This list is compiled from the full text of the Flaw as published in the Official Bulletin:

The vice president of the United States, the officers, legislative, executive and judicial, of The United States and of the several states and territories and the district of Columbia.

Regular or duly ordained ministers of religion.

Students in theological or divinity schools in ho are preparing for the ministry.

All persons in the military or naval service of the United States.

Members of religious sects or organizations which forbid their members to participate in war and whose religious convictions are against war in any form in accordance with the creed or religious principles of such organiza-

The above classes are excused outright. In addition the president is given the power to exempt the following:

County and municipal officials.

Custom house clerks.

Persons employed by the United States in the transmission of the mail.

Artificers and workmen employed in U.S. armories, arsenals and navy yards.

Such other persons in the service of the United States as the president may designate.

Mariners employed by any citizen of the

United States. Persons engaged in industries, including

agriculture, "found to be necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment or the effective operation of the military forces or the maintenance of national interest during the

Those upon whom persons are dependent for support to such an extent that renders their exclusion or discharge advisable.

Those found to be mentally or morally defi-
