The following is summary and narrative of the observing pilot,

"I was returning to base from a mission and had crossed the "high cone" at 20,000 feet at 0543 Z. I told the Radar Observer I would continue south for five (5) minutes, make a procedure turn and return to the "high cone". I made a forty-five (45) degree turn to the right, held course for forty (40) seconds, then started a turn to the left to roll out on three hundred sixty (360) degrees.

Upon reaching a heading of approximately forty-five (45) degrees both the Radar Observer and myself noticed this bright light approximately forty-five (45) degrees to our left and slightly below us. Its optical size appeared to be two to three (2-3) inches and it was between me and the Delaware Bay. I turned toward the object and he started moving away. As it moved, the light appeared to dim, and grow smaller in size and then it became stationary over the vicinity of Cape May, New Jersey.

I attempted to contact the GCI controller on "F" channel but could not raise him. I continued on to Base and finally contacted the controller on "C" channel at approximately 0600 Z and asked him if he had a target on his weapon over Cape May. As I approached the base, the "light" seemed to come up behind us and increased in size to approximately one and half (1½) inches. The "light" headed south and finally disappeared. The controller finally told me he had two targets moving south at approximately three hundred fifty (350) knots south of Rehobath Beach. This was approximately at 0603 Z.

The "light" was under constant observation from 0549 Z until 0600 Z. The "light" went out once while the "light" was stationary over Cape May. This was only momentary. It disappeared momentarily again while moving to the North West and again momentarily while moving to the South. The "light" finally faded away at 0600 Z on a Southerly heading.

Our airborne radar was inoperative and we were low on fuel so were not able to track the object anymore accurately than previously stated. The "light" did move from its first position to its stationary position in less than a minute because I was pointed at it while it was moving and did not stay pointed long. I say this because I checked my "high Cone" time, my procedure turn time, flew to a position approximately ten (10) miles south of the field at 20,000 feet at two hundred forty (240) knots indicated, let down at two hundred fifty (25) knots indicated, and was on the ground at 0606 Z.

All observations can be confirmed by the radar operator."

| <p>The Airdrome Officer, Air Force Flight Test Center, received a telephone call from Deputy Sheriff Leroy B. Hatfield, Kern County Sheriff's Department, Bakersfield, California, at approximately 2300 Pacific Daylight Saving Time on 12 August 1952 in which Hatfield stated that between thirty and forty patrons of a Drive-In theater had observed and reported to Sheriff's officers an unidentified flying object which had been over the theater shortly after 2200 PDSST. An initial electrical report was submitted by the Airdrome Officer.</p> <p>On 14 August 1952, the undersigned, accompanied by Captain Curtis L. [REDACTED], visited Bakersfield, California, and interviewed Deputy Sheriff [REDACTED] and MR. [REDACTED], a Naval Reserve Lieutenant who is presently employed at Motor Center, Bakersfield, as an automobile salesman, who was one of the persons who sighted the flying object.</p> <p>Through evaluation of statements made by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] and a review of the report submitted by Hatfield to his superiors, it was concluded that the object observed was not an aircraft or helicopter or other common airborne object; that the object sighted must have been exceedingly noticeable to divert the attention of the patrons of the Drive-In theater from the movie screen; and that the reported actions of the object as observed by Mr. [REDACTED] are not within the capabilities of either conventional or Jet type aircraft. Further investigation by either personal contact or Direct Mail by the Air Technical Intelligence Center is recommended.</p> | | | |

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At approximately 2230 PDST, 12 Aug 52, Deputy Sheriff Leroy B. Hatfield, Kern County Sheriff's Department, Bakersfield, California, received a telephone call from [redacted] street, Bakersfield, California, who was, at that time, in the Terrace Drive-In theater adjacent to Highway 99 in South Bakersfield. [redacted] stated that he had seen an unidentified flying object over the theater and that several other people, also present at the same location, had observed the same thing.

Hatfield received several other calls relative to the same subject from the theater and other locations immediately after the initial call by [redacted]. Hatfield consequently went to the theater and began interviewing individuals and making a list of their names, addresses and telephone numbers. Inasmuch as Hatfield was alone, he obtained short statements and identifying data from twenty-three persons although Hatfield stated that at least three and possibly four times this number of people were grouped at the theater when he arrived. Many of these persons departed before he was able to interview them.

