1. G-2 (FEC/LG) has a priority operational requirement for the following FM radio equipment for use in certain highly-classified projects currently underway:

- a. 2 ea. Land Station, Radio Set, Motorola - NSN FS-TR-140-BR-MW-1A
- b. 10 ea. Mobile Radio Set, Motorola - NSN FM-TR-80-D-MW-1A

2. FEC/LG has served a requisition for the above equipment upon CG, JLC, in accordance with procedures outlined in GHQ letter, short title GHQ-LS-51, dated 12 June 51. It has been informed, however, that this equipment is in depot stock but that its issue is controlled by GHQ Signal Section.

3. Through informal staff coordination it has been learned that the above is Class IV signal equipment and, as such, was procured under special project requisition on the ZI as ultimate replacements for FM Radio Sets AN/VRC-2 and AN/FRC-6 now in service with military police and similar units in the FEC.

4. G-2 has been informally advised by Signal Section that its desires to prevent depletion of its current stock-level on the Motorola equipment cited in para 1 above, have prompted its recommendation that FEC/LG draw AN/VRC-2 and AN/FRC-6 sets which are in more plentiful supply.

5. The clandestine and/or semi-covert nature of the FEC/LG operations for which two-way mobile FM voice radio is required renders it imperative that such mobile transceivers as are used be as inobtrusive as possible. Since the AN/VRC-2 mobile set is a two-unit transmitter/receiver and the Motorola set is an appreciably smaller single-unit transmitter/receiver, the latter set's use in sensitive operations seems indicated. Contrariwise, the greater bulk of the AN/VRC-2--especially when installed in non-military jeeps--fails to render it a satisfactory replacement for the Motorola set.

6. The overall FEC/LG requirement for Motorola FM sets (FS-TR-140 and FM-TR-80) is included in a FEC/LG Table of Allowances now in preparation.

7. Request, therefor, immediate release of equipment outlined in para 1, above.

1. FEC/LG has a requirement for ten (10) mobile two-way FM radios and two (2) fixed FM radios. The required items are sets produced for the Signal Corps by the Motorola Company.
2. These radios are necessary for use by Zed Unit, FEC/LG to provide vehicle-to-vehicle and vehicle-to-base station two-way contact in the conduct of Zed's counterespionage operations.
3. Yokohama Signal Depot (JLC) stocks the particular set in question. Due to the fact that this radio is a specially-procured item (it is in current use throughout the FEC by Military Police, fire marshals, etc.) and not one of recurring issue from ZI to FEC depots, it is carried in depots as a "controlled item" whose release must be authorized by GHQ Signal Section.
4. FEC/LG served on JLC a requisition for the items cited in para 1, above, in accordance with procedures outlined in letter, short title: GHQ-LS-51. Since this letter states that "authority is granted to issue...all classes of supplies, equipment and/or services required (by FEC/LG) without regard to established TO&E and TD authorization...", and since letter further indicates that "...the authority for issue will be this letter and no other authority shall be requested or required", FEC/LG has encountered no difficulty in the past in obtaining required materiel.
5. On receipt of FEC/LG requisition for the Motorola radios at JLC Signal Section, FEC/LG Supply Officer was informed that issue could not be effected without specific authorization of GHQ Signal Section.
6. Informal coordination with GHQ Signal Section (Lt Col Bond, Sig Supply) reveals the Signal's position re issue of these sets is as follows:
 - a. Radios needed by G-2 were procured from ZI as replacements for FM two-way sets currently in service throughout the FEC.
 - b. Theoretically, each radio of this type now in depot is "earmarked" on a 1-to-1 basis to replace a wartime-type set still in use in some areas. ("If an act of God wiped out all the now-in-service sets of this type tomorrow, we couldn't replace them, one for one, if G-2 draws ten radios already allocated as 'replacements'.")
 - c. Since the Motorola-type set is a non-standard item and specially procured, Signal cannot draw readily on the ZI for ten additional sets (it has a considerably larger quantity in depot stock). Thus, any draw by FEC/LG of this item will decrease the signal depot's stock-level below "normal." Since maintenance of proper stock level is a cardinal supply rule, Signal

states it can, if it desires, officially state that these sets are "not available", even though hundreds of them lie on depot shelves.

