MEMORANDUM FOR: IMPERIAL JAPANESE GOVERNMENT.

THROUGH : Central Liaison Office, Tokyo.

SUBJECT : Acquisition of Tokyo Kempei Tai Headquarters Building.

Marked 29 K

1. Reference is made to your memorandum to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file C.L.O. No. 148, dated 3 October 1945, subject: "Request for Exemption from Requisitioning the Building of the former Military Police Headquarters."

2. Your request in the above memorandum to use the Kempei Tai Headquarters building known as the former Military Police Headquarters in Tokyo as a hospital for the staff of the Imperial Household has been carefully considered but the urgent need for buildings to house the Allied Occupation Forces makes it necessary to requisition these facilities for use by the Allied Forces.

3. It is directed that the Kempei Tai Headquarters Building and adjacent structures as indicated on the inclosed sketch, located at Kudan-shita in Tokyo, be made available by 1200, 5 November 1945 for occupancy by General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. All items of furniture, furnishings and fixtures will remain in the building until a representative of this headquarters designates the items required for use by the Allied Forces and those items which may be removed.

4. It is desired that renovation and minor repair work necessary to place the building in condition for use as a billet by the Allied Forces be accomplished. All utilities will be made completely operative and the building thoroughly cleaned throughout prior to occupancy.

5. It is directed that necessary arrangements be made to have a representative of your office and a competent interpreter at the Kempei Tai Building at 1000, 29 October 1945 for a meeting with a representative of this headquarters. Detailed instructions regarding the renovation and repair work to be accomplished and the items of furniture, furnishings and fixtures desired to be retained in the building for use by the Allied Forces will be communicated to your representative at that time.

6. Requirements for operating personnel will be communicated to your office by a representative of this headquarters at a later date.

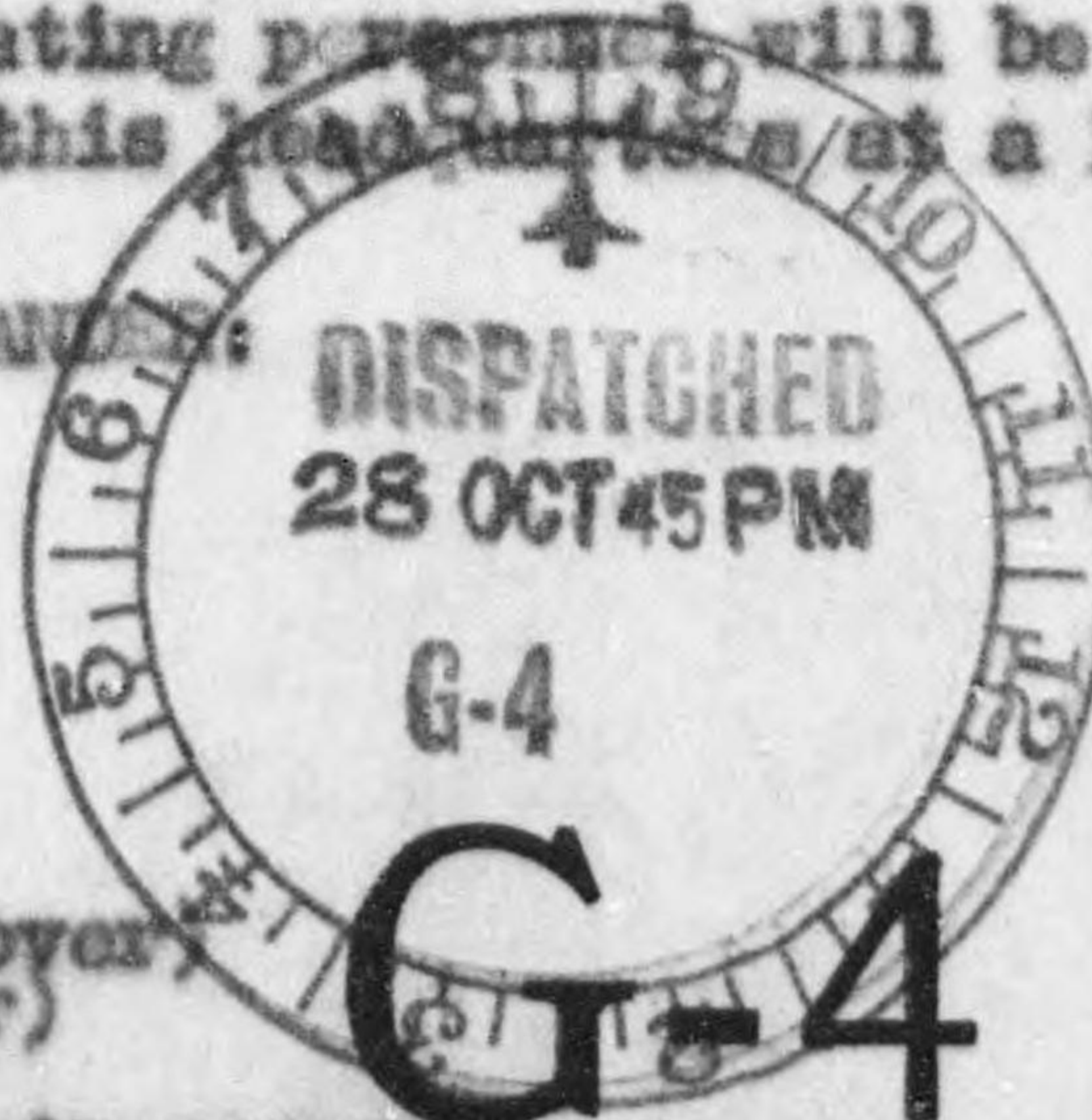

Subject: Acquisition of Tokyo Kempei Tai Headquarters Building.

1. OCCIO by G/N dated 20 Oct 45, subject: "Tokyo Kempei Tai Headquarters Building," requested the Kempei Tai Building and certain adjacent structures as indicated on the inclosed sketch.

2. A representative of this office (Lt Col Pichel) and a representative of OCCIO (General Thorpe) inspected the facilities on 20 October 1945. General Thorpe advised Col Pichel that the Kempei Tai Building could house the 80th CIC Detachment, 441st CIC Detachment, and the CIC Training School, if the building was renovated and made suitable for use as a billet.

3. This office, by separate communication, has advised the Headquarters Commandant that the Kempei Tai Headquarters Building is being demanded from the Japanese Government and assigned to the Headquarters Commandant for use by the CIC Detachments and Training School. Alterations and repairs necessary to place the building in condition for use by CIC will be accomplished at the direction of the Headquarters Commandant through the usual procedure.

4. CIC (Col Stuart) stated to G-4 (Lt Col Pichel) that they are interested in the main building alone. Col Munson (G-2) previously asked him for that information and had received same answer. Adjacent sheds for motor pool etc were considered as included in the above description.

1. CI & E were allocated an area 60X90 feet adjacent to the area requested above, on 4 Oct 45 for use as a motor pool as the Hq Comdt had approved a separate motor pool for this section.

2. The additional area requisitioned above for CI & E is considered necessary

by that section to accommodate the extra vehicles which have arrived in Tokyo and as parking space for large vans which were previously used by IWB units attached to the Armies. These vans with their equipment are being turned over to CI & E for disposition.

3. Hq Comdt (Maj Seaver) advised this office that the size of the Hq Comdt motor pool and the fact that staff sections would not release the drivers of their vehicles to the control of the Hq Comdt made it necessary that CI & E and certain other large staff sections maintain separate motor pools. Major Seaver feels that the Hq Comdt cannot efficiently operate a motor pool to service the entire GHQ Headquarters unless the vehicles and drivers are released to the exclusive control of their section. He further stated that previous attempts to accommodate the vehicles of staff sections in the Hq Comdt motor pool without any control over the vehicles or drivers had been very unsatisfactory.

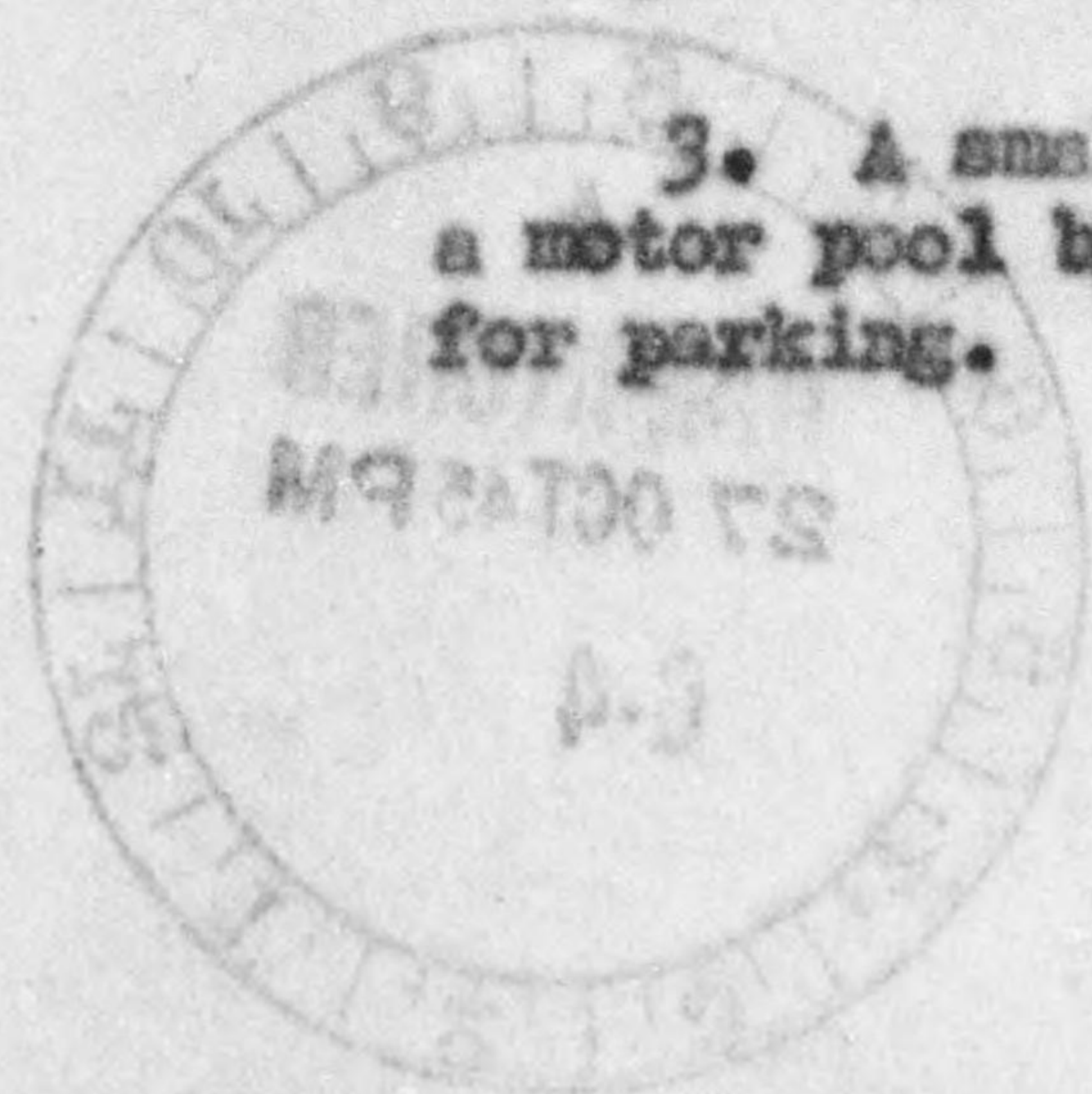

1. It is directed that St. Luke's Apartment house located at 48 Minamoi Cho, Tokyo be made available by 1200, 15 November 1945 to General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

SUBJECT : Tokyo Arsenal No. 1.

