After taking the two women ashore, Vandvander notified the police and the police patrol automobile and a company of firemen were dispatched to the scene. Firemen lowered ladders from the bridge and crawling out on the boom of logs on the flats, began the search for the victims of the automobile party. H. J. Magee, assistant general forenan of the street department, to-day emphatically stated that a red lantern nailed to the bridge railing at the scene of last night's catastrophe, to warn vehicles of the curve in the trestle, has nightly been maintained under his orders.

This morning the lantern was missng. Presumably it was carried into the bay when the big auto smashed through the railing last night. Wheth, er the light was burning when the ac-cident occurred cannot be learned.

According to friends of Parry, the dead chauffeur, it does not seem reasonable that he would have driven his car at a high rate of speed had the light been burning. On the other hand, his friends argue, it is possible that Parry lost control of the machine, due to the clutch sticking, making it impossible to slow down so as to take the curve easily. the curve easily.
George Gileng, of 4305 Rainier ave-

nue, was walking west on the Andover Street bridge, about 50 yards from the abrupt turn when the car crashed through the railing.

Screams for Help.

"It was a terrible sight," said Gileng. It seemed to me that the auto was taking between 30 and 40 miles an

hour. There was a crash and as the big, black car hurtled through the air, screams of terror rent the air.

"With a heavy splash the big auto plunged into the water. For a second or two I could hear nothing, and then came groans and terrorised cries for the balo. I ran to the gap in the bridge peered down into the inky dark

and peered down into the inky dark-ness for a few seconds. Those awful cries for help, as those poor women were drowning right within a few feet of me, I shall never forget, "Save me, oil, save me!" 

### RAVORS CHANGE IN SUNLIGHT ANTI-TRUST LAW

TAFT WILL DEAL WITH SUBJECT IN MESSAGE

**Would Permit Combinations of** Railways Not in Restraint of Trade.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 20.—President Taft contemplates making several radical changes in the interstate commerce laws. With this idea in view a conference is to be held in New York within the next two weeks, and sev

within the next twi weeks, and several changes in the Sherman anti-trust law will be taken up at this time.

The members, of the conference will suggest that President Taft recom-mend the alterations in his next message to congress. President Tuft plans sage to congress. President Taff plans accorded and made a wide a more effective government supervision over railroads and plans to relieve the interstate commerce of many burdens and restrictions. Taft has requested the committee to put his plans in concrete form. He plans to divest the commission of administrative power, establish it as a quasi-judicial body, but the American proved a quick with power to determine cases and enwith power to determine cases and en-force its rulings; and to limit appeals

with power to determine cases and enforce its rulings, and to limit appeals only to supreme court in constitutional questions.

The president plans to establish a bureau in the commerce and labor department, and to this bureau will be turned over all questions referring to labor administration, safety appliances and employees laws. This breau also will have the power to settle all minor differences between shippers and railroads, and will control the filing of rates and investigate complaints. rates and investigate complaints.

President Taft believes that much time will be saved for the inter-state commerce commission by this plan. As was Roosevelt's belief, Taft thinks that the railroads should be relieved of cer-tain operations of the Sherman law and should be in a position to make com-binations and agreements providing they are beder the government's su-pervision and not in restraint of trade. pervision and not in restraint of trade.

**CURTISS AVERTS** COLLISION IN AIR

**Guides Machine Above Another** Aeroplane During Trials at Rheims.

Rheims, Aug. 20 .- Glenn H. Curtiss, at sundown yesterday, added a dramatic feature to the trial flights of the aeroplanes entered for the aviation week contests by skilfully gulding his machine above another aeroplane, and averting a collision. The feat was ac-complished when for the first time in history three heavier-than-air craft-were manoeuvering at the same time. All were flying rapidly, when suddenly Curtiss saw M. Dumanest in an Anette approaching at right angles tomette approaching at right angles and on the same level with him. As quick as a flash, Curtiss realized the danger, and elevating his planes, his machine instantity shot upward and soared safely over the Frenchman. Thousands of spectators applauded the American wildly. The third machine in the air at this time was that of M. in the air at this time was that of M. Tissandler. Experts last night were agreed that Mr. Curtiss had made a fine demonstration of ability to control his machine. They declared that his bi-plane was a real racer.



Wright Brothers Allege Infringement of Patents and Bring Suit.

New York, Aug. 20. Willow and Orville Wright, the aeronauts, yesterday entered suit in the United States circuit court here against the Aernautic cuit court here against the Aernautic Society of this city, charging infringement of patent rights on their aeroplane inventions. The Wrights complain that the society procured from the Herring-Curtiss Company and Glenn H. Curtiss flying machines alteged to infringe on the Wrights' patents, and secured Curtiss to give public exhibitions for which an admission fee was charged.

The Wrights demand that the infiring machine be turned over to them for destruction, and in addition ask the court to assess damages for three-fold the amount of whatever loss they are found to have suffered by reason of the infringement and the public exhibition or rental of the infringing machine. A hearing in the suit will probably be held early in October.

Aeronautic experts here generally viewed the suit as in the nature of a test case brought to determine legally whether the Wright's patents cover effectually the aeroplanes constructed along similar lines to theirs.

