John E. Harris Surrenders Upon A1- Haig Will Attempt Smash Through Belgium and Hindenberg Expects

to Launch Gigantic Attack London, June 15.—Big guns, mines, and scouting parties are setting the stage in the west for what may be a decisive battle. Indications are that a dual battle will be fought as Hindenburg is preparing a huge

drive against the French all the way between Rheims and Soissons. General Haig, having battered at the door into Belgium, and the Messines Ridge, getting ready to smash through.

Hindenburg's offensive against the French is in the ititial stage. The German crown prince's heaviest artillery is honeycombing the positions on the Aisne and in several vital sectors south as far as

Verdun. General Haig plans to attack so that Hindenburg will have to give up the south and reserve the north.
