# U.S. DEFENSE SECRETARY SENDS CONDOLENCES ON GEN. THANH'S DEATH

SAIGON, MAY 4 (VP) - Sources from the President's Office Monday reported President Nguyen Van Thieu received on Sunday a letter from US Defense Secretary Malvin Laird who expressed his condolences on the death of Maj. Gen. Nguyen Viet Thanh, commander of the IV Corps and IV Corps Tactical Zone.

Secretary Laird said the RVN had lost an experienced military leader and outstanding combatant at the death of Lt Gen. Nguyen Viet Thanh. The supreme sacrifices of the late General was the sorrow not only for his family but also for the Vietnamese nation which is struggling for peace. (PD11)

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# RELIEF COMMITTEE COLLECTS VNS 180,000 FROM ROK DANCE TROUPE PERFORMANCES

SAIGON, MAY 4 (VP) - The Committee for Relief and Resettlement of Vietnamese from Cambodia has collected VNS 184,102 from the three performances put on by the Republic of Korea's National Dance Troupe at Thong Nhat theater, Saigon.

The first performance which took place Thursday evening with the attendance of government ranking officials and representatives of the diplomatic corps turned in the highest proceeds of over VNS 100,000.

The Committee made known that the proceeds will go to the funds for relief to Vietnamese nationals newly-repatriated from Cambodia.

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AN QUANG BUDDHIST YOUTHS OCCUPY

SAIGON MAY 4 (VP) - About 200 Buddhist Youths and students of An Quang faction occupied the Vietnam National Buddhist Shrine (VNBS) No 16 Tran Quoc Toan St, Saigon at 6 p.m. Sunday.

These youths forced 30 student monks of Quang Duc Buddhist Studies Center directed by Ven. Thich Huyen Minh, to go to An Quang Pagoda.

A number of Venerables of the VNBS Vien Hoa Dao Council had to flee away except its head, Ven. Thich Minh Thanh, who was brought to An Quang Pagoda by the occupants.

At a meeting with the press at the VNBS Monday morning, Ven. Thich Nhat Thuong, chief of the committee for recuperation of the VNBS, said he had reported the occupation of the worship facility to Ven. Thich Thien Hoa, head of the Vien Hoa Dao An Quang faction.

According to Ven. Meat Thuong, the occupation of the VNBS simed at waking up "intramsignant elements" to help them early return to Buddha's teachings.

# TALK ON ARVN DEVELOPMENT GIVEN IN LONDON

SAIGON MAY 4 (VP) - Lt Col. Cao Xuan Ve, Military Attaché at the Republic of Vietnam Embassy in Britain last week gave a talk at the Military Commentators Association headquarters in London on the development of the RVN Armed Forces in line with the redeployment of US troops from South Vietnam, sources from the RVN Embassy in London reported.

During the lecture, Lt-Col Ve also dealt with the military intervention of North Vietnam and the Vietcong in Laos and Cambodia as well as the influence of recent events on communist military facilities at the RVN-Cambodia border area.

Besides, a military columnist of the Daily Telegraph, Maj. Gen. Thompson who recently ended his observation tour of South Vietnam, praised the achievements scored by the RVN Armed Forces and said that the Communist war potential has been greatly weakened.

The lecturer also answered questions on the strength of the two sides in the battlefields, the infiltrations of NVN troops into South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos as well as measures taken by the ARVN to check these infiltrations.

Attending the talk were RVN Amb. to Britain Le Ngoc Chan, a number of former British ambassadors, general officers, military attachés, and representatives of newspapers and press agencies. (PD26)

### WORKERS URGE RMK MANAGEMENT TO RESPECT PROVISIONAL AGREEMENT

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## FOREIGN MINISTRY CLARIFIES MINISTER LAM'S

SAIGON, May 4 (VP)—The Foreign Ministry's Press and Information Directorate Monday issued a communique clarifying Foreign Minister Tran Van Lam's statement in an interview granted to an Italian newsman which appeared on the Italian daily Il Tempo and was reprinted by several Vietnamese dailies on May 2 and 3 from a AFP report.