1. Memorandum, this headquarters, file AG 601 (19 Oct 45)GD, dated 19 October 1945, subject: "Acquisition of Certain Facilities of Tokyo Arsenal No. 1," is rescinded.

2. This is to inform your office that the Allied Forces will occupy buildings numbered 255, 263, 269, 276, 395, 475, 481, 776 and the open areas adjacent to the buildings of Tokyo Arsenal No. 1, located at Shimojujo, Oji-ku, Tokyo.

3. The supplies and equipment presently in the buildings which have been inventoried and tagged for the Allied Forces will be removed and stored in other nearby buildings within the Arsenal. Items of equipment and supplies stored in the open areas adjacent to the buildings will be removed.

4. The items of supplies, equipment, furniture, furnishings and fixtures which were designated by a representative of this headquarters (Colonel Manley) as required for use by the Allied Forces will remain in the buildings.

5. It is directed that bathing, sanitary, messing and other facilities be installed in buildings numbered 263 and 395 and that certain renovation work in other buildings be accomplished immediately in accordance with the instructions communicated by a representative of this headquarters (Colonel Manley) to Major General Gunji Kobayashi, Commander of the First Tokyo Arsenal and the representative of your office at a meeting at the Tokyo Arsenal No. 1 on 20 October 1945. It is desired that all instructions communicated to your representative by the representative of this headquarters (Colonel Manley) be carried out immediately.

6. The buildings and grounds to be used by the Allied Forces will be thoroughly cleaned prior to occupancy.

Subject: Tokyo Arsenal No. 1.

1. This headquarters, by memo referred to in par 1 above, demanded the Japanese Government to make buildings numbered 255, 263, 269, 276, 395, 475, 481 and open areas adjacent to these buildings available immediately for use by the 5250 Technical Intelligence Company. Since the above memo has been submitted to the Japanese Government, Maj Gen Kobayashi, Commander of the Arsenal has offered building No. 776 to the 5250 Intel Co. This building has heating and hot water system in good operating condition.
2. The Memo rescinded by par 1 of the above memo was written in the form of a demand letter. G-4, P & C Section (Col Hutchison) advised the Facilities Section that property such as arsenals were now under control of the Allied Forces and that they should not be demanded for use by the Allied Forces. Therefore the original letter is rescinded and the above memo is not written as a demand but as a directive to the Japanese to accomplish the renovation work necessary to make the building suitable for use by the Allied Forces.
3. G-2 (Cols Tait and Manley) have informally made arrangements with the military authorities at the arsenal to accomplish the renovation and repair work and also had lengthy discussions with Mr. Yamagata in this matter. During the informal discussions with Mr. Yamagata, Col Tait gave the Japanese CIO the idea that the Arsenal would be available to the Japanese to manufacture civilian goods. In other words, the lengthy verbal negotiations by G-2 representatives direct with the Japanese Army officials and the Japanese CIO has caused confusion in the minds of the Japanese CIO as to just what purpose the arsenal will be used and what is desired. They could not understand why Col Tait was discussing reconversion of the arsenal to civilian use and at the same time we had demanded part of it to be renovated for use by the Allied Forces. Facilities Section (Major Reed) directed the Japanese CIO (Mr. Yamagata) to continue the renovation and repair work as directed in our memo of 19 Oct 45 and as explained in detail by Col Manley to their representative.
4. The revised memo should make it clear to the Japanese Government what is desired by the Allied Forces and at the same time conform with the policy recommended by G-4 P & C which is that the facility should not be demanded since it has already been turned over to the Allied Forces.

Subject: Tokyo Arsenal No. 1. ✓

1. The use of Tokyo Arsenal No. 1 was coordinated with the assistant G-4, Eighth Army (Col Hickey) on 19 Oct 45 prior to submitting the original demand letter to the Japanese Government. The Eighth Army has no requirement for any part of the arsenal.

2. Col Tait knew of the Allied Forces requirements for part of the arsenal and was discussing conversion of that part of the arsenal not required by the Allied Forces, but he was misunderstood by the Japanese. It appears that G-2 (Col Tait) has been attempting to sell the idea to Mr. Yomogata of the Japanese C.L.O. that Major General Kabayashi, present Japanese Commander of the Arsenal should be retained as a civilian manager when they convert the arsenal to civilian production, and in painting the reconversion picture to Mr. Yomogata, made him think the entire arsenal would be converted to civilian use.

SUBJECT : First Red Cross Hospital Building at Kyoto Japan.

1. Reference is made to your memorandum to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file G.I.D. No. 297, dated 18 October 1945, subject: "Request for Exemption of First Red Cross Hospital Building in Kyoto from Requisition."

2. The Allied Occupation forces have an urgent requirement for hospital facilities in the Kyoto area and a definite commitment cannot be made to exempt the First Red Cross Hospital building from requisition until hospital facilities have been provided the Allied Occupation Forces in this area.

3. It is not the policy of the Supreme Commander to unnecessarily inconvenience or hinder your training of nurses for medical examination and the use of hospital facilities by the Allied Forces is being kept to a minimum.

1. The Japanese Government in their Memo GLO No. 297, dtd 18 Oct 45, requested that the first Red Cross Hospital Building

in Kyoto be exempt from requisition.

2. The Public Health and Welfare Section, GHQ, by c/n dated 22 Oct 45, advised this office that the First Red Cross Hospital was required for use by the Sixth Army and recommended that the Japanese request for continued use of the building be disapproved.

3. Chief Surgeon, GHQ (Col Weiseman) advised this office (Major Reed) that the First Red Cross Hospital building was needed by the Sixth Army and recommended that no commitment be made to exempt this building from requisition. Col Weiseman further recommended that no hospitals in Japan be exempt from requisition until the Allied Forces requirements for hospitalization has been fulfilled. Col Weiseman stated that the Japanese requirements for hospital facilities were being carefully considered when demanding facilities for use by the Allied Forces and that they were being given every consideration possible under the present circumstances.

SUBJECT: Request for Exemption of the First Red Cross Hospital Building
in Kyoto from requisition

C.L.O. No. 297

18 October 1945

It is reported that the Sixth Army Headquarters of the Allied Occupation Forces in Kyoto have decided to requisition the First Red Cross Hospital Building in Kyoto. The Central Liaison Office wishes to invite your attention to the fact that the above Red Cross Hospital, while conducting medical examination of the patients at large, is chiefly intended for the training of the first class nurses forming the nucleus of the personnel who are responsible for guidance and management of the public medical examination as well as for the operation of all sanitary facilities in the country. In order to accomplish the purposes in view, this Red Cross Hospital, unlike other medical establishments, is equipped with boarding-houses and complete facilities for the training of these personnel, which cannot be easily removed to, or operated in, any other building.

In view of these facts, it is requested that special consideration be given as to the exemption of this Hospital from requisitioning.

1. CG Eighth Army by letter, file AG 601 (SM), NR dated 23 October 45, subj: "Allocation of Yanase Automobile Co, Ltd," recommended approval and requested

allocation of the Yanase Automobile Co Bldg, located within zone No. 1 of the Tokyo Area, for use by USASCOM "C" as an APO for all non-divisional troops in the Tokyo area.

2. The Yanase Bldg consists of two stories and was formerly used as a sales room for Buick Automobiles in Tokyo.

3. The Eighth Army desires to establish the 181st Army Postal Unit, consisting of 19 EM, 1 Officer and 3 vehicles, in the Yanase Bldg to operate the APO. The personnel will be billeted on the second floor of the building and messed with other Eighth Army Units in this area.

4. The building presently contains a few automobiles and a small amount of furniture which can easily be removed. The renovation and minor repairs mentioned in the above letter consist of minor repairs to the skylight, placing the utilities into operation, and constructing partitions for use by the Post Office.

Memo for Record:

1. The Japanese Gov't, by memo file C.L.O. No. 306, dated 19 Oct 45, requested this headquarters to exempt the Tokyo Plant of the Nihon Card-Clothing Company from requisition. The Japanese Government states in the above memo that this plant is the only one of its kind still operating and the only source of supply of the card cloth, a commodity essential in the manufacture of textiles and that the use of this factory by the Allied Forces would have the effect of compelling the nation's textile factories to suspend operations. The Japanese also stated that there is no other factory existing in Japan to replace this card cloth plant.

2. The Japanese Government in the above memo further stated that officials from GHQ had inspected the building several times, presumably with the intention of taking over the plant. This office knows of no requirement for the above plant by GHQ. General Eastwood has informed this section to exempt the above plant from requisition.

SUBJECT: Exemption from Requisition of the Tokyo Plant of the Nihon Card-Clothing Company.

TO : Commanding General, Eighth Army, APO 343.

1. The Tokyo Plant of the Nihon Card-Clothing Company is the only remaining factory of its kind still operating and is the only source of supply of card cloth. This commodity is essential in the manufacture of textiles and the requisitioning of the above factory by the Allied Forces would compel the Japanese textile factories to suspend operations.

