The past week has been one of almost continued rain, so that all those desiring creek water for irrigation purposes have been accommodated by means of the several irrigating ditch companies. Last night the weather changed to cold and the weather bureau men warned our growers that there was danger of severe frost which would freeze the apricots, as they were well set. Smudging was advocated to help keep the temperature down just before day break. Luckily the sky became cloudy, and though cold, no damage was done. It may be that tonight and for a few days there may be frosty nights. As there is an unusually small crop of apricots for this year, with prospects of a good price, it stands the growers in hand to guard well their 'cots.

PLAN TO SHIP OIL FROM STATE

UNITED STEAMSHIP COMPANY IN
CORPORATES WITH \$15,000,
000 CAPITAL.

Will Give Independent Producers or
Coast Chance to Send Produce
Via Isthmus.

New York, March 1.—Behind the filing in Trenton, N. Y., yesterday of articles of incorporation of the United Steamship Company, with an authorized capital stock of \$15,000,000, lies another step in the gigantic plans of the Union Oil Company of California for the shipment of the product of its Pacific wells to the Atlantic Coast via the pipe line across the Isthmus of Panama.

It was recently announced that the California company had secured from the War Department a concession for building a pipe line across the isthmus and shortly after that a large order for iron pipe was placed in the East.

Now those controlled by the oil company have incorporated a steamship company, which will operate a line of tank steamers on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Thus the machinery for the competition with the Standard Oil Trust is nearing completion, and the California oil producers seem assured of a fair chance to market their output.

By the terms of the articles of incorporation filed in Trenton the United Steamship company is authorized to "do a general transportation business, operate steamships or other vessels, to purchase or acquire other lines now in existence and to carry on any business incidental to these objects."

Tramp Saves Many Lives.

San Francisco, March 1.—By the heroism of a tramp, many passengers on the Southern Pacific overland limited, due to arrive here at 5:48 o'clock Monday afternoon, but which did not reach this city until 10:08 o'clock yesterday morning, were saved from injury and maiming. Between Carlin and Palisade in Nevada two wheels on the rear truck of the tender left the track, and the train pounded along for a mile before the engineers was notified by a tramp riding in the "blind vestibule" of the baggage car. A fearful wreck was averted by the wanderer's bravery in climbing over the swaying tender, but he disappeared before the passengers could reward him.

Train Crashes Into Bus.

Portland, Ore., March 1.—A dispatch from Centralia, Wash., says that a freight train on the Northern Pacific struck a bus containing a theater party last night, seriously injuring four of the occupants of the bus.

Miss Grace Key was severely injured about the back and head and one of her limbs may be broken. Miss Fontelle Waters was badly bruised about the head; Mrs. Fred. T. Merritt, wife of Judge Merritt, suffered a dislocated shoulder and Mrs. T. A. Carr was badly bruised about the body.

Congress Asked to Amend Laws.—San Francisco, March 1.—An effort is being made to secure the passage of a Federal law which will require all bar steamers and ferryboats to be provided with bulkheads. Nearly all of the Southern Pacific ferryboats now have the safety device. The Tiburon, it is said, is lacking in this respect, but will be placed on the ways for the necessary change.

LAVA BURNS UP TOWN

VOLCANO IN GERMAN SAMOA
STILL ACTIVE AND PEOPLE
ARE ABANDONING HOMES.

Tutuila, March 1.—The volcano on the Island of Savaii, in German Samoa, is still active. The inhabitants of the district of Matautu have abandoned their homes and traders have removed all their stores. The flow of lava is slow and people approach quite close to it. Some persons will not leave their houses until they are actually set on fire by the burning lava. As the lava flows into the sea, great volumes of steam arise, and the once placid lagoon inside the coral reef is now a mass of hardened lava. The district now being destroyed was one of the richest in the German possessions.

The lava is flowing along the coast toward Matautu. It ran between January 28th at 7 a. m., to Saturday, February 3d, at 7 a. m., a distance of 1,130 yards. It has destroyed all of Salago, including the house of Mr. Partley, a well-known resident, and is now nearly halfway through Saleaula. The flow comes from underneath the old lava and raises it up till it is a field some 20 feet high.