The communique said to a question of newsman Giorgio Torchia on his impression about the French proposal on the Indochina issue, Foreign Minister Lam said when proposing international negotiations to solve the Indochinese war, France had hurriedly stated that the ultimate goal of these talks will be the neutralization of South Vietnam.

The Foreign Minister expressed the regret that such a proposal would not differ from the setting of the ploughshare in front of the buffalo.

According to Minister Lam no condition would be set before any invitation for conferences or negotiations. The problem of neutrality if pointed out, would only constitute a topic to be discussed later in the negotiation. Moreover everyone knows that at present when Communist North Vietnam is waging aggression against the Republic of Vietnam and dreaming of toppling down the constitutional government of South Vietnam by the force of arms, the

Foreign Minister Lam stressed that for the time being the key problem is that the Communists nust end their aggression to enable the restoration of peace instead of raising the neutralization of South Vietnam as a measure to solve the war. (PDI)

# 230 FOREIGN WORKERS AUTHORIZED TO STAY IN VIETNAM

SAIGON, MAY 4 (VP) - Sources from the Labor Ministry reported Monday that in the first three months of 1970, only 230 foreign workers were granted entry-visa or extension of their stay in Vietnam.

Meanwhile application for entry or extension of stay in Vietnam of 1,408 foreign employees was rejected. Besides, 1,020 workers who had their employment ended returned home, and were replaced by Vietnamese workers.

Sources from the Labor Ministry also made known that from 1967 to 1968 the number of foreign workers in Vietnam decreased from 29,529 to 24,753 (or 16 percent) and the figure of third country nationals decreased from 24,029 to 15,926 (or 33 per cent). (PD15)

2,416 TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS RECORDED IN WEEK

SAIGON, MAY 5 (VP) - During the week ending May 4, 2,416 violations of traffic regulation were recorded in the capital sources from the Traffic Police Service said Monday.

Most of the violators are motorbike riders and about 698 driving licences were temporarily withdrewn.

During the same period, 171 traffito accidents took place, causing three persons dead, 204 others injured.

The gifts presented included 748 cans of powdered milk, and 107 cans of cooking oil. (PD.27)

### CAMBODIAN ACTION COULD HASTEN U.S. REDEPLOYMENT PAPER SAYS

SAIGCN. May 4 (VP) - President Nixon's decision to clean out North Vietnamese sanctuaries in Cambodia could shorten the timetable for U.S. redeployments from South Vietnam. according to a Washington newspaper.

The Washington Evening Star said Mr. Nixon had been advised that the enemy's ability to continue a major war in South Vietnam can be crippled. If this advice is right, the timetable for orderly withdrawal will be measurably shortened. the newapaper said.

Those who have been quick to condemn the offensive as a foregone failure should hold their fire. It added. They might better spend the next six to eight weeks joining in the prayerful hope that, this time, they are wrong.

The Washington Daily News, refing that Mr. Nixon has been charged with widening the war, says, these are specious charges. He sent troops into areas in Cambodia invaded by the North Vietnamese five years ago and occupied by them since then.

By using those areas as a staging ground for attack. it was Hanoi- not us-who made Cambodia part of the Vietnam war. the News added. And Cambodia is being attacked today only because its government had the outrageous nerve to ask the North Vietnamese to go home.

We don't know whether Mr. Nixon will succeed in eliminating Hanoi's invasion bases and saving the Cambodian government, the newapaper said. But he is not wrong to try.

The Chicago Tribune wrote, 'rarely if ever has an American President displayed greater courage than Mr. Nixon did on this occasion,' adding that he made his decision amid warnings that 'it would make him a one-term President'.

The newspaper added, we believe most Americans, have the will and character to support whatever has to be done to protect the lives of our men in Vietnam until they can be withdrawn.

The Christian Science Monitor said 'the President showed great political courage, It would have been ... easier to have done nothing. But, at a time of need, the American people expect their President to act according to his conscience, not according to a political scoreboard.

