Salad Broccoli

This is a variety of Broccoli which has come into prominence within the last two years, especially on the eastern shore of Maryland and Delaware, and is taking the place of Hardy Winter Borecole in many other sections, it has proven a very profitable crop.

Cultural Suggestions

For Salad Broccoli

Select a good piece of land, medium soil, plow thoroughly. Drill in about 4 to 500 lbs. of a high grade fertilizer. Sow in rows from 30 to 32 inches apart. It is best to use a seed planter. Sow to depth of ½ inch. Use about 2 lbs. per acre. Sow from the 10th to the 20th of August. Cultivate 2 or 3 times in Fall.

In cold weather the tops will die down. As soon as it begins to get a little warm in February use a top dressing of Nitrate of Soda or some quick acting fertilizer. Cultivate after putting the top dressing on. The leaves may be cut and shipped to northern markets like New York City, commanding a fine price.

About middle of March it will begin to stalk up with several shoots on each stalk with green blossoms. When stalks get about 8 inches high cut and tie in bunches like asparagus with one and one-half lbs. per bunch. Ship in crates 2 dozen bunches per crate. If weather is warm cutting will commence around the middle of March and last until around the 10th of April. If weather is warm can be cut 2 to 3 times per week.





Asparagus Roots Plant either in Spring or Fall

Directions. Select a good sandy loam, plow the ground as deep as possible, dig trenches 4 ft. apart, and 14 to 18 inches deep, put in a layer of 4 inches of good strong stable manure, and press down; cover manure with about 1 inch of soil then place crowns 15 inches apart with roots straightened, then cover roots or crowns to level of land.

Culture. Beans are somewhat tender, but it often pays to take some risk. Plant in warm, loamy soil at the beginning of settled, warm weather in Spring, and at intervals for succession until August. Rows may be made 2 feet apart, and the beans planted not more than 1 inch deep and several inches apart in the drills, or 3 or 4 beans in hills 6 to 8 inches apart. Cultivate and hoe frequently, always, however, when the vines are perfectly dry. In hoeing draw the soil up towards the rows or plants. For String Beans, gather the pods clean as fit for use. The plants will remain all the longer in bearing. 1008. Giant Stringless. This is a great improvement on the old-time popular favorite Valentine Bean. The pods are fully one-third longer, averaging 5 to 6 inches in length; absolutely stringless, very crisp, round, full and fleshy. 

Make the rows 3 feet apart and give to each plant 6 inches space in the row. A top dressing of poultry manure, ashes or some good fertilizer or some good compost around the plants will be of much benefit in hastening maturity and increasing the yield.



Culture. Early Cabbage requires a rich, warm, loam soil well drained; and the soil for the late Cabbage should be heavier and more retentive of moisture and not so rich as for early crops, as the heads are liable to burst.

To have Cabbage real early, sow seed in hotbed in February, or still better, Winter over the crops in a cold frame. For this purpose the seed is sown from the tenth to the twentieth of September. From four or five weeks from the time of sowing they will be fit to transplant into the cold frames. It is very important that the plants be set down to the first leaves so that the stem is all under the ground, otherwise the stem would split by the action of the frost.

These early Cabbage plants are set out in March or April, Inese early Cabbage plants are set out in March or April, in rows three feet apart and 18 inches between the plants. The early crop matures in June. For second early crop, sow seed first week in April and plant, out in May. The crop matures in July and August. 





Culture. One ounce will produce about twenty-five hundred plants and sow about two hundred feet of row. Sow the last of March or early in April, in an open border, in rich, mellow ground in shallow drills, watering freely in dry weather. By rolling or pressing in the seed, the result will be more satisfactory than when only covered. Cut the tops off once or twice before planting out, to make them stocky. When the plants are 5 or 6 inches high, transplant the dwarf varieties 3 feet and the taller sort 4 feet between the rows; plant 6 inches apart in the rows. Cultivate well and when large enough, blanch by earthing up. The first operation is that of "handling," generally done by the beginning of September. After the soil has been drawn up with the hoe, it is drawn around each plant by hand to keep the leaves firm in upright position and prevent spreading. When plants have become "set" in an upright position and the Celery is wanted for early use, they should be "banked." This is done by throwing the soil up as close to the plants as possible with a plow and finishing it with a spade, bringing the earth nearly up to the tops of the plants. The method employed now for protecting it is by covering the tops of the banks with waterproof felt paper.