7. Subsequent informal coordination between FEC/LG, Signal Supply and G-4 (Col Griffin, Supply Div) evinced discussion of GHQ-LS-51. Although this letter provides for submission of quarterly forecasts (now in preparation by FEC/LG) for foreseeable advance requirements, it specifies that "...such forecasts are not to preclude rendering logistical support for unforeseen requirements where material desired can be furnished from existing stocks without adversely affecting support of combat operations."

8. Both Signal and G-4 agree that issue of these radios will have no affect on combat operations in Korea. They point up the fact that letter GHQ-LS-51 (although thoroughly staffed through and concurred in by G-2 prior to approval by Chief of Staff) makes no provision to allow the various Technical Services to draw on ZI supply points to replace stock issued to FEC/LG. They state that (and, again, this is theoretical) all of FEC/LG's past requirements have been met by supply depots "because we happen to have excess in the depots."

9. In essence, the issue now raised by the supply people is whether, as GHQ-LS-51 states, "the authority for issue will be this letter and no other authority shall be requested or required", or whether FEC/LG requirements shall be met only if a technical service considers its depot stocks surplus to its present and future needs.

10. Signal, in its attempt to hold its Motorola radios, has suggested that FEC/LG draw an older, World War II-developed set which it terms a "suitable substitute." Using agencies who have been contacted, however, categorically state the the wartime set is not dependable under certain transmission conditions (it cannot send or receive in a variety of city conditions) while the Motorola model has eliminated these "bugs". Further, for Zed use, it is imperative that the radio used be as inobtrusive as possible. The older set is a two-unit, cumbersome combination; the new radio is a siggle-unit, compact job--much more readily hidden.

11. G-4 has recommended that G-2 submit its request for the Motorola radios by Check Sheet to Signal through G-4. The attached ~~check sheet~~ Check Sheet embodies this request.