The Monitor's editorial urged Mr. Nixon to keep these military moves limited in time and space, and the American people to be restrained and constructive in their reactions.

# SVN PACIFICATION PROGRAM AT WORK

#### (Part III)

SAIGON. May 5 (VP)- Without security, the rest of the pacification program cannot succeed. In Ben Soi military commanders moved swiftly to improve security conditions. The RD team, armed with light weapons set up a nighime outpost along the path usually taken by Wiet Cong infiltrators. Modern, high-powered M-16 rifles were issued to the men of the Regional Forces (RF) companies and then to the Popular Forces (PF) platoons in the area, and the resulting increase in their morale and aggressiveness was immediately evident. (&)

In June the RF launched a series of heli-mobile operations and district sweeps that forced the communists main-force units to withdraw, and the area was declared militar ly pacified—i.e. contested only by Viet Cong local-force units capable of being handled by militia forces. And in September General Do, Cao Tri, the III CTZ commander, ordered the Special Forces and the CIDG warriors they had trained—Civilian Irregular Defense Group

(&) RF and PF troops now are the military spearhead of the government's pacification campaign in the countryside. counter-infiltration troops guarding the border—to extend their area of responsibility to include Ben Soi. This was an important step, for the CIDG maintain the largest of all the forces in the immediate vicinity of Ben Soi. General Tri also made arrangements for quick-reaction help in case of an enemy attack to be provided by elements of the First Brigade of the 25th U.S. Infantry Division eight kilometers away.

The RD can be and PF militia meanwhile were busy organizing the teenagers, elderly men and other draft-ineligible males of Ben Soi irto the hamlet's own civilian combatant corps, the People's Self-Defense Forces (PSDF). Soon three PSDF platoons of 35 men each had been formed and trained, and 3 weapons were issued to them. Placed under the command of the village chief-who also commands the local PF civilians were assigned the responsibility of creating an early-warning system for the hamlet. When the three-week unit training course was completed the PSDF platoons built outposts around the hamlet perimeter to guard against infiltration. Soon they began sending out squads on night patrols, a dangerous task usually left the milities.

Boys 16 and 17 and men between 38 and 50, under Vietnam's national mobilization law, can be drafted into the PSDF, though many are volunteers. PSDF civilians are unpaid, but they get compensation if they are wounded, they and their families receive free medical care, and the family of a PSDF member killed in action receives, 10,000 piasters compensation. (The official exchange rate is 11 piasters to US\$1). Their weapons are World War II rifles and carbines as well as some shotguns, most of them reconditioned weapons turned over by RF and PF troops after they were re-outfitted with M-16 rifles. (&) odt

### Leaders Elected

With security improved, the RD team and hamlet committee members moved on to the next step in the pacification program--local elections. Candidates were persuaded to toss their hats in the ring despite the fact that local leaders are prime targets for VC assassination squads. Campaign posters appeared on trees throughout the hamlet, and RD car be with portable public-address units reamed the lanes to shout out the news of the coming balleting. Soon the people were familiar with the campaign symbols adopted by the various candidates—a palm tree, a farmer's hat a water buffalo. These symbols would appear alongside the candidates names on the ballets to assist the illiterate in marking their choices.

Late in March the people went to the polls--more than 90 percent of the eligible ovoters. They elected a village council of six members, and the councilmen then elected from their own ranks a chairman, popularly known as the village chief. Lam Van Duong, a 54-year-old rice farmer, was Ben Soi's choice. He had been appointed village chief by the pretince chief in 1966, but now he was returned to office as an elected leader of the people. Duong accepted the job despite the fact that several Tay Ninh village chiefs had been assassinated by the VC in the weeks just prior to the election.

Now Duong has more responsibilities and more authority than ever before, because in April 1960 the central government issued the latest in a series of decrees expanding the power of village chiefs and village councils and insuring them against arbitrary removal. The village chief commands the PF, PSDF and RD forces within his jurisdiction.