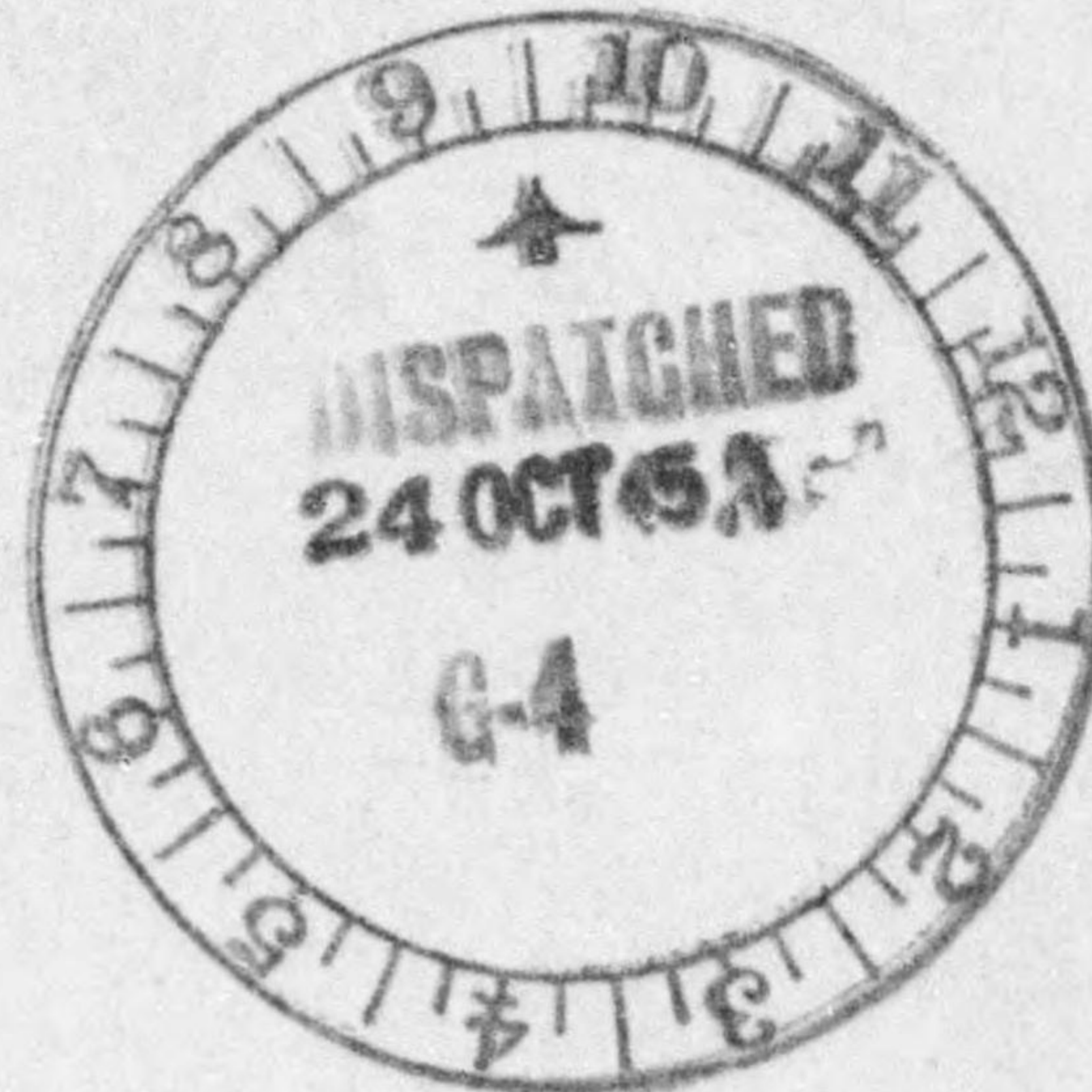

1. The Japanese Govt requested this Hq to exempt the offices of the Marunouchi Branch of the Teikoku Bank in the Yuraku Bldg from our requisition of the building. The Japanese Govt, in

the above CLO No. 311, stated that the branch offices of the Teikoku Bank in the Yuraku Bldg handle monthly transactions amounting to 100,000,000 yen and that the branch office of the bank was one of the principal financial organs in the Marunouchi business district of Tokyo. The Japanese further stated that the office structure required by the branch office differed greatly from the ordinary business office. Therefore it would be difficult to accommodate them elsewhere.

2. G-4 Facilities (Lt Col Pichel) contacted the Hq Comdt (Major Shubert). Major Shubert advised this office that the bank offices were not essential for the use of the Allied Forces and that they could be excluded from requisition. 1. It is directed that buildings numbered 255, 263, 269, 276, 395, 475, 481 and the open areas adjacent to the buildings, as indicated on the inclosed sketch, of the Tokyo Arsenal No. 1 located at Shinojajo, Oji-ku, Tokyo, be made available immediately for occupancy by an agency of General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

2. The supplies and equipment presently in the buildings which have been inventoried and tagged for the Allied Forces will be removed and stored in other nearby buildings within the Arsenal. All items of supplies, equipment, furniture, furnishings and fixtures will remain in the buildings until a representative of this headquarters designates the items required for use by the Allied Forces and those items which may be removed. It is desired that the items of equipment and supplies stored in the open areas adjacent to the buildings be removed.

3. The installation of bathing, sanitary, messing and other facilities in buildings numbered 263 and 395 and certain renovation work in other buildings will be required. It is directed that necessary arrangements be made to have a representative of your office at building No. 395 at 1000, 20 October 1945 for a meeting with the representative of this headquarters. The details pertaining to the work to be accomplished and the installation of the facilities referred to above will be communicated to your representative at that time.

4. The buildings and grounds requisitioned in paragraph 1 above will be thoroughly cleaned prior to occupancy by the Allied Forces.

Subject: Acquisition of Certain Facilities of Tokyo Arsenal No. 1.

1. G-2, by carrier note to this office dated 17 October 1945, requested the above facilities of the Tokyo Arsenal No. 1 for use by the 5250 Technical Intelligence Composite Company, Separate (Provisional) as the technical intelligence center for the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
2. G-4, Eighth Army (Col Hickey) was contacted by this office (Maj Reed) relative to the use of the facilities of the Tokyo Arsenal No. 1 by the Eighth Army. Col Hickey stated that the ordnance officer, Eighth Army, had made an inspection of these facilities and that the Eighth Army did not contemplate using any part of the Tokyo Arsenal No. 1.
3. This office (Major Reed) contacted G-2 (Cols Manley and Tait) regarding instructions to be furnished the Japanese Government in the demand letter. Their instructions have been incorporated into the Memo to the Japanese Gov't. Most of the instructions have already been furnished members of the Japanese Army on duty at the Arsenal. Col Manley stated that a meeting between a representative of the 5250 Intelligence Co and the Japanese Government would not be necessary since detailed instructions had already been furnished to the commandant and staff of the Tokyo Arsenal and that he was having another meeting on the morning of 19 October 1945 at which time all arrangements would be completed to accomplish the necessary evacuation of the premises required by the Allied Forces and the installation of bathing, messing and other facilities. Major Reed pointed out the importance of such a meeting to insure that all arrangements were understood and finalized. The representative of this headquarters referred to in the above memo, par 3, will be Col Manley or some officer designated by him from the 5250 Technical Intelligence Co.
4. Facilities of the Tokyo Arsenal are located within zone No. 2 of the Tokyo area and are considered suitable for use by the Technical Intelligence organization. The 7 buildings requested for use by the 5250 Tech Intel Co are only a small portion of the Tokyo Arsenal..

