12 VT and 4 VF launched as one direct aircraft support group in aid of ground troops on Okinawa. At the target, the VT with the 100 lb. bombs were directed to attack a command post reported in area 8364 V, while the VT with the 500 lb. bombs and the VF were directed to attack a gun position reported in area 8070 O.

In neither instance were the attacking planes able to spot the specific targets assigned and therefore had to resort to area bombing and rocketing. All of the bombs and rockets hit in the designated areas but it was impossible to ascertain whether any enemy installations had been damaged.