He and the councilmen have increased authority over budgets. taxes, land transfers, public services and internal legal matters. They are empowered to make decisions in 15 different spheres, ranging from school construction to management of village markets. And the village chief is the principal architect of the community development program to raise the people's living standards. (To be continued)

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### V.N. WAR IS THREATENING TO EXTEND ALL OVER INDOCHINA: U THANT

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)-- U.N. Secretary-General U. Thant said Sunday that the Vietnam war was threatening to extend all over In Jochina.

Reviewing the world" troubles, he told the League of Women Voters at a meeting here, "we see the tragedy of the war in Vietnam threatening to engulf the whole indochinese peninsula."

Meeting with reporters afterward, he was asked if he had any proposals on how to prevent that. He replied, "yes, I have some ideas," and added that he would include them in a statement to be issued in a few days.

He said, "I don't know how they'll be accepted."

### AUSTRALIA REPORTED POSTPONING DECISION ON CAMBODIAN REQUEST FOR ARMS

SYDNEY, May 4 (Reuter) -- The Australian government postponed for the time being any decision on a Cambodian government request for arms and other assistance, the national daily "The Australian" said today.

In a front-page story, the newspaper said the government had deliberately avoided making any decision in order not to prejudice its position at talks on the Cambodian situation due to be held in Djakarta on May 16.

For the same reason the government so far had avoided making any public statement on President Nixon's decision to send American troops into Cambodia to attack Communist position." The Australian" said.

But correspondent David Solomon said the government was expected to end it silence soon, probably in answer to questions in Parliament tomorrow.

"Cabinet is firmly convinced that Preischnt Nixon's decision to invade Cambodia was corect under the circumstances, "Solomon wrote,

"The government's unwillingness to commit itself publicly on this and on the question of supplying arms to Cambodia is a departure from a previous policy," he said.

"In previous years it has given quick public support to American decisions on the conduct of the Vietnam war, in the belief that the U.S. needed such moral support.

"This time it has decided it can achieve more by going into the Djakarta talks without any previous public commitment, so as to improve its standing and assert its independence."

#### PARIS PEACE TALKS MAY BE THREATENED BY NEW U.S. POSTURE OVER IN TOCHINA

PARIS, May 4 (Reuter) -- The tough new American posture ever Indochina makes the outlook for real negotiations at the Vietnam peace talks here appear bleaker than ever.

North Vietnam and the Viet Cong agreed to the talks as part of a deal in which the U.S. halted bombing of the North 18 months ago, Defence Secretary Melvin Laird on Saturday set out circumstarces in which he would recommend a resumption to the bombing. Unerican air action over North Vietnam on a bigger scale than anything since 1968 was also disclosed in Washington.

### PARIS PEACE ... (2)

Cbservers said that if Mr Laird's warning developed into the basis of the peace talks here would be threatened.

There is no sign that the North Vietbamese or the Viet Cong are anxious to break up the conference, but developments since the U.S.-South Vietnamese advance into Cambodia dim the prospects of progress.

Observer who have been following the conference say that Hanoi is now likely to be more convinced than ever that President Nixon is seeking military victory.

Mr Laird warned that he would urge a resumption of raids if North Vietnam launched any major action across the Demilitarised Zone into South Vietnam.

His Department also admitted that U.S. fighter bombers had struck in North Vietnam but said this was to protect reconnaissance planes, and involved no change of policy.

Hanoi was claimed that more than 100 planes have carried out two days of air strikes over North Vietnam and a New York Times report said that a large raid had been aimed at supply dumps to North Vietnam.

Hanoi has repeatedly alleged that U.S. planes attacked its territory has warned that the U.S. must bear the consequences of its action, without speciflying those consequences.

The latest raids however, appear largers than anything since 1968.

### PARIS PEACE...(2)

Hanoi's delegation to the Paris talks said Mr Laird's warning "Exposes more clearly the frenzied belligerence of the Nixon administration." But its spokesman made no reference to any effect on the peace talks.

Observers point out that the Faris talks provide a forum for Hanoi and the Viet Cong to present their views in a Western capital, giving them a means of speaking to world opinion.