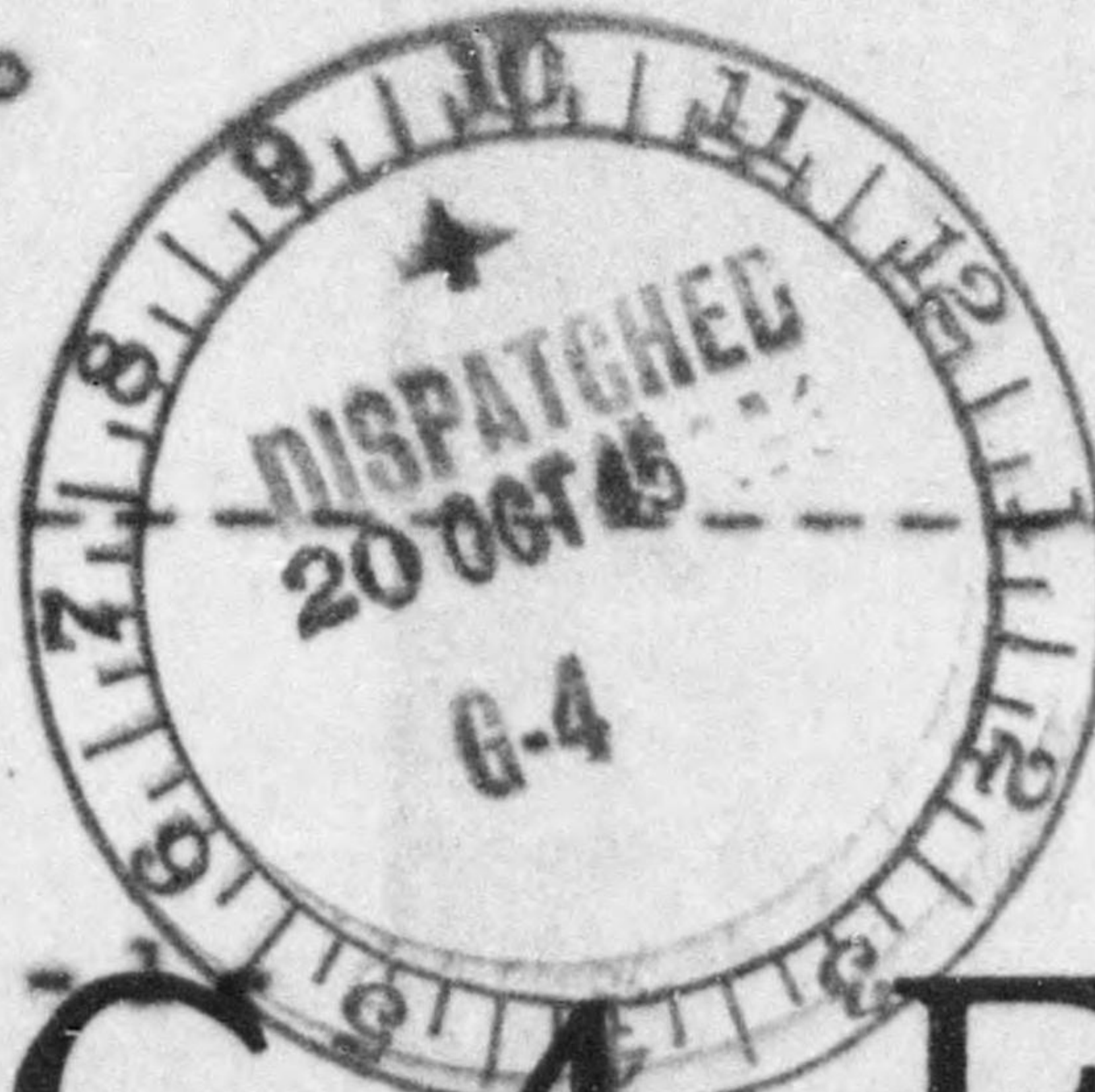

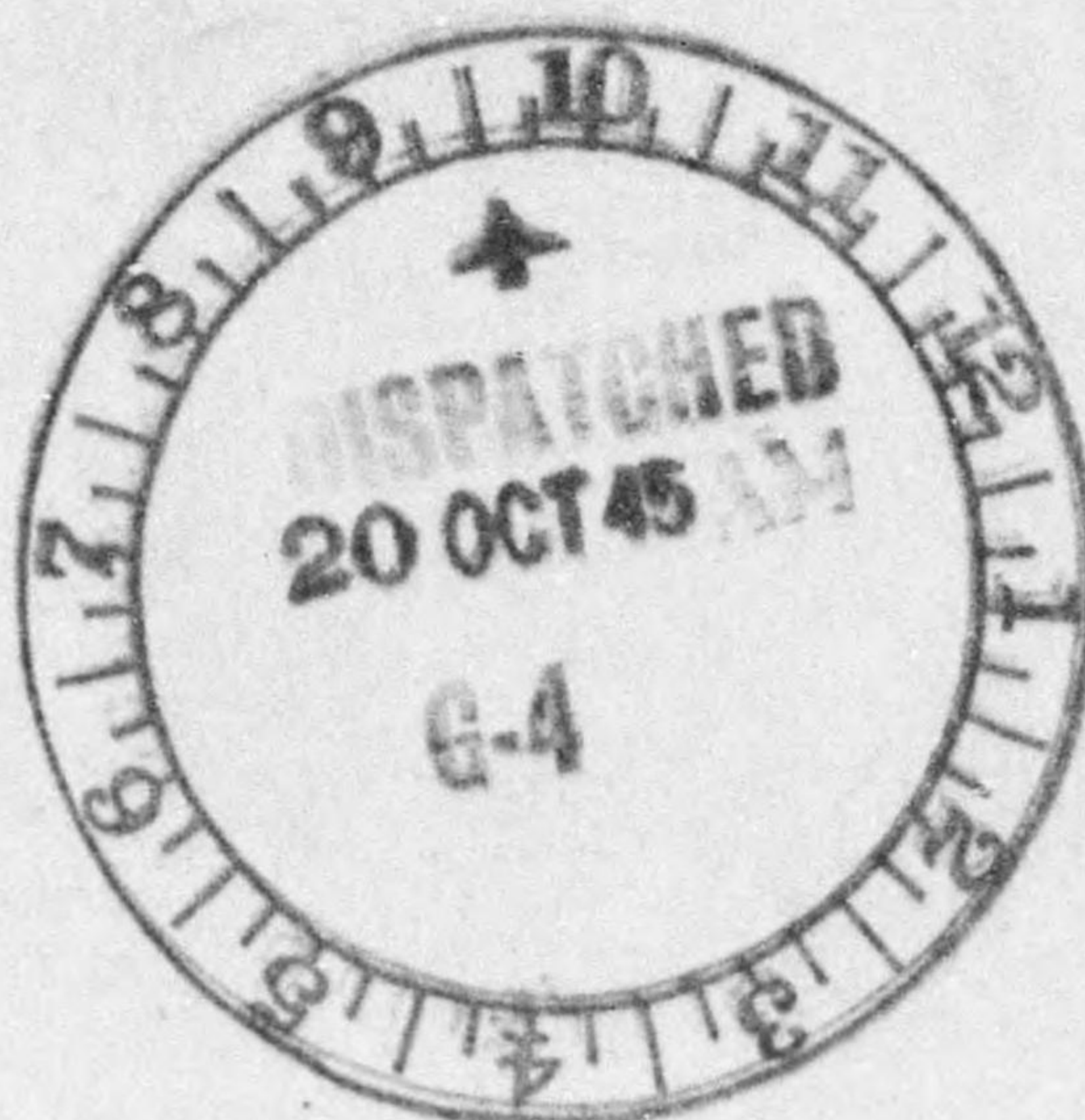

1. To implement General Order No. 9, 2 Oct 45 (copy attached), the removal of 5250 Technical Intelligence Composite Unit from its present location in Manila to the Tokyo area is contemplated. The unit will number about 300 officers and men when it is complete, and has in its possession a large amount of technical equipment, including six technical laboratories and a photographic laboratory, and a number of motor vehicles. Personnel moving from Manila will probably not exceed 175, but it is expected that personnel from other technical missions will be quartered with this unit and work with it.

2. Facilities for housing a heavy unit of this type are limited in the vicinity of Tokyo. However, it has been found that the First Tokyo Army Arsenal, Shomojujo, Oji-ku, has within it ample facilities for quarters, laboratories, garages and workshops, and the storehouses necessary for storing the intelligence material (heavy guns, tanks, tractors, etc.) which will be collected by the various intelligence agencies operating in Japan and Korea.

3. Building No. 475, plus adjacent storehouses and garages, will probably suffice to house the unit. Until a detail survey of the area is made, however, it is requested that this arsenal be reserved for the use of this Technical Intelligence Center.

JAPANESE MILITARY INTELLIGENCE TARGETS

1. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, is designated to coordinate and supervise the exploitation of military intelligence targets in Japan and Korea under existing War Department policies.

2. The exploitation of these targets and objectives will include coordination and utilization of certain general and technical intelligence agencies, viz:

- a. U. S. Technical Intelligence Depot. (Manila)
- b. 5250th Technical Intelligence Composite Unit. (Manila)
- c. Field intelligence teams. (Japan)
- d. TIS Combined Document Center. (Manila)
- e. Army, Corps and Division TIS field detachments. (Japan)
- f. Special staff sections, supervising "a" to "c". (Japan)
- g. Air and Navy technical units, analogous to "b". (Japan)
- h. Special technical missions, national or foreign.

3. Coordinating control and supervision over the various agencies interested in technical intelligence investigations will be exercised through normal command and staff channels. Each agency, i.e., special staff section, AFPAC; Armies; separate Corps; CINCPAC; FEAF; USASTAF; Allied agencies; and special missions represented in Japan and Korea will designate plenary representatives to form in the office of Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, a group which, operating under his control, will provide the larger features of coordination and supervision over technical intelligence activities and prevent competitive duplication of effort.

4. The organization and function of technical military intelligence in this theater is designed to accomplish the following primary objectives:

- a. Exploitation of materiel: This will include the examination and evaluation of all available enemy materiel and the deduction, from such

evaluation, of the state of enemy resources for war. Intelligence so obtained will be exploited for the reciprocal benefit of the United States and Allied Armed Forces. This will include a thorough examination of all enemy facilities which may be involved in the production of materiel for war and the provision of trained personnel to assist the chiefs of services (Ground, Naval and Air) in the supervision of the collection, safeguarding and evacuation of captured enemy equipment for intelligence study and for tactical and training purposes.

b. Exploitation of documents:

- (1) To provide trained personnel to screen enemy documents and inventory same by categories.
- (2) To circulate accession results to authorized agencies.
- (3) To extract intelligence needed within the theater for security and control, by means of fragmentary translations or photostats.
- (4) To select Military, Technical, Scientific and General Documents for transmission to the United States acting on current target books published by the War and Navy Departments and the specific interests of specialist agencies.
- (5) To focus all field agencies of the Ground, Naval and Air Forces through TIS for all document activity.

c. Exploitation of Order of Battle Intelligence and RelatedSubjects:

- (1) Lists of all Regular Units (Ground, Naval and Air).
- (2) List all code names and numbers (home and operational).
- (3) T/O and T/T's all types of units.
- (4) List of Divisions, Brigades and Major units (Ground, Naval and Air) by components, strength, armament, etc.
- (5) List of Recruiting Districts and units trained therein.
- (6) List of Army and Navy officers and their commands. Army list and directories including transfer and promotion lists, Biographical and Service Record.

- (7) Histories of major units.
- (8) Investigation of recruiting and training system.
- (9) Investigation of Home Guard and Volunteer Defense Units.

- (12) Reports on Military Societies.

d. Exploitation of Military Historical Records and Official Reports of the Japanese General Staff (Ground, Naval and Air):

- (2) The preparations for the War of 1941.
- (3) Campaigns in the Southwest Pacific Area, 1942-1944.
- (4) Campaigns in the Philippines, 1941-1942.
- (5) Second campaign in the Philippines, 1945.
- (6) Campaigns in the Pacific islands, 1941-1945.
- (7) Campaigns in other areas, 1941-1945.

5. For effective coordination, the following policy provisions will be enforced by subordinate echelons:

a. All foreign and national technical missions will, on arrival, register with the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, for coordination of their activities, to prevent competitive duplication with other services; the theater G-2 will undertake to notify the occupation authorities concerned.

b. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, will conduct all liaison with the Japanese Governmental authorities, in relation to the operation of technical missions, delegating such liaison as is required to Occupation Force Commanders.

c. Since intelligence targets are geographically distributed, the occupation force commanders are responsible for the coordination of

exploitation of targets within their territorial jurisdiction, operating through subordinate commanders or staffs, to prevent competitive duplication.

d. To expedite the conduct of these investigations, the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, is authorized to correspond directly with the heads of the various agencies mentioned in paragraph 3, or such representatives as they may designate, on technical details. Direct correspondence between plenary representatives and the heads of the agencies which they represent is authorized.


e. To protect intelligence materiel and records, in limited numbers, against exploitation by a single research agency, their removal will be cleared through the Occupation Force Commander, in order to make these items accessible to other intelligence agencies.

f. The principle of reciprocal exchange of reports applies to all field technical agencies. All reports of technical intelligence relating to investigations in Japan or Korea will be cleared through the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, this headquarters, prior to being dispatched to locations without the area. Sufficient copies will be presented in order that two copies may be filed in this headquarters.

