By the set of 21st December 1814, it is enjoined on every slaveholder to have one white person as an averseer for every thirty slaves on his plantation or in his possession—the penalty being 50 dellars by the act of 1807. We believe that this act is not well or usua ly enforced; and that there are many plantations, where a white averager is not kept for every 50 or 60 slaves. Parish judges and justices of the peace have summary authority in such instances.

There is a part of the Black code strictly prohibiting slaveholders from renting out tasir slaves, or from allowing them to earn or possess money on their own second, which should certainly be enforced. When alever are hired out,or worse, when so now they are permitted to work for themselves, paying their owners for their time-they are too much at larger and more likely to be infected. Any person can challenge and fine a slave at large without a special permission for a limited time.