Hatfield stated that further telephonic reports were received at the Sheriff's office on 13 Aug 52, many by people who stated that they "thought" they had seen a "flying saucer" and were calling to find out whether or not their impressions were correct. Several of these people refused to give their names. Hatfield's interviews with persons at the theater and in telephone conversations seemed to indicate that the phenomena was observed shortly after 2200 PDST and that a smaller number of persons saw a similar object at approximately 2400 PDST 12 Aug 52.

Description of the object by persons interviewed by Hatfield indicated that all persons sighted either a group of lights or had the impression of a large object which was variously described as "V" shaped, crescent shaped or triangular. Witnesses agreed in substance that the object moved in a general South to North direction at a moderate rate of speed generally estimated to have been from 60 to 80 miles per hour, was at a relatively low altitude (generally conceded to have been below 2000 feet) and that it disappeared at a high rate of speed.

MR. [redacted] Naval Reserve Lieutenant who is presently an employee of the Motor Center, Bakersfield, and a member of the Kern County Sheriff's reserve, was interviewed. [redacted] stated that he was seated in his 1950 Cadillac at a point to the left of the center line of the Terrace Drive-In theater with the automobile headed approximately South-Southeast. He stated that the screen of the theater is directly Southeast of the theater parking area.

While seated in the car with his wife, Jenkins said that he noted two lights moving in general Northeasterly direction from a location directly to the South-Southeast of the theater. [redacted] could not estimate the distance the lights were from the theater but stated that they appeared to be not more than two thousand feet above the ground and appeared to be moving at about the speed of a light aircraft such as a Piper Cub or Taylorcraft. [redacted] stated that his initial impression was that it was a crop-duster's helicopter and that this illusion was heightened when the lights remained stationary for a short space of time before beginning to move again. [redacted] continued to idly watch the lights, being forced to stoop down in the driver's seat of his car in order to continue watching as the lights progressed toward the Northeast.

At a point approximately Southeast of the Drive-In theater screen the lights either stopped or the object took up a Southeast heading without even momentary hesitation or reduction in speed in accomplishing the 90-degree turn after which the lights again resumed a Northeasterly course which curved to the East and ascended sharply at an extreme speed which [redacted] likened to that of a Jet fighter which has accomplished a high-speed, low-altitude pass and chandelled to the left. Jenkins was of the opinion that an instantaneous turn was actually accomplished by the object inasmuch as he noted

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the lights, which had previously appeared to have been separated by thirty to fifty feet, appeared to fade into one light and then reappear as two lights as the sharp climbing turn was accomplished. [REDACTED] lost sight of the object at about the time it was on an Easterly heading and was of the opinion that it had disappeared due to the great distance it had covered

[REDACTED] stated that the front light of the object was bright and similar to looking in a brightly lighted window on a dark night while the rear light was more dim and had a bluish-orange color which appeared hazy and similar to the glow of a jet fighter at night. [REDACTED] was emphatic in stating that he heard no sound from the object at any time and that it definitely was not a helicopter. [REDACTED] is familiar with light aircraft and with Armed Forces aircraft of both conventional and jet types.

A written report was prepared by Deputy Sheriff Hatfield and submitted to Captain Johns of the Kern County Sheriff's Office. The identifying data relative to persons who witnessed the phenomena and short statements which were taken down by Deputy Hatfield while he interviewed witnesses have been extracted from the official Sheriff's department report as follows:

Says that he saw a triangular shaped object, brownish in color, larger than an airliner, surrounded by either dim lights, or running lights turned off reflecting light from the ground. The object was flying at an altitude of 200 or 300 feet very slowly---60 miles or less per hour. Object disappeared suddenly after traveling Northeast away from the theater. There was no sound of operation from the aircraft.

Saw it from the Terrace theater on South Highway 99 on August 12th after 2200 PDST but before 2300 PDST. It looked like a rectangle with lights.