12. Recommend approval, signature and dispatch of Check Sheet (Incl 1).

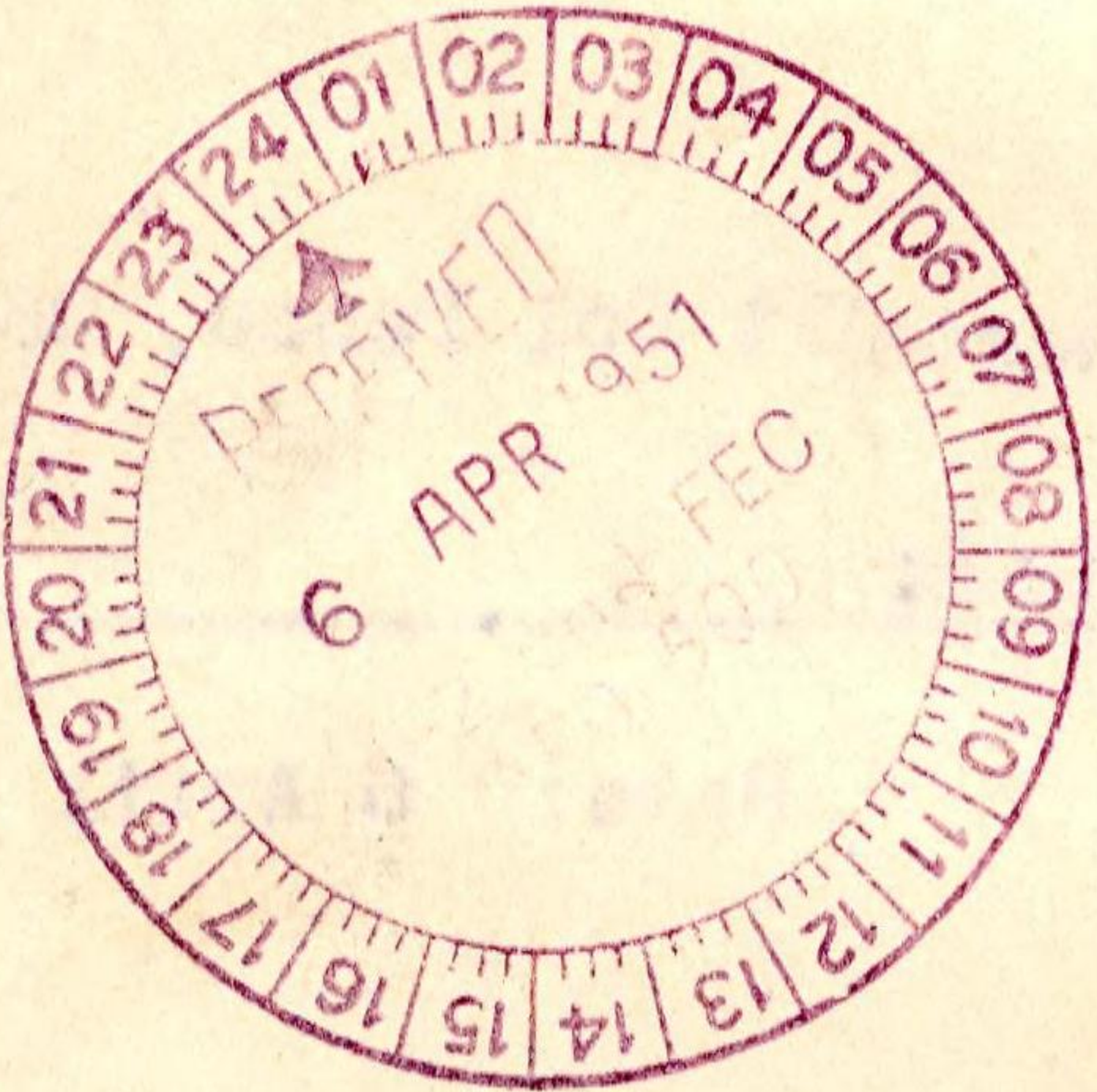

1. This headquarters plans to organize as a separate unit, the 1st Operating Platoon of the 126th Signal Service Company (RI), APO 9. The 126th Signal Service Company is presently operating a fixed installation in Kyoto. The 1st Operating Platoon will be sent to Korea.

2. It is planned that the 1st Operating Platoon will operate ten (10) intercept positions. The 126th Signal Service Company has on hand sufficient Intercept Centrals TC-9 to provide operating space for the platoon. Experience has proven that intercept results are greatly improved when receivers BC 1004 or equivalent are employed. Receivers of this type presently authorized the 126th Signal Service Company are employed in the fixed installation.

3. It is requested that authority be granted to requisition twelve (12) BC 1004 (or equivalent) receivers. The issue of this equipment would be over and above equipment presently authorized the Company. The receivers BC 342 presently in the Intercept Centrals TC-9 would be used to double bank the intercept positions. Twelve (12) receivers BC 1004 have been requested in order to provide two (2) spares for maintenance purposes.