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# V.C., N.V.A., RED KHMER FORCES REPORTED IN CONTROL OF CAMBODIA EAST OF MEKONG RIVER

PHNOM PENH, May. 4 (REUTER) -- Viet Cong, North Vietnamese and Red Khmer forces today appeared to be in control of virtually all of Cambodia East of the Mekong River.

This followed the capture yesterday of the East bank of the Neak Leung ferry crossing which controls Highway One to South Vietnam and the Parrot's Beak operation area where South Vietnamese forces last week crossed into Cambodia.

A military spokesman said today the Viet Cong followed a mortar barrage on Neak Leung with two human have assaults involving about 2,000 men.

Cambodian river patrol boats joined the fighting to help Army troops on the East bank.

The Viet Cong also cut Route One at Kompong Trabek to prevent reinforcements from East Svay Reing province being brought down to the ferry.

They also destroyed a bridge across a secondary road running North - South between Routes One and Seven to the only other major ferry access the Mekong at Kompong Cham.

Observers here speculated that Kompong Cham, controlling Highway Seven, could be the next target for Communist forces under pressure from U.S. and South Vietnamese forces pushing out from the Fish Hook area on the border.

Contract has been lost with government battallions on the East side of the Neak Leung ferry but some men from these were reported to have crossed the river to safety.

A 12,000 strong joint task force is sweeping the Fish Hook Salient about 100 miles Northeast of Phnom Penh just across the border from South Vietnam.

Viet Cong forces late yesterday also came close to cutting the vital Route Three linking Phnom Penh and the Port of Sihanoukville on the Gulf of Siam.

The Viet Cong attacked a government post six miles Southeast of the road at a point where it passes through a hilly region but the road was still open this morning.

This was the first attack as Far West as Kompong Speu province.

### U.S. MUNITIONS SHIP EAGLE DUE TO ARRIVE IN SAN

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3 (AP) -- The Columbia Eagle, the U.S. ammunition ship that was hijacked to Cambodia last March 14, is due to arrive Monday to go into routine quarantine at Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay.

A day out at sea the Columbia Eagle Captain, Donald V A. Swann, told a newsmen by Marine telephone Sunday that the whole experience had been incredible. If anyone should tell him that two seamen could hijack his big ship, 'I'd tell him he was nutso Swann said.

Swann has said Alvin Glatkowski, 20 ,a steward, and Clyde Mackey Jr.25, a stoker, pulled guns and took over the ship on the last leg of a voyage to Thailand.

Swann said in the interview:

They told me they would blow up the ship'.

They told him, he said, that 'this was the first in a series of mitinies' designed to 'impede the war effort in Vietnam'.

After lowering away 24 of the 39 crewmen in lifeboats, the Eagle sailed to the Cambodian Port of Sihangukville where, Swann said, he was well treated.

'They were concerned about my personal welfare and of everyone on the ship, he said.

McKay and Glatkowski were given asylum in Combodia. Two days later, the Eagle was permitted leave.

After quarantine, the Eagle is to move to Todd Shipyards, Alameda, for drydock.

## 75 DEMONSTRATORS ARRESTED NEAR WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, May 4 (UPI) -- Seventy-five demonstrators kneeling in prayer near the White House were arrested Sunday during a religious rally to protest the stepped-up U.S. military action in Southeast Asia.

Dr. Benjamin Spock was among the group taken into custody by U.S. Park police. The demonstrators were charged with failure to move on and disorderly conduct. All were later relejsed after posting 10 U.S. dollars collateral.

About 150 persons took part in the service in Lafayette Park, directly across Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House. Police said the organizers, who included clergy and laymen concerned about the war in Vietnam and the fellowship of reconciliation, failed to obtain a demonstration permit from authorities. Leaders applied for a permit Sunday but police said 15 days advance notice was required.

It was impossible to get such a permit if you want to have a service concerned with Cambodia and the resumption of bomding in North Vietnam, said the Rev. John Boyles of Philadelphia, one of the participants.

'We thought it was our right to worship in the Park,' Boyles said. There was no violence. There was hardly even any movement'.

