**France and South America.**—It appears that the report to which we alluded two or three days ago, relative to the deposition of France to recognize the new American states, was true. The agent, appointed to conduct the important negotiations with the government, arrived at this port in the packet ship Caledonia. This has effected what proved beyond the influence of all the French liberal party a year or two ago, backed as it was by the interests of a large portion of the Army, Navy, and magistracy previously pro-British. It was commanded by the cabinet minister, who had the responsibility of the foreign policy of the republic, and who, according to the most Christian of the Hotel Catholique King, was proponed to make a measure. But now, calling the thing as it is. The advantages to be gained are no greater, indeed, none of them have been sacrificed by the delay; the projected measure has not changed its nature; those states are no more independent than they were—but, indeed, views have altered, of either side. The trials of the cabinet have been changed, and this, we hope, is one of the subjects on which an opposite policy will be pursued by the new ministry. The step that will be taken by France will be known the better for all parties.

It has been conjectured that France would obtain from the new states, an indemnity in the shape of Spain, which she will be compelled to hold for the satisfaction of her claim against the United States.—*N. Y. Day Advt.*

**EXPEDITION AGAINST CAMPEACHA.**—On the 6th a small vessel and brig sailed from New-York, for Campeachay, and were attacked by a British frigate commanded by Midulius, and the small Creek brigs. After a short engagement, the Turkish vessels retreated before the cannon of the fort of Cape Baba. The Greeks attacked them there on the shore, and sent a broadside against them. The Turkish vessels then retreated, were to pieces.

The expedition from Spain came in about 10 days since, landed about 2400 men. It appears they came out on a wild goose expedition, to invade Campeachay, without any of the means therewith to effect a landing, and, as it is said that Laborde refused remaining on that coast at this season of the year with his vessels, to effect their disembarkation the commander thought better to come here.

We are dreadfully dull here; nothing doing in produce and without any news. As we have been for some time without arrivals from the U. States, every description of provisions have greatly advanced. Some Rice, old and new, of weevil, received this morning. Matanzas sold on the wharf at \$2.00 per q. Beef, pork, ham and lard are wanted, and as cargo dropping in at this moment, from your place would no doubt answer very well.—Good lard would command above 18 cents, but as advices on the market have long gone forward, it is but the first arrival, and as will be likely to "mislead" wallers, I shall keep you posted of what I can learn.
