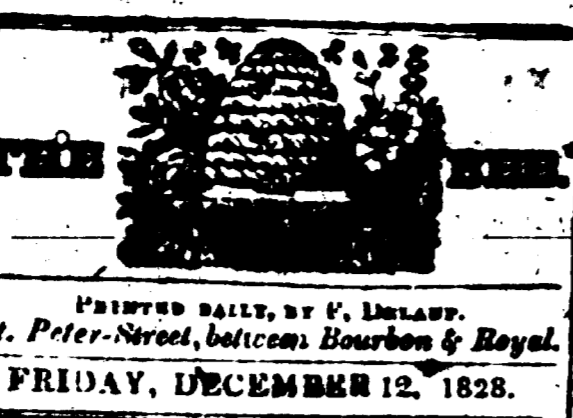

Fruits of the Tariff.—The ship Merced arrived at Baltimore, on Wednesday, from Chili, with a cargo of copper, in pigs, for the supply of our great manufacturing, and five hundred thousand dollars in specie for the comfort of our merchants—chiefly the product of American manufactures exported.—[Niles' Register.]

Retort of a letter received by a gentleman of Washington, dated Singra, Sept. 10, 1828.

You will have learnt by the public papers the manly resistance the Turks make against Russia, although, as far as I know, there is not a newspaper printed in Europe or America disposed to do them justice. Such devotion to country as the Turks present, I have never seen, heard or read of; the roads leading to Constantinople are filled with men who have left their homes with their guns on their shoulders, and that without any of the long list of excitements generally used to warm the patriotic feelings of other people going to meet in deadly fight their implacable enemies. Until they arrive at the Turkish camp they are of no expense to the Government, and then only a miserable ration of bread and rice. Such people may be beat and basely slain, but never can be conquered. Should the Sultan wish a million of men, he has only to say so, and he will have many more. The Russians have advanced as far as Shoumla, where they seem to have found their graves. After a loss, since the beginning of the campaign estimated at 80,000 men, the force they brought before the place was not sufficient to attack it. The Emperor returned to Russia to hasten on reinforcements. The troops left, fortified themselves on the 26th ult. The Turks attacked them at midnight and carried at the point of the bayonet, all their works, and after losing 15,000 men, in a battle fought man to man, they have been forced to retreat upwards of 30 miles. Varna has been attacked by the land and sea forces, as yet unsuccessfully. The place is badly fortified, but the garrison amounts to 40,000 men, and other troops are rapidly moving in that direction. Without the possession of Varna there will be no security for the provisions sent the Russians by sea.

[From the Charleston Courier.] English Summary.

The Young Queen of Portugal was ill at her lodgings at Grillon's Hotel, on the 12th ult. but was convalescent the next day. It is said two agents have been despatched from the Queen of Portugal, one to France and the other to Vienna, with proposals to assist her in regaining her Crown. It is said that the British Government is willing to aid, provided the other Powers agree to it.

Accounts from Oporto, as late as the 8th of October, state, that business among the British merchants began to revive, and shipments of wine and fruit were making to considerable extent. About 30 sail of vessels were at anchor in the Douro, ready to receive cargoes. It is stated that the yellow fever has made its appearance in Cadiz and the South of Spain.

Died, the Hon. Sir George Gray, Bart. K. C. B. Commissioner of the Portsmouth dock yard. The Duke of Wellington received despatches from Ireland on the 13th ult. considered of high importance.

Mr. Lawrence, the American Charge d'Affaires, left London for Paris on the 13th ult.

The King of England had so far recovered, as to be able to take his usual sittings.

The Queen of Wirtemberg, aged 63, (formerly Princess Royal of England,) died at Leedwergburg, on the 6th of Oct., of dropsy in the chest. It is announced that Keen the Tragedian, is about to re-visit the United States again. The Courier peremptorily denies that any dissatisfaction exists among the

three Powers, upon the subject of the Treaty with the Pacha of Egypt. There is not the slightest foundation for the statement.

Hutton, underwent a public examination at London, on the 18th, on a charge of forgery, and was committed to Newgate.

Our Correspondent at Madrid writes us as follows, under date of the 2d inst:—"No doubt any longer exists of the expedition of Gen. Barrados having been directed against the coast of Campeachy, to the great satisfaction of Gen. Vives, Captain-General of the Isle of Cuba, who would have been disconcerted by the troops landing at the Havana, and remaining at the charge of the inhabitants of the Island. M. La Torre, Captain-General of the Isle of Porto Rico, has just sent dispatches to the government to ask for 5000 men, whom he engages to keep upon a war footing, without its being any expense to the mother country."

