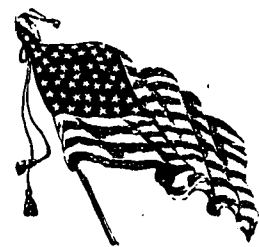




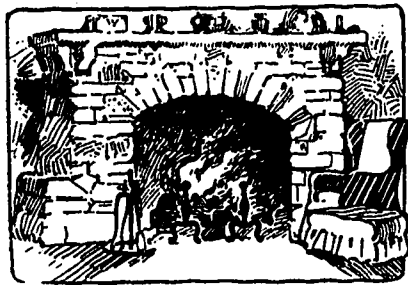

BIG PATRIOTIC PARADE SCHEDULED FOR NARBERTH NEXT THURSDAY, THE 17TH

The town of Narberth is overflowing with enthusiasm for Uncle Sam and the outcome of which will be a big town patriotic parade on Thursday night, May 17.

At a committee meeting of the parade officials held in the secretary's office of the Y. M. C. A., the following plans were adopted:

Parade formation—The town officer will lead the parade with the Burgess, Hon. George M. Henry as marshal and as his aides he will be assisted by a Civil War veteran, who will represent the past war veterans; Mr. James Cook, of the enlisted men; Mr. Edward S. Haws, postmaster and of the Home Defense Guards; Mr. Arthur Cole, of the Boy Scouts.

The various units will form in line as above with Boy Scouts' Band following in after the enlisted men.

These units will form on Haverford avenue facing Forrest avenue and extend down Haverford avenue and north on Narberth avenue.

The Narberth High School will form on Windsor avenue and extend to Essex avenue and north on Essex avenue.

The fire department will be in readiness to fall in behind the Boy Scouts when that unit passes the fire house.

The various units will form in line as above indicated with the exception of the automobiles which are requested to fall in line with appropriate decorations on Essex avenue, facing Windsor and fall in after the school unit.

An open invitation is extended to all the population of the town to fall in line after the above united have started.

Line of march as follows: From Haverford and Forrest avenues north on Forrest avenue to Windsor, Windsor to Iona, Iona to Woodbine, Woodbine to Narberth, Narberth to Wayne, Wayne to Essex, Essex to Windsor, Windsor to Conway, Conway to Haverford, Haverford on to Narberth, thence to the south side by continuing on Narberth to Woodside, Woodside to Merion, Merion to Wynnewood, Wynnewood to Woodside, Woodside to Narberth, Narberth to Haverford, Haverford to Forrest and thence to Elm Hall.

The Narberth Y. M. C. A., under whose auspices the parade is being carried out, together with the hearty co-operation of the various units, is very grateful to announce that the parade will have as bugler Mr. Fred C. Patten, a Spanish-American War veteran of note, who will be Mr. Henry's aide and who will also sound all commands to the column by bugle.

The line of march will be supplied with torches and red fire and in this connection residents of the town are asked to swing out all their flags and illuminate their houses from 7.15 P. M. until 8.15 P. M.

At Elm Hall will be heard the best speakers to be obtained on both Y. M. C. A. work in the field with our soldier boys, not only in this country, but the world over, together with army and navy speakers.

What is the first duty of a pacifist? Echo answers, "pass a fist!"

We commend the attention of the public to the invitation of the Park Development Committee to contribute plants, trees and shrubbery for the adornment of Narbrook.

Mr. Edward W. Bok, of Merion, has given \$3000 to Philadelphia Central Y. M. C. A., to put up a building for the boys in training camp. Another gentleman has given \$2000 for its equipment. This is part of the quota of \$100,000 to be contributed by the Central Y. M. C. A.

A generous response should be made to the appeal made by our local Y. M. C. A. to Narberth citizens, for contributions to help maintain Y. M. C. A. work in our Army and Navy. These are times when we must all go the limit in doing our share to help our boys to live up to the ideals that have been set before them in their homes. The great majority of us cannot do field service. We must make up for this by giving our financial support.

If our young men are left to their own resources, while in training camps or at the front, or in the Navy, they will be much more in danger from the temptations of camp life, than if

surrounded by the uplifting influences of such an organization as the Y. M. C. A. This fact is appreciated by the Government, and every facility will be afforded to further the work. But the Government has no funds for this purpose. They must be supplied by private subscription, and every locality where there is a branch is expected to do its share. The Central Powers and the Allies have recognized the great value of this work, and have done all in their power to encourage it. Let us not be backward. Let every citizen turn out Thursday evening of this week, at the great Y. M. C. A. demonstration, and pledge liberal support to the cause.

SENIOR TRIP!

Thursday morning at 6.30, speeded by Mr. McCarter with five boxes of candy we, the Seniors, started on our motor trip.

We passed through Pottstown, Annapolis, Reading and spent the night at Harrisburg. Next morning we spent a very profitable time in the capitol, library and museum.

Then we had the opportunity and pleasure of lunching at the Carlisle Indian School. We arrived at a very interesting time, for we saw 520 students marching on the campus. Under the guidance of Miss Johnson, the girls' outing agent and a woman whom we all know so well, and Mr. Francis, the superintendent, we passed three and one half hours going through the Industrial and Academic departments of this school and renewing our acquaintance with girls who have formerly been in Narberth. Upon request, Mr. Melchior spoke a few helpful words to the Senior class.