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

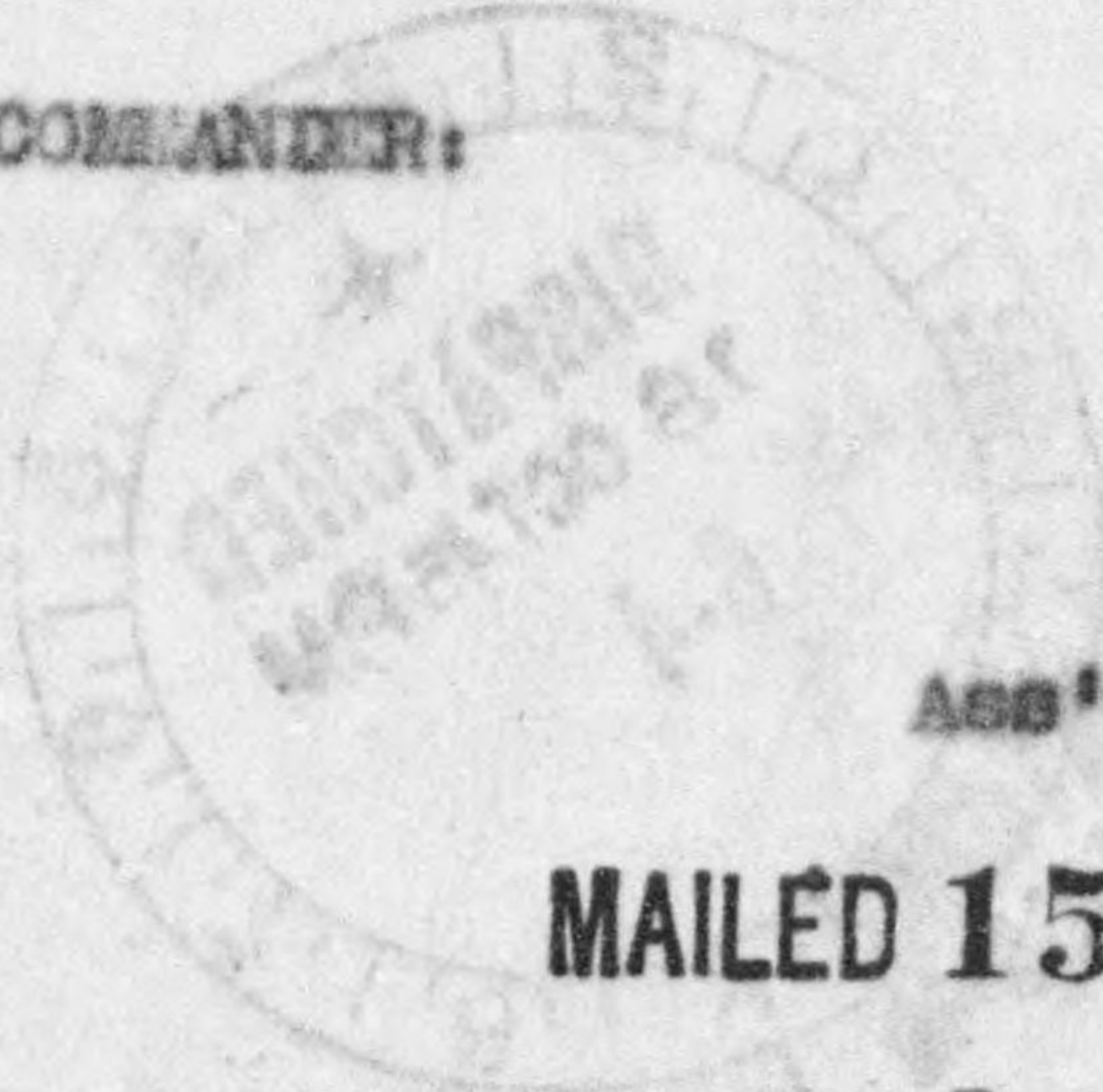

Subject: Tokyo Municipality Buildings.

1. The Japanese Government in letter referred to in par. 1 of the above memo requested that the buildings of the Ministry of Welfare and certain buildings of the Central Meteorological Observatory be exempt from requisition to permit them to be occupied by offices of the Tokyo Municipality.

2. A representative of this office (Major Reed) made an inspection of the facilities requested by the Japanese Government for the Tokyo Municipality. Buildings A and B (see inclosed sketch) are three story office buildings in poor condition and without heating facilities. Building C is a two story storage shed. These two buildings and shed with small auxiliary buildings were formerly used by the Ministry of Welfare. Buildings D, E and F are two story stucco sheds and were used as offices. Building F, reported by the Japanese as being occupied by United States Forces, was found to be partially occupied and contained some United States Army equipment located therein. This space was provided by the Observatory to the Allied Forces weather unit operating with the observatory. All of the above buildings are located within zone No. 1, Tokyo, but are considered undesirable for use by GHQ as office space or covered storage.

3. G-4 Facilities (Major Reed) consulted G-3 Planning (Col Walker) in this matter. Col Walker stated that facilities had not been requisitioned for the Army unit operating with the observatory because the unit was being provided facilities and necessary space within the observatory by the Central Meteorological Observatory. It is a case of Army supervision with the Japanese operating the observatory. Col Walker further stated that there was no objection on the part of this headquarters to the Tokyo Municipality occupying the former buildings of the Central Observatory provided such buildings were released by the observatory to the Japanese Government. In addition to the facilities referred to above, the Central Meteorological Observatory has been assigned the former Japanese Meteorological Buildings and research equipment at Kanda, Tokyo. This assignment was directed by SCAP in their memorandum file AG 000.93 (13 Oct 45)CG-P, dated 13 October 1945, subject: "Disposition of Meteorological Installation."

4. The Government Section, GHQ, advised this office that their section was not concerned in the matter of location or consolidation of the Tokyo Municipality.

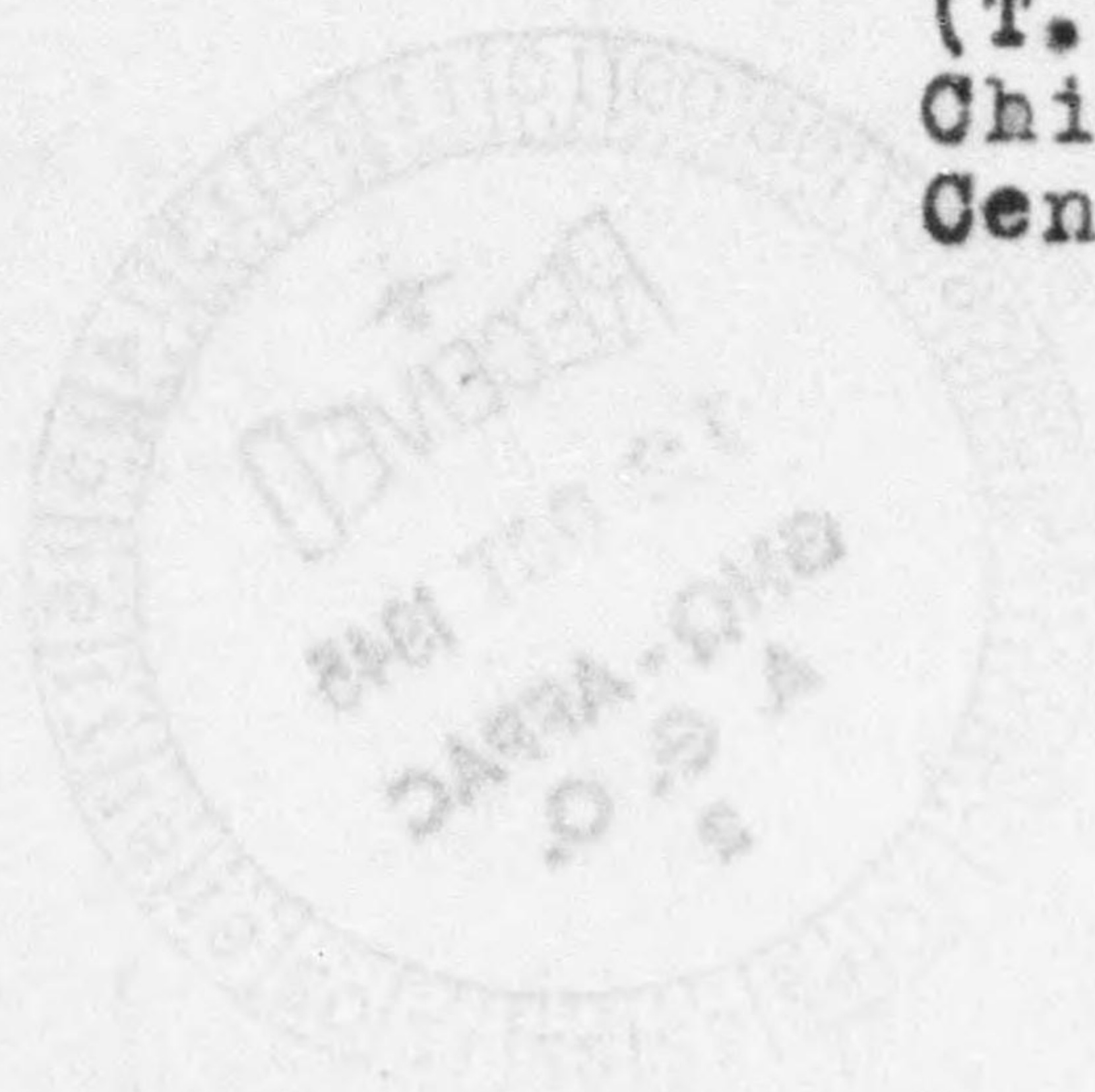


SUBJECT: Rations for French Consul General.

1. Regarding request of Mr. Pierre DePeyre that the Japanese authorities be instructed to provide him with a food allowance. Our comments referring to your numbered paragraphs are as follows:

a. Mr. DePeyre and his staff should receive the usual diplomatic food allowance from the Japanese Government.

b. We suggest that all neutral and Allied diplomatic missions be informed that requests to the Japanese for food, housing and other facilities should be made through GHQ.

c. Such action would be consistent with the general policy of requiring all foreign activities of the Japanese Government and relations between Japan and foreign countries to be conducted through GHQ as the representative of the occupying powers. Full authority for such policy has not yet been received from Washington. Therefore, although the requiring of rationing and other requests to be made through GHQ is a first step, it can be justified on grounds of coordination and planning of the limited facilities and resources available.