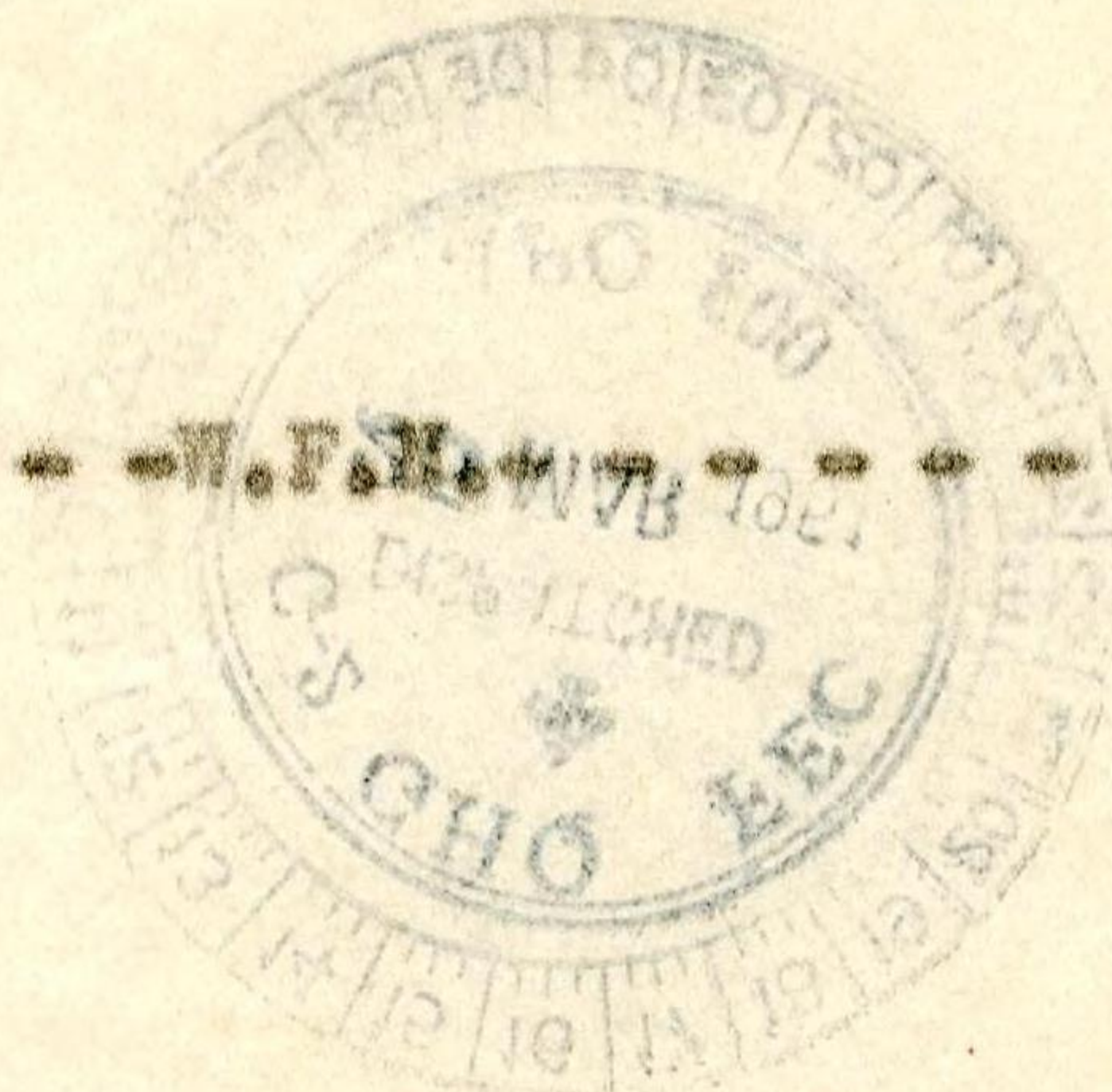

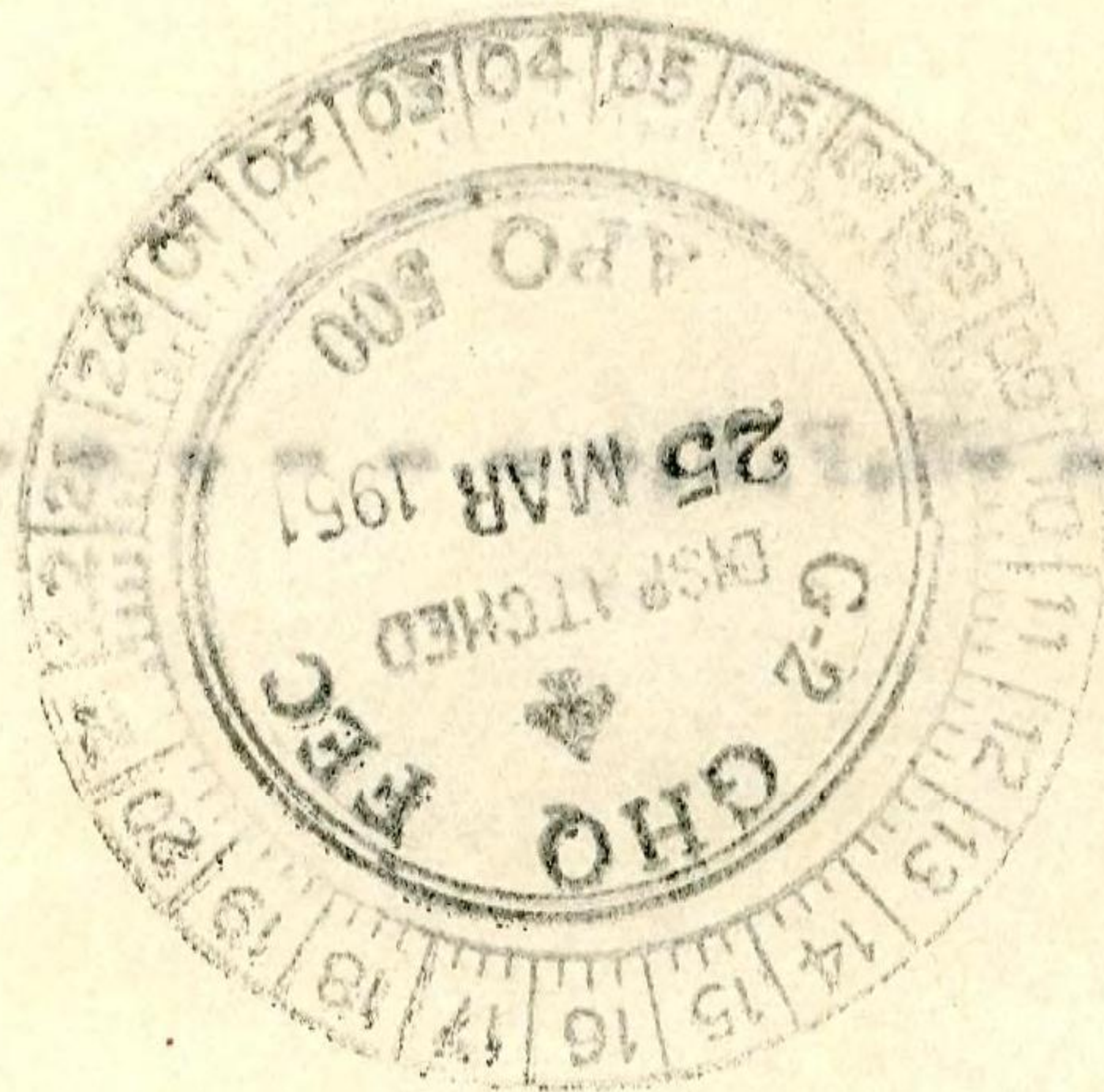

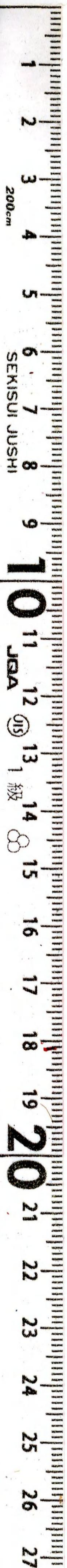

SUBJECT: Maintenance and Supply of Signal Equipment

TO: Commanding General, Eighth Army, APO 301
Commanding General, Japan Logistical Command, APO 343

1. Reference General Headquarters, Far East Command, Terrain Study Number Six - North Korea.

2. Attention is invited to Tab XIX of reference 1, which provides detailed information concerning average annual weather conditions in Korea. Particular note should be made of the months of June, July, August, and September, during which the heaviest rainfall occurs, and during which the relative humidity is very often in excess of 90%.

