Income Sufficient to Pay State's Expense

SACRAMENTO, June 13 .- Definite announcement that there will be no ad valorem tax during the coming fiscal year is made by the state board of equalization. The board reported that the income for the fiscal period will exceed \$40,000,000, the sum stipulated by the legislature as necessary to maintain the state government

during the year. Assessments completed will bring in \$36,195,353.30, an in-crease of \$1,416,032.35 over last vear.

Commenting on business condiions, the equalization board says: "All classes of utilities and franchise companies represented in the state's tax sources show at least a normal increase in the amount of business during the year 1922, except express com-panies, which show a slight decrease.

"The best indication of the business conditions of the state generally is shown in the reports of the business corporations. These show uniformly, from all parts of the state, both increased business and better results of business than that of the previous year."