To the Editor:—Your editorial on the Tram Company's agreement, in your issue of Wednesday evening, appeals very strongly to me. There is one point, however, upon which I would like further light. In your editorial you say: "Taxpayer says he will yote against the tramway agreement because it places a monopoly in the hands of the company. Thus, under this tramway agreement, if it acquires the Goldstream property the city will have about \$200,000 worth of 'power possibilities' tied up, which we cannot sell to others save to the Tram Company, which we cannot force that company to buy, and which it certainly will not buy if it develops 10,000 horse power at Jordan river. Pipes and mains have been laid and the work of grading is now under way. The contractors for this work have secured the services of a man from Chicago, who is said to be an expert in this class of pavement. A secwload of vitrified brick for the Wharf street pavement has arrived from the Denny-Renton. has arrived from the Denny-Renton Company of Seattle. This shipment consisted of 80,000 bricks, and several more scowloads are expected in the course of the next few days.

### WHERE WIRES WILL GO UNDERGROUND

Telephone Company Submits Its Plans to City Council.

Mayor Hall and Alderman Mable have been appointed a committee to select some suitable person to interview the various owners through whose property access to the various blocks will be gained for the telephone wires which are to be placed underground. This course was decided upon at a meeting between the aldermanic board and R. B. McMicking, local manager of the telephone company last evening.

Mr. McMicking explained that the Mayor Hall and Alderman Mable

pany last evening.

Mr. McMicking explained that the first thing necessary is to get a list of those places where connection will be made to the various blocks from the main conduits on the street, and to make arrangements with the owners to permit of entry being made. It is proposed to run a conduit from the corner of Blanchard and Cormorant street where the company has secured. a site for the new exchange, east to Wharf street, along Wharf to Bastion and up the latter to Langley. From this conduit all that section west of Government street will be served.

Another conduit will run to Fort street and one also along Douglas street and down View to Broad street, whence a conduit will extend southerly about half way between View and Fort street. From this conduit all those blocks between Government street and Broad street south of Trounce avenue will be served. A conduit will also run along Broughton street from Douglas

The territory covered extends from Johnson street on the north to the Empress hotel on the south, and from Blanchard street on the east to the waterfront. The system at conduits will give the company access to every will give the company access to every block, and if carried out will permy of all the wires being placed underground. Government street will not be touched except where the conduit rorosses at Johnson street.

It is impossible at present to compute what the exact cost of the improvement will be. The original scheme was estimated to cost \$55,000, but the present plans is likely to prove



SIGNIFICANCE OF HEBREW WORDS

To-nght at the Y. M. C. A. Mark Levy will deliver his final Bible ad-dress on "Christian Symbols in Jewish Feasts." Last. night the Rt. Rev. Bishop Perrin presided and Mr. Levy spoke in part as follows, on "The Sig-nificance of Hebrew Words." When the Psalmist said, "The en-trance of Thy words giveth light," the spiritual force is stronger in the He-

trance of Thy words giveth light," the spiritual force is stronger in the Hebrew than appears in the English. Every Hebrew noun is derived from a verb root, and almost every name in the Old Testament has a special significance, associated with the person, place or circumstance described.

It is said that ancient Israelites were so jealous of the Word of God that they numbered every letter and the middle

so jealous of the Word of God that they numbered every letter and the middle letter of every word of the Old Testament. Christ Himself said that not the smallest hook of the smallest letter should pass away till all be fulfilled. In Israel one of the titles of Messigh is Mamre (word) making dear the declaration of St. John, "In the beginning was the word; and the word was with God, and the word was God." Another title of Messiah is Amas (truth); this word is composed of the first, last, other title of Messiah is Amas (truth); this word is composed of the first, last, and middle letter of the Hebrew alpha-bet, with which the Hight Psalim is so significantly associated, as referring to Christ, who is the Aleph and Tau (Greek Alpha and Omega.) God gave to Abraham the promise that his seed should be as the stars of

that his seed should be as the stars of the heavens and as the sand of the sea, making clear the significance of his name, "father of a great multitude." Isaac signifies "laughter," to denote the unbetief of Sarah when she was promised a son in her old age and her joy at his birth, Jacob (supplanter), denotes his early character, until re-penting at Peniel, he receives a new

penting at Penicl, he receives a new name, Israel (a prince or prevailer with God.)
David means Beloved, illustrating the text, "This is my beloved son," i.e., my David's son, in fulfilment of an ancient prophecy (Jas., 23:5-6), when Christ said to the Syrophenician woman, "If is not meet to take the children's bread and give it unto dogs." He probably meant nothing harsher than "It is not meet to give the children's bread to those who 'yelp' against them."

It was while he was engaged on this biography that he was requested by It was white the was requested by Queen Victoria to write the "Life of His Royal Highness Prince Consort," the first volume of which appeared in 1874. About a mile above the dam there is a waste weir, built of cement concrete upon bedrock, \$4 feet long, crest 4½ feet below crest of dam. Capacity of this weir is 2,500 million imperial gallons during a day of 24 hours. In addition there is another waste weir 49 feet wide cut into bedrock bottom 4 feet below crest of dam. All timber on margin of old lake and to a vertical height of 26 feet above old lake level, was cut down and burned.