On February 6th there was a strong eruption of the volcano, lasting about ten minutes. Several explosions have occurred, evidently the result of accumulations of steam in cavities. These explosions are accompanied by a penetrating odor of sulphur.

There have also been at intervals gushes of steam from innumerable vents in the lava, preceded by a strong hissing noise. One of the peculiarities of the lava stream is that it presents the appearance of a flat topped wall, and this in spite of the numerous fissures it shows. At night it is most imposing, for then the whole front is one glowing red mass, with innumerable pinpoints of white fire dotted about it.

During the past three weeks a number of pieces of heavy bridge lumber has been washed upon the southern coast of Tutuila. Some of the logs are charred and show evidence of fire.

Rhode Island Matters.

State Master Marchant is after the state board of agriculture. He believes that the laws governing that body should be thoroughly revised. He says that nearly all the present appropriations expended under the direction of the board are used in killing tuberculous cows. In most cases the disease is so far advanced that the cows are no longer a profit to their owners or have been purchased by speculators because they were sick and the buyer could make good profit by turning them over to the state under the tuberculosis law. This, he thinks, would not be so regrettable, but many cattle are taken into Rhode Island from other states and released there by the cattle commissioners upon a physical examination which, he says, in some cases has "consisted of sitting upon the fence and filling out the required papers."

The Two Largest Granges.

The two largest granges in the United States or Canada are Houlton of Maine and Wolcott of New York. Houlton has 912 at this writing, having added 132 the past year. Wolcott has 850 and more in sight. What would most interest the grange public now is to know the comparative average attendance on these granges and what active efficient work each is accomplishing. Are large granges desirable? Could these two granges do better work if they were each subdivided into four separate bodies, each with its own staff of officers and its own members and meeting on different evenings in the week or in different weeks, yet owing allegiance to the one mother grange now existent? The distance limit would prevent the making of the granges distinct in organization.

BAY STATE PATRONS

PAST MASTER LADD APPOINTED NATIONAL ORGANIZER.

C. D. Richardson Is the New State Master—Membership Has Reached Nearly 20,000—Grange Fire Insurance a Strong Feature.

The annual meeting of the Massachusetts state grange was held at Springfield, Mass. Master George S. Ladd in his address reported a gain of 5,000 members in the past four years, the 20,000 mark being passed this year. There is a total of 196 subordinate granges and twenty-one Pomonas. The growing strength of the Order was emphasized by the increased number of its members in the legislature. The new trespass law had been found satisfactory. The pure food enactments should be supported. National aid in suppressing the gypsy and brown tail moths was favored. State money for good roads should be used where most benefit will accrue rather than in sections with greatest volume

of travel. In this way town appropriations, often wasted, will be made to count. The dairy bureau had convicted violators of the law with net loss of only a little over 1 per cent. In taxation a more uniform valuation should be brought about between cities and country towns. Regulation of freight rates and the parcels post were indorsed.

Mr. Ladd, who has served as state master for several years, gave way this year to C. D. Richardson, whose popularity may be noted in the fact that he received a total of 301 out of a total of 306 votes cast. While the Patrons of Massachusetts regretted to lose Mr. Ladd from the chief office, they were greatly pleased when the announcement was made by National Master Bachelder, who was present, that Mr. Ladd had been appointed national organizer and would begin his work in the west in January. This appointment to a larger field came as a surprise to many, but when its full importance was realized their enthusiasm was unbounded. This is an evidence of what the national grange proposes to do along the line of extension work this year. Two or three general organizers are to be sent into those western states where the grange is weak or where it does not exist, and later they will be given such assistants as may be needed to further the work. Mr. Ladd is a native of Sturbridge, Mass., where he has always lived; was for four years lecturer of the state grange and served for a like period as state master. He has served in the state legislature and was appointed last year by the governor on a committee to study the conditions and laws of this and other countries in regard to forest lands.

Massachusetts has also a strong grange insurance company, carrying policies to the amount of \$2,460,413. The company paid a 10 per cent dividend this year. National Master Bachelder gave an address on "Agriculture, the Basis of Other Industries." The sixth degree was conferred on 293 candidates, the largest class ever admitted to the state body.