From Carlisle, we ran over to Chambersburg and stopped at Wilson College, where we took Marion Haws by surprise.

Then, at sunset, traveling through the most beautiful scenery of the trip, we went to Gettysburg where we spent the night.

Saturday morning, under the direction of a guide, we viewed the battlefield, National cemetery, Jennie Wade house and other points of interest. It was a delightful time in the year to visit this historic place, as the Judas and Dog Wood trees were in full bloom.

From Gettysburg, we went to Lititz by way of York, Columbia and Lancaster. Here we saw Linden Hall, the second oldest girls' private school in America and enjoyed real Lititz "pretzels." We stayed here overnight and disapproved the idea that country hotels are uncomfortable.

Next morning occurred one of the most enjoyable times of the trip, for then we rode to Ephrata and guided by Dr. Zerfuss, who is now chaplain of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, we went through the quaint old cloister and church. Dr. Zerfuss told us in full of the doctrine of their church and of the history connected with the cloisters and sur-

rounding buildings, the first of which was built in 1730.

From there, we cut across country to Honey Brook, then to Downingtown and arrived at Narberth at 1.30 P. M. Sunday.

On this trip we had the opportunity of visiting the following institutions not heretofore mentioned: Ursinus College, Hill School, Dickinson College, Shippensburg Normal and Gettysburg College and Seminary.

I am sure that no member of the Senior class will ever forget the four days' trip and in behalf of the class I wish to especially thank Miss McCarter and Mr. Melchior, our chaperons, for their untiring efforts and care and also all those who in any way contributed in making the trip a success.

J. D. YOWELL APPOINTED PARK SUPERINTENDENT

The Narbrook Park Development Committee has appointed Mr. Jefferson D. Yowell as superintendent of the park for the current year. Mr. Yowell will immediately see that portion of the public area that has not yet been sown to grass, and take general charge of the grounds, cut the grass, trim shrubbery, trees, etc. He has already sodded the bank adjoining the open air theatre, improving its appearance greatly. The committee and one or two of its appreciative friends, have contributed a sum of about \$200, for the planting of willow trees, rhododendrons, iris, etc., along the brook. The public is invited to contribute perennials, evergreens and other shrubs to still further beautify the park.

Narbrook park is for the enjoyment of everybody, and it is intended to make it indeed, "a thing of beauty and a joy forever." Owners of private lots within its limits are requested to clean them up, and, so far as possible, set out shrubbery and seed in grass. Mr. Yowell will make a price for doing this work for lot owners that is extremely reasonable. Let everybody join in making the park beautiful this season, and ever after.

The committee (appointed by the Civic Association at the annual meeting) decided upon a membership fee of \$2 per annum, which is to include a copy of Our Town each week. FOR YOU AND ME

The local Board of Health has received a communication from the State Health Department, which points out the need of an energetic clean up in all localities, in order to assist in the controlling of any possible epidemic of infantile paralysis that may occur this summer. There were 2000 cases in Pennsylvania between July 1, 1916, and the end of the year, with 500 deaths. The fatalities might have been much greater had not the citizens adopted the measures suggested by the State authorities and it is urged that no effort be spared to repeat, or rather redouble, those measures this season. Space does not allow us to print the full text of the Harrisburg communication, but the following extracts should be carefully noted by every resident of the borough and followed to the letter. The Board of Health is instructed to enforce these rules:

Stables—in Towns and Villages
Manure must not be allowed to accumulate in open piles. The daily contents should be placed in pits or bins tightly covered or thoroughly fly screened. It must be removed once a week from the first day of May until the last day of November. Stables must be cleansed daily.

Garbage
Garbage when kept must be placed in covered containers. The containers must be scrubbed clean with the liberal use of soap and water before refilling. It must be collected at least three times a week from May 1 until November 1; the balance of the year it must be removed often enough to permit the container being kept closed.

Rubbish and Ashes
Rubbish, and ashes mixed with rubbish, must be collected regularly and disposed of in such a way as not to cause a nuisance.

House Cleaning
All vermin, such as lice, bedbugs, roaches, flies, mosquitoes, rats and mice should be exterminated. Kennels, boxes and cages used by household pets should be frequently cleansed and disinfected, including floors, carpets, etc., used by them. Cellars should be kept clean at all times; this includes the floors, walls and ceilings. Cellars should be kept dry. Cellars should have the windows as well as all other openings for ventilation, etc., fly-screened. All houses should be thoroughly screened by the end of April and the screens kept in good condition until cold weather, or when insect life has ceased its activities.

General
Surface drainage of kitchen, laundry and bath waste water should not be permitted unless it is sprinkled over a large surface, where it will not reach a stream, and never to such an extent as to sour the ground. Where no sewer system is available, separate cess pools had better be built to receive this waste water. Streams must not be used for the dumping of sewage, garbage, ashes or rubbish of any kind. Pools of stagnant water or any mosquito breeding places should be drained. Water barrels, cisterns, etc., should be covered or screened. All highways should be treated so as to keep down dust. Street gutters should be frequently flushed out and kept free from accumulations of rubbish. Ground where manure or garbage has stood or where made foul by surface drainage should be cleaned and treated with unslaked lime. Foodstuffs exposed for sale must be protected from flies, dirt and domestic animals, and where exposed for sale on sidewalks they must be elevated above the pavement at least 24 inches. It would be well during the coming summer that children under sixteen years of age should not be allowed to congregate unnecessarily in public places.
