**NUMEROUS GAPEWORMS ARE FOUND IN TURKEYS**

WASHINGTON—Turkeys are the natural hosts of the gape-worm—a serious pest among young chickens—and are an important factor in their spread, according to experiments just completed by the department of agriculture.

During three winter seasons beginning in December, 1916, a total of 625 chickens and 679 turkeys were examined in the city market here. No gape-worms were found in the chickens, but 22.5 per cent of the turkeys were found to be infested. From one to eighteen worms were found in each of the infested turkeys.

### FLOODING MARKET WITH GERMANY'S MERCHANDISE

German-Made Straw Hat Retails in Brooklyn for \$1, It Is Reported

WASHINGTON, June 16.—An industrially awakened Germany is reaching out into the marts of the world for trade with a persistency and zealousness which already is scattering familiar "Made in Germany" articles broadcast throughout the world.

Even German straw hats are being worn by Americans this summer, and Senator Calder (R.), of New York, a member of the Senate Finance committee, "sporting" one recently which, he said, had retailed in a Brooklyn shop for less than a dollar.

German exporters are understood to have been advised officially the new American tariff law will become operative not later than September 1, but the possible shipments from Germany to the United States should be hastened in anticipation of its earlier enactment.

**Flooding Market**  
And "Made in Germany" goods are reported to be flooding the American market as a result of this semi-official "tip" to their German makers.

The United States, Russia and South America appear to be the favorite fields for the German exporter and "drummer."

There is to be an exclusively German industrial exposition held at Moscow in July which is intended to display before the Russian people the desirability of things "Made in Germany." The soviet government is reported to be already admitting the exhibits, consisting largely of agricultural and transportation displays, free of duty, and to be giving the Germans back of the enterprise every encouragement in carrying out their invasion of the Russian market.

**Germans Send Samples**  
Owing to the difficulties of exchange few German firms are expected to participate in the exposition to be held at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, this fall, but a German steamship, bearing "samples" of "Made in Germany" goods and a staff of trained German salesmen, will visit Rio during the "fair" and will subsequently to other South American ports.

German foreign trade control is being systematically pushed under the paternal supervision of the German government itself with characteristic German foresight, precision and patience, according to semi-official advices received by members of both the Senate Foreign Relations and Finance committees recently.

### Many Taking Stock In Edison Company

Believing in their own company, and having shared to advantage in the steady and continued advances in the price of the stock which they own, and upon which they receive regular quarterly dividends, some four thousand of the Edison men and women are this week putting in after-hour-time, in presenting to their friends and acquaintances, the merits of popular ownership in the company which supplies their electric necessities.

Knowing the affairs of their own company well, this army of four thousand volunteers are making a noteworthy campaign for popular ownership in public utilities, the principle in finance advocated and adhered to by their president, Mr. Miller.

