NAVSTA graduates 23 ASF students

After three weeks of intensive training, 23 new members of the Naval Station Guantanamo Bay Auxiliary Security Force (ASF) were presented with graduation certificates in a ceremony held in the Bulkeley Hall auditorium, Nov. 3.

CAPT Mark Leary, NAVSTA Commanding Officer; CDR Sylvester Moore, NAVSTA Executive Officer; and LT Richard Thompson, NAVSTA Security Officer, were among senior leadership present at the graduation.

According to Thompson, the newly graduated ASF personnel will augment the current Naval Security Force (NSF) during increased force protection conditions (FPCON), or when directed by NAVSTA Commanding Officer as reasonably necessary and lawful to maintain peace, order, and protect installation personnel and property.

"It was extremely important to get a trained and capable ASF in place now," said Thompson. "NAVSTA has to have qualified Sailors at the ready, who can instantly be recalled and integrated into the Security Department "

Instructed by personnel from Homeland Security Solutions Inc., the ASF students completed 9mm pistol and M16

rifle qualifications, and received extensive training in firearms handling, accountability and safety. The students also learned hand-to-hand combat, prisoner control methods, and various security sweep techniques.

"The importance and benefit of this training will serve Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba well because as the ASF

members continue to serve in rity." their primary duties," said Thompson. "Be it in Port Services, Base Operations, or even the Public Affairs, they can apply their training in areas like antiterrorism awareness, building and physical security procedures, disaster and emergency plans, and basic first aid, to enhance the installation's and its residents' safety and secu-

Thompson said that the ASF graduates will be assigned to NSF sections where they will be assigned monthly security duties, including at least one shift that will enhance their continued training and proficiency.

They will also attend all phased and sustainment training, and will complete periodic

Nesting can happen any time of year

People aren't the only ones Sometimes she will crawl out who make use of Guantanamo Bay beaches. Other creatures make the beaches part of their ritual habitats, including sea turtles. According to Fred Burns NAVSTA Environmental Director, sea turtles can nest almost any time of the year and anywhere along the beach.

Just recently a large turtle was spotted at Windmill Beach, late in the evening of Oct. 28, and was later identified by local environmental experts as a Green Turtle.

Green turtles can reach 3.5 - 4 ft. in length and weigh between 300 - 400 pounds. They mainly stay near the coastline and around islands and live in bays and protected shores, especially in areas with seagrass beds. They nest at intervals of two, three, or more years, with wide year-to-year fluctuations in numbers of nesting females. They nest between three to five times per season. They lay an average of 115 eggs in each nest, with the eggs incubating for about 60 days.

Only female turtles nest, and that occurs most often at night. The female crawls out of the ocean, pausing frequently as if carefully scopes out her spot.

of the ocean, but for unknown reasons decides not to nest. This is a "false crawl," and it can happen naturally or be caused by artificial lighting or the presence of people on the beach.

The Green Turtle that came ashore on Windmill beach last week laid her eggs near the concession cabana.

"Whenever a turtle is laying her eggs, residents are reminded to remain at a distance," said Burns. "Coming too close may spook her and she will not lay her eggs, or may leave the nest before laving all her eggs. spooked, she will return to the water and deposit her eggs in the sea because the urge to lay the eggs is too great."

Green Turtles are listed as endangered (in danger of extinction within the foreseeable future) under the U.S. Federal Endangered Species Act. Internationally, these turtles are also listed as endangered (facing a very high risk of extinction in the wild in the near future) by the International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources. The current population estimate is 88,520

nesting females.

"If these turtles are scared off of the beach they might not have enough time to find another secluded beach and all eggs will be lost," Burns concluded. If anyone sees a nesting sea turtle on any of GTMO's beaches, they are urged to stay well away from

the area, and contact Fred Burns or Christopher Creighton at the NAVSTA Environmental Department, ext. 4662 or 4380, as soon as possible after the sighting. Volunteers under the guidance of Environmental Department personnel will monitor the nest until after the eggs have hatched.