3. Heavy rainfall and high humidity are particularly hazardous to the operation of communications equipment.

4. In order to limit Signal communication failures during the rainy season, it is suggested that the following actions be taken by Commanding General, Eighth Army, prior to June 1951:

a. Conduct technical inspections of Signal equipment in using units to insure that proper organizational maintenance is being accomplished. Particular attention should be given to equipment gaskets and weatherseals.

b. Insure that organizations have on hand their full authorization of both major Signal items and maintenance parts.

c. Explore the need for waterproof covers to be used on Signal equipment in the field and advise Commanding General, Japan Logistical Command, of requirements.

d. Insure that Signal depot stocks in Korea, both major items and maintenance parts, are raised to, and maintained at, authorized thirty-day level.

1. Signal equipment is particularly susceptible to failure when operated under conditions of high rainfall and high humidity. It is essential that weatherseals be in good condition to prevent the entrance of fluid moisture. It is also essential that cleaning as required by first echelon procedures be accomplished to prevent hygroscopic dust particles from adsorbing moisture and causing circuit failures.

2. Since even the best maintenance cannot prevent a substantial increase in the rate at which equipment fails during period of high rainfall and relative humidity, it is essential that depot stocks be at full authorized levels when the rainy season begins.

1. PSD/G-2 concurs in the proposed SCAPIN 2075/1.

2. Marine radar is standard equipment on most merchant marine vessels and is used primarily for decreasing the casualty incident rate caused by undetected hazards to navigation.

3. The tremendous intra-island commerce of Japan in hazardous waters, where permanent navigational aids are not completely reliable and where protracted periods of poor visibility are the rule, the use of radar on Japanese ships is highly desirable.

4. In view of present world conditions and the shortage in foreign exchange, sources of imported radar may be curtailed or completely cut off at any time. PSD/G-2 believes that the Japanese should be permitted access to this scientific field of research, manufacture and development of radar navigational aids.

1. Inclosed draft of check sheet to Chief of Staff recommends approval of proposed SCAPIN 2075/1 intended to permit manufacture by the Japanese of radar required for marine navigational use.
2. SCAP radar policy as set forth in SCAPIN 2075 prohibits research, development, design, and manufacture of radar required for marine navigational use but does not prohibit importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of such radar.
3. This prohibition results in expenditure of foreign exchange for importation into Japan of radar for navigational use in all cases where radar is installed in Japanese vessels.
4. Ninety-six sets necessitating the expenditure of approximately \$1,028,400.00 in foreign exchange were approved for import into Japan for the period January 1950 through January 1951.
5. One hundred fifty sets of foreign type radar will be required during the 1951 calendar year to meet expanding Japanese requirements for navigational radar.
6. Since radar for marine navigational use falls into the permitted category it is deemed appropriate to remove restrictions on such radar to permit research, development, design and manufacture by the Japanese of this type of radar.
7. It is believed that several years will elapse before Japanese technicians together with Japanese industry will produce navigational radar of the quality and quantity required for an export program.
8. Request comments or concurred in proposed policy to permit research, development, design, manufacture, importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of radar for marine navigational use.