Our Correspondent at Lisbon writes us as follows, under date of the 37th ult.—"The vessel just arrived at Oporto from Rio Janeiro, was the bearer of a letter addressed by Don Pedro to his brother Don Miguel, in which the Emperor announces to him that if he should persist in the usurpation of the rights of his niece, he would conclude peace at any price with Buenos Ayres, and immediately after send his squadron to blockade Portugal and effect a descent upon that country."—Boston Courier.

The Queen of Portugal.—It was rumored about by the Western Quindance, yesterday, that "nothing but the particular state of his Majesty's health prevented the presentation of the young Queen to him at his Court at Windsor." What state of health may be requisite for so august a ceremony it perhaps does not become us to conjecture; but we can state, upon very good authority, that his Majesty has been no otherwise indisposed than by "an ordinary attack of the gout in his neck,"—from which he is now rapidly recovering; and that it was never in contemplation for him to receive the young Queen of Portugal at present. Her Majesty is here as a Royal refugee; and as such, certain Royal courtesies have been afforded her on her arrival, and there, we apprehend, the matter will rest whilst her affairs with the renowned Don Miguel are in abeyance. Hitherto her expenses in this country have been borne by the English Treasury, and she has been attended by one of the Lords of the Bedchamber, and other officers of our Royal household; and she has had the use of a couple of the Royal carriages, with a proportionate quota of servants; but in a few days these will all be withdrawn, and she will retire into the country upon a small private establishment, under the control or at the charge of the Brazilian embassy. The place of her retirement is a mansion near Laleham, the property, we believe, of the Earl Lucan, but lately in the occupation of Lord Francis Leveson Gower, until he was appointed to the beautiful Secretaryship of the Emerald gem; and there her Majesty will remain in privacy, with a suitable establishment of educational tutors, &c. until the European Powers have settled the dispute between her papa and her uncle. On Sunday next, she attends high-mass at the chapel of the Ex-Portuguese Embassy in South-str. Grosvenor-square; and it is expected that she will retire to Laleham early in the following week.

In the mean time her presence in London causes almost as much excitement among the Cockneys as that of poor M'Alle Verry. Grillon's hotel, like Mr. Verry's shop, is surrounded from morning to night by a crowd of idlers, who are highly gratified if once in 2 or 3 hours they can catch a glimpse of even one of her attendants, and are excited to roaring raptures if once in the day her juvenile Majesty steps into the balcony and shakes her pocket-handkerchief at them. Yesterday her Majesty and suite left the hotel in two of the Royal carriages, "amidst the shouts of the assembled multitude," and proceeded to the Soho Bazaar, where her Majesty was graciously pleased to purchase a wax doll. The doll, a remarkably fine one, was handed to the carriage by the Marquis Barbacena; after which the Royal cortege proceeded—still "amidst the shouts of the assembled multitude," to the Zoological Menagerie in the Regent's Park; where her Majesty spent upwards of an hour among the bears and monkeys of that establishment. From thence she returned to the hotel; and in the evening, she received the Prince and Princess Esterhazy, &c. and their children—the Prince Nicholas and the Princess Mary, who no doubt were to her the most welcome visitors she has received hitherto.—London Paper.

Economic Secretaries.—A Cardinal complaining to Pops Clement XIV. of his confidence having been abused by his Secretary, "I have never been betrayed by mine," said the Holy Father, "although I have three," holding up his fingers at the same time.

An Artist's Compliment.—You find me older, observed Louis XIV. to Pierre Bouchard, the painter, as he sketched the likeness of the king. "Some campaigns only, please your Majesty," replied the skillful artist.

Roussel, a blind man in Paris, has been condemned to two years imprisonment and a fine of 50 francs, for buying in wait for, and striking with a hammer, a sailor who lived near, and whose cat had frequently stolen his meat. It appeared that they had quarrelled, before and that Roussel had received a severe blow on one of his blind eyes.

A barber in Modena, Italy, lately exhibited signs of melancholy, and cut his throat; he died in four days. On opening his body one hundred and forty gold coins were found which he had swallowed a short time before. The physicians said they had produced inflammation which would have caused his death if he had not cut his throat.
