Under direction of Commander Support Air the strike silenced anti-aircraft positions on Yontan field, pocketed a strip near Point Zamba Misaki, and bombed a town near proposed landing beach.

VI runs were made from 3000 to 1000 feet, using 30 degree glide and 220 knots. VF runs, preceding the VI, were from 7000 to 2000 feet, 50 degree angle of dive, and at speeds of 290-320 knots.
