Encouragement for the timid from the lessons of history—A writer in discussing the question, are we to be subjugated by the North, says:

The history of all civilized nations of past ages answer this question decidedly in the negative. Greece, a small republic, consisting of not more than an half dozen states, whose population did not exceed three million, was invaded for the purpose of subjugation by the Persian monarch, X as s, with an army more numerous thau the entire population of the country they invaded; but her soldiers were well disciplined and brave, and the result was that Persia "failed to subjugate ber," and her invaders returned home with not more than the fiftieth part of the army that entered Greece,

England, with a population four times more numerous than that of Scotland, by taking advantage of the domestic discords of that country, for more than two centuries, at various times, attempted her subjugation, and in the reign of Edward II, did succeed, with a powerful army in overrunning the entire country, taking every fortress, their capital and every scaport town, and yet, notwithstanding her chiefs who fled to her mountains, in a few years assembled a powerful army of determined men, and at the field of Bannocsburn, so completely vanquished and dispersed the British army, that it was the last attempt that England ever made at subjugation, and though the two kingdoms afterwards became united under the same monarch, it was the result of civil compromise and not of conquest.

But a case more analogous to that of the Southern States and that of the Northern government presents itself in that of Spain and Portugal Portugal was a department of Spain, separated by a chain of mountains, and containing a population less than onefourth of the entire kingdom. Portugal felt, or fancied, that she did not enjoy equal privileges with the other departments, and, therefore, in a convention, passed a resolution to secede from the Spanish government and have a government of their own. Spain called this rebellion, and sent a powerful army by land and sea to crush it out. Portugal also assembled an army which was commanded by the duke of Braganza, and after many years effort of alternate defeat and victory, Spain abandoned the country, and finally aeknowledged her as an independent kingdom, and her rebel duke as king.

Scotland in her efforts was without a navy—so was Portugal, and the ports of each, all the while under the strictest blockade, and neither of them possessed of half the internal resources for the supply of food or arms as are the Confederate States, and each of them had to contend with a greater numerical difference in the field. It follows, therefore, as a fact, that if we suffer ourselves to be subjugated, it is because we are less brave than either of these kingdoms. This we do not believe, and therefore utterly discard all apprehension of subjugation.

Perfection is attained by slow degrees; she requires the hand of time.

POTASH—A HINT TO FARMERS.—The great scarcity of soap at the present time arises from the want of potash and soda-ash. Either will make soap. The latter is found in its natural state (*natron*) in Egypt and South America, but the principal supply has been obtained from Great Britain, proc d by the burning of sea-weeds.

There is in the Southern States any quantity of material to make potash, and I would call the attention of farmers to its production. It requires but a simple process in its manufacture. A few large iron kettles or pots, and a half dozen whiskey barrels with heads cut out, and an iron ladle, being all the apparatus required. Most weeds furnish potash in a greater or less quantity to every 1,000 pounds. The following plants will furnish of potash:

Oak wood two and a half pounds; wheat straw, four and a quarter pounds; barley straw, five pounds; po-, tato stems, fifty-five pounds; corn stalks, seventeen pounds; oak, beech and elm leaves, twenty-four pounds. Those articles can be obtained by the farmer at little Select a shaded position, gather in a large heap, cost. set fire to them, keeping the fire up until several bushels of ashes are obtained; fill each barrel about onequarter full of ashes, mixing with them a quart of slack lime; fill it then with water, stirring the ashes well; let it stand over night, or for about twelve hours, stirring frequently; strain off the ley as clear as possible; pour in the kettles, and evaporate over a wood fire. The M '[A kettle should be kept constantly full for two days. little experience will soon teach the quantity of ley it will require to make them half full with potash.] The evaporation should be continued until the mass obtain the consistency of brown sugar; then increase the fire, by which it will be fused; continue it until quiescent, and looks like melted iron; with a ladle transfer it to iron pans or baking ovens, and aflow it to cool; it may be then broken in pieces, and packed in tight boxes or barrels.

#### RATES OF POSTAGE WITHIN THE CONFEDERATE STATES.

On Letters.- Single letters, not exceeding a half ounce in weight, for an<sup>y</sup> distance within the Confederate States, ten cents. An additional single rat<sup>®</sup> for each additional half ounce or less. Drop letters two cents each. In the foregoing cases, the postage to be prepaid by stamps or stamped envelopes. Advertised letters two cents each.

