NEWS BRIEFS

KIRKPATRICK NAMED TO COLLEGE PRESIDENCY -- Dr. Edward T. Kirkpatrick, dean of the College of Engineering at Rochester Institute of Technology, has been named the new president of Wentworth Institute, Boston, Mass.

Dr. Kirkpatrick was chosen by the board of trustees of Wentworth Institute to succeed Dr. H. Russell Beatty as president on July 1, 1971, according to John F. Rich, chairman of Wentworth board of trustees. Dr. Beatty will be 65 in May of this year.

As one of the foremost educators in technical institute education, Dr. Beatty has served as president of the Boston school since 1953, coming to the post from Pratt Institute. He will continue as president of Wentworth College of Technology, a new institution which opened its doors this past September and provides junior and senior year programs leading to a baccalaureate degree for engineering technologists.

Dr. Kirkpatrick has served as dean of RIT's College of Engineering since 1964. Previously he was chairman of the Mechanical Engineering Department and director of the Computing Center at the University of Toledo from 1959 to 1964. He was assistant professor at the University of Pittsburgh for two years, and a graduate student and assistant professor at Carnegie Institute of Technology from 1954 to 1958.

His experience in industry includes the positions of sales engineer, sales manager and general manager, respectively, with F. Bolton Ltd. from 1948 to 1954. Prior to that time he was a test engineer with Canadian General Electric Co.

A graduate of University of British Columbia where he specialized in mechanical engineering, Dr. Kirkpatrick earned his Masters of Science and Doctor of Philosophy degrees at Carnegie Institute of Technology in Pittsburgh.

He has attended the Basic Nuclear Engineering Summer Institute at Purdue University and Argonne National Laboratory, the Ford Foundation Computer Project at University of Michigan, and National Science Foundation Institute at University of North Carolina.

Dr. Kirkpatrick has also served as president of Rochester Engineering Society, a director of Rochester Chapter of American Society of Mechanical Engineers, and trustee of Rochester Museum and Science Center. He is also a member of American Society for Engineering Education, New York State Society of Professional Engineers, and National Society of Professional Engineers.

He has authored many technical papers for engineering and scientific publications.

Admission free and open to the public, the lecture-discussion is sponsored by Delta Sigma Pi, the professional business fraternity at RIT. An interpreter from the National Technical Institute for the Deaf at RIT will be present to interpret for those deaf persons who attend.

For the past four years Abelson has been employed by Villa Manufacturing Inc., which considers itself one of the pioneers of the four day work week. He previously served as executive vice president of Sargent & Greenleaf Inc., where he was employed for 20 years.

A graduate of RIT where he majored in mechanical engineering, Abelson resides at 291 Imperial Circle, Irondequoit.

FOUNDATION SELECTS RIT STUDENT -- The Walter Hansgen Memorial Foundation of Easton, Conn., has selected Rochester Institute of Technology student Louis C. Peck III as the recipient of a \$500 scholarship. The Foundation periodically gives educational grants to individuals who have made important contributions to the field of motor sports, or to members of the families of such persons.

Peck, who is enrolled in the mechanical engineering program in RIT's College of Engineering, hails from a prominent motor racing family in Watkins Glen, N.Y. His father, Louis, Jr., has served as a working member of the Race Communications Association (RCA) since 1957. Louis (the son) is also a member of the RCA, and the Sports Car Club of America.

The Walter Hansgen Memorial Foundation was founded by friends of the "greatly admired and respected racing driver" who was killed in 1966 while practicing for the La Mans 24 hour race.

GRANTS AVAILABLE FOR FACULTY RESEARCH AND TRAINING -- National Science Foundation grants are available to faculty members who wish to gain research experience or strengthen subject-matter competence by attending one of the more than 170 special projects to be held this summer.

Successful applications for the projects, which run from one to twelve weeks in length, receive grants which cover the cost of instruction and include stipends to defray living expenses.

Three types of summer programs are available: Summer Research Participation Programs, lasting eight to 12 weeks, provide teachers with competence, but with little time to do research during the academic year, a change to conduct research during the summer; Summer Institutes, from four to 12 weeks in length, generally offer advanced level work in courses often specially designed for the participants; Short Courses, from one to four weeks in length, offer specialized short-term programs covering advances in selected areas of subject fields.

The deadline for application to most special summer programs is in the month of February. Interested faculty should contact the Grant and Contract Administration office (ex. 2388, on the 6th floor, Administration Tower) immediately.

The series was initiated last fall with a discussion of Urban Social Problems and will conclude during April and May of this year with a discussion of Urban Social Change.

Loftus C. Carson, executive director of the Monroe County Human Rights Commission, is the seminar leader.
