

Attention, Mr. Grullemans.
Gentlemen:

In the spring of 1935 we bought 200 Berberis Mentorensis. We planted them in the nursery and sold out of them from time to time a small number of specimen plants.

We left one row intact and are certainly enthusiastic about the prospects of this plant for hedge purposes, and for planting where beauty and protection are needed.

As you know, we experienced the most disastrous drought here last summer, having no rain from May 10th until August 15th. Viburnum, Forsythia, Bush Haneysuckle had lost all their faliage, Euonymus Radicans and Patens lost their leaves, but Berberis Mentorensis remained green and, in fact, it was the only plant that kept producing new shoots.

To anyone interested in something worth while as a hedge that can really take the punishment, I do not believe it can be equalled. Here it is almost December 1st and it is still just as vigorous and as showy as Mahania aquifolia.

I am writing you this because I feel that this was a test which was most unusual and certainly should be of interest to all that have had trouble growing anything where moisture is limited and growing conditions are unfavarable.

Instead of producing the conventional single stem with one bloom on top the vorieties offered under this heading all grow a strong main stem with from 3 to 6 branches, half way up the stem, eoch side shoot or bronch corrying its own flower. The result is that 3 to 6 or sometimes 8 flowers are obtained from one bulb. All

the blooms are of good size, are gracefully spaced and as you con well imagine, produce an unusual effect and a great mass of color. The soil must be kept rich because if planted in poor ground they will not be as floriferous.

All the varieties offered are most attractive, some very unusual in their coloring.

Hyacinths for Garden Planting

Truly a precious source of scent and color, at a time when other flowers are still too shy or fearful to venture forth. No other plant in early spring displays such an abundance of jubilant tones of red, rose, lavender, purple, blue, yellow and orange. No other spring plant enriches our parks and gardens with a heart-lifting fragrance so soon after the snow is gone. No other plant requires so little coaxing to give its all, either in the garden or in the house. As house plants, in bowls with bulb fiber or on glasses filled with pure water or in good old-fashioned clay pots and pans with garden soil, its "rising spire," colorful and fragrant, effects a rare and perfect quality of delight.

The most satisfactory Hyacinth flowers for the garden are produced from the bulbs about 15 to 17 centimeters in circumference. These sizes are the most suitable for outdoor planting in formal beds or in drifts in the border. The larger, say 17 ta 18 centimeters, are ideal for bowls with fiber, or clay pots and pans with soil. They are economical grades, selling at 30 to 40 per cent less than the "top sizes." Top sizes should be used for water glasses, and for contests at shows or by those who desire the finest and largest bloom. They are offered on the opposite page.

Culture: These Hyacinths should be planted from 6 to 10 inches apart, and covered with at least 4 inches af soil from the top of the bulb. For beds or borders close to the conservatory or dwelling, 6 inches will make a fine display; but where the beds are planted to be viewed from a distance, they may be planted 10 inches apart. Hyacinths planted alternately with Darwin Tulips produce a color effect in the same bed lasting better than a month, and for this combination 6 inches from bulb to bulb is also a very suitable distance. It is advisable to cover, after the bulbs have been planted, with leaves or some heavy material that will prevent them from freezing or being affected by early spring frosts after they have started. Hyacinths, as well as Tulips, should be planted by November first in this latitude, as they are the better for early planting.

Miniature Hyacinths should be planted 5 to 6 inches aport and covered with at least 4 inches of soil on the top of the bulb. They are particularly well adapted for planting in informal groups in the borders and are highly successful in beds. An attractive way to plant them is to combine them with Darwin Tulips or Cottage Tulips, setting the bulbs alternately. A flower bed so handled will be a splash of color for over a month. First the Hyacinths come into bloom. When the flowers fade, they may be removed, to be replaced by the Tulips which carry on the display of color well towards the end of May.

To prevent damage from frost, we advise a liberal covering with straw or any other garden litter after the ground has become frozen.

Colchicum - Meadow Saffron

(Giont Autumn-Flowering Crocus)

Colchicum are autumn-flowering bulbs with large Crocus-like blossoms which appear during the months of September and October, without foliage. The foliage, however, appears early in the spring about the same time the Tulips and Hyacinths are in bloom and disappears in June. They are especially recommended for planting between the taller growing rock plants such as Cerastium, Vinca, Pachysandra and the various Sedums, where their bold, checkered Crocus-like blossoms are seen to the best

advantage. Blooming in September and October when flowers in the rockery are scarce, they are especially valuable. They may be also planted in the open woods or in naturalistic plantings of any sort. The bulbs, if kept indoors, will bloom during September and October in the window without any earth or water and after blooming, the bulbs may be planted in early November outdoors, and will not suffer in the least.