On Packages.—Larger packages, containing other than printed or written matter—money packages are included in this class—are rated by weight as letters are rated, and to be charged double the rates of postage on letters, to wit: for any distance, twenty cents for each half ouce or less. In all cases to be prepaid by stamps or stamped envelopes.

On Newspapers-Sent to regular and bona fide subscribers from the office of publication, and not exceeding three ownees in weight: Within the State where published Monthly, three cents per quarter, or one cent for each number. An addi-Semi-monthly, six cents per quarter, or one cent for each number. An addisemi-monthly, six cents per quarter, or one cent for each number. An additional cent each number for every addition-1 ownee or less beyond the first one and half ownees. Bit monthly or quarterly, one cent an ownee. In all cases, the postage to be paid quarterly in advance at the offices of subscribers. Without the state where published-Not exceeding one and half ownees in weight: Monthly, six cents per quarter, or two cents for each number. Semi-monthly, twelve cents per quarter, or two cents for each number. Two cents additional for every additional ownce or less beyond the first one and half ownees. Bi-monthly or quarterly, two cents an ownee. In all cases, the postage must be paid quarterly in advance at the offices of subscribers.

On Transient Printed Matter.—Every other newspaper, pamphlet, periodical and magazine, each circular and sealed hand bill and engraving, not exceeding three ounces in weight, two cents for any distance; two cents additional for each additional ounce or less beyond the first three ounces. In all cases, the postage to be prepaid by stamps or stamped envelopes.

Franking Privilege—The following persons only are entitled to the franking privilege, and in all cases strictly confined to official business: The Postmaster General and his chief clerk; the Auditor of the Treasury for the Post Office Department, and deputy postmasters.

By an act of Congress, approved July 20th, 1861. letters written or sent by any officer, musician or private in the army, may be transmitted through the mails without prepayment of postage, provided said letters shall be endorsed with the name, etc., and shall be on account of the individual sending the same. A similar privilege is given to members of Congress. In both-cases, the postage is paid by the persons receiving the letters.

For Rheumatism, Sprains and Bruises.—Take a quart of spirits of wine, two ounces of laudanum, one ounce of oil of pennyroyal, and one ounce of oil of amber; mix them and apply the mixture to the part affected. The following is also good for the rheumatism. Put a gill of gymson seed into a pint bottle; fill the bottle with the fine chips of a pitch pine knot; then fill it with strong alcohol. In three days the virtue of the chips and of the seed will be extracted, the alcohol turning of a greenish color. Bathe the parts affected a few times, and it will destroy the pain. A decoction of wormwood, or the bruised leaves, moistened and applied, is a good application for a bruise or sprain.

Diseases in Fowls.—To frequently cure, and invariably to prevent the spread of a distember among chickens, known as the Roup, keep the trough supplied with a decoction of red oak bark, and allow the fowls no other drink. The distemper, which differs from roup by its absence of protuberances and ulcers on the head, but which is marked by the *yellowness of the skin* and difficulty of breathing, will be effectually arrested by keeping their troughs filled with tolerably strong ley and compelling the fowls to use it by keeping pure water out of their reach.

Candles.—To make a candle equal to the adamantine, add one pound of unslaked lime to twenty pounds of melted tallow, and strain it before moulding. To make an economical, but somewhat unsightly candle, add a quarter of a pound of beeswax to two pounds of tallow.

To prevent the formation of a crust in tea kettles.— Keep an oyster shell in your tea kettle. By attracting the stony particles to itself, it will prevent the formation of a crust.

Liquid Blacking.—Mix and stir well together four ounces of ivory-black, six gills of vinegar, two spoonfuls of molasses, and one of sweet oil.

Rice Bread.—Boil six ounces of rice in a quart of water till dry and soft; put it into two pounds of flour and mix it well; add two teaspoonfuls of yeast, and enough milk or water to make it of a proper consistency. Bake it in moulds, when well risen.

Aromatic Vinegar.—Mix with a spoonful of vinegar powdered chalk sufficient to destroy its acidity; let it settle; turn off the vinegar from the chalk with care, and dry it. To purify an infected room, put in a few drops of sulphuric acid. The fumes arising from it will purify a room where there has been an infectious disorder. In using it, be very careful not to inhale the fumes, or to soil your garments with the acid. It will corrode whatever it touches.