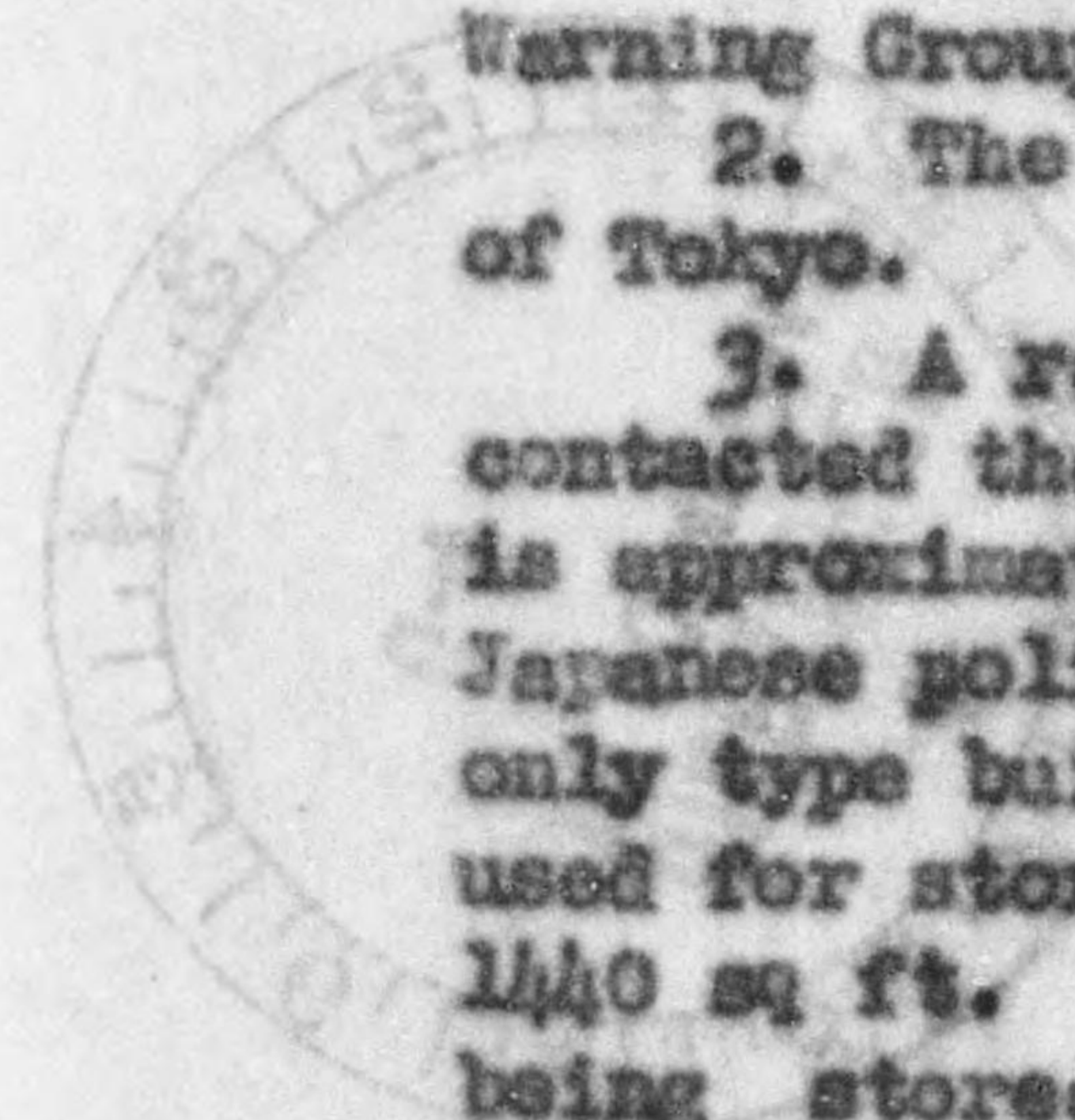

1. The above shed was requested by FEAF for Hq 13th Aircraft Control Warning Group which is billeted in the Army Hall.

2. The shed is located across the street from the Army Hall in Zone #1 of Tokyo.

3. A representative of this office (Major Reed) inspected the shed and contacted the executive officer of the unit (Col Powell) at the site. The shed is approximately half full of tents and provisions belonging to the local Japanese police whose headquarters is located three buildings away. It is the only type building in the general vicinity of the Army Hall that could be used for storage and motor shop. The shed is small, containing approximately 1440 sq ft. Col Powell, Exec Officer of the 13th ACWG stated supplies were being stored outdoors until the shed could be made available.

4. The unit plans to store communication equipment in 960 sq ft and use the remaining 480 sq ft for a motor vehicle shop.

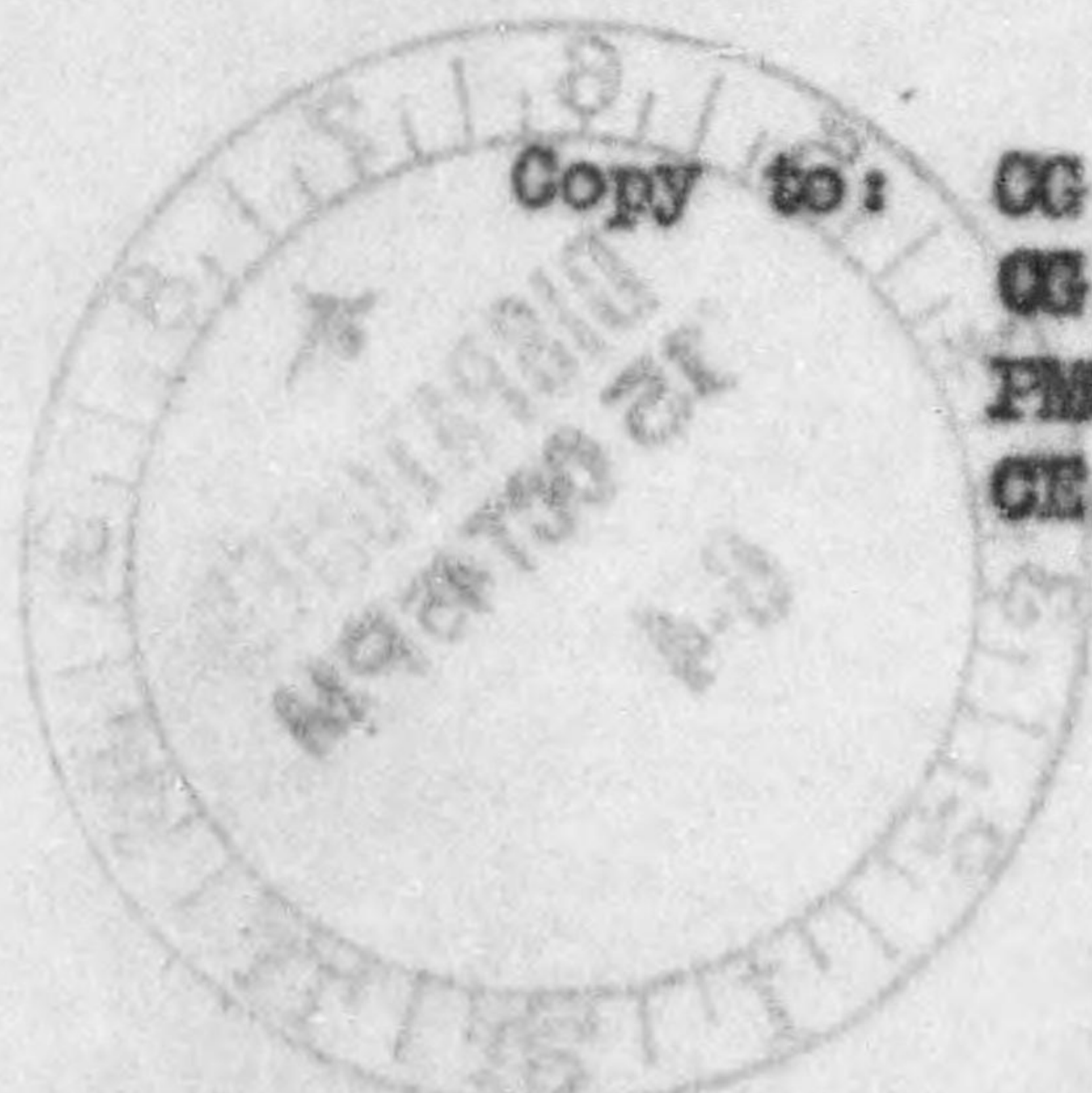

Subject: Acquisition of Residence for Allied Personnel. (FEAF) ✓

1. The residence was requested by FEAF through Eighth Army. General Eastwood directed assignment of the house 27 September 1945.
2. The allocation request from the Eighth Army gave the address of the house as No. 7-1 Ebison St, which was not the correct address. This headquarters, in the Memo referred to in par 1 of the above Memo, requisitioned the house listed in the Eighth Army request. CLO (Mr. Yamagata) advised this office that Dr. Mori had two residences and that the one we had requisitioned was an old style Japanese house and was not suitable for use by a general officer. Mr. Yamagata further stated that Dr. Mori's house located near the Muroyama Reservoir was a modern house and probably the one desired. This information was furnished FEAF, A-4 (Col Hardy) 5 October 1945. FEAF, A-4 (Col Johnson) advised this office (Maj Reed) on 13 October that the address originally furnished by them through Eighth Army (7-1 Ebison St) was the home address where Dr. Mori could be contacted and was not intended as the house for General Whitehead; and that the house desired was located near the Muroyama Reservoir. General Whitehead of FEAF has gone to the US temporary but is expected to return. The house is assigned to Gen Whitehead.
3. This office (Major Reed) has informed the CLO (Mr. Yamagata) of the correct address of the house desired and action is being taken by Mr. Yamagata to make the house available.