Autumn and Spring Flowering Crocus Species

Besides the Dutch Crocuses there are certain species that bloom very much earlier in the year, often before the snow has gone. The flowers of these wild sorts are smaller than those of the Dutch kinds but they are as vigorous and free as the others. Given a sunny position in the rock garden or a sheltered position in grass where the sun may encourage them freely, they will surprise you by their hardy appearance in the face of cold and storms.

Crocus Imperati, pale lilac with buff jackets, often

flowers in late February, and is closely followed by Crocus Sieberi, a fuller, purer mauve sort; it has as a companion the deep rich yellow Crocus Susianus, which is even more attractive in the bud stage with its dark, rich brown flowers on the exterior of the segments. Once planted, they will take care of themselves for many years. Then comes Crocus Tommasinianus, an exquisite vaselike form, in color varying from a pale mauve to quite a rich purple. This variation is one of its great attractions. These all increase as freely as do the Dutch varieties.

Daffodils for Naturalizing

The greatest and most effective use of Daffodils is to naturolize them in quontity in meadows and orchards, in woodlands ond olong the driveway, on the bank of the brook or olong the shrubbery.

By plonting some bulbs on the south side and some others facing north, a long period of flowering, lasting well over o month, may be enjoyed.

Daffodils are the most prolific of flowers. If you plant a single bulb it will not be long in gathering o family, and in the course of two or three years the spot in which it grows will have become as populous as the tents of the patriorchs.

Planting mixed Daffodils is on investment that pays large dividends, if the right varieties are used.

Yet each strain carries out the plan on a color scheme of its own, and then can be compared only with the orchids in wonderful variability of beauty. "Mariposa" is simply the Spanish word for butterfly, and is applied to these Tulips because the eyes and markings of the flowers are so much like those on a butterfly's wings. The bulbs are small and should be planted about 2½ inches deep and covered during winter. (Color illustration, page R).

The plant disappeors above ground after flowering and annuals may be planted close to them to fill the vacant space. A light mulching is advised as a winter protection.







PLANTING: The table above shows the number of plants or bulbs required to fill a circular bed of the dimensions given. In plantings, begin at outside row—where 6 inches apart, 3 inches from edge of bed; where 12 inches apart, 6 inches from edge of bed. It is customary among professionals in planting a bed to set the plants or bulbs somewhat closer together in the two

outer rows, giving more space between each plant or bulb toward the center of the bed. A square bed will take about the same number of plants. For an oval bed, add length and breadth and divide by two. For example, an oval 9 feet long by 7 feet wide will require the same number of plants as a circular bed 8 feet in diameter.

Those who have neither a large garden, nor the convenience of greenhouses, or frames, or who have a difficulty in obtaining suitable soil find most of their troubles removed in adopting this modern method of growing bulbs in the house. It will be extensively adopted in the future when it is fully realized what excellent results may be obtained in this way.

The advantage of this system is that the bowls, having no drainage holes, can be placed anywhere about the house without fear of any mess or domage to furniture. Wayside Gardens Bulb Fiber is perfectly odorless and clean to handle; it is specially prepared for the purpose of growing a great variety of bulbs in the house. Leaves no dirt or stain. It can be used for several years.

Culture: Moisten the fiber to saturation, fill the bowl with the soaking wet fiber mixture up to the rim and plant the bulbs in the same manner as with ordinary soil. A little fiber should be shaken down into place after planting but should not be pressed down too tightly or

the bulbs will be forced upwards when root growth commences.

After planting, adopt either of the following plans:

The bowls may be placed in a cold frame, airy cellar or in a dark or moderately dark, airy, cool room. They must never be placed in a closed cupboard. It will not be necessary to give a great deal of water; perhaps once every two weeks.

In the case of bowls placed in the cold frame there will not be much need to give any water. Where, however, the bulbs are not exposed to rain, the bowls should be examined twice a month, care being taken that the fiber mixture is kept uniformly damp. For the first weeks after planting, additional water should be given sparingly, sufficient only to encourage root action. As soon as the bulbs are well rooted, water should be given more freely. If the mixture is allowed at ony time to become dry, the flower buds may go blind. Should by any chance too much water be given, the bowls may be drained by tipping them on their sides.

When the bulbs have made a good top growth in the dark, the bowls should be placed in a sunny window where they will get the morning sun. They must have sufficient light and air to prevent the foliage from becoming drawn. Never place bowls on top of radiator cover. A temperature of 55 to 60 degrees is sufficient to obtain good blooms; the bulbs resent too warm a temperature.