NEW JERSEY ACTIVE.

Co-operative Purchasing of Farm Supplies an Important Feature.

New Jersey is a small state, but there are over 8,000 members of the grange enrolled within its limits. There has been an increase of 2,137 during the year. Co-operative buying is practiced with great success in several of the granges of the state. Sweedsboro grange reports purchases amounting to \$14,000, Vineland \$30,000, Moorestown nearly \$40,000 and several others report large transactions.

The automobile is causing New Jersey farmers considerable trouble and the grange will endeavor to have an amendment to the automobile law made calling for the regulation of the gearing for machines which will limit their speed to twenty miles per hour. The repeal of the law authorizing the election of township road supervisors is opposed by the grange. The abolition of the fee system for public officers is favored.

The success of the national grange meeting held at Atlantic City is rightly pleasing to the members of the Order in New Jersey, as is also the election of State Master George W. F. Gaunt to the office of national lecturer.

Ohio State Grange Notes.

Deputies now get \$2 for inspecting granges instead of \$1.50.

Permanently locating the state grange had many supporters, but failed to win out.

Secretary Freeman reported a gain of 3,000 in membership the past year.

Last year 183,000 pounds of binder twine and 1,356 tons of fertilizer were purchased through grange trade arrangements.

Twenty-nine experimenters of Ohio Agricultural union were organized into a grange recently at Kingsville, O.

The Ohio State Grange.

At the last meeting of the Ohio state grange, held in Columbus, resolutions were passed in favor of United States postal savings banks and parcels post, convict labor on public highways, removal of tax from denaturalized alcohol, condemning the action of the politicians of the state in getting the taxation amendments adopted at the last election, against the repeal or any modification of the oleo law, in favor of a law prohibiting the killing of quail for a period of three years, election of United States senators by direct vote, desiring a test of the legality of the adoption of the taxation amendment to the state constitution exempting municipal bonds from taxation, for the repeal of the state inheritance tax law passed at the last session of the legislature and authorizing the master to invite the national grange to hold its next annual session at Columbus. It was decided to hold the next annual session of the state grange at Canton.

Death of Frank Boucher.

The grange in Dutchess county, N. Y., has met with a sad loss in the death of Frank Boucher, master of the Dutchess Pomona and secretary of the Dutchess and Columbia Patrons' Fire Relief association.

DEPARTMENT WILL ASCERTAIN WHY SYSTEM FAILS TO WORK WELL AT SUNRISE.

New York, March 1.—Wireless telegraph tests are to be made during the next thirty days by the officers in charge of the stations established by the Navy Departments to determine, if possible, the many failures to receive and to send messages at sunrise and sunset. Repeated tests have shown this to be the case, and it is said that the navy operators were the first to make the discovery of this strange and important phenomenon.

Just why the power of the wireless apparatus and the sound waves should be at the lowest ebb at sunset or at sunrise, operators say may not be difficult to ascertain, for it has long been known that messages can be sent by the system at night 40 per cent better than in the day time especially when the sun is shining. There is what is termed frictional dissipation of energy in transmission by day. It is also known that foggy weather is more favorable for sending and receiving wireless messages than clear weather, so naval officers familiar with electrical subjects believe they will soon be able to locate and remedy that alleged defect at sunrise and sunset.

Commander Thomas W. Ryan and Lieutenant Jackson, U. S. A., who are in charge of the wireless equipment at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, intend to make tests at once.

TELEGRAPHIC BREVITIES.

Postmaster Albert Hoerner of the West Seneca Postoffice, Buffalo, was arrested yesterday charged with embezzling \$5,000 Postoffice funds.

There was heavy rain all day yesterday at Auburn, with a fall of .97. For the season to date the record is 25.86 against 29.19 last season to date.

Secretary Taft was before the Senate committee on the Philippines yesterday. He said the production of sugar in the Philippines is greatly limited for the want of a market.

A big tourist hotel to cost about \$300,000 is now an assured fact. It will be built by a stock company which has purchased a block of land for the site at Alameda.

President and Mrs. Roosevelt were entertained at dinner last night by Secretary and Mrs. McCall. Senator Aldrich and Crane were among the other guests.