1. SCAP radar policy as set forth in SCAPIN 2075, among other uses, permits importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of foreign made radar required for marine navigational use. (TAB A)

2. Memorandum for Record, 8 February 1951, Subj: Importation of Foreign Made Radar Equipment for Navigational Purposes, indicates that 96 sets costing approximately \$1,028,400 were approved for import into Japan through January 1951 and that the import program for the calendar year 1951 will require importation of approximately 150 sets of foreign type radar to meet increasing Japanese requirements. (TAB B)

3. Memorandum to Maj. Gen. W. F. Marquat, Chief, Economic and Scientific Section, GHQ, SCAP, from Shigemi Yokoo, Minister of International Trade and Industry, Subj: Application for Removal of Restrictions on Radars for Navigational Purposes, 8 February 1951, with attachment, requests removal of restrictions on radars for navigational purposes for economic and other reasons. (TAB C)

4. Memorandum to Chief, Civil Communications Section, Subj: Evolution of SCAP Radar Policy, recapitulates events and actions leading up to the current SCAP radar policy as set forth in SCAPIN 2075. (TAB D)

5. Considering that the SCAP has placed radar as a mechanical aid to navigation, in the permitted category where only commercial applications are involved, and further considering that importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of foreign made radar required for marine navigational use also is permitted to the Japanese, it appears reasonable to permit research, development, design, manufacture, importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of radar in the permitted category. This should result in a diminishing foreign exchange requirement for importation of foreign radar.

6. The attached proposed SCAPIN (TAB E) relaxes the current SCAP radar policy to permit the Japanese to engage in research, development, design, manufacture, importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of radar in the permitted category.

7. Recommend approval of the attached proposed SCAPIN.

MEMORANDUM FOR: JAPANESE GOVERNMENT

SUBJECT: Radar Policy

1. Reference is made to Memorandum for the Japanese Government, AG 413.684 (18 Jan 50)CCS, SCAPIN 2075, Subj: Radar Policy, 18 January 1950.
2. Paragraph 2a is amended to include the following sub-paragraph:
(5) Radar required for marine navigational use.
3. Paragraph 2b is rescinded in its entirety.
4. Paragraph 3a is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - a. Research, development, design, manufacture, importation, possession, use, installation, sale and exportation of radar intended for fire control, fighter director and air search and including radar employing altitude determining features, rapid position calculating devices for directing fire power and such features which permit radar to be used in aircraft.
5. Direct communication within the scope of this memorandum is authorized between the Ministry of International Trade and Industry and Civil Communications Section and other interested staff sections, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

1. 1. G-2 has received information evaluated as probably true from a usually reliable source to the effect that the Chinese Communists in Mukden have recently ordered 430 radar sets in Yokohama, Japan, and that these sets will be transported to Mukden via Dairen in the near future.

2. G-2 at present has no positive evidence that any firms or agencies in Japan are selling radar equipment to Communist China, nor any information to substantiate the above report. The following information, however, has been reported:

a. In October 1950, at the request of the Chinese Mission in Japan, the Daiichi Tsusho Kaisha, Ltd, #4, 1-chome, Shiba-Tamura-cho, Minato-ku, Tokyo, and the Hui Min Company, Tobu-Gomu Building, 5th floor, 1-1 Horidome, Nihonbashi, Tokyo, participated in a sealed bid for an order to manufacture electric apparatus, including radar parts. The bid was reportedly awarded to Hui Min Co despite a lower bid submitted by the Daiichi Company.

b. Hui Min Company, reportedly has received another order from Formosa in December 1950 for radar tubes and parts.

c. G-2 files indicate that the China Mutual Trading Company, whose office was located in Room 420, Hotel Tokyo, Marunouchi, Chiyoda-ku, Tokyo, has been active in trade with Communist China. This firm is believed to be trading with Communist China secretly through Hong Kong, exporting among other equipment, radar parts manufactured by Tokyo Shibaura Electric Company. Recent reports indicate that the Tokyo office of said firm has been closed.

3. Request that G-2 be notified of any action taken as a result of this information.

(1) Equipment required within six (6) months.