Police interrupted the service, which consisted of prayers and scripture readings by clergy wearing religious garb, about 10 minutes after the invocation. When the participants were told to move on about half dropped 70 their knees in prayer. They were then placed under arrest and led by the arm to police vehicles.

Others arrested included Sam Brown and David Hawk, leaders of the Vietnam Moratorium Committee, the Rev. Malcolm Boys and Rabbi Balfour Brickher.

#### 1,500 U.S. STUDENTS DISPERSED IN OHIO

KENT, OHIO, May 3(AP) -- National Guardsmen (State Milisa) used tear gas Sunday night to turn back some 1,500 Kent State University students who demonstrated despite Governor James A. Rhodes' ban on outdoor meetings.

A window in one building was broken as the students made the rounds of dormitories seeking support after the group was dispersed don campus, about 1,200 students staged a sit-in in a downtown street. They were surrounded by guardsmen.

Guardsmen were sent to the campus Saturday night following a demonstration by about 1,000 students during which the Army Reserve Officer Training building was destroyed by fire.

Sunday morning, a trailer officer at the airport, a few miles from the Kent State Campus, was destroyed by fire and six planes were rammed with a truck, causing damage estimated at 40,000 dollars.

The Governor appeared in Kent on Sunday and said he hoped to obtain an injunction allowing guardsmen to make the arrests. He blamed much of the trouble on well-trained revolutionary outsiders and said. This kind of activity is over with in Ohio.

LOS ANGELES, May 4 (UPI) -- Rep. George Brown, D-Calif, angered over the sending of American troops into Cambodia without authorization of Congress, has ordered his staff to study at the possibility of impeaching President Nixon.

Brown, seeking the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate, said he would announce by the end of this week whether he would initiate impeachment proceedings in the House against the President.

### SEN. KENNEDY NOT TO STAND FOR PRESIDENT IN 1972

washingTon, May 4 (Reuter) -- Senator Edward Kennedy, making his first comment on his political future since the release of the transcript of the inquest on Mary Jo Kopechne, has reaffirmed that he will not stand for President in 1972.

In a radio interview broadcast here last night, Mr.Kennedy said that he would neither seek nor accept the Democratic Party presidential nomination. But he looked forward to continued service in the Senate.

'I would not accept a draft and I have indicated as clearly, completely, precisely as the English language allows that I would not be a candidate for the Presidency, 'Senator Kennedy said.

Asked about the Vice Presidency, he said ' same response'.

He had 'given very little thought' to subsequently seeking national office, he said.

He recommended a number of possible Democratic presidential candidates for 1972, including former Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Senator Edmund Muskie of Maine, Senator George McGovern of South Dakota and Senator Harold Hughes of Iowa.

Senator Kennedy also said that he had not planned to run for the 1972 Presidency or Vice Presidency even before the accident in which Mary Jo Kopechne drowned last July in his car.

Mr. Kennedy declined in the interview to make any comment on the report filed by the presiding judge of the inquest, Judge James A. Boyle, who concluded that he found 'probably cause 'that Senator Kennedy was operating his car negligently when it went off a bridge on Chappaquiddick Island.

The judge also indicated in his report he believed that Mr. Kennedy and Miss Kopechne were not on their way to the ferry landing when his car went into the tidal pool, as Mr Kennedy had testified and that he was thoroughly familiar with the dyke road and bridge.

### JORDANIAN, ISRAELI FORCES CLASH IN N-JORDAN VALLEY

AMMAN, May 3 Reuter) -- Jordanian forces silenced an Israeli artillery emplacement and destroyed an Israeli tank in an 85-minute clash between Jordanian and Israeli troops in the Northern Jordan Valley this afternoon, a military spokesman said here.

It was the second clash reported today.

The spokesman said Israelis opened artillery fire from the Shuwe'er camp in the Kraymeh area at 1420 local (1220 GMT) and Jordanians fired back.

The spokesman had reported the death of two Jordanian civilians and wounding of five Israelis in an earlier clash in the area today.