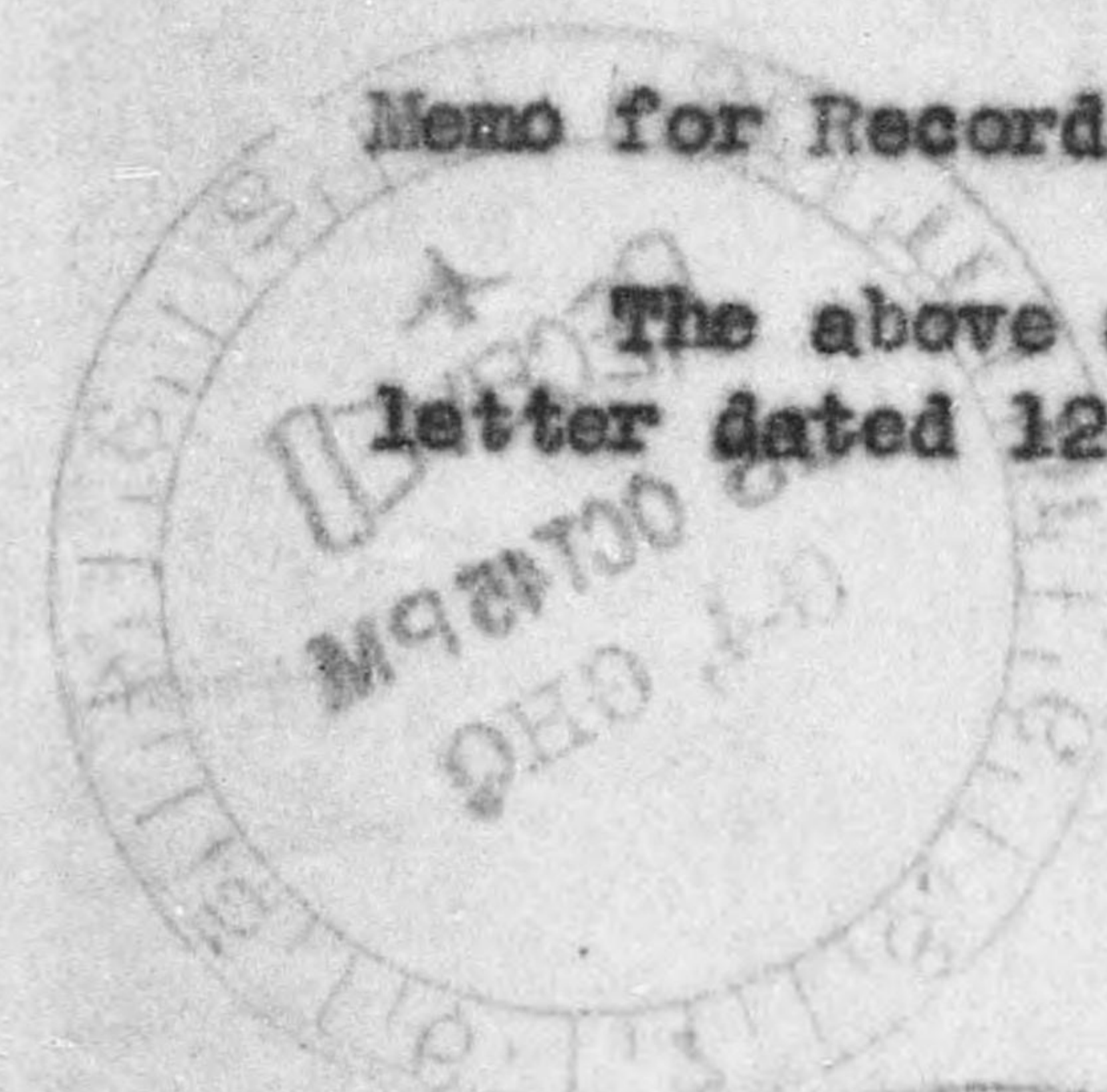



The Tokyo First Military Hospital, (located at Wakamatsu-cho, Ushigome-ku), is the only establishment equipped with special facilities and experienced personnel to make special treatment for the serious patients injured in battles. As previously reported, there are 180,000 and 80,000 Army patients in overseas areas and Japan Proper respectively, of whom a considerable number requires special treatments such as extraction of bullets from human bodies, plastic surgery, etc. It is expected that the said Hospital will receive and treat 500 of most serious patients habitually. (The capacity of this hospital is 500 patients).

With regard to this matter, Surgeon, Lt. Colonel Matsunaga of the War Department reported fully to Colonel Webster, Chief Surgeon of your G.H.Q., on September 25.

It is understood that the Eighth Army requested the occupancy of the said Hospital, but we wish you would appreciate the actual conditions on our part and be good enough to grant permission for continuous use of the said establishment in the future.

It is to be added that other army hospitals, instead of the one in question, will be available for your occupancy.

2. The Military Police Headquarters, listed as item No. 5 on the list of facilities requested for retention by the Japanese Army, is required for use by the Allied Forces. The demand for this establishment, together with detailed instructions, will be made in a separate letter. The facilities listed below, requested for retention by the Japanese Navy, are under consideration for possible use by the Allied Forces. Your office will be informed of the decision of this headquarters as soon as possible.

- a. 1st Branch of N.D., Shinagawa-ku, Kamiosaki (in compound of Navy War College)
- b. Lodging (Kazokukaikan) Kojimachi-ku, Kasumigasaki, 3 Chome, 4.
- c. Lodging (House of Prince Sanjo) Shinagawa-ku, Kamiosaki, 5 Chome, 699.

3. This headquarters, by memorandum, file AG 601 (10 Oct 45)GD, dated 10 October 1945, subject: "Facilities for Use by Allied Occupation Forces," informed your office that there was no foreseen Allied requirement for the Antiaircraft School near Chiba (Item No. 17) and the Junior Tank School near Omiya (Item No. 16).

4. Your request for the remainder of the facilities in memorandum No. 102 has been referred to the Commanding General, Eighth Army, who is responsible for the supervision of disarmament and demobilization of the Japanese Armed Forces within his assigned zone of responsibility, for necessary action. Subject: Retention of Certain Army and Navy Installations by the Japanese Government.

1. The Japanese Govt, by memo file ND 102, dated 7 Oct 45, requested certain facilities be continued in use by the Japanese Army and Navy during the demobilization period. This headquarters has reviewed the above request and physically inspected the facilities located in zones 1 and 2 of the metropolitan Tokyo area.
2. The facilities listed below, referred to as items No. 2, 14 and 15, on the list of Naval facilities and item No. 5 on the list of Army facilities were considered as having possible use by GHQ:
 - a. Item No. 2 (1st Branch ND) is on the northwest edge of Zone 2 and is ideal barracks for about 300 men. Has good heating and latrines on every floor. G-4 (Major Reed) has inspected it.
 - b. Items No. 14 and 15 are in Tokyo and are worth considering for officer or female billets.
 - c. Item No. 5 on Army list (MP Hq) has already been requested by Hq Comdt to house some 300 men and officers.
3. A list of these facilities, together with comments by this office as to their condition, has been submitted to the Hq Comdt, GHQ, for consideration. A list of the remainder of the facilities desired by the Japanese Govt is forwarded to the CG, Eighth Army in the above letter, as the Army commanders are charged with the supervision of the disarmament and demobilization of the Japanese Armed Forces within their respective zones of responsibility (O.I. 4, as amended by 4/12 dated 30 August 1945).
4. The matter of Army Commanders determining and designating facilities to be used by the Japanese Army and Navy in demobilization activities was discussed with G-3 (Col Howell) and G-4 P & C (Col Humphries) on 7 Oct 45 by the Facilities Section (Major Reed). Col Howell and Col Humphries both stated that since the Army commanders are charged with the supervision of demobilization and repatriation within their respective zones of responsibility, such requests should be submitted by the Japanese Government direct to the respective Army commanders and any requests received in this headquarters for facilities for these purposes should be submitted to the Army commanders for necessary action and review by this headquarters if such was determined necessary.





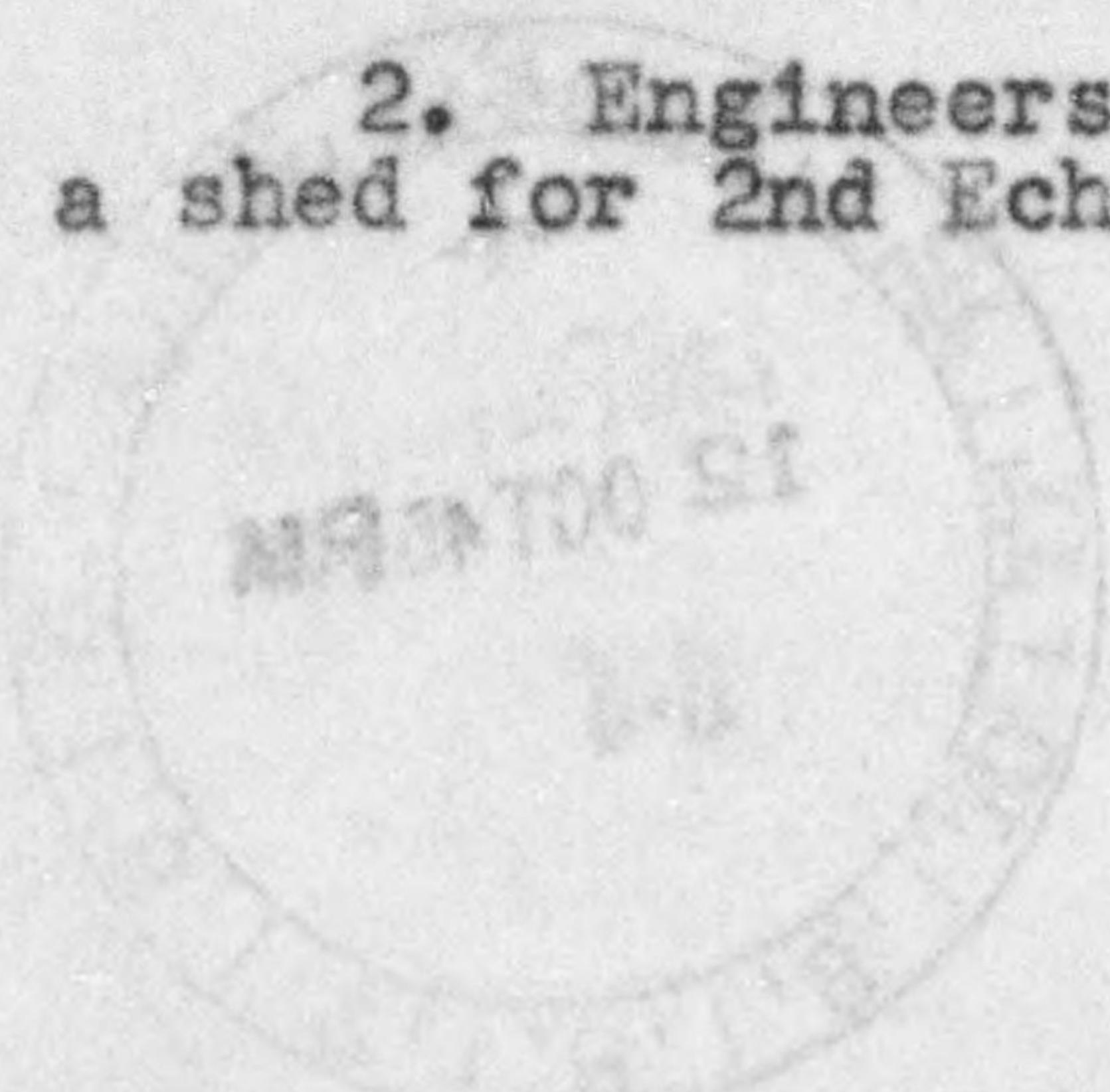

The Foreign Office including Central Liaison Office is moving to the Nissan Bldg. next week.

