the Local Board of Managers, who are appointed by the State Board of Education.

#### CONDITIONS OF MEMBERSHIP.

Every applicant for admission must present sufficient evidence of good moral character, and pass a satisfactory examination in Reading, Spelling, Writing, and the fundamental Rules of Arithmetic (as far as Fractions) to enter the lowest class. For the higher grades proportionately higher scholarship will be required.

Each student must promise, upon becoming a member of the school, to observe the Rules and Regulations of the school; to take good care of the books furnished for his use, and to return the same, in good order, before leaving school; and, also, to teach in the public schools of the State for three years, as far as practicable.

#### EXPENSES, AID, ETC.

Tuition is free to all residents of the State. The books required are furnished from the school library without charge.

Board, including lodging, fuel, lights and washing, can be procured in private families at reasonable prices.

Students will be received at any time, but are especially requested to enter, if possible, at the beginning of either the Fall, Winter or Spring term. The examinations held at those times will enable the teachers to properly classify the candidates for admission.

#### DISCIPLINE.

Students are required to conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen. They are treated with confidence from the first, and the effort is made to govern rather by the law of mutual respect than by severer methods of discipline. Students must attend school regularly unless prevented by imperative necessity. A daily record of attendance and deportment is kept, and any student who falls below a certain percentage is dropped from the roll.

The use of intoxicating liquors, tobacco, profane or ungentlemanly language is positively forbidden.

Parents or guardians who desire it will be furnished with a monthly written report of the deportment and scholarship of students.

Students are liable to be suspended or expelled at any time for violation of the rules, or for unsatisfactory conduct in any respect.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

Oral and Written Examinations of all the students will be held during the first week of each term, and Public Examination and Exhibition annually, at the close of the session.

#### CERTIFICATES.

Students who complete the course of study prescribed for the third year, and whose deportment, while members of the school, has been satisfactory, will receive certificates of recommendation as teachers for Public Schools. Those who complete the studies of the Junior and Middle years will be entitled to receive certificates of higher grade. Those who complete the prescribed course will be entitled to Diplomas or Certificates.

In all cases males must be at least eighteen and females sixteen years of age before receiving teacher's certificate of any grade.

#### LIBRARY, APPARATUS, ETC.

The School has a small but well-selected Library, and is supplied with the necessary Maps and Globes, Musical, Historical and Writing Charts; and, in addition to these, a set of apparatus for the illustration of Physics or Natural Philosophy.

#### SOCIETIES.

The Normal Literary Society, which meets Friday evening of each week, and the Normal Band of Hope (Temp.,) which meets monthly, are Societies formed among the students, and subject to their own control, under the supervision of the teachers. They are excellent means for drill in parliamentary usage and business habits.

#### NON-SECTARIAN.

This School is not conducted in the interest of any religious denomination or any political party. The teachers belong to different churches, and students, while expected to attend some church, are allowed to make their own choice. All the leading denominations are represented by churches in the town.

#### GENERAL REMARKS.

The Normal School is open to inspection at all times, and teachers and friends of education are cordially invited to visit it at their convenience.

We hope to profit greatly by their criticisms, favorable or unfavorable. We are advocates of progress, and hold ourselves in readiness to alter or amend our system whenever it can be done to advantage.