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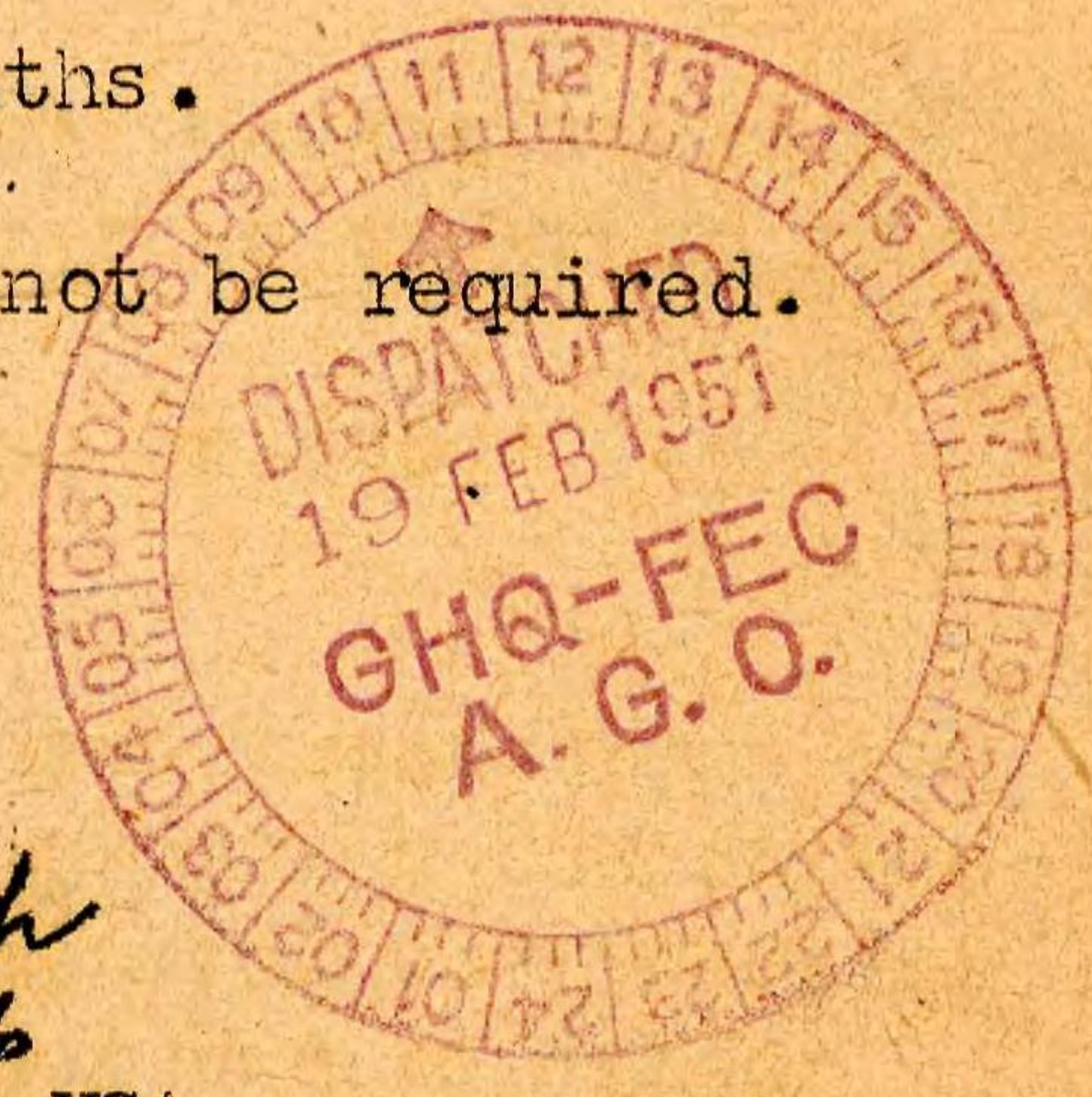