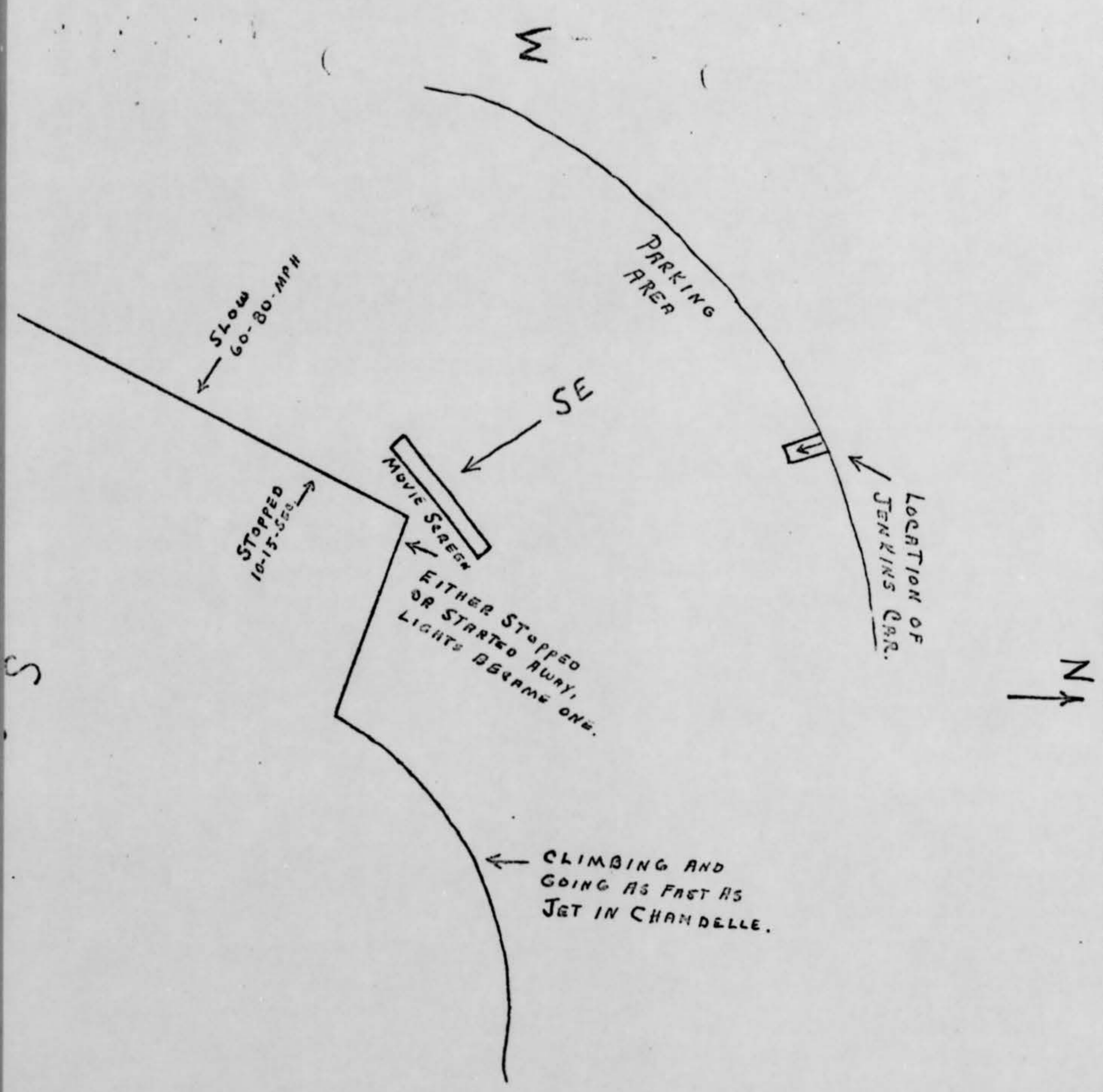
Bakersfield, 2330 PDST: Clear, visibility more than 15 miles, wind NEW at 8 knots.

Winds Aloft: Light, variable and under 5 knots to 6000 feet above surface.

From 7000 to 30000 feet above the surface the winds varied from South to South-Southwest at 5 to 10 knots. At 30000 feet above the surface winds were from 200 degrees at 15 knots; 35-40000 feet from 200 degrees at 20 knots; 40-45000 feet above the surface from 200 degrees at 30 knots.
