## Chinese or Celery Cabbage

The most essential requirement for successfully raising Chinese cabbage is cool weather. Where the summers are warm, sowing must be delayed until early August. In the vicinity of Philadelphia, the first week of August is the best time. The plants develop quickly, forming large, tightly folded heads of tender leaves which are well blanched in the heart. Chinese cabbage can be served as salad like lettuce or, when cut, makes a delicious cold-slaw. Boiled, it is even more palatable than ordinary cabbage.

## Delphinium

During Delphinium blooming time there is hardly any florist who ever has enough of these stately spikes to supply the cut-flower trade. Delphiniums are hardy, and on account of their long flowering period and easy culture they occupy a place ahead of even Peonies and Phlox. Our strain of Belladonna Seedlings is particularly fine, ranging from light sky blue to deep rich purple. It is, however, the Belladonna Light Blue which seems to be in greatest demand for cut-flowers. Compact White and Compact Blue are of dwarfer growth and are planted mostly in the perennial border.

## Dianthus

The Annual Pinks make a very showy bed or border of neat appearance and are quite attractive even when the plants are not in bloom. In the Laciniatus varieties the flower petals are deeply cut in and fringed. The Perennial Dianthus, Plumarius, and Scoticus, fl. pl. are excellent low growing plants for perennial borders or the rock garden. Dianthus barbatus is listed under Sweet William, and Dianthus caryophyllus is referred to mostly as Carnation and is listed under that heading.


## Digitalis-Foxglove

Digitalis, or Foxglove as it is commonly known, is a biennial of handsome appearance, particularly when planted in groups. Florists who sell perennial plants to their trade will find a ready demand for the young plants. For this purpose the seeds should be sown during February to have ample plants ready for planting outdoors in May.

## Helichrysum-Strawflower

Heliotropes are splendid bedding plants, and if used for cutting the stems should be allowed to soak themselves full of water for a period of ten hours in a cool dark place. You will find a mong your plant trade in the spring a large number of customers who will buy small young plants for making garden beds.


## Hollyhocks

Hollyhocks are an essential to the old-fashioned garden, giving a display which is not equaled by any other perennial. The florist will find a ready sale for plants either during spring or fall; and whenever he is called upon to plant a perennial border he should be sure to have some plants on hand for this purpose. Any surplus plants should be allowed to flower, as the handsome spikes will bring a good price.

## Larkspur

The Annual Larkspur is important for all florists. It may be grown for winter or spring blooming indoors or for an outdoor display and cut-flowers. Our list of varieties includes a wide range of beautiful colors, some of them quite new and rare among this class. For outdoor blooming sow the seed about March 1, carrying the plants in a cold-frame or spent hotbed. The flowers will begin to appear early in May and for a continuous supply for cutting another sowing should be made early in April in a cold-frame, setting the plants into the open during the early part of May. For a still later supply sow about the middle of June to give plenty of cut-flowers during the fall months, when the blue shades are particularly rare.