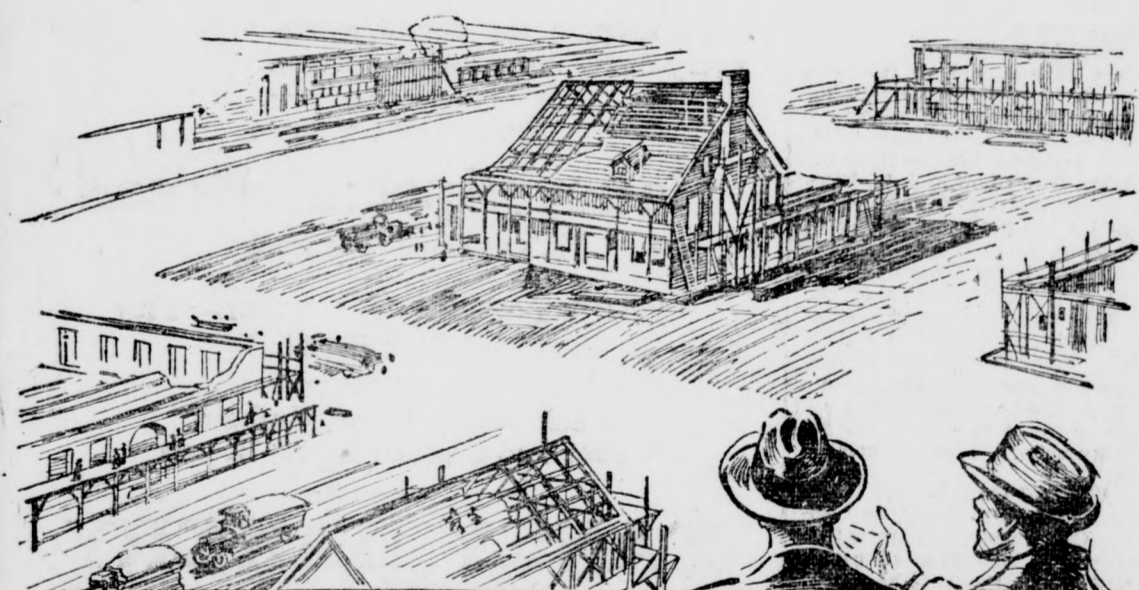

### Wealthy Man Faces \$79,500 'Heart' Suit

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 16.—Picturing himself the victim of a sinister blackmail plot, Philip Whitney, wealthy cattleman of Chase county, Kan., today declared he would return to San Francisco to face trial on a suit brought against him there by Miss Monte Huckshorn, in which she asks that Whitney be sent to jail and that he pay her \$79,500 in damages.

Whitney expressed surprise when told his bond of \$1,000 for appearance for trial before Judge Jacks had been forfeited.

A large, white cross on the mountainside behind the L. C. Brand "castle" has puzzled many Glendale residents recently. It was built by Mr. Brand to be used as an aviator's landmark, and may be seen from an airplane many miles away.

The cross is intended to mark the location of Mr. Brand's landing field, it is understood. It will also guide aviators in trouble to the Brand estate, where there are facilities for repairs. The location of the new cross is to be marked on aviation maps, it is stated.

### Coal Miners Secure Hoover's Indorsement

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Anthracite coal operators have advised Secretary of Commerce Hoover that they have agreed not to advance prices above the scale obtaining the last two weeks, Hoover announced.

Hoover said the scale which had been effective for the past fortnight represents a slight reduction in prices.

Coal miners are not getting a living wage, Hoover declared. He said the irregularity of coal production left coal miners idle half the time and that their earnings when computed on an annual basis reveals they are poorly paid.

This is the first time Mr. Hoover has lent endorsement to the miners' chief claim for consideration in their present fight with the operators against a reduction in wages.

Henry Allen Faces Hearing for Murder... Henry Allen, negro servant of Deputy District Attorney W. Maxwell Burke, now is on trial in the superior court for the alleged murder of H. Joseph Rouse, superintendent of the La Crescenta water company, who was shot New Year's Eve at La Crescenta lodge by the defendant. Burke took the stand yesterday in the latter's defense.

Council assembled at 7:15 p. m., all members present. Reading of the minutes set aside. Committee from the Federation of Parent-Teachers' association, represented by Mrs. John Robert White, appeared and asked that an appropriation be made for the upkeep of city play grounds. Matter was discussed and it was laid over until Monday night.

**Bids for Fire Hose**  
In accordance with advertisement calling for same, bids were received at this time, read and publicly declared from the following bidders for fire hose: B. F. **Improvement of Brand**

## BLIND MAN WILL REGAIN EYESIGHT IS BELIEVED

'Old Bill' Rabe to See Again After Thirty Years of Blindness, Claim

CHICAGO, June 16.—The stars will shine and the flowers will bloom again for "Old Bill" Rabe After thirty years in the limbo of the blind the seventy-two year old mendicant is to recover his sight; to resume his old trade of tailor, and to take a new lease on life. All through the kindly aid of a social welfare worker whose name he doesn't know.

"For she deserves the credit," he asserts.

For three decades "Old Bill" in the guise of a beggar, has held out his battered tin cup to passersby on Chicago Commons. He was a familiar figure until one day his "patrons" missed their favorite charity. The works of the Illinois Charitable Eye and Ear Infirmary had been told to "Bill."

Soon Dr. E. K. Finley, of the infirmary, is to remove the bandages that have shielded the one-time beggar's eyes from light since his operation. The doctor declares the sight is sure to return.

Thirty Years Ago!  
"Oh, I haven't forgotten what I knew of the tailoring business before I went blind those thirty long years ago!" Bill says. "Mary and I have lived too long in that dark basement."

"Can't say that I'll be able to have things like the old days when I was almost rich. Used to own an apartment building. Then there were my boys and girls—eight of them. But I lost them all with my sight."

So "Old Bill" is planning a restoration of "the things that count for something in life"—a joining once more with the people who offer more than a "beggar's blessing" for their daily food, even tiresome, dreary days in some tiny shop, with no compensating hurry and scuffle of the street to make up for its dinginess.

"You see, I sort of thought Mary would like me to work again," he says.

**PARIS STREETS SOON TO GET MODERN PAVEMENTS**

PARIS—Jolting down the grand boulevards of Paris in omnibuses or motor car soon will be a thing of the past. Even the hardest-boiled of Parisian taxi drivers won't be able to jounce his passenger one single jounce.