All the office furnitures of the Foreign Office have been burned. What are now used belong to Education Ministry and they must be returned. Now the Army Fuel Depot at Fuchu, Tokyo is in possession of a large quantity of such furnitures as are required by the Foreign Office.

The Depot is being occupied by 164th Rgt. 1st. Brn. Co. -A of the 8th U.S. Army, but the furniture in question is not used by the occupation forces.

Accordingly the Japanese Government desires that permission be given to transfer from the Depot to the Foreign Office and Central Liaison Office the following items:

His Excellency the Soviet Ambassador and the members of the Soviet Embassy in Tokyo have continued, since the declaration of war by the Soviet Union, to receive the same rations of foodstuffs, fuel, soap, gasoline, etc. as they previously received as diplomats of a neutral country.

On October 2nd, 1945, a Soviet soldier required a competent official of the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry to present himself at the Soviet Embassy, and made a request to him that foodstuffs as enumerated in the accompanying lists be offered to the Soviet Military Delegation.

On inquiry to a member of the former Soviet Embassy who still remains there, the Japanese Foreign Office was assured that the Soviet Embassy had ceased to exist, that the members of the former Soviet Embassy who still remained in this country were to be attached to the Soviet Military Delegation, and that, as they were to obtain foodstuffs through other channels hereafter, they no longer found it necessary to procure food supplies, as diplomats, from the Japanese Foreign Office.

In the view of the Japanese Foreign Office the supply of foodstuffs to the members of the former Soviet Embassy as diplomats should be discontinued, and such supply to them, as the Soviet Military Delegation, should be requested, not directly by them from the Japanese authorities, but through the intermediary of the Supreme Command of the Allied Powers.

The Central Liaison Office would be grateful if the office of the Supreme Commander of the Allied Powers would be good enough to communicate to the this Office, as soon as possible, an expression of its views on the above-mentioned point.

2. The former school for Military Police at Nakano, Tokyo, also known as the Pikigm Kempri Cokko Military Police School, is being used by the allied occupation forces as a billet for troops charged with the police of the Tokyo area. If suitable and comparable facilities can be located by your office in the immediate vicinity, reconsideration will be given to the relocation of these troop units and release of the school. At the present time suitable and adequate billets for these troops is an urgent matter. Should other facilities considered as a desirable substitute be located, your office should refer the information, for reconsideration, to the Commanding General, Eighth Army, through your representative of the Central Liaison Committee connected with his command.

3. This headquarters does not anticipate using the Sobudai army hospital at Kanagawa Prefecture, Zoma-Mura. However, the Commanding General, Eighth Army, should be contacted through your representative of the Central Liaison Committee associated with his command to determine any requirements their headquarters may have for the facility.

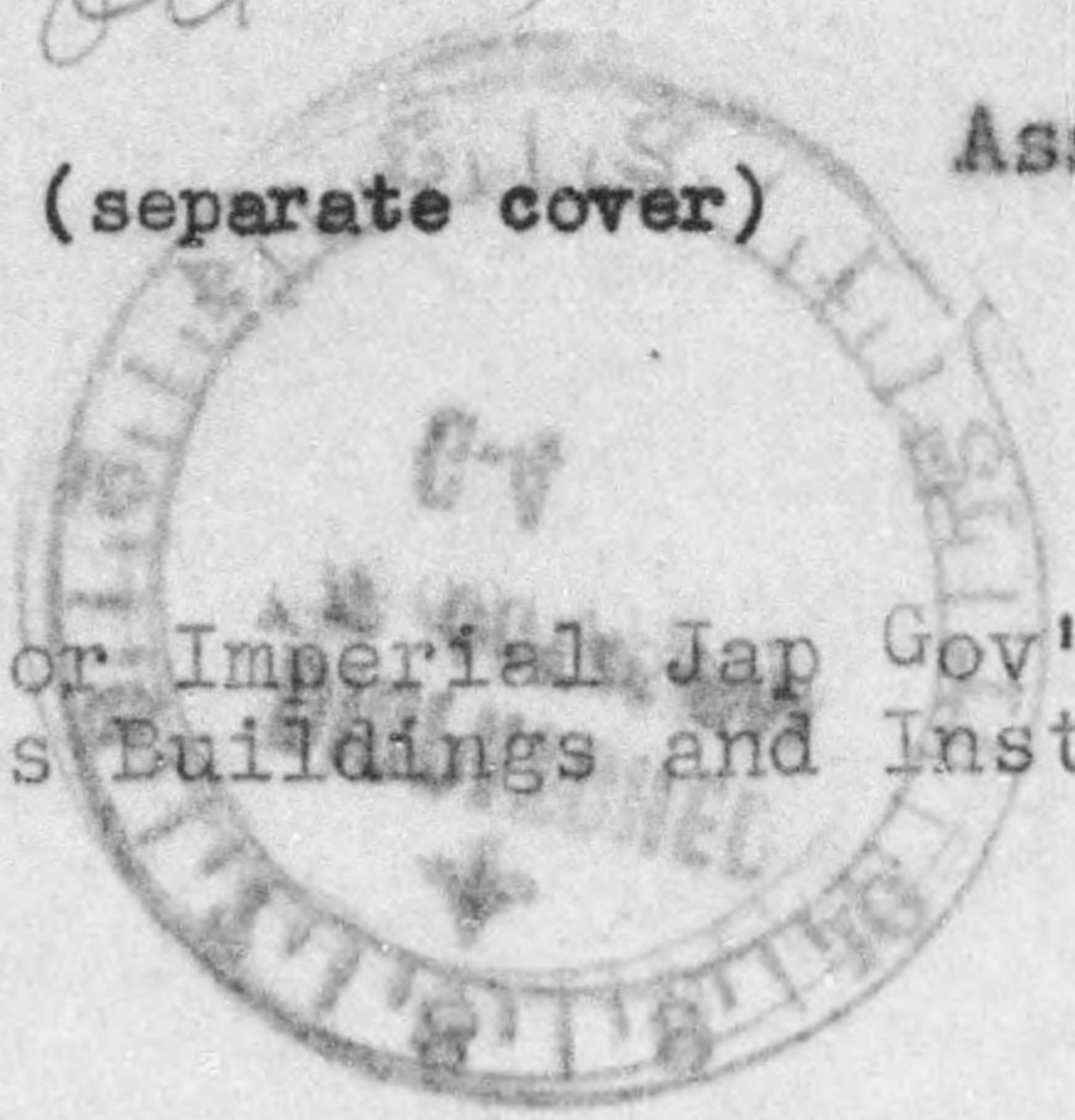

SUBJECT: Request for Buildings by the Japanese Government for Use by Central Meteorological Observatory.

TO : Commanding General, Eighth Army, APO 343.

1. Attention is invited to the inclosed letter with accompanying sketches from the Japanese Government, requesting that the Central Meteorological Observatory in Tokyo be permitted to use certain buildings now occupied by the Japanese Army, for the purpose of concentrating the presently dispersed sections of the observatory into one place in order that their establishment may more efficiently furnish weather data and reports to the Allied Forces.

2. The Japanese Government has been directed to operate meteorological facilities necessary to furnish weather data for the Allied Forces. The Central Meteorological Observatory in Tokyo is one of the principal sources of this weather data for the Allied Forces. It is the desire of this headquarters that the observatory be permitted to use the buildings requested in the inclosed letter or other facilities which are comparable and suitable for the purpose, as determined by your headquarters. The facilities requested for the Central Meteorological Observatory should be made available with the least practicable delay to permit this agency to meet the requirements of the Allied Forces for weather data upon disbanding the Japanese Army and Navy meteorological activities. It is requested that this headquarters be advised of final action taken.

Subject: Request for Buildings by the Japanese Government for Use by Central Meteorological Observatory.

1. G-3 (Col Britton and Col Walker) were consulted in this matter by Facilities Sec (Major Reed). Col Walker stated that the Japanese Govt had been directed to operate existing Japanese Meteorological facilities for our purpose and that the Central Observatory was one of the principal sources of weather data in Tokyo. Col Walker further stated that he concurred in the use of the buildings requested by the Japanese Government for this purpose and that suitable facilities should be provided to permit this agency to meet the requirements of the Allied Forces.

2. It appears that the Central Observatory has made several attempts to get set up by the facilities desired were needed by the Allied Forces.

3. Economic and Scientific Section (Major O'Haney) was contacted and stated that their office was not concerned in this matter.

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1. Reference is made to your Memorandum No. CLO M-37, dated 20 September 1945, stating the requirements of the Central Meteorological Observatory of the Japanese Government for use of the buildings and installations of the Odwada Naval Signal Corps located at Odwada, Iruma-gun, Saitama Prefecture.

2. General Headquarters of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers does not contemplate using these buildings and facilities. However, the Commanding General, Eighth Army, should be contacted through your representative of the Central Liaison Committee associated with their command to determine any requirements their headquarters may have for these buildings and facilities.

1. The Odwada Naval Signal Corps installation is located approx 15 miles from Tokyo in the 8th Army area.

2. The following procedure is being followed in answering Japanese request to use certain facilities:

a. The Japanese request is reviewed by this office and the facility inspected, if practicable. If the facility is required by the Allied Forces, or the use the Japanese people are to make of the facility is disapproved, the Japanese are so notified with an information copy of the correspondence to CG 8th Army.

b. If this headquarters has no requirement for the facility and the use of the facility for the purpose is favorably considered, the Japanese are notified that GHQ has no requirement for the facility and informed to contact the army commander as to
