Satchel Belonging to Lady Herbert Left Lying on New York Pick For Hours.

Newport, R. I., June 26.—Despite the delightful farewell that members of the British embassy gave Lady Herbert, wife of the British ambassador, upon her departure on Wednesday, her peace of mind during her journey to New York was greatly disturbed by the loss of a satchel containing jeweis worth \$15,000 and highly prized by Lady Herbert on account of their associations. By chance the satchel fell into the hands of a responsible person after it had been kicked around the pier here for three hours.

London, June 26.-The Constitutional Club to-day entertained Colonial Secretary Chamberlain at luncheon and pre-sented him with an address enclosed in easket, in recognition of his services to the nation.

Premier Balfour made the presentation speech. Referring to Mr. Chamberlain's fiscal proposals, he said it would be absolute folly for the Conservative-Uniist party to make opinions of econon present economic position of the country

questions a test of party loyalty. The present economic position of the country demanded the most careful consideration. It must not be supposed that because self-government had been given to the colonies that these could be regarded as separate political entities. On the contrary, they were integral portions of the British Empire. The question at issue was not new, but Mr. Chamberlain, more than any other man, dead or living, had given life, to the expression of the idea of Imperial unity.

Mr. Chamberlain received a remarkable ovation when he rose to reply. The colonial secretary opened his remarks with repudiating the suggestions of personal competition between himself and Mr. Balfour, remarking that he could not conceive any occurrence that could shake the political association and friendship between them. He desired on the eve of a great controversy to publicly state that he believed that the leadership of Mr. Balfour was essential to the success of the Unionist party. If the Unionist alliance was dissolved or weakened the "Home Rule snake, which was only scotched, not killed, would again come to the front."

SERVIAN MINISTER RESIGNS.



Dr. Pope then gave the following interesting statistics:

"Vancouver Island became a Crown colony in 1849. Four years later, 1853, this school building was erected, the school having at that time the very appropriate name of Maple Point. In the Colonist of March 16th, 1902, the Hon. Dr. J. S. Helmeken states that in 1855 the census returns of Vancouver Island colony showed the following: "There were three schools, Vigoria school had 26 pupils: Maple Point, opposite Craigflower, had 26; Nanaimo, 29. Education probably free; the teachers paid out of colonial funds."

"From the foregoing, as well as from information kindly given by old residents, we learn that Craigflower then was directly across the Arm from where we now are, and having a population of nearly 80 m all. We have also been informed that a large flour mill with bakery attached, was located there, and that at that time the name of th place was written 'Craigflour.' It may reasonably be inferred that when the wheel of this mill ceased to grind, in consideration of the great number of wild flowers with which this vicinity is especially beautiful, a happy change was made in the spelling of the word 'Craigflower." In 1852 or 1853, the Major Tompkins, the first mail boat running between Victoria and Olympia, was wrecked at Macaulay's Point. The bell of this stepner was purchased for the use of this school. It may be of interest to say that the bell was not used for many years, on account of the expense of hanging it, and that on the occasion of the visit of Lord Dufferiu, in 1876, was kindly loaned to the Victoria trustees, who so admired its sweet tones that they were only too willing to retain permanent possession. They doubtless would have accomplished their desires, had it not been for the very persistent efforts of Messrs, the late James Stewart, Roboert Porter and Martin J. Dodd, your them trustees.

PLOT TO KILL CZAR. Would-Be Assassin Was Disguised as an Army Officer.

A dispatch to the London Morning Leader, dated Moscow, June 17th, says that reports were then current that an attempt upon the life of the Czar was only prevented at the last moment the other day at Tzarskoe Selo, on the eve of the departure of the court for the Imperial villa at New Peterhoff. The would-be assassin attempted to gain access to the presence of His Majesty in the uniform of a superior officer of the gendarmerie.

There is much mystery about the affair, which has been hushed up for fear of its coming to the knowledge of the Czar, who is said to have been in a highly nervous state since the Belgrade

The correspondent describes a conversation he had with two university professors, who knew of the attempt being made and frustrated, but did not know the details. The said it would be better not to discuss the incident just now. One of the professors claimed that he learned directly from a member of the Imperial entourtage that the Czar's perturbation over the Belgarde catastrophe arose from the terrifying fact that the regic'des were military officers.

About the personality of the man who attempted to assassinate the Czar' at Trarskoe Selo nothing has yet transpired, and if the police and minister of the interior can prevent the matter from becoming public nothing more is likely to be heard of him.

A cipher telegram of enquiry received from Kieff shows that the report of the attempt has reached that city and Odessa. Recently the palace guard has been doubled, but in such a manner as not to attract the attention of the Czar.
