Several candidates are soliciting the suffrages of their fellow-citizens, in the election, called for by the resignation of two members of the state legislature.

Such are our general principles: we may, probably, not be singular in our views. But we wish it to be plainly understood that we truckle to none—that the question, which we originate, is not one of vain and flimsy speculations, poorly concealing party machinations.

The rational examen of the merits of candidates, who affect seats in the legislative councils of the nation, is the proper province of the press; but we assert it, as the organs of public sentiment, we must have data for the basis of our opinions.

Will you urge the discussion of Livingston's Code, and be friendly to the adoption of the essential provisions of a work, which has entailed great expense on the state, and which has been received by an absolute power, with tokens of special favor?

Will you support all constitutional measures, which the general government might oppose against the plans of the disorganizers, who may attempt to impair the bands of our union?

Such are the questions, which we propose to the several candidates; such the questions, on which we wish to know their opinions, before we can hang out our colours, in a contest, viewed by the people, with that degree of anxiety, which is warranted by its importance.

The following extract, on the subject of improving the means of communication, in Alabama, we copy from the Message of the Governor of that State.

The events of the last war, yet fresh in the memory of us all, admonished, that if a hostile flag should again wave along our coast, it is to the interior we must look for the means of defence in men and the armaments of war.

The accomplishment of the proposed undertaking, thereby draining the country of its intelligence and all classes and conditions of men.—Another desirable effect attendant on its consummation, would be the concentration of the trade, export and import, of an extensive tract of country, (of itself adequate to the support of a large city) upon Mobile; thus contributing to the creation of a great commercial emporium within our own limits, than which nothing serves more effectually to give character to a State.

Agriculture, that sheet anchor of the prosperity and independence of our country, will receive a large share of attention. Horticulture, to the successful prosecution of which interesting branch of husbandry Louisiana is so peculiarly calculated, will not be neglected. The Messages of the President of the United States, and the Government of this State will be published at length in the REGISTER, as also in condensed forms, such as propositions of Congress and of the several Legislatures, as may possess a commanding importance.
