
A partial view of the late Cabbage trials at Fordhook, season 1924 All seeds sold by Burpee are tested twice at Fordhook







The House of Burpee has reason to be proud of its work in connection with the improvement and introduction of new lima beans. The first large-podded bush lima bean in existence, namely, Burpee's Bush Lima, was introduced by us in 1890. In 1907 both the Burpee Improved Bush Lima and Fordhook Bush Lima were placed on the market by Burpee. 

We are proud to realize that again we have an outstanding and most meritorious novelty in our New Philadelphia Bush Lima. It is the result of a cross between Burpee's Fordhook Bush Lima and Wood's Prolific, and embodies the good qualities of both parents. The pods are ready for picking seven days ahead

of Wood's Prolific and are of considerably larger size.

All extra-early varieties of Bush Limas hitherto introduced have small pods which usually contain but two or three beans, while our New Philadelphia Bush Lima produces pods which are comparatively large, flat, and nearly straight. The average pods measure 434 inches in length and 136 inches in width, containing four fair-sized flat beans of excellent quality. In color and general appearance the foliage is similar to Wood's Prolific, but slightly larger. The plants are of upright habit, producing pods in the greatest abundance well to the tip of the flower spikes which rise clear above the foliage. The earlier pods, however, are set quite close to the ground and are borne in clusters of six to eight. Southern planters will find that it far surpasses the bush Sieva or "Butter Bean," as it matures its pods considerably earlier and bears a much heavier crop.





Chinese or Celery Cabbage

The most essential requirement for successfully raising Chinese cabbage is cool weather. Where the summers are warm, sowing must be delayed until early August. In the vicinity of Philadelphia, the first week of August is the best time. The plants develop quickly, forming large, tightly folded heads of tender leaves which are well blanched in the heart. Chinese cabbage can be served as salad like lettuce or, when cut, makes a delicious cold-slaw. Boiled, it is even more palatable than ordinary cabbage.
