ZEPPELIN L-20 WAS UNABLE TO KEEP UP

From Britain; Wrecked In Norway

London, May 4.—The Zeppelin L-20, which was wrecked in falling at Hafso Flord, Norway, belonged to a squadron of five airships which attacked the east coasts of England and Scotland Tuesday night, according to a member of Much interest exists concerning the policy towards the captured rebels. 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



Indictment of British Consular System in China by Traveler-From Orient

The matter of wheat shipments to he Orient has engaged a considerable nount of attention recently, and the westward flow of grain from the prairie, would be found among the illions of people on the opposite shores of the Pacific. "To show how the use of flour has developed," he said, "I may mention that a few years ago when I started operations in Shanghal, there were only five mills, none of large capacity, whereas now there are eighteen run-ning constantly. Of course they are not as large as those on this side, as the conditions there are not compar-able with those in the great grain pro-ducing states and provinces of the plains on this continent. The wheat of China is grown in small patches, and primitive implements are used to gar-ner it. Most of the grain comes down by boat to the mills to be ground When political conditions are unset-tled, as at present, the supplies are in-

Asked as to the importation of flour from America, Mr. Melville observed: "While the Chinese are learning to use wheat in place of rice, it is doubtful whether rice will ever be completely displaced as the staple food. The ten-lency is rather to make China inde-pendent of outside importations of condstuffs, and the increase in demand will be met probably by more acreage along the river banks being devoted to grain growing than has hitherto beer

Me Melville, however, expressed the pinion that the opportunity for ship-ments would eventually come, and meanwhile the chance for millers was very good, although decreasing as en-erprising foreigners located plants at the principal ports.