Cough Mixture.—With twenty teaspoonfuls of honey, mix ten of brandy, sixty drops of laudanum, and forty drops of elixir vitriol. Tako two or three teaspoonfuls of the mixture on going to bed; and a teaspoonful any time after coughing.

Candles-To make a candle equal to the adamantine, add one pound of unslaked lime to twenty pounds of melted tallow, and strain it before moulding. To make an economical, but somewhat unsightly, candle, add a quarter of a pound of beeswax to two pounds of tallow.

Diseases in Fowls-To frequently cure, and invariably to prevent the spread of a distemper among chickens, known as the Roup, keep the troughs supplied with a decoction of red oak bark, and allow the fowls no other drink. The distemper, which differs from roup by its absence of protuberances and ulcers on the head, but which is marked by the yellowness of the skin and difficulty of breathing, will be effectually arrested hy keeping their troughs filled with tolerably strong ley and compelling the fowls to use it by keeping pure water out of their reach.

For Rheumatism, Sprains and Bruises-Take a quart of spirits of wine, two ounces of laudanum, one ounce of oil of pennyroyal, and one ounce of oil of amber; mix them and apply the mixture to the part affected. The following is also good for the rheumatism. But a gill of gymson seed into a pint hottle; fill the bottle with the fine chips of a pitch pine knot; then fill it with strong alcohol. In three days the virtue of the chips and of the seed will be extracted, the alcohol turning of a greenish color. Bathe the parts affected a few times, and it will destroy the pain. A decoction of wormwood, or the bruised leaves, moistened and applied, is a good application for a bruise or sprain.

Liquid Blacking-Mix and stir well together four ounces of ivoryblack, six gills of vinegar, two spoonfuls of molasses, and one of sweet oil.

*Rice Gruel*—Put into six gills of boiling water a spoonful of rice, and a little mace or cinnamon; strain it when soft, adding half a pint of new milk; and then boil it a few minutes longer with a teaspoonful of salt.

To make the gruel of rice flour, mix a spoonful of it smoothly with three of cold water, and stir it into a quart of boiling water. Boil five or six minutes, stirring it constantly. Season with a little salt and pepper, adding nutmeg and loaf sugar if liked.

Windsor Soap—To make the celebrated Windsor soap, slice the best white bar soap as thin as possible, and melt it over a slow fire; then take it off. and when lukewarm, add sufficient oil of caraway, to scent it, or any other fragrant oil. Pour it into moulds, and let it remain five or six days in a dry place.

, For a Felon—Roast a lump of salt of the size of a walnut, wrapped in a cabbage leaf, and pulverize it. Take the same quantity of shaving soap, and the same of bar soap, and make all into a very smooth salve; soak the felon in lye; apply the salve; in twentyhours, pare down where it looks like breaking, till you open it; put on basilicon salve.

Superior Writing Ink---Mix with a gallon of pure soft water, and stir in well, twelve ounces of coarsely-powdered Aleppo galls, six of chipped logwood, five of protosulphate of iron, five of gumarabic, and two of dry sugar.

To pot Butter for Winter-Into six pounds of new made butter, work the mixture of a spoonful of powdered white sugar, one of salt, and one of saltpetre. When you have finished putting down your butter, in a stone pot, cover it with fine salt, put in alternate layers of salt with the butter; cover so close as to exclude the air. Some prefer potting butter in brine-make the brinc of the saltness wished for the butter, add half a spoonful of saltpetre to two gallons of brine, made by turning boiling water on the salt. Put it to the butter when cold, and let it cover the butter. Another method: free the butter entirely of the buttermilk; work it up quickly with about half an ounce of salt to the pound; let it lay one day or longer; beat well together four ounces of salt, two of loaf sugar, and a quarter of an ounce of saltpetre, and work the mixture thoroughly into the butter, allowing half an ounce for every pound. Pack it in jars or tubs, and place a layer of the mixture in folds of thin muslin, stitching it loosely and placing it neatly over the top.

To preserve vegetables through the Winter-Keep succulent vegetables in a damp, shady, cool place. Protect potatoes, turnips, and similar vegetables from the air and frost, by burying them in sand. Potatoes will not sprout it is said, if covered with charcoal dust. It is also said that sweet potatoes will keep months thus-packed in boxes of dry sand, exposed to the influences of smoke.