A dispatch from Havan says it is reported that an American, acting as Postmaster for the Territorial aspirants in the Isle of Pines has been arrested and confined in jail.

The International Mercantile Marine Company of New York, according to a story on Wall street, has suffered losses to the extent of \$5,000,000 by unprofitable operations since 1902.

Mrs. Elizabeth Rountree of Santa Cruz, a pioneer of 1852 who has lived there since 1861, died yesterday at Fulton. She was the mother of eleven

children and grandmother of twenty-three grandchildren.

The House committee on agriculture has decided by a vote of 8 to 7 not to recommend any appropriation to buy seeds for free distribution by the Department of Agriculture. This means a saving of about \$250,000 annually.

MILITIA QUELL RIOT IN OHIO.

State Troops in Command of Situation at Springfield Restore Order.

Springfield, Ohio, March 1.—The excitement following last night's riot subsided with the dawn and the city is enjoying its ordinary quiet.

The district known as the "Jungles" is in charge of the militia, under command of Major Kiefer. No lives were lost in the riot. The result of the mob's work was the destruction of six negro houses, one saloon, and the damaging of several others. The casualties are the injuring of Sergeant of Police Creger, who was hit with a rock. His injury is not serious. A young man named Beltz is also injured, though not serious.

No further trouble is expected. As long as the militia is on the ground all the saloons in this city will be kept closed. They all closed promptly at 9 o'clock last evening by order of the Mayor and have been so ever since.

Martin Davis, who was shot night before last by two negroes, whose action was the cause of last night's trouble, is barely alive.

The "Jungle" is a name given to a distance on East Monroe street where notorious dives are located and are frequented by negroes. Six or seven of these joints were wiped out last night by the mob with a torch. The most famous place was literally torn to pieces, and burned half down by the rioters. This shack will be torn down.

Many negroes are fleeing from the city. It is estimated that one hundred negroes have left since last night.

Do Not Want Ferry Slip Moved.

San Rafael, March 1.—The City Trustees, in conjunction with the Board of Trade, have decided to call a public mass meeting at the opera house tomorrow evening. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the proposed change in the ferry slips at San Francisco and to talk over the advisability of granting a franchise to the Marin Terminal Company and other applications for franchises.

Accused of Implication of Crimes.

Lodi, March 1.—Officers are searching for H. E. Armstrong, a local blacksmith who they assert is wanted on a charge of petty larceny. Armstrong is also thought to know something of the accident to Ralph Mettler, who fell from the top of a swiftly moving freight train near Stockton last Sunday and who is lying in a hospital at Stockton with his left leg amputated. Mettler and Armstrong were partners here in the blacksmithing business and left together for Fresno.

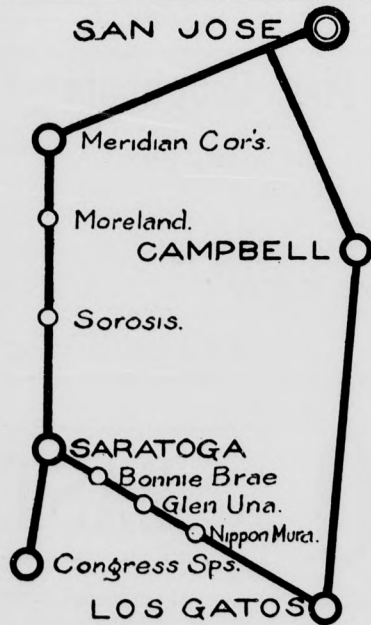

AGED SHERIFF PASSES AWAY

T. M. Brown, Probably Oldest Active Sheriff in the United States, Dies.

Eureka, March 1.—Sheriff T. M. Brown, the oldest Sheriff in California and perhaps in America, died suddenly yesterday morning at about 4 o'clock at the County Court House. The end came peacefully and without pain, and was due evidently to heart trouble or clot on the brain, the exact cause of his death not yet being determined.

He came down to his office yesterday morning at 8 o'clock, apparently in the best of health and spirits. He retired to an outer room. His absence was noted by Chief Deputy John F. Ferrill, who went in search of him. He spoke to him several times but was unable to obtain a response, and upon further investigation discovered that death had occurred some time before.