Culture. Sow in hotbeds in March, and when the soil has become warm, set in rows 3 feet apart and 24 inches in the row; hoe frequently; the plants may also be forwarded in small pots.



GENERAL CULTURAL DIRECTIONS


The seed of plants that you wish to get started early can easily be sown in-doors, in shallow boxes or seed pans, not over three inches deep. About one inch of rough material like coal ashes should be placed in the bottom, and on top of this another inch of fine sifted soil consisting of one-third each of sand, leaf mould and garden loam. After the surface has been smoothed and lightly pressed, sow the seed evenly and cover with more soil to a depth of about twice the diameter of the seed. Then press firmly and water. Cover with a pane of glass, keep in a temperature of about 65 degrees and water carefully as needed. As the seeds grow, the glass can be removed and the plants transplanted into small pots from which they are afterwards planted in the open ground. When sowing seed out-doors, the ground should be thoroughly spaded and raked until the top is as smooth and fine as possible. The seeds should be covered three or four times their diameter in order to prevent rains from washing them out. Do not sow until all danger of frost is over.

Culture. Dig a trench 2 feet deep and 2 feet wide and fill with rich soil which has been carefully mixed with well rotted manure or black mold from the woods and generously sprinkled with lime. Early planting is necessary for best results with Sweet Peas as it gives the plants opportunity to develop good deep root systems to sustain them during the hot days. When the warm weather does come, such plants then make a strong upward growth. Hardy Lilies

With the exception of *Lilium candidum*, which seems to prefer an open position, most Lilies thrive best when planted in a semi-shaded situation where the ground can be kept cool and moist by the protection of shrubs and a carpet of lawngrass cuttings. Planted among shallow-rooting perennials or rhododendrons, they find a congenial situation both as to soil and shelter. The bulbs should be planted from 6 to 8 inches deep, with a little sand or spagnum moss under the base of each bulb.

Auratum. (Gold-Banded Japan Lily.) Undoubtedly one of the finest. Its large graceful, fragrant flowers are composed of six petals of a delicate ivory-white color, thickly studded with chocolate-crimson spots and striped through the center a golden yellow; 3 to 5 feet. There is perhaps no plant or flower so generally cultivated today as the Rose. Its wonderful beauty and fragrance make it the most popular of flowers. For extensive grounds, small lawns, porch trellis or hedges, Roses are used with charming effects. Many persons think it difficult to grow Roses, but

such is not the case; good soil and a little care will insure fine, hardy plants and beautiful blossoms.

The following sorts are the most popular, very hardy and will bloom throughout the season. We offer only the best 2 yr. old, field grown Roses. They will run 3-5 branches and will bloom the first year.

Planting and Care of Roses

Roses should be planted in good, rich soil. Dig the hole deep enough so that it can be set in the ground about two inches below where it was budded. That will prevent suckers from growing up from the natural root. Do not trim the root off too severely, but cut the tops off about eight inches above the top of the ground. Pack good rich soil thoroughly around the roots, being careful not to let any compost come in contact with the roots. Keep the top of the earth thoroughly worked around the bushes the entire season. 

Hardy Flowering Shrubs



Shrubs are of great importance in beautifying the home grounds. Always changing in variety of bloom, color of foliage and growth. They are of perennial interest. They can be used in many ways, as a dividing line between vegetable and flower garden, or lawn, hiding unsightly buildings, a background for the flower garden or foundation planting.

The acreage space for planting is 3 ft. for dwarf varieties and 5 ft. for the taller ones. As a general rule, shrubs should be pruned just after they have finished flowering.

The best time to plant is in early spring as soon as the ground can be worked, until about May 10.

We have offered below some of the most popular flowering shrubs, but will be pleased to correspond with any of our customers desirous of getting other varieties.

Abelia grandiflora. White, heather-like flowers, tinted lilac, completely cover the plant.

ALTHEA (Rose of Sharon)

The Altheas are among the most valuable of our tall, hardy shrubs on account of their late season of blooming, which is from August to October, when few shrubs are in flower. They are extensively used as hedge plants. Red, Pink, White, and Purple.

CALYCANTHUS OR ALLSPICE

Sweet Scented, or Strawberry, Shrub. Bears great numbers of double, dull brownish purple flowers of exquisite, aromatic, strawberry-like fragrance.

CORNUS (Dogwood)

The care given baby chicks during the first few days of their lives is vitally important. This cannot be emphasized too strongly. Heavy mortality can usually be traced right back to this critical period. Chick mortality can be reduced greatly by following these simple suggestions, which have been found to be the most satisfactory through experience gained in handling thousands of chicks.

The brooder stoves and houses must be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected. The floor of the house covered with clean chaff, cut clover or sand to the depth of at least one-half inch. The stoves started at least two days before the chicks arrive, with the temperature at the edge of the canopy around 100° Fahrenheit.

When the chicks arrive examine them carefully, and see that all are bright and lively. Some may show signs of slow development after a few days. Such chicks should be removed from the main flock where they can be given special attention. Unless they show signs of improvement, they should not be put back with the others, but should be either fed for market or destroyed. The best time to put the chicks under the hover is just before dark. Take a few out of the boxes at a time and get them settled under the hover before putting the others under. Avoid excitement and noise as much as possible.

Chicks which have travelled some distance are usually upset and nervous. Be sure that they have quieted down before giving them any feed. Grit and tepid water should be before them all the time. Do not give cold water under any circumstances.

THE FIRST FEEDING

On the label of our boxes you will find the date the chicks were hatched. Give them their first feed of "Square Deal" Buttermilk Starting Feed when they are seventy-two hours old. You cannot be too careful about the first feedings. Baby chicks are extremely delicate, and are often killed by too much kindness and too much feed. After they have become thoroughly settled, put down several clean boards or papers, and put on them a handful or two of "Square Deal" Starting Feed. Attract their attention to the feed by tapping the boards lightly with the finger tips. Do not allow the chicks to eat longer than fifteen minutes at each feeding, then gather up all the feed which was not eaten. They should be fed four times a day in this manner for the first four days. Leave the feed before them a few minutes longer each day, and one the fifth day put the feed in hoppers, keeping it before them all the time. On the evening of the fourth day scatter a few handfuls of "Square Deal" Baby Chick Grains in the litter. Thereafter give the chicks a light grain feed both morning and evening.

If there is any green feed available, such as lettuce or sprouted oats, give the chicks a little of this each day. It will help materially.

Follow these directions and feeding instructions carefully until the chicks are six weeks old, with the exception of the grain ration, which should be changed from "Square Deal" Baby Chick Grains to "Square Deal" Developer Grains after the fourth week. At the end of the sixth week, start to change the feed to "Square Deal" Buttermilk Growing Mash, by mixing equal parts of starting feed and growing mash, gradually reducing the quantity of starting feed until the chicks are on the growing mash ration. This change should be completed in two weeks.


Keep a close watch on the chicks for lice. Clean the brooder houses frequently and spray with a good disinfectant each time. As soon as the weather permits, get the chicks on the ground into the sunlight. This will tend to prevent leg weakness, toe picking and other vices.

As soon as the cockerels can be determined, separate them from the pullets and feed them for market. "Square Deal" Buttermilk Fattening ration should be used for this purpose.

When the pullets grow to maturity, change their feed from growing mash to "Square Deal" Buttermilk Laying Mash and Scratch Grains in the same way the change from starting feed to growing mash was made.

CAPONIZING SETS

What are Capons?—A capon is a male bird (cockerel or rooster) from which the testicles have been removed. As in other animals—bull, horse, boar, etc.—this operation changes his nature entirely. He has only one function in life—to get fat, He makes quick meat, tender meat, and much of it, and best of all, he makes the highest-priced meat in the market. Properly killed and dressed, he attracts the attention of the best buyers—people to whom money is no object if they can get what they want.

Best Time to Caponize—Fowl hatched any time of the year make fine capons; no ill-results follow the operation at any time in the year. The bird should be from two to three months old (not over six months), and weigh not less than a pound and a half. The size is equally as important as the age. April, May, June, July, August, September and October are the months generally taken for caponizing, for the reason that spring chickens arrive at proper age and weight during these months; also because cockerels caponized then arrive at the proper age and weight for market during the months of November, December, January, February, March, April and May, at which time there is the greatest demand for them in the cities and highest prices secured.





Size of package that can be sent by Parcel Post cannot be over 84 inches in length and girth combined.

The rate of postage on mailable parcels of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots and plants, weighing 8 oz. or less, shall be 1c for each 2 oz. or fraction thereof, regardless of distance, and on those weighing more than 8 oz. the pound rates shown in table shall apply.

Weights by Parcel Post

Parcels up to 70 lbs. can be sent by Parcel Post in the local, 1st, 2nd and 3rd zones, and up to 50 lbs. in all other zones.

To points further than the 2nd zone, on weight of over 10 lbs. the charge by freight or express is usually more economical.
